#### Red Cross Seeks 50,000 Additional Reserve Nurses

Washington, D. C.,-Reports from American Red Cross chapters throughout the country reveal that women are responding to the call for 50,000 First Reserve Red Cross nurses, officials here announced.

In making the plea for the enrollment of additional nurses, Miss Mary Beard, director of the Red Cross Nursing Service, declared, "To place the nation's nursing program on a full wartime basis, the Red Cross must increase its nursing reserve by more than 50,000 trained nurses.

"The Red Cross First Reserve, totaling approximately 24,000, is comprised of single nurses, under 40, who are subject to call to active duty with the armed forces. Members of the Second Reserve, totaling 34,000 are for various reasons unavailable for military duty, but are prepared to serve in disasters, wartime epidemics, and to reinforce nursing staffs of civilian hospitals or do public health work for


civilian defense. Miss Beard issued the call for nurses following a conference with Major Julia O. Flikke, superintendent of the Army Nursing Corps and Miss Sue S. Dauser, superintendent of the Navy Nursing Corps.


Major Flikke reported that at least 10,000 additional nurses are needed for Army duty. Miss Dauser said that more than 1,390 additional nurses will be required to keep pace with the expanding personnel of the Navy.

Red Cross officials here declared that at the close of the first World War, 22,854 regular nurses and Red Cross Reserve Nurses were serving with the Army and 1,500 with the Navy.

This body represents practically all the evangelical denominations and missionary agencies in the United States and Canada. In addition, to these 1700 there are several hundred Protestant missionaries sent out from Europe and from the British Isles. American missionary workers are serving as follows: in Japan, 82; in Korea, 29; in Japan-occupied China, 862; in Indo-China, 56; in Thailand, 83; in British Malaya, 69; in the Netherlands East Indies, 59; in the Phillippine Islands, 424; while 47 are known to be on the high seas en route to or from the United States. In addition to this group, there are more than 2,000 American Protestant missionaries in various parts of Free China, 300 in Burma, and several in-various islands of Oceania,

> The Foreign Missions Conference of North America, which coordinates the overseas mission activities of practically all the major Christian agencies of the United States and Canada, has a new executive secretary in the person of Miss Sue Weddell, who succeeds Miss Florence Tyler, retired. Miss Weddell is widely known as an author, teacher, and lecturer. She has been general secretary of the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions of the Reformed Church in America, and ha shad a wide experience as a missionary and educational administrator. A graduate of Bucknell College, she was with the Y. W. C. A. War Work Council and director of the Hostess House at Plattsburg, N. Y., during the Dorld War; and later with the National Board of the Y. W. C. A. Since 1928 she has been with the Reformed Church in its missionary work, and was a delegate to the World Conference in Madras, India, in 1938/
