





Former Vice Procident Passes Away In Chicago After Long Illness.

Chicago,-Adlai E. Stevenson, vice president of the United States through the second Cleveland administration, fled Saturday night at a hospital here, after an illness of several months. His wife and three children were at his bedside,

Adlai Ewing Stevenson, had a long and honorable public career. He was rice president from 1893 to 1897. In 1900 he again was nominated by the Democratic party and ran with Wildam Jennings Bryan, the party's canlidate for president, but was defeated. He served as a member of the Portyfourth and Forty-sixth congresses. From 1885 to 1889 he served as first assistant postdigator garron -under President Cleveland.

His last appearance as a candidate for public office was in 1908, when he was nominated for governor of littuels by the Democratic party and was deleated by Charles S. Deneen, republi-

He was born in Christian county, Kentucky, Oct. 23, 1835, of Scotch-Irish parentage.

Answer.-We are to understand that the besvenly country for which Abra-bam, Isaac and Jacob and all the faithfull of the fleshly house of Israel waited as pilgrims and strangers is after all to be earthly, in the sense of being on the earth; but that it will be beavenly in the sense that its government, regulations, laws, etc., will be beavenly, and not "earthly, sensual, devilish." The inheritance promised the Jews was Canaan, in Asia (Genesis 12:1-5), and St. Stephen informed us (Acts 7:5) that they are still waiting to rereive it from God's hands.
