September 15, 1945

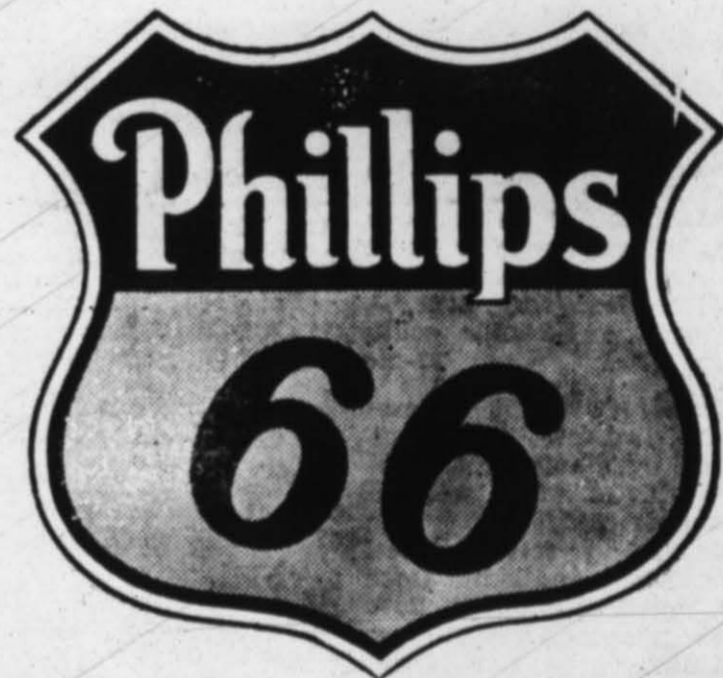

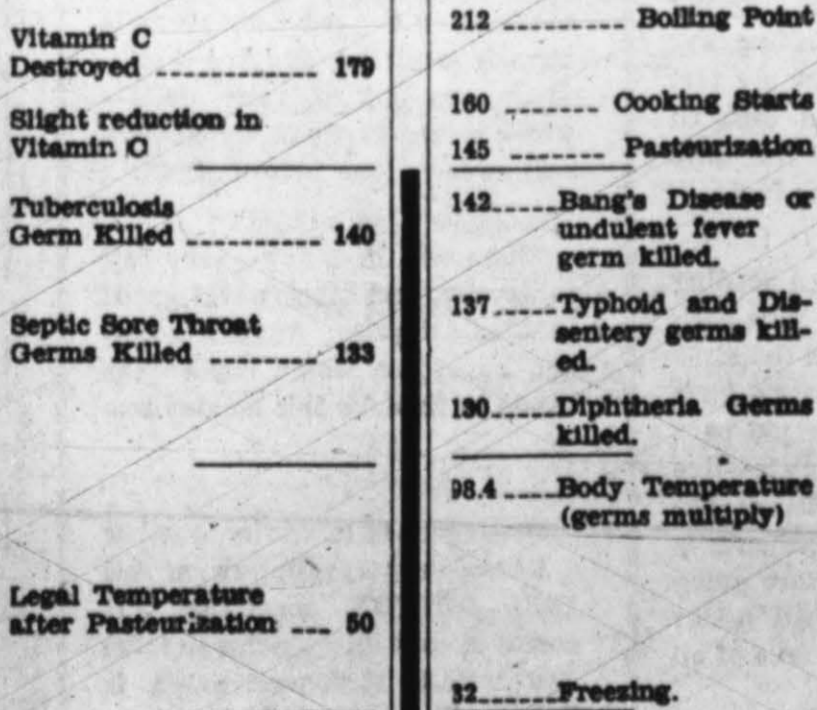

AL FRESCO PARTY ENJOYED BY CLUB

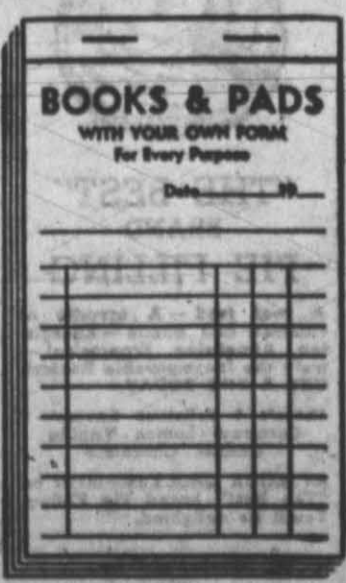

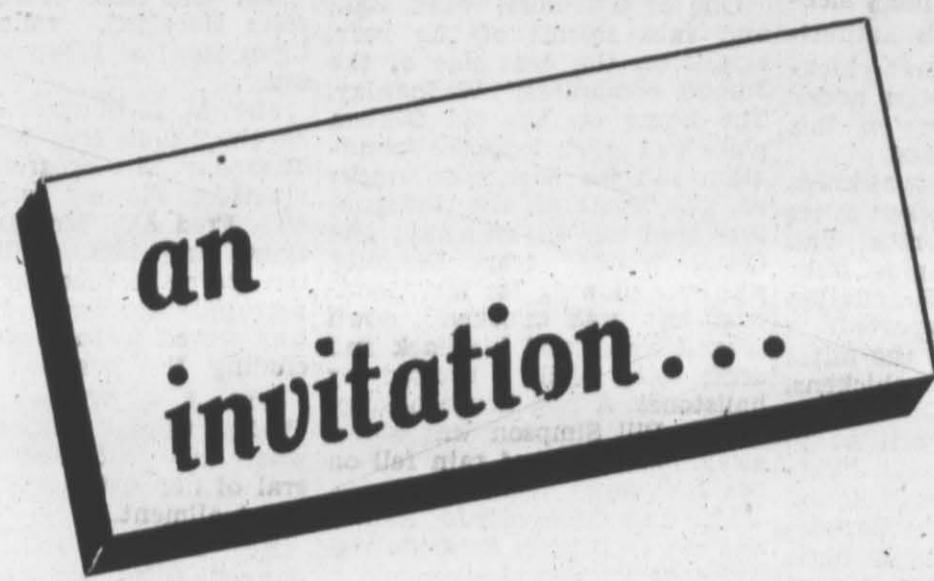

If you have any thought that saving used fats is one of those wartime chores we can drop, now that Victory is here, please consider these facts and tell them to your neighbors.

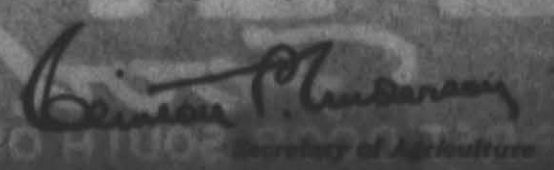
