What's In A Name?

Veal birds cannot fly but they make the best possible meat course for hungry folks. Mrs. W. M. Cogdell knows just how to prepare them for requested re-appearances. Here's her re-



VEAL BIRDS

Select lean veal or round steak and cut in uniform slices, trim and pound lightly until flat. Chop the trimmings of the meat fine and add 1 cup biscuit or toasted bread crumbs/1 cup cornbread crumbs, a few slices of onion chopped fine and browned in a little butter, salt and pepper and a few sprinkles of sage. Moisten with Kinard, J. W. Kirby, Paul Mat-1 well-beaten egg and a little cold water. (The dressing should be hers, C. F. Moore, Clara McLean, stiff for best results.) Sprinkle the veal slices with salt and pepper J. H. Olson, G. A. F. Parker, F. and spread with dressing, roll up and fasten securely with toothpicks. Roll in flour and brown in hot/fot. 





POTATO GROWING IRRIGATION By Joe Ballinger

Growing potatoes under irgation is about the same proess all over the United Stateshat is, the sub or corrugation ystem of irrigation.


