The Mitchells are now living at Moore's camp, but plan to rebuild their home. He is a former owner of the City Cafe.

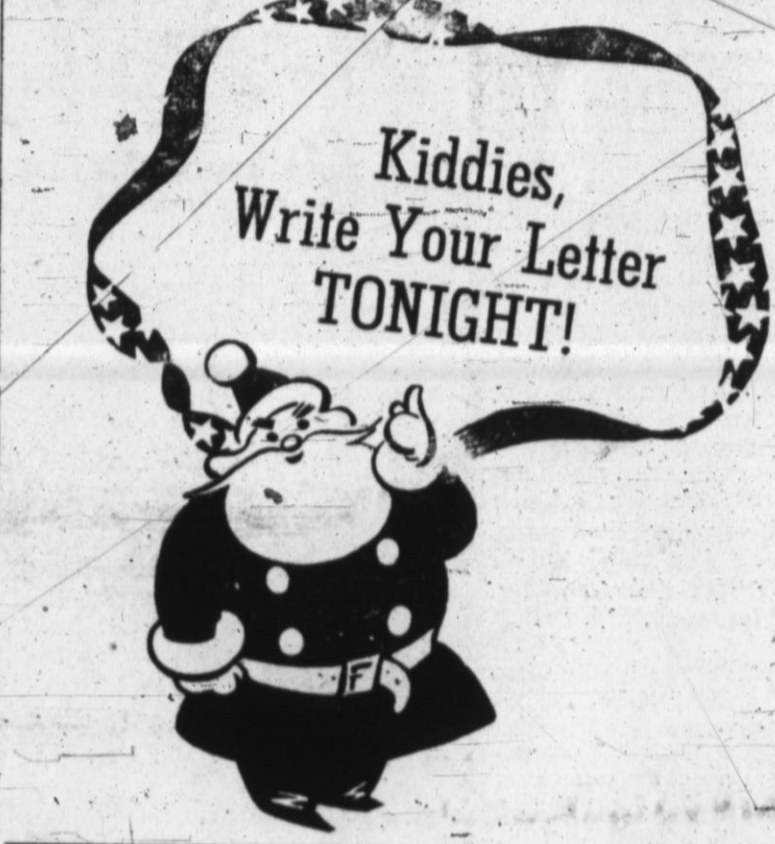


Mr. Campbell's address was printed in the Congressional Record of November 22, 1937 by request of Hon. Joseph B. Shannon of Missouri.
