"There, now, don't cry," Stitsel said, as he stroked her hair. "I know you did what you thought best."

"I intended to kill my father and my brother John," Miss Stitsel tolc the police, who arrested her immediately after her father's death. "I fell that I ought to kill them. I did not intend to kill myself, but expected to take my punishment."

Police say the woman shot her parent under the delusion she was doing an act of mercy. Stitsel, a civil war veteran, had suffered from rheumatism, contracted from wounds received in the battle of Lookout Mountain:

He was shot as he sat in a bedroom in the rear of his store " Physicians say her act was one of insanity. Some years ago she underwent an operation and she had been the victim of constantly increasing melancholia. Her family had been warned that she would go insane if this continued. Her trouble took the form of an excess pity for her father.
