Runways are now complete and three planes—one belonging to J. V. Campbell and two belonging to Jesse Wofford are kept at the port regularly. When hangar facilities are completed—and work is expected to start in the near future—there will be facilities for six or eight planes at the port, which is under the management of Carl Kropff and Bill Bowman. In addition, the hangar will provide storage space for tools and room for servicing.

Buried fuel tanks have already been installed at the airport, and flight instruction service is available there at all times. In addition, planes may be rented by qualified pilots.

Clover Airport is due to be designated on official maps issued by the Civil Aeronautics Authority about Dec. 1, and will qualify as a Class A port.

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Special Insignia Presented to Red Cross Volunteers

Special insignia for "meritorious personal service" will be presented to many long-time volunteers in Deaf Smith County, according to E. C. Eubanks, chairman of the local Red Cross Chapter, who says that the recognition will be made on the basis of actual hours worked in the various Red Cross programs. Most of the local volunteers thus recognized will be women who have given their time to the Red Cross sewing program during the war.

A careful record of this work has been kept, Eubanks said, pointing out that red ribbon bars will be given to volunteers with 12 months service. To the bars will be added silver stripes denoting one or more units of 500 hours' service and gold stripes denoting 5,000 hours. Volunteers with a minimum of 200 hours will receive certificates signed in facsimile by President Truman and National Chairman Basil O'Connor.

All certificate holders may wear the insignia in the form of pins for women and buttons for men. The insignia will bear the inscription, "World War II" below the familiar red cross.

Hereford High School students revealed a natural talent for mountain "feudin'" when they packed their shootin' irons to school Tuesday and ushered in Saddle Hawkins Day with three casualties.

The score: One boy, Bobby Carnahan, treated for minor powder burns; two others, Kenneth Finley and Dale Russell, the victims of gunshot wounds—luckily minor.

Bobby was burned when Helen Ann Pitman attempted to remove a blank cartridge which some over-enthusiastic Dogpatchers had put in her gun. The other injuries were the result of a duel which turned out too realistic when at least one of the guns was loaded. One of the duelers, Dale Russell, was injured when the bullet grazed his leg and went on to lodge in the leg of Kenneth Finley, a bystander at the duel.

PHENOTHIAZINE FOR FARM FLOCKS

All sheep in farm flocks—ewes, rams and lambs—should be dosed late this fall or early winter with phenothiazine and again in the spring after lambing time. From at least May 1, through September, the one-to-nine phenothiazine-salt mixture should be accessible in a covered feeder that protects it from the weather.

In Kentucky tests during the past three years, involving 30,000 breeding ewes, this program (in connection with generally recognized good farm flock practices, such as pasture rotation), eliminated the dosing of any lambs in more than 90 percent of the flocks, and made possible the growing out of even the latest lambs to good market weights and finish. The average increase in weight per lamb was nearly 12 pounds above normal pre-war average. The average annual cost for phenothiazine was less than 30 cents per ewe.

Farmers and ranchers in doubt as to time and frequency of treatment best suited to their conditions and purposes should consult their state agricultural college.

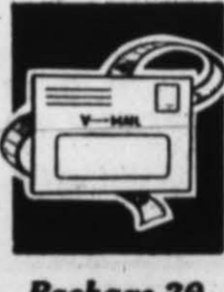

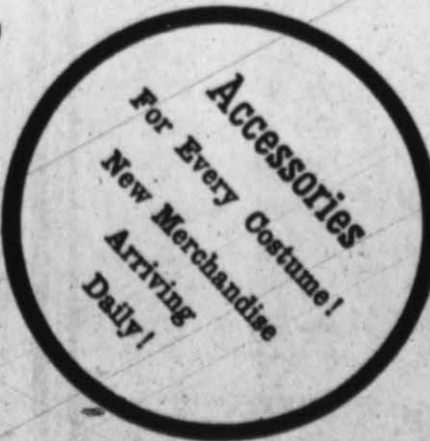
