

Government Will Auction Land

The Secretary of the Interior has au thorized the sale at public auction at the United States Land Office at Las Cruces, New Mexico, on November 22, 1916, of the property known as "Ojo Callente Reservation" situated in Sorseco county, New Mexico. It comprises five sections of land on which were situated the buildings of the former Hot Springs reservation.

There are 3,200 acres to be sold, and the lands are reported to be valuable for grazing purposes. They contain about 20 springs, and there is considerable running water on the reservation The city of Monticello claims certain rights by appropriations of the waters from the springs. The land is to be old in one body to the highest bidder. He will be required to make a deposit at the time of sale equal to 20 per cent of the amount of his bid, and increase said deposit to 40 per cent within ten days thereafter, the balance to be paid in two equal annual installments.

Person desiring further information may secure the same by addressing the Register and Receiver of the United States Land Office, Las Cruces, or the Commissioner of the General Land Office, Washington.




