More saying 'I do' instead of 'I don't'

More than twice as many marriage licenses were issued as divorces granted in Deaf Smith County in 1991.

Records in the office of District Clerk Lola Faye Veazey show that 78 couples were divorced in 1991.

Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland and his staff issued 187 marriage licenses last year. Two weddings apparently never came off.

A clergyman or judge who reads the marriage vows for a couple ordinarily takes responsibility for sending the license back to the clerk's office for recording. The license is returned to the married couple for the bride's book or a family scrapbook.

Divorce proceedings are filed in the district clerk's office and move through 222nd District Court for adjudication.

Mrs. Veazey said 93 divorce suits were filed last year. Some of those apparently were not settled during the year, either by divorce decree or reconciliation.

Included in the 78 divorces granted in 1991 by District Judge David Wesley Gulley may have been some that were filed in an earlier year.

Obtaining a marriage license or filing for divorce is not a "gimme."

A couple planning to marry must pay \$25 for the privilege. Half the fee stays in Deaf Smith County but the other half is forwarded to the State of Texas.

"Half of the fee, \$12.50, goes to the state for the wife and child abuse prevention fund," said Ruland. "I'm not sure where it's spent."

The cost is greater for a couple wanting to dissolve the marriage.

A filing fee of \$125 is charged for a divorce. The state's judicial education fund benefits by \$40 from the fee. The remaining \$85 goes into the county's general fund.

"A \$40 fee is added to every civil suit filed in district court," Veazey said. A divorce action qualifies as a civil lawsuit.

The busiest month for marriage licenses in 1991 in Deaf Smith County was not June, traditionally the month of brides and weddings.

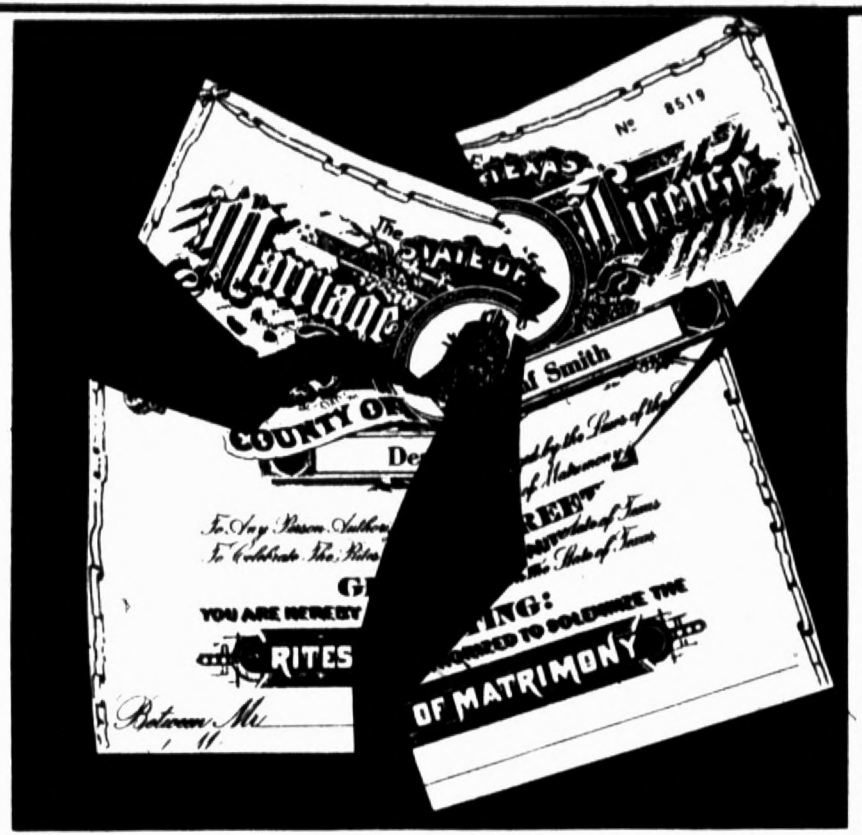
The business month for issuing licenses was May. Those licenses could have been used in June. In May, 28 licenses taken out. October was second with 26 couples paying \$25 for the license.

During August, 23 couples bought licenses; in December, 20 were issued.

March was the slowest month for

marriage licenses, when only two were issued.

Others were January, nine; February, 16; April, 11; June, 16; July 14; September, eight, and November, 14.

A marriage license is valid for 30 days. If the wedding is postponed beyond a month, a new license is required, with the attendant \$25 fee.

State law also allows for an "informal marriage" to be recorded

in the county. That also costs \$25, and five couples went that route in 1991.

Unhappy couples and their attorneys show up in the district clerk's records in spurts.

June, supposedly the wedding month, was divorce month in Deaf Smith County in '91. Suits were filed in June to dissolve 13 marriages. July

Columbus is probably getting a real bum rap

EDITOR'S NOTE - A sailor of no small skill himself, AP Newsfeatures Writer Sid Moody figures Christopher Columbus is getting a bum rap from revisionist historians, especially those who question his seamanship. Moody, sailing in Columbus' wake, found that the explorer was a remarkable navigator "with an oceanic sixth sense amounting to genius."

AP Newsfeatures Writer 'Tis 1992 and the season to bash Christopher Columbus on his quinqucentenary for everything that ails the New World from boll weevils, nagging backaches and Congress to teen-age pregnancy, Public Television fund drives and water in your carburetor.

Formerly a hero every 100 years, Chris this time around has been whipsawed posthumously by revisionist historians. If he'd stayed home, they argue, fellow Europeans wouldn't have decimated the Indians, plundered the Americas and outraged the environment. Seems a bit ex post facto and unfair, like blaming Adam and Eve for the Medellin Cartel.

As a fellow navigator who has sailed in Columbus' wake, from the farthest Antilles and across the Atlantic to Spain, I rush to his defense. Whatever else he was or was not, or may or may not have started, Christopher was a helluva mariner. Helluva.

Chris and I have both made landfalls in the Bahamas. I did so (See COLUMBUS, Page 2A)

with a portfolio of charts, an accurate sextant and timepiece, volumes of navigational tables the size of phone books, an electronic depth sounder and direction finder - and a specific idea of destination. Columbus (me, too) had a compass, a calibrated piece of wood with a weighted string to sight the North Star and noon sun (which he rarely used), 1,200 feet of line with a weight to feel for the bottom, a half-hour glass and no charts other than the misguided belief that Japan or China lay ahead. With only those, but an oceanic sixth sense amounting to genius, he crossed the Atlantic and back four times.

In his "Conquest of Paradise," Kirkpatrick Sale questions Chris' seamanship for losing his flagship Santa Maria to a reef near Cap Haitien, Haiti, early Christmas Day 1492. Well, the watch captain had abandoned his post for some sack time, leaving the helm to a cabin boy, and the crew may have had too much yule wine. Happens.

The amazing thing is that Columbus got behind the reef at all. My palms were sweating when I tried. You can't see the reef for the silt-brown water. The only buoy in sight was either red rusted to black or black rusted to red.

At its worst, navigating at sea is like attempting to roll those steel balls into the clown's eyes while underfoot it's 9.2 Richter. No one expects surgeons to do lobotomies in the heaving dark, but navigators are assumed to always have the answer when worried crewmen ask: "When do we get there, Cap'n Chris?"

Admittedly, Columbus had a lot of luck. If, as many think, the island of San Salvador in the Bahamas was his first landfall, he was heading for some world-class reefs if he'd missed it. In the Bahamas you can go from hundreds of fathoms to CRASH! in a matter of yards. This accounts for waters that look like a drowned peacock and the fact that prudent Bahamians don't sail at night.

My landfall on San Salvador was, by design, in daylight. Good thing. At night that shoreline was guarded by a kerosene lantern similar to Mrs. O'Leary's that burned down Chicago, except this one had been unfit for a month because its keeper had broken his leg falling off the ladder up the palm tree where the dubious beacon was nailed.

Columbus aimed farther south on his second crossing, hitting bang on the best landfall entering the Caribbean, the island of Marie Galante off Guadeloupe. Sixty miles north he may well have gone "bonk!" on the rocks of low-slung Barbuda. This left him a leisurely downwind slide westbound across the tumultuous Anegada Passage.

I crossed it eastbound against wind, current, waves steep as a staircase and the better judgment of two crew members alternately going up-up in the ship's bucket.

The point being in the case of Anegada and San Salvador is that navigators hedge against bad luck (such as heaving to at night in questionable waters) and exploit it when it's good (such as sailing west in easterly trade winds). Columbus, flying blind, used his luck brilliantly.

My knees still quake remembering the day I found the awesome cliff of Cape Cabron on the northeast point of the Dominican Republic. It rises 500 feet out of a mile-deep sea. I found it in the fog ("They" say there's no fog in the Caribbean. "They" lie.) with the aid of a sextant and several other devices Columbus had never heard of. It suddenly appeared 50 stories right over my head. Columbus, on the other hand, used its prominence as a departure point for the voyage home.

Basically - and he excelled at it - Columbus navigated by dead (from "deduced") reckoning. This means recording each compass heading, closely estimating distance run on that course and writing all the lines and zig-zags down. Without an accurate clock, he could only estimate longitude. He could tell rough time from the star Kochab in the Little Dipper which circles Polaris every 24 hours like a clock hand. He could approximate latitude with sights of the sun at noon and Polaris at dawn and dusk when both the celestial body and the horizon were visible. This remains a technique today with the modern sextant.

My admiration for the Genoese mariner increased when I navigated a 43-foot sailboat from Cape Cod to the Virgin Islands. (Santa Maria was about 80 feet.) Once past Bermuda, the course is due south. No sweat for latitude. But a longitudinal mistake meant the reefs between St. Thomas and Puerto Rico to the west and the Anegada reefs eastward.

Chris, of course, wouldn't have known about either one. He just sailed on, his sixth sense fine-tuned to land, clouds, birds, floating vegetation, land-influenced wave patterns. Whatever his inner doubts and fears the navigator must effect

certitude at all times. Anything less makes the crew goosy.

If I was goosy myself because of trepidation of hitting known quantities, I had to tip my cap to Christopher's iron nerves. Discovering stuff in a small boat in a sea of ignorance just takes guts.

After eight-plus days, I figured we were running out of ocean. As an explorer, Chris never had that consolation. He just sailed on. Prudently.

Since the skies were cloudy, I presumed, correctly, that a star fix that evening was out. So I shot as many sun sights as I could, producing a hen's scratch of intersecting lines. Reassuring. But not convincing. Which is why fishermen on Anegada in the crude homemade sloops reportedly have the best in stainless-steel rigging salvaged from crashed yachts.

Landfalls give navigators the pits in the pit of their stomachs. And if I had butterflies in my pit with all the data I had at my disposal, what went on in Chris' innards for months on end? Stout fella.

So I checked and rechecked my figures, resolved I had to develop faith in them, lacking any alternative, peeled a banana with studied calm and sailed on. The captain, who happened to be a son of mine, turned in, figuring the Old Man knew what he was doing and if he didn't, it was all his fault.

With time and water running out by my calculation, I called to the helmsman. "See any land, Schlitz?" (His father was a brewmeister in Milwaukee.)

The boat lifted on the crest of a wave, and there were the lights of St. Thomas dead ahead, a bull's eye as it turned out after 1,400 miles.

"Tierra!" I cried as had Rodrigo de Triano, the teen-age lookout who first spotted the waves of the New World for Columbus. My son grunted and rolled over. I popped two beers, one for me and one for Chris as if to say in the way of navigators: "Tierra? Of course. What else did you expect?"

Eastbound across the Atlantic to Spain via the Azores in Columbus' track was a pleasure. There's nothing to hit except sleeping freighters on autopilot or the occasional sperm whale. You get to know the stars, which have led mariners since mankind first pushed off from shore, on a first name basis. Whenever I see Arcturus even today, I silently say: "Thanks, ol' buddy."

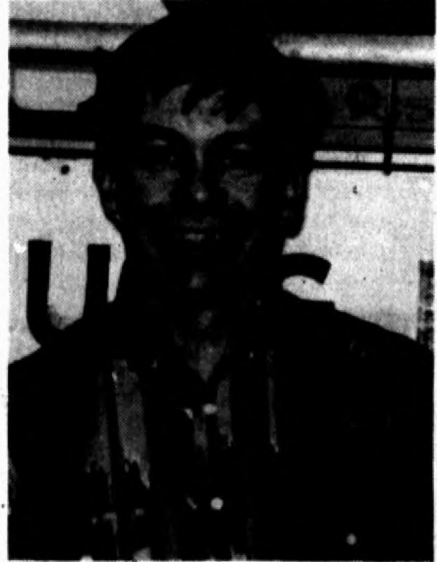

Lottery will be innovative

The director of the new Texas lottery program gave an overview of the operation at the annual banquet of the Amarillo Hispanic Chamber of Commerce on Friday at the Amarillo Civic Center.

Nora Linares started as lottery director in November soon after Texas voters overwhelmingly approved a constitutional amendment. Linares said the lottery program's goal is to reach \$1.2 billion worth of tickets sold by August 31, 1993.

The state will receive 40 percent of the proceeds from ticket sales. The funds weren't earmarked by the legislature; the money will go into the state's general fund. The program will use 45 percent of the funds for prizes and 15 percent for administration, including a 5 percent commission paid to retailers.

This summer, the program will begin selling scratch-off instant tickets. Linares said up to 20,000

retailers across the state will sell instant tickets, with up to 10,000 selling the on-line computer-generated lotto tickets by next Jan. 1.

Linares, who will answer to State Comptroller John Sharp, said the Texas program will be designed differently from programs in other states.

"We will rely on private enterprise for our day-to-day operations," she said. "The state will have less than 200 persons working for the lottery at the maximum. We want to keep our staff at a minimum and have a bundle of privatized services delivered to a single point of contact."

"We want to maximize the returns to the state. We are seeking an unprecedented level of cooperation by private vendors for the games and services."

Linares explained that stores wishing to sell tickets must meet rigorous standards. Applications have been sent to many businesses in the state. Persons who have not received

applications or have questions about the lottery may use a toll-free number (1-800-37-LOTTO).

Gilbert Guzman, chairman of the Amarillo group, said the Hispanic chamber is working on opportunities for all of the Texas Panhandle to work with Mexico and the rest of Central and South America. He said the pending free trade agreement with Mexico should open up opportunities for many area businesses.

Guzman also reinforced the group's educational programs. "Education and economic development work hand in hand," Guzman said. "You can't do one without the other."

January, April and August records show seven each; February and December, four each; October and November, six each, and September, five.

Typically, wedding vows are believed to be exchanged mostly in churches, with the traditional minister, priest or rabbi doing the honors.

Many couples seem to prefer a civil ceremony, read by a judge or justice of the peace.

In Deaf Smith County, Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine may lead the field; she officiated for 93 weddings of Deaf Smith couples and went to Dimmitt for two others. Judge Turrentine will read the ceremony in her courthouse office, in a home or some other site chosen by the couple being married.

"The cutest one I did was in Palo Duro Canyon," said Judge Turrentine about her experiences in 1991.

In a single day in October, she officiated for five weddings: one in Veterans Park, one in the gazebo of the E.B. Black House, a double wedding at the Knights of Columbus hall and one in a bar in Hereford.

Each year, she is asked to officiate for a number of ceremonies in the chapel of the Deaf Smith County Museum.

During the year, County Judge Tom Simons also encouraged marital bliss by officiating for six weddings. Four were in the courthouse and two in other locations.

Since Texas law requires a 72-hour waiting period between issuance of the license and the wedding, most couples make an appointment with Judge Turrentine for a time after the waiting period expires.

If there is a valid reason for the waiting period to be waived, only a district judge may take that action.

"I send them upstairs (to Judge Gulley's office) if they come in here and want to get married right then," said Judge Turrentine.

But, usually the couples are aware of the waiting period and make their plans accordingly, booking a time with Judge Turrentine in advance.

Gonzales hopes to unseal records on friend's murder

WASHINGTON (AP) - After 28 years, scores of conspiracy theories, dozens of books and a few movies, Henry B. Gonzalez is no more certain of the forces behind the assassination of President Kennedy than on that day in Dallas when he rode in the presidential motorcade.

Did Lee Harvey Oswald act alone? Was the ex-Marine one of several or many conspirators?

Was the government involved in the events of that bleak November afternoon in 1963, when Gonzalez' friend of more than a decade was slain?

The Texas congressman still isn't sure, despite having pored through the 26 volumes of the Warren Commission report and 27-volume report of the House Select Committee on Assassinations. His brief stint as chairman of the committee also didn't pierce the veil of mystery surrounding Kennedy's death.

One thing the San Antonio Democrat is sure about though, is that the public has the right to see all of the records the House committee produced on the president's death.

Spurred by the resurgent wave of interest sparked by Oliver Stone's new conspiracy film, "JFK," Gonzalez and others are renewing their efforts to open sealed assassination files.

On Wednesday, the maverick lawmaker introduced a resolution to immediately free the 850-plus boxes

of records sealed until 2029 by his erstwhile committee.

Other former committee members support release of the documents, which were sealed in 1979 by the chairman, Rep. Louis Stokes of Ohio, when the panel disbanded.

The committee concluded in 1979 that Kennedy was "probably" assassinated as the result of a conspiracy involving a second gunman. That conclusion was at odds with the Warren Commission, which decided in 1964 that Oswald acted alone.

"You'll have conjecture for a hundred years, just like you're still having on Abraham Lincoln," Gonzalez said recently.

The 75-year-old's memory of Nov. 22, 1963 remains crystalline, as does his devotion to the nation's 35th president.

His Capitol Hill office, crammed with the memorabilia of 38 years as an elected official, prominently displays reminders of the friendship Gonzalez and Kennedy struck in 1951.

Framed black-and-white photos of the two, a small bust of Kennedy, and a brass etching are just some of the visible signs. Nestled between the pages of some books lining the walls are other reminders - the yellowed telegram Kennedy sent Gonzalez in 1961, when the Texan was first elected to Congress; and the cards he received from the Kennedy family after the funeral.

Perturbed by the effects the assassinations of John F. Kennedy, his brother Robert, and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. had on the nation, Gonzalez resolved in 1975 to establish a House committee to study the issue.

He was successful in 1976, when the House created a 12-member assassinations committee to probe the JFK and King slayings.

But Gonzalez stepped away from his creation - resigning as committee chairman in 1977 - when its focus changed and he lost the backing of the House leadership in a power struggle with the panel's counsel.

Still bitter, Gonzalez contends there was a concerted effort to keep him from becoming chairman and to get him out once he was in.

He says a series of "peculiar things" happened just as he was to take the helm of the committee - including a gunshot fired at his car as he and his wife were driving in San Antonio, and the fact that the FBI did not notify him of three threats made on his life.

Although Gonzalez says his mind does not run to conspiracy thinking, he says he agrees with Stone's premise that Oswald may not have acted alone.

But he's quick to discard Stone's broad conspiracy theory - which contends elements of the military, CIA and FBI, military-industrial complex, anti-Castro Cubans and organized crime played a role in toppling Kennedy.

"It's entirely possible you had, maybe not (a conspiracy) to the extent he surmises, but it's possible you could have had rogue elements," Gonzalez said.

"The full and truthful facts are not yet established," he said. "We don't know the true aspects and range of Lee Harvey Oswald - or for that matter (Oswald's killer) Jack Ruby."

Although Gonzalez had not seen "JFK" when interviewed, he defended Stone's conspiracy theory, which has been ridiculed by many journalists and assassination buffs.

By the late 14th century, likenesses of the dead began to take on a very grotesque and gruesome image. It's now generally accepted that these images were supposed to inspire a more moralistic behavior in those who looked upon the image of death. Perhaps the gargoyles that line the eaves of the ancient cathedrals in Europe were placed there, to make people aware of the evil that they imagined lurked in every shadow or darkened street. In 1811 excerpts from a Prince Alexander Sapieha diary, describes massive monolithic stones called "Seichaks." These huge monuments are found grouped together in vast cemeteries in the remote mountain or forest areas of Yugoslavia. Each of the monoliths has a carving of an upraised hand. This may have been a warning or possibly a greeting to people when they came upon the grave site. Today we use a more traditional stone to mark the resting place of our loved ones.

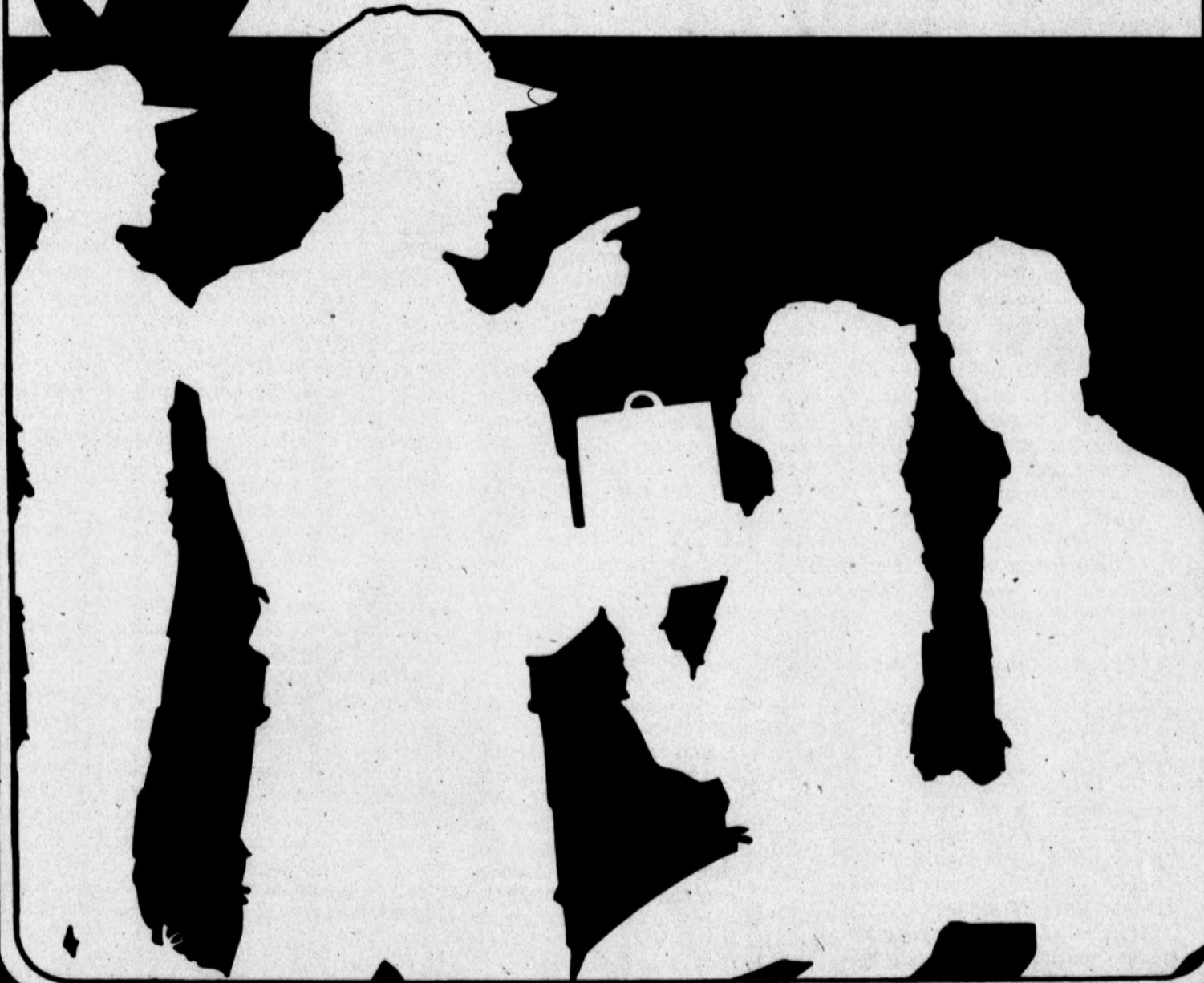

What does it mean to be a Christian? According to a Gallup poll, most Americans who profess to be Christians (86 percent) don't know the basic teachings of the faith and don't act significantly different than non-Christians in their daily lives.

It's apparent that the apathy which affects our lives in other areas, also is very evident in religion. Gallup says Americans generally "want the fruits of faith but not the obligations." Americans have many answers on what it means to be a Christian, but many of the responses are only part of the answer. According to a study made by the Barna Research Group in Glendale, Calif., 22 percent profess ignorance of what being a Christian is all about.

Twenty-one percent believe living differently from other people makes someone a Christian. Fourteen percent believe it is loving and helping others; 14 percent think it is believing in God, and 11 percent say it involves going to church or being religious. Ten percent think that being a good person makes one Christian.

Only 19 percent agree with the traditional evangelical belief that being a Christian is accepting Christ as Saviour and having a personal relationship with Him.

If the figures from these studies are factual, it is evident that we have plenty of professing Christians but not enough who place a high priority on their faith or make a real commitment to serving their God.

Super pointers

The following is a public service publication for those of you who, as I, have no basic knowledge of football, but want to be invited to a Super Bowl party this weekend.

FOOTBALL (A Guide for the Non-Practitioner)

LOYALTY: Before the kick off, one must decide which team to root for. This is accomplished by mingling with the other guests and staunchly supporting the team that most people favor. Once a team is chosen, one must not change loyalties, no matter how stupidly the chosen team performs. (Unless one is a Cowboys fan, in which case all rules of loyalty are null-and-void.)

PENALTIES: Penalties occur just before a yellow flag is thrown by an intrusive little man in a black-and-white striped shirt. If the yellow flag is thrown because of something the chosen team did, that's bad. Chosen fans should jump to their feet and incredulously yell, "WHAT?!"

If the yellow flag is thrown because of something the other team did, that's good. Chosen team fans should nod knowingly and say, "Finally!"

Body slamming someone is called "tackling" unless the someone being crunched is the passer who just passed or the kicker who has just kicked. Then body slamming is called "roughing," and it's a yellow flag no-no.

"Offsides" is what they yell when a player starts moving before it is time. And this from a guy who is getting paid millions to do this job. In the business world when an executive moves at the wrong time, they don't yell "offsides" — they

yell, "YOU'RE FIRED!"

SCORING: A touchdown is when a player carries the ball across the goal line without getting body slammed, then he throws the ball down and exuberantly holds up his index finger to the crowd in the universal symbol for "We're number one!" (Football players are very big on "We're number one!" and "Hi Mom!") A touchdown is worth six points.

A safety is when the ball carrier is pushed back across his own goal line by the opposing team. This ball carrier also throws down the ball and exuberantly holds up one finger—I forget which one—in the faces of the opposing team. A safety is worth two points to the opposing team.

If the kicker kicks the ball up over the middle of the goal posts, his team gets three points unless it's after a touchdown (that six point thing I mentioned earlier). Then it's only worth one point.

SIDE NOTE: If I were a football player, I would be a kicker. They're only in the game for about 10 minutes total, nobody's allowed to "rough" them and they get paid an obscene amount of money.

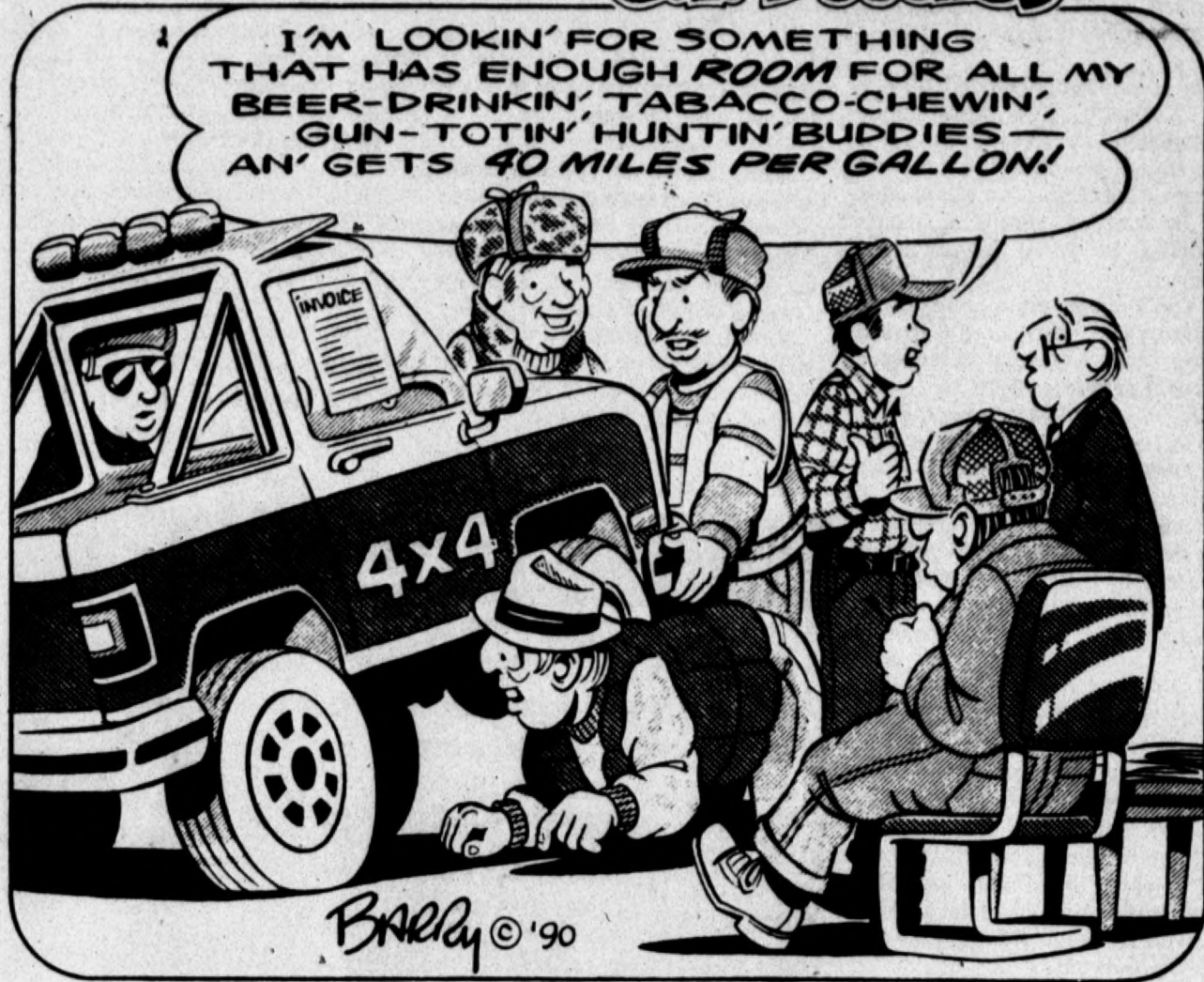
TIME: The game is divided into four quarters of equal lengths with one "halftime" of varying lengths depending on how many dance routines and band numbers are to be performed.

DC fans are souped up for super game

WASHINGTON (AP) — Washingtonians like to believe that no football fans on earth are as loyal as themselves. They tell themselves that when the Redskins are engaged, a bowling ball could traverse Pennsylvania Avenue and encounter only pigeons.

They tell themselves, too, that in a city where most people come as adults from somewhere else, leaving roots and loyalties elsewhere, the Redskins are a unifying power. They bring into common cause black Washington and white Washington, poor and rich, Georgetown and Anacostia, city and suburb, Republican and Democrat.

The Skins, they say, are great levers, something that limousine driver and limousine passenger can talk about on equal footing.

It is the conventional wisdom here. It is heard more when the Redskins are winning than when they're losing — but they haven't been a consistent loser for more than 20 years. Even then, Robert F. Kennedy Stadium was sold out. Time on the waiting list for season tickets is measured in decades.

"This football team symbolizes what most people wish America were

today, and this is a collection of people of all classes and races, working together, giving their very best to achieve a great goal," is the way it is put by Carl T. Rowan, the columnist, television commentator and fan.

Rowan has been a season ticket holder since 1962, when the Redskins, under pressure from their federal landlord, finally allowed a black player in the lineup. He loves his Skins, but are they unifiers? It is true that on game days the Metrobuses flash the message, "Redskins will win today."

It is true The Washington Post sent out a reporter on a man-bites-dog mission, assigned to find and interview people who were not Redskin fans.

(Among others, the reporter found Chris Marks, 22, research assistant on Capitol Hill, who groused, "The Redskins is all you hear about in this town whether you are a fan or not. You actually come to dislike them. It just gets to be overkill.")

It is true that Washington, a city of bureaucrats, finds its heroes in the offensive line — the "Hogs," the workhorses, footsoldiers, bureaucrats among football players.

And it is true that Molly Turner, 24, who's been seeing this young man

in the Virginia suburbs, son of a native Washingtonian, turned down his parents' invitation to their Super Bowl game Sunday.

"It just wouldn't work out," Molly said, according to her father, Douglas Turner, who is Washington bureau chief for the Buffalo (N.Y.) News.

Father and daughter are serious devotees of the Buffalo Bills, the team that meets the Redskins in the Super Bowl.

Father scoffs at the notion that Redskin followers are the most fervid of fans.

"It's kind of synthetic," he says. "You see, I don't think this is a hometown. It's not Scranton. It's not Pittsburgh. In Pittsburgh, you have people with cousins and uncles and aunts going back for generations. Pittsburgh is like Buffalo. Buffalo is a family city."

At the University of North Colorado, where he holds a joint appointment in sociology and kinesiology (which used to be called phys ed), George Sage judiciously handles the question of random superfandomness.

He has heard it before, from sportswriters in San Francisco and Denver, who called in other years to inquire if their cities' fans weren't

truly the most inately lovably loyal.

"It really is a case of every city that has the Super Bowl team has about two weeks to be quite bizarre," Sage says. "Some people in the Denver area painted their entire house orange."

"To pick out one group of fans and to say they're more dedicated, you'd have a hard time making that case," he says.

"I've been in the Washington area a couple of times before they played in the Super Bowl, and I would admit that it is wild and crazy," Sage says. "And people there are adamant that they are the most dedicated and the most loyal."

He seems to think it does no harm.

"If the assassinations committee of the United States House of Representatives concurred it was a conspiracy and (may have) involved elements of organized crime, why shouldn't this guy have his own hypothesis?" he asked.

"Everything is going to be grist for the rumor mills for decades."

Gonzalez was in the third car behind the president's as they rounded the bend next to the Texas School Book Depository on the west end of downtown Dallas.

He distinctly recalls hearing only three bullets, but doesn't reject the possibility another bullet - or several others - were fired from a gun equipped with a silencer.

"I had rolled the window down and I heard 'Bam' then a pause, and then 'Bam' and then a short pause - 'Bam,'" he remembered. "I said, 'My God, that's rifle fire.'"

Gonzalez says he could not see Kennedy's car when the shots were fired, but a police officer quickly motioned them toward nearby Parkland Memorial Hospital.

"She had those elbow-length pink gloves, caked in blood, (as was) her dress."

The First Lady was seated outside a small room where Gonzalez saw a sheet-covered body. Then, he said, it hit him that it was Kennedy who had been killed.

After kneeling, in tears, before Mrs. Kennedy to offer his condolences, Gonzalez later watched her place her wedding band on her slain husband's finger. He also helped lift Kennedy's coffin into the car that transported the president's body to Air Force One.

"I'd wake up at night for months and say 'My God, I had a nightmare the president was shot,'" he said.

"We had such a camaraderie," Gonzalez recalled.

"The image today is he was the quintessence of American youth and elicited the best of everyone."

What's forgotten, he says, is the hatred that Kennedy elicited - particularly in Dallas.

"I had fear," Gonzalez said of the trip.

While the other occupants of the car ran into the emergency room, Gonzalez says he walked to the convertible Kennedy had been riding in.

"I looked and I was horror-stricken," he said. "In the middle of the hump on the rear was (Jackie Kennedy's) bouquet of roses - trampled, crushed and caked in blood."

"I said: 'My God, Mrs. Kennedy was hit.'"

Gonzalez then ran into the hospital, where shellshocked lawmakers and White House officials lined the hospital's corridors.

After seeing Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and his wife, Lady Bird, Gonzalez wandered down a hallway, where a nurse gave him two paper bags containing Gov. John Connally's bloodied clothing.

"I got these bags and then I couldn't take it any longer, so I walked out of the corridor," he recalled. "Who do I see at the end, but Mrs. Kennedy sitting in a chair."

They made a big surge in the fourth (scoring 25 points), but some of that couldn't be helped. We were trying to win the game and tried to press them. It can work for or against you. It probably worked more for them; they got a lot of layups off the press."

Leo Brown had a big night for the Herd, scoring 22, including 10-of-13 free throws, and grabbing 13 rebounds.

Jason Tatarevich added seven points for the 0-3 and 5-18 Herd. Randall evened its record at 11-11, and is 2-1 in District 1-4A.

Neither of the junior varsity games were close, as Randall beat Hereford's girls 71-32 and Hereford's boys 90-52.

"The JV (boys) got behind early in the first half and couldn't catch up," Thomas said. "They just didn't play well as far as taking care of the ball and getting back on defense."

Cambridge can return to UT team

AUSTIN (AP) - After sitting out half the season, Dexter Cambridge needs to lose some weight to get back in playing form. But he's thrilled to get the call to suit up.

An NCAA panel agreed Friday that the suspended Texas starter can return to the team if he sits out two more games and repays \$4,600 to a booster of his junior college.

"I couldn't believe it. Man, I couldn't believe it. To tell you the truth, I didn't think I had a chance," said Cambridge, who worked out with the team after getting the news.

Coach Tom Penders said he was elated for Cambridge.

"He's been through enough," Penders said. "This will give him a lot of incentive to finish the season strong."

Cambridge, the team's leading scorer and rebounder in the four games that he has played this season, is allowed to return Feb. 1 when Texas travels to Rhode Island. He will have missed 15 games, half of the regular season total.

"I want to thank the school for believing in me and allowing me to appeal. They knew I didn't do anything wrong," he said.

Cambridge said he needed to lose some weight and promised his teammates he would run a couple of miles Friday night. Cambridge said he weighs about 224 pounds and would like to get back to 218.

The NCAA subcommittee on eligibility appeals committee ruled that Cambridge must repay \$4,600 to Keith Heingartner - a Jacksonville, Texas, businessman and supporter of Lon Morris Junior College - before playing again.

"I've said all along Dexter had no idea he might have broken an NCAA rule," Penders said. "It gives me a little more faith in the system."

Cambridge accepted a \$7,000 check from Heingartner in 1990 after being named a junior college All-America. During his two years at Lon Morris, Cambridge also did office and lawn work for Heingartner.

Cambridge told the NCAA of the transaction in November and immediately was suspended. But Texas officials successfully proved that one-third of the money was for a graduation gift and for back wages owed Cambridge.

"The subcommittee disagreed with the previous action of the eligibility committee for Division I

and found that available information more convincingly corroborated the university's claim that the young man's earnings from work totaled \$2,400," the NCAA wrote in a statement.

Since the suspension was levied in November, Cambridge has missed 13 games. He must sit out Monday's game against Baylor and Thursday's game against Virginia Commonwealth before being eligible to play again.

"We'll have to see how we are with him again. It's been awhile," said sophomore guard B.J. Tyler. "It's not like he's going to be some savior. We are a team. And he's going to have to adjust to us again like we are going to have to adjust to him."

With Cambridge, the Longhorns were 2-2. In his absence, the team has

posted a 9-5 record.

"As a team, we can't do anything but get better," said freshman guard Terrence Rencher.

"I'm delighted, truly delighted," said UT vice president James Vick. "I'm pleasantly surprised (by the decision). I'm pleased they took the time and energy to investigate it and analyze the affidavits."

DeLoss Dodds, Texas' men's athletics director said, "I am pleased that the process worked. This was for Dexter, and not anybody else. That is what this was all about."

Seles claims Australian Open

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) - Though Monica Seles is the undisputed queen of women's tennis, her latest victim already is sounding a warning: Improve or risk a drop from the top.

Seles was as dominating as usual today in successfully defending her Australian Open title. Her two-fisted groundstrokes pounded No. 7 Mary Joe Fernandez into submission 6-2, 6-3 to earn the \$270,000 first prize.

Fernandez showed only flashes of the sharp net game she unveiled in ousting No. 3 Gabriela Sabatini in the semifinals. But she said she knows she must continue the switch to a more aggressive style - and that Seles has to learn the same lesson if she wants to add to her collection of five Grand Slam titles.

She also feels it may not be easy. "I think when you're No. 1 and you win all the time, it's hard to change," Fernandez said. "I think that's a mistake. Someone is going to come along who is going to beat her. She's not improving. When I did attack, I won most of the points."

The 20-year-old said Seles already is beatable now - but "you have to play a perfect match. She creates shots from nowhere. But eventually someone is going to catch up to her."

Seles, 18, agreed that she must improve, particularly if she wants to conquer the speed of grass courts and win the only Grand Slam she hasn't claimed yet - Wimbledon.

"I would really like to have the serve stronger, just come in more often. I think for Wimbledon, I'm going to have to," she said. "That's going to be hard, because I don't feel secure."

Seles won all three Grand Slams she contested last year but pulled out of Wimbledon, citing shin splints. She has reached the finals of 19 consecutive tournaments, winning 13.

Fernandez said Seles' big advantage is mental.

"I think the best part of her game is her tenacity," Fernandez said. "I think that's what wins her most of her matches."

Seles looked stylish at her post-match news conference in a pink, crushed silk-and-lace floppy hat and calf-length sundress reminiscent of the 1920s style of the woman she most admires in tennis, Suzanne Lenglen.

She said she wanted people to know she's just a normal teen-ager when she sheds the serious demeanor she wears on the court.

Seles said the final score against Fernandez, far from the tension of the 9-7, third-set victory in last year's semifinals, wasn't indicative of how close the match was.

"The score was pretty tight, just decided by a few points," she said.

Fernandez lost the first four games despite holding game points in each one, including three break points on

Seles' second service game, when the champion fought back from a 15-40 deficit. Fernandez lost the next game after saving off three break points.

"I was unlucky not to win any of the first four games," Fernandez said. "There is a big difference between 4-0 and 2-2."

Both Seles and Fernandez got off to slow starts and looked a little tight on a warm, sunny day. Seles set the early tone with a double-fault on the first point. Six of the nine service breaks came in the first set.

Seles got untracked first, although each game was a struggle. The combination of Seles' winners and Fernandez's errors proved deadly to any hopes for an upset.

Fernandez ended up with 32 unforced errors to 21 for Seles. Many came off the backhand side, which Seles exploited to the fullest.

Fernandez lost her first six service games and didn't win until Seles double-faulted at game-point in the fifth game, a half-hour into the 77-minute match.

Fernandez, who had promised to continue the attacking style she used to dismantle Sabatini, looked unsettled by three errors on approach shots in the first game and largely

Bulls turn out lights on struggling Pistons

The Chicago Bulls didn't keep their fans in the dark for long.

After playing most of the first quarter with many of the lights at Chicago Stadium off because of a blown fuse, the Bulls rolled to a 117-93 victory over the Detroit Pistons on Friday night.

Scottie Pippen scored 29 points and Michael Jordan 20, and most of the Bulls' regulars were on the bench early in the fourth quarter.

"It was an unusual game," coach Phil Jackson said. "I can't remember seeing fans leave the arena with five minutes to go in a Detroit-Chicago game."

"It was a bizarre night, starting with playing in the dark," Pistons coach Chuck Daly said. "All I know is when they turned the lights on, it went downhill for us."

The Bulls improved their record to 36-5, the second-best half-way mark in NBA history. The Los Angeles Lakers were 38-3 in 1971-72 when they won a record 69 games. Philadelphia in 1982-83 and Portland in 1977-78 were 35-6 at the half-way point.

The victory was the eighth straight for the Bulls over the Pistons, including a 4-0 sweep in last year's playoffs.

"They can do it, but it won't be easy," Daly said when asked if the Bulls could win 70 games.

The Bulls took a 51-42 halftime lead before a 15-6 run, capped by a three-point play by Pippen and a 3-point shot by John Paxson, made it 65-48.

The Pistons closed to 68-58 before the Bulls went on an 18-4 spree that enabled them to take an 86-66 lead after three quarters.

Elsewhere in the NBA, it was Phoenix 100, Boston 93; New Jersey 123, Miami 117; Philadelphia 119, Minnesota 86; Orlando 121, Dallas 103; Cleveland 104, Indiana 102; San Antonio 115, Milwaukee 86; Portland 125, Atlanta 117; the Los Angeles Lakers 95, Sacramento 92; and New York 114, Golden State 109.

Knicks 114, Warriors 109

New York moved past Boston into first place in the Atlantic Division as Patrick Ewing had 35 points and 21 rebounds at Oakland.

The Warriors, whose five-game winning streak ended, trailed 68-50 at halftime, but tied the score 109-109 on Victor Alexander's jump hook with 42 seconds left.

A free throw by Anthony Mason made it 110-109 with 27 seconds remaining, and he set up two more free throws when he rebounded Tim Hardaway's missed 20-footer. Mark Jackson's two free throws clinched the victory with 2.6 seconds left.

Chris Mullin scored 30 points, Hardaway 25 and Sarunas Marciulionis 22 for the Warriors.

Suns 100, Celtics 93

Phoenix won at Boston Garden behind Kevin Johnson's 21 points and 16 assists.

The Celtics, who never led, trailed 81-73 early in the fourth quarter, but got within two points three times before tying the game 91-91 on Robert Parish's 13-footer with 1:54 remaining.

Then Tim Perry drove inside for a go-ahead layup with 1:41 left, and Johnson scored seven points in the final 1:02 to keep the Suns safely in front.

Kevin Gamble scored 22 points and Parish had 20 for Boston. Perry and Jeff Hornacek had 20 points each.

Trail Blazers 125, Hawks 117

Portland won its 10th consecutive game at home and pulled into a virtual tie with Golden State in the Pacific Division by outscoring Atlanta 12-3 down the stretch.

Clyde Drexler scored nine of the Blazers' last 13 points and finished with 29, while Terry Porter scored 27 points and Jerome Kersey had 20.

Dominique Wilkins scored 34 points and Kevin Willis had 27 points and 17 rebounds for the Hawks, who set a club record with 10 3-pointers. Portland matched its franchise mark by hitting nine from 3-point range.

Lakers 95, Kings 92

Byron Scott and Terry Teagle each scored 22 points as Los Angeles beat Sacramento for the 17th straight time overall and the 43rd consecutive time at the Forum since 1974.

Spud Webb paced the Kings with 21 points and 12 assists.

Los Angeles, which nearly blew a 14-point lead at Sacramento Thursday night and won by three, are 9-0 in games decided by three points or less.

Nets 123, Heat 117

Derrick Coleman hit 14 of his first 15 shots and scored a season-high 38 points, giving New Jersey a home victory over Miami and its first five-game winning streak since 1985.

The win was the 12th in 15 games for the Nets following a 7-18 start. Mookie Blaylock scored a season-high 24 points and Drazen Petrovic added 22, including two 3-pointers as the Nets took command with a 20-6 second-half run.

Glen Rice matched his season-high with 35 points for Miami, while Willie Burton scored a season-high 26.

Spurs 115, Bucks 86

David Robinson had 23 points, 10 rebounds and six blocks, and San Antonio held Milwaukee to 36 percent shooting.

The Spurs, with Terry Cummings scoring 16 of his 20 points in the first half, led 60-45 at halftime; then increased that to 104-76 in the fourth quarter.

The Bucks, who lost their sixth consecutive road game, were led by Alvin Robertson with 14 points. Milwaukee, outrebounded 62-39, got just four points on 2-for-10 shooting from Dale Ellis, their leading scorer.

Cavaliers 104, Pacers 102

Danny Ferry came off the bench to score Cleveland's final four points, and the Cavaliers overcame a 13-point third-period deficit to win at home against Indiana.

Larry Nance led Cleveland with 23 points, while Chuck Person led the Pacers with 29.

Ferry, who scored 10 points in the fourth quarter, tied it 102-102 with a 20-footer, then rebounded Craig Ehlo's miss and scored the winning basket with 8 seconds to go. Person missed 3-pointers on Indiana's final two possessions.

76ers 119, Timberwolves 86

Seven Philadelphia players scored in double figures against Minnesota,

which lost its eighth consecutive game.

Ron Anderson led the 76ers with 19 points and Armon Gilliam added 18 points and 17 rebounds.

Sam Mitchell scored 19 points for the Timberwolves, who played without leading scorer Tony Campbell because of a back injury and fell to 2-17 on the road.

The 76ers, who lost recently unretired center Jeff Ruland to an Achilles tendon injury, broke the game open in the second period when they outscored the Timberwolves 14-2 for a 44-28 lead with 7:04 left in the half. Minnesota never again got within 10 points.

Magic 121, Mavericks 102

Nick Anderson had the first triple-double of his career with 32 points, 12 rebounds and 10 assists for the Magic, who used a 21-0 first-quarter run to rout visiting Dallas.

It was the third triple-double in franchise history for Orlando, 3-2 in its last five games after losing 25 of 27.

The Mavericks, playing for the first time after snapping an 11-game losing streak Wednesday night against Milwaukee, were led by Derek Harper with 19 points.

Anderson had 12 points, two rebounds and two assists during the 21-0 run that made the score 22-4.

Super Bowl XXVI Buffalo vs. Washington

QB, desperation: why Bills will win

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - The Buffalo Bills will win the Super Bowl because:

1. Jim Kelly is a better quarterback than Mark Rypien.

2. Their offensive players run faster than Washington's defensive players.

3. They won't be allowed back in Buffalo if they lose.

Let's start at the beginning, which for these purposes is last Jan. 27 at Tampa Stadium, when Scott Norwood's 47-yard field-goal attempt sailed two feet wide of the right goal post. That gave the New York Giants a 20-19 win over the Bills, who were in their first Super Bowl.

That first is important. "I think we barely knew what was going on around us," says Kent Hull, the Bills' designated talker.

This year they know, even coach Marv Levy, who managed to show up for all the press conferences this year after missing his first last year because he was working on his game plan.

In fact, the game plan was in last week - the week off the Bills didn't have last year. On the other hand, everyone knows what it is, including the Redskins - Kelly throwing to Andre Reed, James Lofton, Don Beebe, Keith McKeller and Thurman Thomas and Thomas running this way and that.

The Redskins have been successful against similar teams - the run-and-shoot Falcons and Lions in their two playoff games.

But the Bills are something else. "It's hard to tell how fast their offense runs unless you see it in person," acknowledges Washington coach Joe Gibbs. "It may take a while to adjust to it."

The no-huddle means something else. It means that Buffalo can dictate

the pace. Washington figures to come out in a nickel defense, designed to stop the pass, which means that the Bills will probably come out running.

But the pass will still be the principal weapon, one that Washington's not particularly well equipped to stop.

Other than Darrell Green (and sometimes Martin Mayhew), the Redskins don't cover particularly well man-to-man, meaning that Kelly should be able to find one of his five receivers. If they play zone, Kelly should be able to pick it apart - Reed and Thomas are particularly dangerous in the seams of a zone and can run with the ball after they catch it.

Washington's offense will move, too, against a defense that was next to last in the NFL this season.

But that's deceptive - the Bills played their best defense of the season in the playoffs, holding Kansas City to 77 rushing yards after the Chiefs trampled them for 239 in the regular season. The keys will be limiting Washington's running game and getting at least some pressure on Mark Rypien, whose still has problems when he's rushed.

They're also used to pressure - they've played under it all year in a city where only a Super Bowl victory will make this a successful season. A loss Sunday and the Bills may be pelted with snowballs getting off the plane.

There's one other factor - the law of averages.

The NFC has won the last seven Super Bowls, five of those seven by margins of 19 points or more. The AFC will win one of these years and it might as well be this one.

Yes, Norwood will miss an extra point, but the Bills will still win. Make it 34-33.

Best coach: why 'Skins will win

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - The Washington Redskins have been the NFL's best team all season. That won't change in the Super Bowl.

Joe Gibbs will make it three Super victories in four tries with his best team. The Redskins will win with a strong running game, a timely passing attack sparked by Mark Rypien's skill of throwing deep to superb receivers Gary Clark, Ricky Sanders and Art Monk, and with a solid defense.

The Skins will win with special teams - Chip Lohmiller's two field goals will be the difference.

And they will win because Gibbs is the best coach in the league.

Washington scored 485 points this season, getting many of them against defenses far better than Buffalo's. With Earnest Byner and Ricky Ervins

operating behind the Hogs, the Skins are powerful enough to run over Buffalo and quick enough to scoot around the Bills.

Then there is the matter of the Posse. The Bills secondary, particularly with Leonard Smith fighting an infected knee, is not that strong. Clark, Sanders and Monk comprise the best trio of receivers in the league.

The Bills' best hope of disrupting the offense is to get pressure on Rypien. But nobody has done that this year - the Hogs yielded nine sacks all season.

Under staunch pressure, Rypien has had problems in past years. With the leisure time he has enjoyed in the pocket this season, however, Rypien has torn apart secondaries.

Don't think that all this evidence leads to a rout. As good as Washington's defense has been,

allowing fewer points than everyone except New Orleans, it will yield yards and scores to Buffalo's no-huddle.

Like the Bills, the Redskins do not have a great secondary. Darrell Green is an All-Pro, but he is one man facing the dangerous trio of Andre Reed, James Lofton and Don Beebe. He might shut down one of them, but the other defenders could be overwhelmed.

Jim Kelly will have some success throwing long and, especially, to the sidelines. The Redskins are adept at taking away the middle routes Reed favors, which could make Lofton a busy man outside.

Thurman Thomas had a superb game in last year's Super Bowl defeat. He might need to repeat that performance (155 yards rushing, 55

receiving) to keep it close. He probably will.

The artificial turf is better suited for the no-huddle than the grass of Tampa. But it doesn't hurt the Skins, who have plenty of speed demons, too.

Washington also figures to get more pressure on Kelly than Buffalo puts on Rypien. The Bills have a fine offensive line, perhaps No. 2 in the league. But the gap between it and the Hogs is mammoth.

Washington is healthy. Buffalo is concerned about the knees of Bruce Smith and Leonard Smith.

One factor that can't be ignored and should make things close is the Bills' determination. After last year's one-point loss, they are a team on a mission.

Sorry, that's not enough. Washington 27, Buffalo 21.

Lohmiller sells Twin Cities area

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - You already know Chip Lohmiller, the Washington Redskins' unorthodox placekicker. Meet Chip Lohmiller, Twin Cities booster.

For Lohmiller, a Minnesota native and University of Minnesota product, Sunday's Super Bowl against the Buffalo Bills will be a real homecoming. And he thinks everybody should be excited about going to the Twin Cities, even though Super Bowls are almost always held in warmer, sunnier climes.

"There's five ski areas right in the Twin Cities area," Lohmiller said. "There's a lot of skating, outdoor things, especially with Winter Carnival. Don't be afraid to check it out, because it can be a lot of fun."

For all his enthusiasm about the great outdoors, Lohmiller is happy to be heading indoors to the Metrodome, where he regularly hit 62-yard field goals during college warmups.

"Indoors, you have a longer range and you don't have to worry about the wind and the rain," said the kicker, who led the NFL in scoring with 149 points. "It takes some pressure off the offense because you can kick from farther out."

Lohmiller has been making it easier for the Redskins to put points on the board all season long. He was perfect on his 56 extra point conversions, and nearly so on field goals from 40 yards in. He made 19 of 21 attempts inside the 40 and 12

of 19 from 40 yards and out.

That three of those misses were from 50 yards or more is of some comfort to him.

"It shows they're not afraid to use me," Lohmiller said. "Except in the Atlanta game (a rainy day), I never go out there thinking I might not make it."

Special teams coach Wayne Sevier says Lohmiller's booming kickoffs are just as important, particularly in games where the Redskins want to negate a dangerous return man.

"My favorite Chip Lohmiller story is the Atlanta playoff game, where I told Chip, 'The footing's too bad to kick it out of the end zone,'" Sevier said. "He kind of took that as a challenge, runs up in the mud, plants his foot and kicks it out."

Deion Sanders, Atlanta's explosive kick returner, was never a factor.

And if Lohmiller is almost alone in his enthusiasm for playing the Super Bowl in Minnesota, he's also the only member of the NFL's Tough Guy Kicker's Club.

Start with the fact that he likes to hit people, lifts weights more than he kicks in practice, and has the build of a small linebacker.

"I would say he's almost a normal person, but he's not a normal kicker," said Redskins punter Kelly Goodburn, who watches Lohmiller as closely as anybody. "He's really aggressive, throws his body around,

and he doesn't get all caught up in the mechanics of kicking. He just goes out and boots the ball."

Two hours before each game, the 6-foot-3, 210-pound Lohmiller stalks onto a nearly empty playing field, looking for the opposing team's kicker. When he finds him, he starts a cat-and-mouse game that's usually demoralizing for his opponent.

"That guy will line up on the left hashmark, hit one from 40 yards. Chip goes to the right hash, does the same thing," Goodburn laughed. "They keep going back, and they don't talk to each other. Sooner or later, with that strong leg, Chip's the only one left. I've never seen anybody else do that."

It is Lohmiller's appetite for hitting, however, that truly separates him from his kicking colleagues around the league.

In the NFC championship game,

with Washington leading 10-0, Lions kick returner Mel Gray hit a gap in the middle of the field and it appeared that he might break off a long return. Then Lohmiller slammed the hole shut, and Gray went down at the Detroit 29.

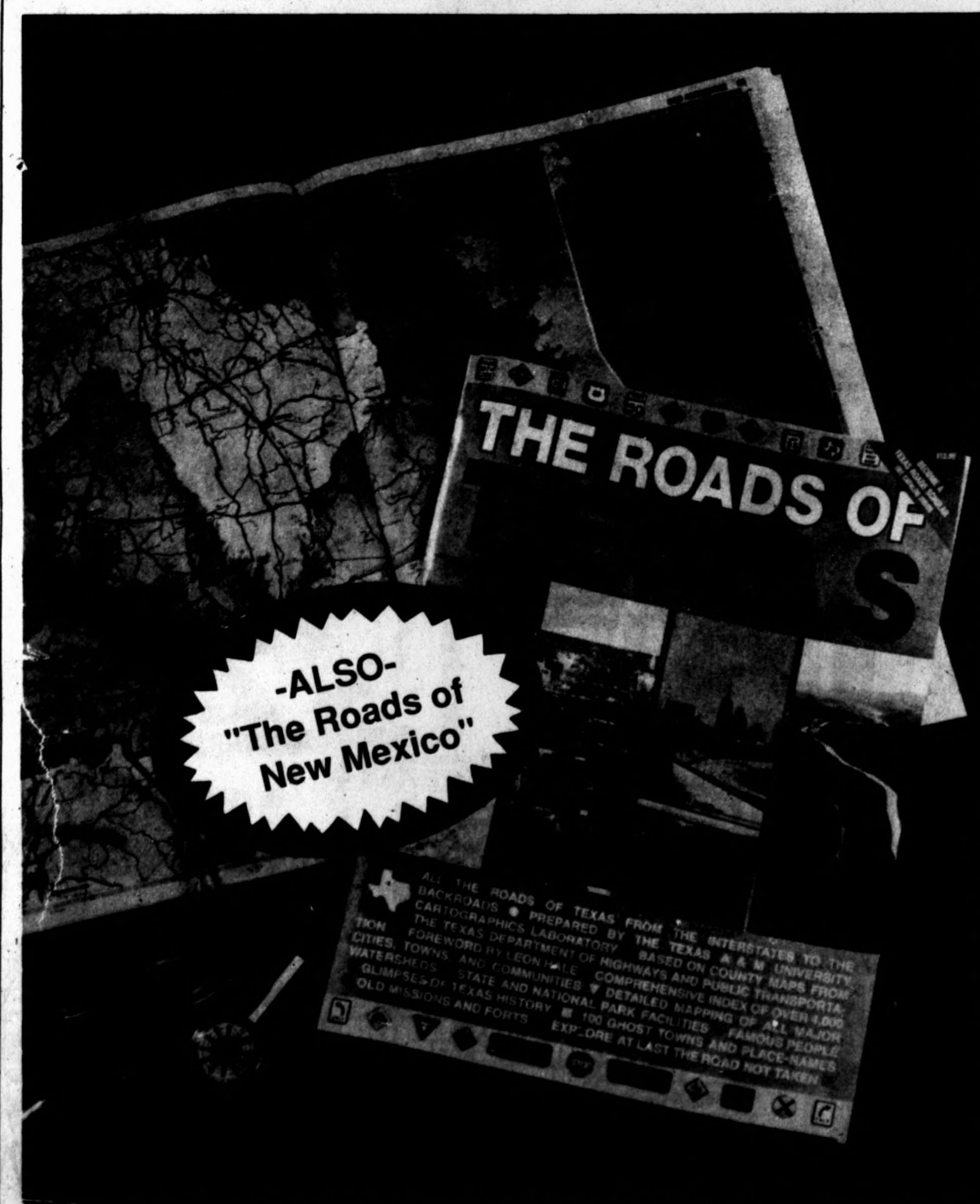
"That wasn't just a good hit for a kicker, it was a good hit, period," Sevier said proudly. "Chip has always come through when we've needed him to."

Then, later in the game, Lohmiller got into a shoving match with Detroit running back D.J. Dozier after another kickoff.

"He just came at me full blast, and I don't think that's right. I don't have all the pads of the regular player," Lohmiller said. "I don't respect people who do that. I gave him a shove back, you know, like, 'You can't do that to me.'"

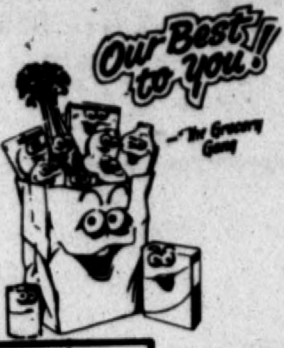

Researchers hope to teach animals not to eat toxics

Can animals grazing on the open range be taught to avoid eating poisonous plants?

Utah researchers Michael Ralphs and Fred Provenza think they're close to being able to demonstrate just that.

Ralphs is a range scientist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Poisonous Plant Research Lab at Logan, Utah, and Provenza is with the Utah State University range science department, also at Logan. The pair have sought to minimize toxic plant losses in livestock by using behavior modification.

Their work is based on an animal's ability to associate a toxic plant's taste with the illness that it causes. A technique called conditioned food aversion learning is commonly used in studies of rat behavior. Other experiments have taught coyotes not to prey on sheep. The technique also has been used to help people suffering from alcoholism.

Toxic plants cause major problems for livestock producers. More than 100 species are known to infest Texas rangeland, and about 70 percent of them are found in the western half of the state, according to Allen McGinty, range specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Fort Stockton.

"The economic impact is not restricted to actual livestock deaths," said McGinty. "Toxic plant consumption also results in reduced calving, kidding and lambing percentages, lower weaning weights, increased supplemental feeding costs and reduced production of more desirable range forage."

"These losses have been estimated to exceed \$100 million annually for Texas ranchers. Perennial broomweed alone costs ranchers in excess of \$36 million every year."

To a crusty West Texas rancher, however, the theory that animals can learn good plants from bad may seem farfetched. Ralphs argues that native livestock on familiar rangeland suffer less from toxic plants than do newly introduced animals.

"This is a common occurrence that most ranchers know," said Ralphs. "This phenomenon suggests a learning process. Those native animals have learned to avoid certain plants, but their counterparts have not."

In South Africa, for example, the tulip is a problem only with new animals. As a preventive measure, Ralphs said, ranchers typically give new animals a dose of this tulip to have them associate its taste with the resulting illness. Subsequently they avoid eating the plant.

Ralphs said one theory of how learning occurs suggests that when an animal gets sick after eating a plant, illness information is conveyed by the same nerves that also carried the plant's taste, and an association is made. An actual change in palatability occurs, he said, that makes the plant distasteful.

"This process is not foolproof in nature; we still have large livestock losses to poisonous plants," Ralphs said. "An animal may not be able to associate which plant made it sick."

"One of the principles in conditioned learning is to avoid the interference of other tastes. We associate the taste of just one plant with the illness. The animal can make that simplistic type of association."

In diverting animals from a certain plant, the researchers found one specific requirement: for the association to remain, whatever is given to induce illness must cause a gastrointestinal distress. This can be accomplished by using an emetic. The Utah researchers prefer lithium chloride, widely used in behavioral studies of humans and rats, which causes a rapid nausea without dangerous side effects.

Some stumbling blocks have been encountered in the research; a major one is differences in the individual animals.

"Animals vary greatly in their ability to learn, much as we humans do," said Ralphs. "They may not be able to discriminate between tastes too well or they may not be too particular

about what tastes good and what tastes bad."

To complicate matters, Ralphs said, animals may respond differently to the emetic or to the associations made. Some animals may be fast learners, and others may never learn at all.

New tastes are more strongly associated with an illness than familiar ones. A new animal is more likely to form a stronger aversion than one that has grazed the plant in the past.

Age at conditioning is also important, Ralphs said.

"Around the time of weaning, animals are developing preferences and learning what's acceptable and what's not. This is an appropriate time for them to learn aversions. However, young animals also are very inquisitive. They may form aversions faster, but they also may lose them faster."

"Mature animals on the other hand, once preferences are set, are less likely to change. We're thinking now that mature animals may be the more efficient (Learners)."

"In our studies on larkspur (considered the most important poisonous plant on mountain ranges), we found that peer pressure also was a strong force," Ralphs said. "If an animal sees his neighbor eating something, and we are not there to dose the animal for that immediate negative feedback, then it will eat more and more until the aversion is gone."

For this reason, Ralphs said, "averted animals should be kept separate from non-averted ones for the first year or two."

"Hunger, however, will extinguish any aversion. When an animal is hungry, it will eat almost anything."

"Is aversion training a viable management tool in a typical ranching operation? I guess the answer is maybe," Ralphs said. "We're not to a point where we can make strong recommendations. Too much research needs to be conducted."

"But if a rancher has a situation where a palatable poisonous plant is causing persistent losses, and other options are cost prohibitive, aversion training might be considered."

Short courses planned to help producers use futures, options

AMARILLO—A producer may not be able to control price but controlling how and when he prices can make a critical difference in profitability, said Dr. Steve Amosson, management and marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Amarillo.

On Feb. 5-6, area producers can participate in a Futures and Options Shortcourse from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. both days at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West. The cost of the

course is \$25 per participant or couple. All participants must pre-register by February 3rd.

"We're going to concentrate on the entire marketing process, and teach producers how to use futures and option in the cattle and grain markets as risk management tools," said Amosson, instructor for the shortcourse.

The 12-hour workshop offers in-depth training on hedging mechanics,

pricing objectives, futures and options terminology, and methods of calculation. Additional topics include an introduction to options, interpreting and localizing options information, and comparing pricing alternatives and potential marketing strategies. Workshop sponsors are the agricultural committees of Potter County and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. FmHA launching new program to help farmers obtain credit

The Farmers Home Administration is launching a new program to help local farmers obtain credit from local lenders, according to Neal Sox Johnson, FmHA State Director for Texas. Known as the Interest Assistance Program, it provides strong incentives for commercial lenders to make loans to farmers who otherwise could not qualify.

Under the new program, FmHA

will pay up to four percentage points of interest for farmers to help them qualify for FmHA guaranteed loans.

"If a creditworthy farmer can't cash flow with a guaranteed bank loan at regular interest rates, we can pay part of that interest for him until he can," Johnson said.

The percentage of interest FmHA will pay depends on the financial condition of the farmer. FmHA will pay only the number of points necessary to help the farmer cash flow with a small reserve.

An FmHA guaranteed loan is made by a bank, PCA, or other lender with an agreement from FmHA that if the loan goes bad, FmHA will compensate the lender for up to 90 percent of its loss. "That guarantee plus the new interest assistance," Johnson said, "should greatly increase availability of

farm credit through the private sector."

The program, made law in late 1990, was put on a first track to assist farmers in time for the 1991 planting season, Johnson added.

According to Johnson, the level of interest assistance will be adjusted each year, based on a review of the borrower's need for continued assistance. In addition, a borrower must be able to project a positive cash flow, including a 10 percent debt-service reserve to qualify for assistance. This is the same rule for guaranteed farm loans not receiving interest assistance.

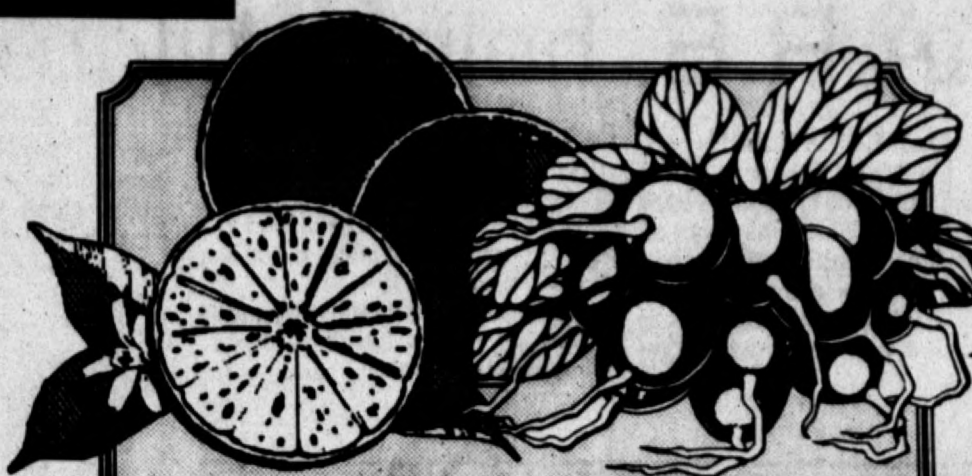

C.A.R.E. helps children build self-esteem, bright futures

Helping confused children to open up and face their problems is not an easy task for the child or the helper, but a program in its second year at St. Anthony's School is helping kids to open up and talk about what's on their minds.

Cathy Revell, who both went through special training, are the teachers of the program.
Both Revell and Eggen feel the program helps all students, not just those in trouble.
The main goals of the program is to build self esteem, develop adequate communication skills and offer

special," said Revell. "Everyone has something special, something good about them. We try to build each child's self-esteem."
The program is a big success, according to the student's who participate teachers and parents.
"We have parents tell us they notice a change in their children," the teachers said.

Students also believe the program is working.
"I like it (C.A.R.E.) because I could tell why I was hurting inside. C.A.R.E. was fun to go to. I enjoyed it because I could tell everyone what I did," said one student.
"I enjoyed C.A.R.E. because it gave me a chance to talk about my feelings. I learned how to express them and how these, though they didn't seem to be, were normal."
"I like C.A.R.E. because it taught us that violence is not the right choice. It was fun and you were free to talk about your problems."
The one purpose of the class is help the student feel more free about

45-minute sessions were "Goal Setting," "My Individual Self," "My Inside Self-Feelings," "My Outside Self-Defenses," "Decisions! Decisions!," "Chemical Dependency," "The Others in My Life-My Family," and "The Others in My Life-My Friends."
The successful program had 52 of 56 students participate in the program in its first year.

Eggen and Revell hope that other schools can implement C.A.R.E. or a similar program.
"The program is great and it really works," said Eggen.
"I feel it has been a privilege for me to get to work in this program. It has helped me a lot too," Revell said.
C.A.R.E. is a continuing service to help the students at St. Anthony's School.

"I like C.A.R.E. because I could tell why I was hurting inside."

Children Actively Recovering Through Education or C.A.R.E. is a program that originated with Catholic Family Services to assist children growing up in "at-risk" homes.
"At-risk" homes are homes with children facing alcoholism, chemical dependence, single parent homes and abuse.
The program is in its second year at the school. Jennifer Eggen and

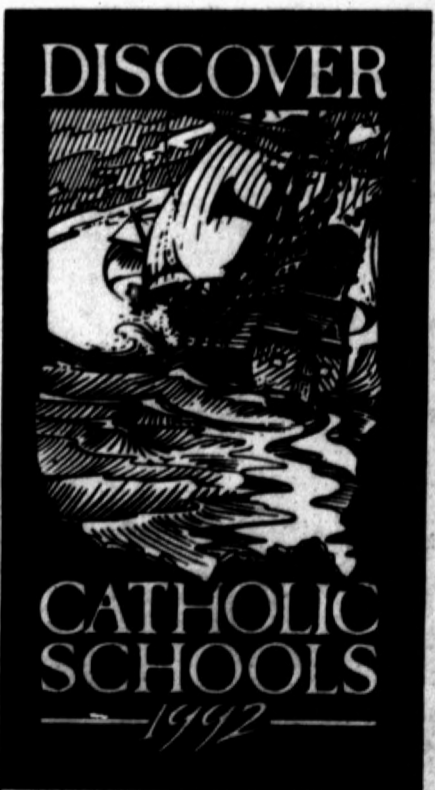
Sick kids cannot learn and of course they expose others to whatever it is they have.

I am always amazed when I run into a longtime county resident who mentions that he or she has never been in the library! Recently a fellow put in words a comment that is all too prevalent in the thinking of many: "I just thought the library had books." I realize that a lot of people buy what they read, and a lot of people don't read, but these folks are unaware of what the library has to offer.

Granted, we are not a large library, especially compared to others I'm familiar with - Amabillo Public, Comette Library at WTSU, Fort Worth Public, but did you know that what they have is what we have? Anything they have, with a few exceptions, is available to us, rather YOU, our patron, through interlibrary loan (ILL). We can borrow a book from say, Amarillo Public...or Perryton...or someplace in New Jersey if we have to, and all it takes is a little time and the cost of postage one way. And library rate is very inexpensive. I don't believe I've ever paid as much as a dollar for one ILL book. We have filled requests for everything from children's books to technical manuals. Even copies of documents, magazine articles, and the like are available, although there is a copying charge in addition to the postage.

The staff person assigned to the Interlibrary Loan desk is Annie Brown. Annie has been with the library for about a year, and I guess we'll keep her. We send lots of materials out, as well as receive them, and she's the one who stays on top of it all. Annie also keeps track of the periodicals, which is a bigger job than you may realize.

Did you know that we currently maintain over 200 periodical subscriptions? This includes six newspapers and a number of children's magazines. And you may not be aware that the magazines we have on the shelf, with the exception of the latest issue, are available for checkout, up to six at a time!

Speaking of magazines, I just got a glimpse at the February issue of Texas Highways. There's an article there about some historical buildings

in northeast Texas that have been converted for use as public libraries. It makes interesting reading, and I'm sure that those places are fun to visit, but, all in all, I would rather have a library that was designed to be one. I think we, the citizens of Deaf Smith County, are fortunate to have the library facilities that we do.

We're starting a "fun" project at the library. What is your favorite book? This past week, Rebecca and I had the opportunity to speak to the Golden K Kiwanis Club, and were able to scratch the surface, I guess, of what the library has to offer. The food was good, as usual, and the fellowship was, too. I asked them to participate in this little project and here are some of the answers:

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

It's Your Money

You've always worked hard for your money. You have never lived extravagantly, but there never seems to be enough cash to make ends meet. You're still years away from retirement, but you haven't even thought of starting a serious savings program yet.

If you find saving money a tough job, you're in good company. Most Americans rank saving money at the top of their "need to do" list. However, in reality, it scores near the bottom of the "are doing" list. The New York Institute of finance reports that only three percent of the people who reach retirement age are financially secure.

Why not make a commitment this year to begin your journey to personal financial success and security. There is no easy way, no 30-day quick fix and no miracle formula. However, there are some

time proven principles that have been used with success for hundreds of years. They can work for you today.

Stay with a Plan

Most experts recommend beginning with a financial plan. Start with a list of items worth saving for. You should include short, intermediate and long-term goals. For example, saving \$2,000 for a summer vacation is a short term goal. Money for a preteen's college is an intermediate need and retirement funds would be long-term.

By establishing financial goals you give yourself a target to aim for. Now you can begin to direct your money toward your goals.

At the top of every financial plan should be paying off all debt. Thomas Fuller said, "Debt is the worst poverty." Publilius Syrus said, "Debt is the slavery of the free." Thomas Jefferson said, "Never spend your money before you have it."

One of the most common and most debilitating debts is the infamous credit card. The interest rates can soar to more than 20 percent per year. You can't afford to pay 20 percent interest. Pay your charge cards off. Don't charge more on them. Reduce the number you hold and thereby the temptation to use them.

Pay Yourself First

You can only save if you put money into savings first. You usually spend what you have left after paying bills. To get your savings started, take money out of your paycheck first. The amount is not really as important as establishing the habit.

You may set a goal to save \$200,000 over the next 30 years. A monthly deposit of \$142, earnings eight percent interest, would accomplish that goal.

Another good way to save is to shorten the length of repayment terms. For example, a 30 year \$50,000, eight percent home mortgage has a monthly payment of \$366.89. If you shorten the term of repayment to 15 years, the payment grows to \$477.83 per month, an increase of only \$111. However, you save a whopping \$46,071 in interest costs.

Now carry this little exercise a step further. Let's assume you pay the house off in 15 years and continue to deposit \$477.83 into savings for another 15 years. Earning six percent, your savings account would grow to more than \$136,000.

In both cases your home is free and clear. The extra \$111 per month advanced your long-term savings by more than \$136,000. So shorten the term and continue the payments.

The same principle will work for cars. Drive your paid for car three more years and make a \$300 monthly deposit to savings. At the end of three years you'll have accumulated \$11,700 to put down on your next car.

In summary: plan, get out of debt, pay your savings first and shorten repayment terms. It's your money, why not keep more of it.

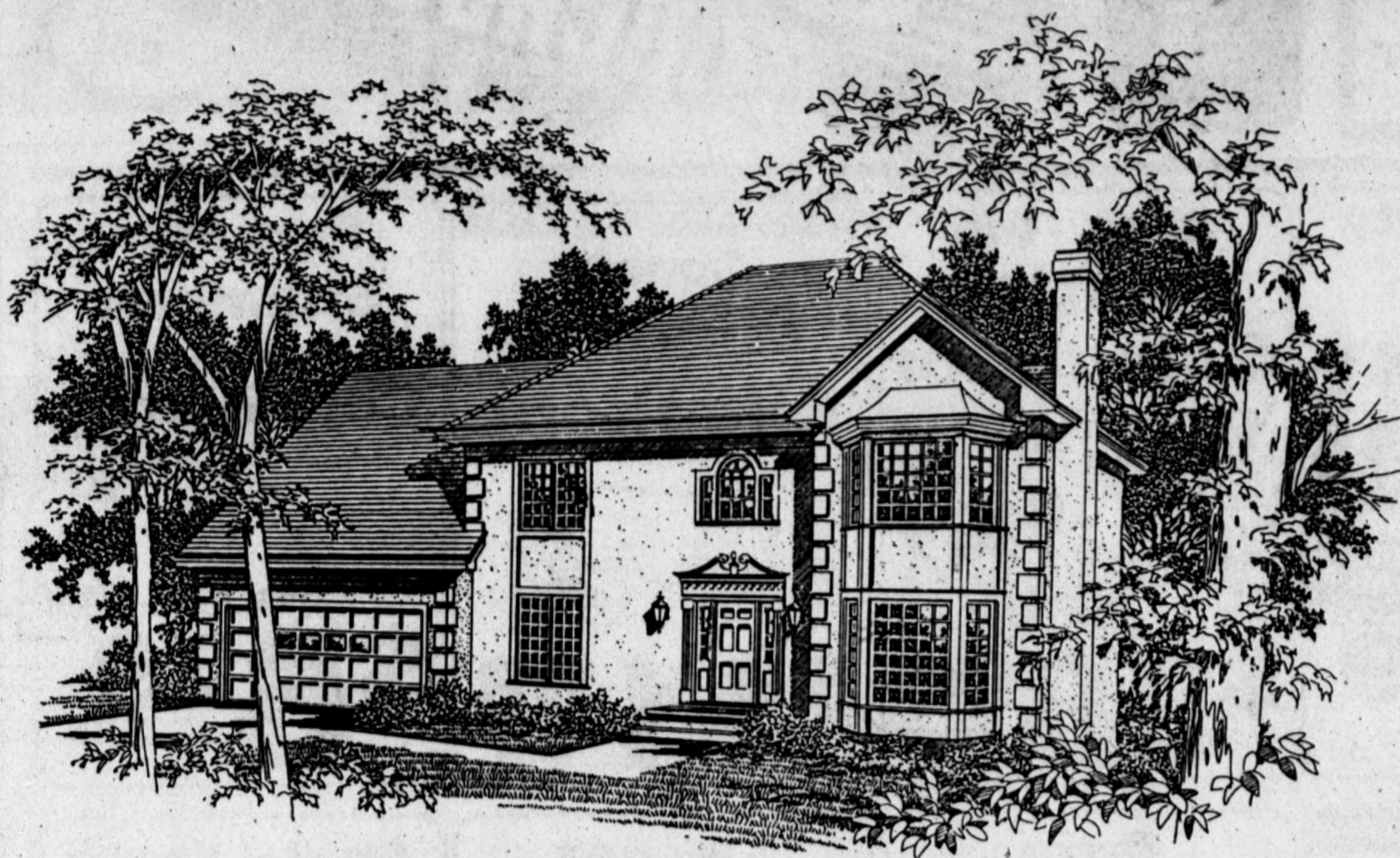

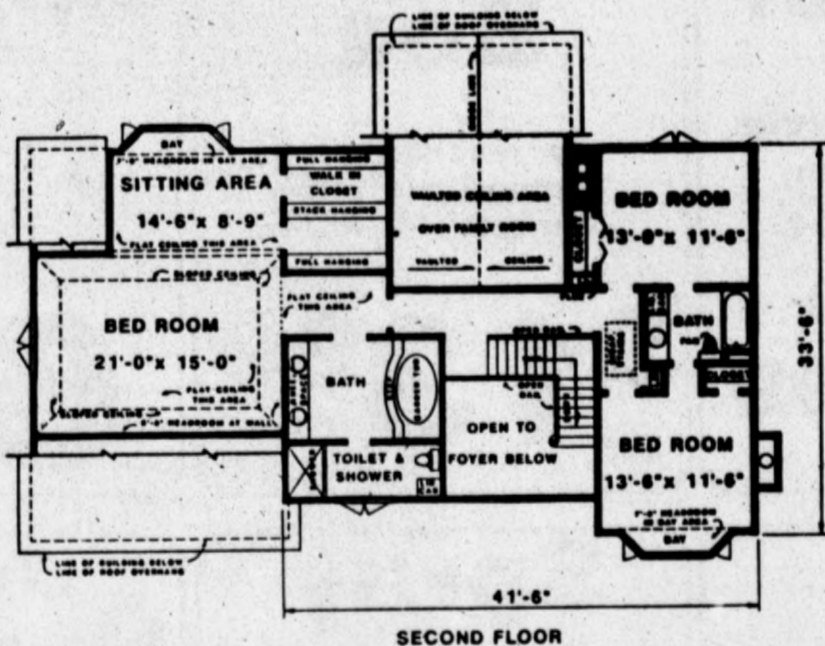
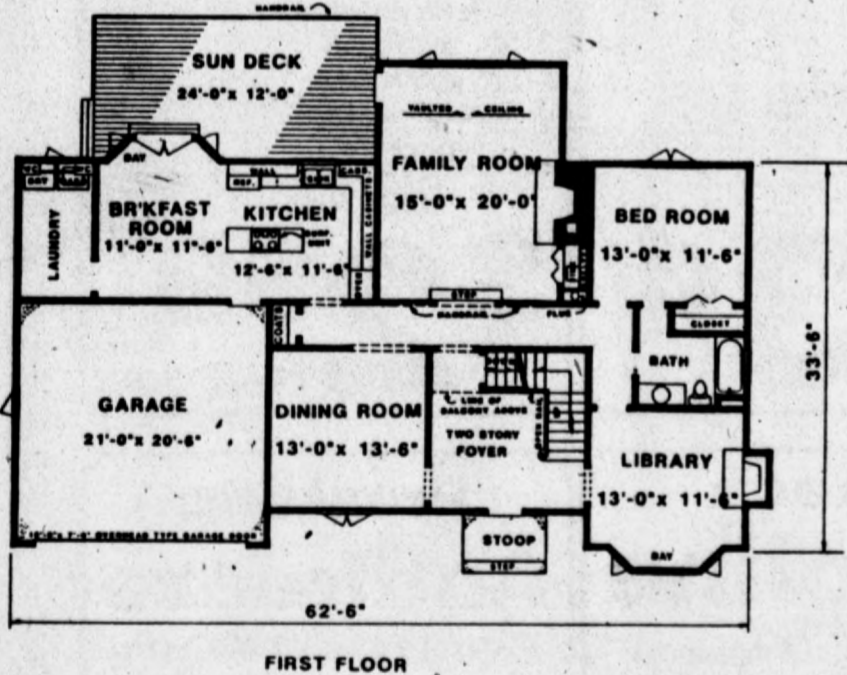

A. First, remove the agitator by unscrewing the agitator cap. Lift the agitator up and out of the machine. Check the inside of the agitator and the post in the machine for soap deposits. Remove as much as possible with a plastic potscouring pad and wooden scrapers such as Popsicle sticks. To get the film off the inside of the washer tub, fill it with hot water (140-160 degrees Fahrenheit). Add one cup of nonprecipitating water conditioner such as Calgon, Spring Rain, etc. plus one cup of household ammonia. Run the washer through a complete cycle without any other ingredient or clothes. You may have to repeat the process if there is a soapy film on top of the water.

To get the soapy film out of clothes washed before this treatment, fill the washer with warm or hot water. Add one cup of the water conditioner and one cup of household ammonia plus the soiled clothes. Run the clothes through a cycle and dry normally.

Exercise fights aging, illness

ST. LOUIS (AP) - We can't avoid getting older, but evidence is growing that we may be able to avoid some of the sicknesses that go along with it.

Disorders such as cardiovascular disease, hypertension and adult onset diabetes don't have to be the natural consequences of aging, says Wendy Kohrt, an associate professor of medicine at Washington University.

"We feel they are more related to physical inactivity, and that many of them could be avoided through exercise and by maintaining an active lifestyle," she said.

Kohrt recently completed a first-of-its kind, five-year study in which 110 sedentary people ages 60 to 71 were put through a rigorous exercise program.

Kohrt's study group recruited 53 men and 57 women from the St. Louis area for a yearlong regimen. By year's end, all the participants were exercising 45 to 50 minutes a day, five days a week, at heart rates 80 percent to 90 percent of their maximum heart rate.

"Most were walking or jogging," Kohrt said. "The goal was to get each participant to do the equivalent of 15 to 20 miles per week by the end of the study."

All of the exercise was done under

supervised conditions at the medical school's indoor track and gym.

In the later stages of the program, those who could progressed from walking to jogging. Those who continued to walk but had difficulty increasing their heart rates on a level surface exercised on treadmills with elevated grades.

And the results surprised a lot of people.

"Earlier studies had tended to show that older people were not adaptable, that they couldn't benefit from cardiovascular programs like younger people, and women were not expected to do as well as men," Kohrt said.

"But after a year in our program, both the men and the women improved their cardiovascular function 20 (percent) to 25 percent - the same improvement level typically noted in studies of much younger people," she said.

"It seems to me that the central message here is that older people are remarkably responsive to exercise," said William Evans, chief of the Human Physiology Laboratory at the Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging at Tufts University in Boston.

Evans' own study on high-intensity weightlifting for the elderly last year showed that even up to age 100, such exercise can triple muscle strength and cause significant increase in muscle size.

For the Kohrt study, about 300 applicants were screened to get the 110 participants, and they had to be ready to work hard. Some people couldn't take it, she says.

"It's hard to push some people because they feel they've done a lot if they've walked a mile. We wanted them doing four miles a day," Kohrt said.

"We wanted the most vigorous exercise that we thought they could handle. I think the majority expressed some reservations at the beginning, but before it was over they were actually doing things they couldn't even imagine before they started," she said.

Every three months the participants underwent interim testing, and their exercise assignments were adjusted weekly. At the end of the study, the initial tests were repeated to determine the progress.

Not all the progress was physical. "Take Clara Wolff, for instance," she said. "When she came in, she said she might walk, but she would

never run. And eventually she ran six miles. That kind of thing makes you feel good about yourself."

"Now life is a smorgasbord," Wolff said. "Now I'm not afraid to try something. And if I like it, I go back for more."

Wolff said her only complaint was that once the program ended, she had no good place to walk, run and work out.

"I think I'm going to make that my next project," she said.

Kohrt, 73, agrees that supervision is needed for older exercisers.

"We had a fairly high incidence of what we call 'painful episodes' - usually minor orthopedic problems such as hip and knee pain," she said.

But only three people suffered injuries that required them to stop exercising or modify their routine, she said. "That's probably about what you would find in a similar program for younger people."

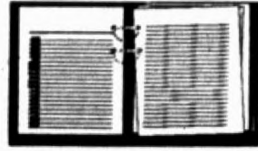

Nutrition Notes

"CHECKING OUT" THE SUPERMARKET CHARLOTTE R. CLARK RD/LD

As 1991 closed and 1992 opens, it's time to make plans for this new year, whether personal resolutions or strategic objectives. We can all benefit from a survey of socioeconomic landscapes as it relates to our outlook on food and nutrition.

Consumer attitude research is a good tool to check individuals' nutrition needs and concerns. This becomes the first step in fashioning effective nutrition messages and services. We need to observe the attitudes and behavior of supermarket shoppers.

Through the year 1991 various surveys were taken by observation and by telephone to establish trends in the shopping process. Americans shopped at 145,000 grocery stores and 30,750 supermarkets (1)-full line grocery stores with annual sales over \$2 million. While at the store, consumers could choose from an array of products and services, including bakery goods, deli counters, bulk foods, salad bars, and flower shops, but what features really "sell" an individual store and keep shoppers coming back for more?

Produce. Quality fruits and vegetables top the list of reasons 99% of shoppers choose a particular store. The other top of five factors affecting shoppers' decisions about where to shop are: wide selection (98%), low prices (96%), courteous employees (96%), quality meat (95%), and convenient location (93%). Availability of nutrition and health information is important to 86% of shoppers; slightly more women (88%), than men (81%) consider health information important.

We are all eagerly awaiting the finished product, "Sugar Britches," which is one of the most popular dolls made. There are a number of other dolls that can be made. Some of the members have made dolls before. It seems we all have several daughters and granddaughters who need a doll.

Most Americans go to the grocery store an average of 2.3 times per week. Men seem to shop more often than women. Shoppers with children average more weekly trips than shoppers without children, and young adults shop more frequently than persons over 65.

American families spend an average of \$79 per week for groceries. Families of all sizes spend more for groceries than in previous years. The increase is specially noticed in two-person households. Per-person spending on grocery items averages \$32 per week, compared with \$29 in 1989 and 1990.

Most consumers are paying greater attention to prices when food shopping. Economy-minded shoppers clip coupons and scan newspapers for grocery specials, the most common method used to save money. Consumers are eating more leftovers, buying fewer gourmet and convenience foods, dining out less often and being very conscious of food quantity preparations.

Shoppers rank nutrition second to taste as the important factor to consider when purchasing food. Most shoppers (95%) are at least somewhat concerned about nutritional content of foods; (56%) of shoppers are very concerned about nutrition. A large part of the population have gone back to "basic" cooking and the use of many generic products to increase the purchasing power of their food dollars.

Shoppers worry about fat and cholesterol content of their diets. One in five shoppers is concerned about salt intake and 12% are concerned about calories and sugar.

What are shoppers eating? More fruits and vegetables are being

consumed to ensure healthful diets. Less meat, oils, fats, and sugar are being eaten as evident in almost 50% of shoppers check out at the counters. Women are more concerned about nutrition than men. As people grow older, they place greater importance on nutrition.

Food safety is considered by 9 of 10 shoppers to be important factor when shopping for food. Their greatest concern is the threat of spoilage and its identification. Contamination from residues such as pesticides and herbicides and chemical residues are considered by most as a serious health hazard. Other safety factors include concerns for antibiotic and hormone use, irradiation of foods and the use of nitrates.

With the 90's our American society has been characterized as an era of renewed and growing interest in environmental responsibilities. Shoppers reflect varying levels of commitment to environmental activism through recycling aluminum, newspapers, plastic or glass. However, one in three shoppers consider the type of packaging when choosing a product. About 50% of shoppers surveyed indicate that they would probably switch to a supermarket that promoted environmentally safe products and practices.

The growing interest and knowledge of consumers in health and nutrition issues has promoted the food industry to respond through products development and marketing aimed at Americas' health concerns.

Eye Openers

Dr. Hugh B. Currie DID YOU KNOW?...

Patients come into the office and after being refracted, many seem surprised when I do not recommend a change in their glasses. It seems that some people are in the habit of changing their glasses every year or two assuming that there are significant changes occurring during that period of time in their refractive error. Refractive errors do change, but usually it is gradually. Sometimes many years pass before a significant change occurs. I have seen patients that have worn essentially the same glasses for over 20 years. Changing their glasses made only a very slight difference in their vision. They could have satisfactorily worn the same glasses prescription for the whole 20-year period.

There are some important reasons for a sudden change in the power needed in glasses. The sudden onset

of diabetes mellitus is a fine example. Incidentally, the initial treatment of diabetes may result in just as large a change. Changes in the lens of the eye, such as development of cataracts, may result in a slow change in the nearsighted direction. This is known commonly as the onset of "second sight." This may make it easier to read without glasses. Changes in shape of the cornea on the front of the eye are still another example. Keratoconus, a coning of the shape of the front of the eye, is this type of corneal disease. Irregularities from injury to the eye, sometimes of a seemingly minor nature, can result in requirement for change in glasses.

Any sudden change in vision should suggest a need for an eye examination without delay. It may be a change in glasses is all that is needed, but more often, there is a disease condition present that causes the sudden decrease and it may need immediate attention.

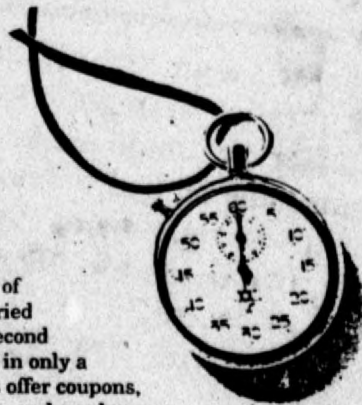

Today saw one of the largest consumer responses of the week to offers made by local grocery stores for discounted prices. Across the city, shoppers were redeeming coupons cut from the local paper in record numbers.

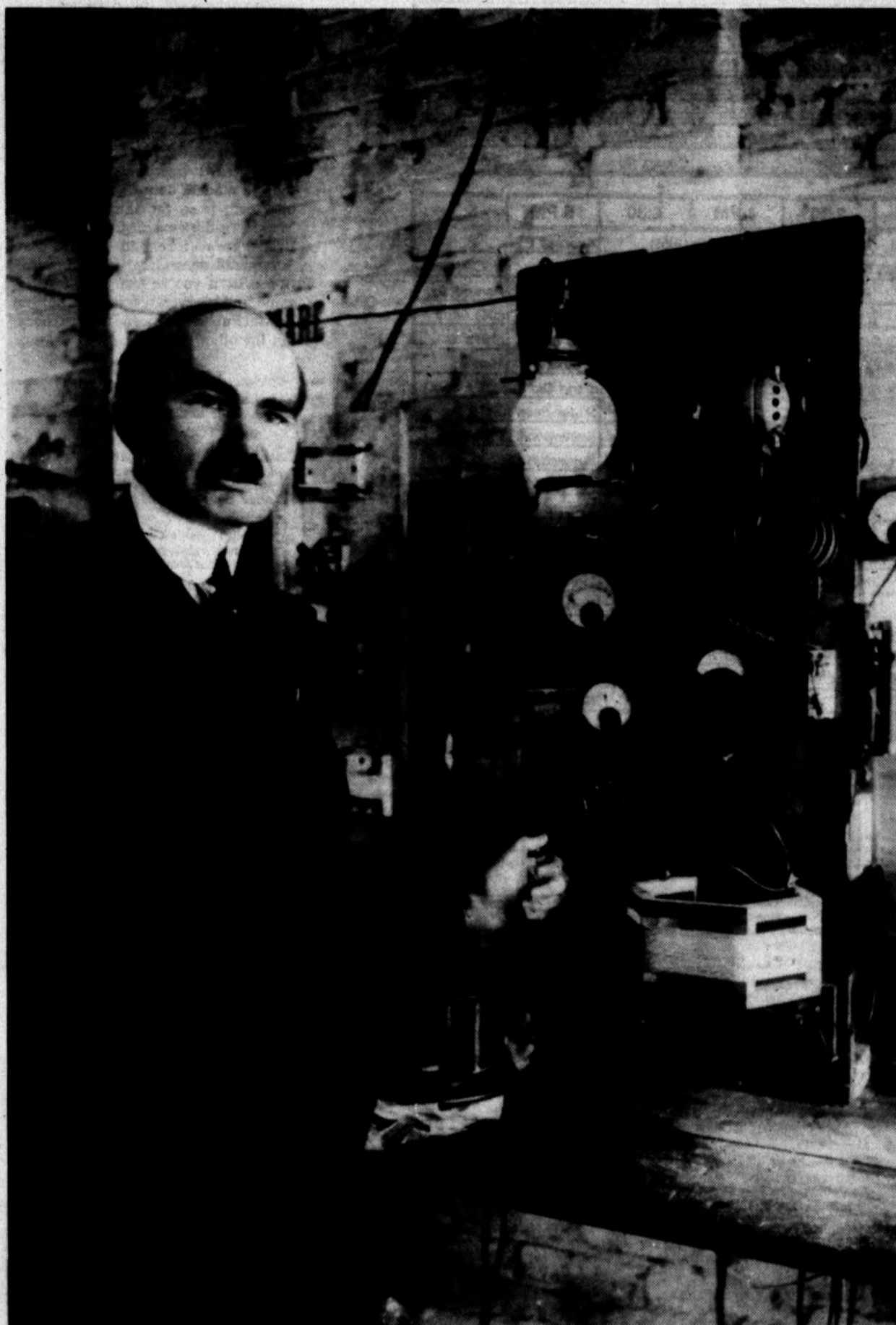

PBS viewers discover 'Empire of the Air'



Lee de Forest liked to call himself the "Father of Radio," but his detractors balk at that title. De Forest is one of many profiled in *Empire of the Air: The Men Who Made Radio*, premiering Wednesday on PBS. Written and directed by Ken Burns, the documentary is narrated by Jason Roberts.

History's dust swept off radio pioneers

In times when technological advances are made at an accelerating pace, it is easy to take for granted those fundamental discoveries which now seem simplistic. And when history is composed of public-relations work and half-truths, posterity suffers from misinformation and loses the human drama it is due. Fortunately, we have authors like Tom Lewis and documentarians like Ken Burns to open those dusty cans of worms and air out the real facts. On Wednesday, Jan. 29, television can look into its grandfather's closet with *Empire of the Air: The Men Who Made Radio*, Burns' film of Lewis' book. The PBS presentation also includes an encore of Burns' *Brooklyn Bridge*.

Spanning the years from 1906 to 1955 (when television assumed its position of dominance), this documentary is the interwoven story of the three men most responsible for the development of the aural medium, as well as the foundation for all subsequent forms of electronic communications. But the telling of the tale is a marvel in itself. Burns re-creates the feel of radio by frequently switching the screen to black so that the snippets of old radio shows, commercials and news announcements achieve a greater impact upon the audience's senses with their crackle and hiss. As for visuals, in addition to photographs and newsreel footage, Burns includes on-camera interviews with radio performer Garrison Keillor, broadcasting historian Eric Barnouw and friends and relatives of the film's subjects: David Sarnoff, Lee de Forest and Edwin Howard Armstrong.

The Russian immigrant David Sarnoff, who rose from delivering telegrams for the Marconi Company to heading up the Radio Corporation of

America (RCA), was the most successful of the three. A hard-driven, self-made master of business, Sarnoff saw the unlimited potential in the inventions of others.

Lee de Forest, the self-proclaimed "Father of Radio," invented the audion tube, a device which detected and regulated the flow of radio waves.

Although he held more than 300 patents, many of his contemporaries asserted that most of his "discoveries" were actually the work of others. Still, it is de Forest which history most acknowledges, due largely to his lifelong bids for publicity.

Sadly, the most unsung hero in the chorus of history is the man who made its music more listenable. Edwin Howard Armstrong invented the process of regeneration (which greatly increased the strength of de Forest's audion tube) and frequency modulation (FM), which deleted the static inherent in AM (amplitude modulation) broadcasts. The dedicated Armstrong had his patents disputed and/or sidestepped by Sarnoff and de Forest, and spent much of his troubled life tied up in court over lawsuits he rarely won.

Ken Burns, whose award-winning film *The Civil War* has been called the best TV documentary ever made, has another winner with *Empire*. Though he had not planned to make this film, to him "there was something so compelling about the drama of these three men, so complicated, so dark and so unknown. You know, we're used to a kind of sanitized version of history. And here, the rug had been lifted up and some of the dirt swept out. And it was fascinating dirt." © TV Listing Inc.

On Sunday, Jan. 26, at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in Minneapolis, the year's most anticipated single sporting event gets under way at 6 p.m. EST when CBS broadcasts live coverage of Super Bowl XXVI to more than 100 million viewers worldwide.

So, if you've lost your Twister game and everybody's burned out on Trivial Pursuit, it may be time to check out the other networks.

'Notorious' remake no threat to original

Robertson wasted in tepid telefilm

The Lifetime cable network has produced a remake of Alfred Hitchcock's *Notorious*, which is scheduled to debut on Tuesday, Jan. 28. The good news is star Jenny Robertson emerges as an actress of real promise, combining impressive range and timing with presence and surefire sex appeal. The bad news is she can't save this slow, unengaging film.

Part of the problem lies in Lifetime's reworking of Ben Hecht's original story. In Hitchcock's 1946 gem, American agent Cary Grant blackmailed fast-living Ingrid Bergman into infiltrating a band of escaped Nazis, led by suave Claude Rains.

The new version unwisely moves the action to the present. Jean-Pierre Cassel plays Alex Sebastian, a Russian

arms dealer whose enterprise is threatened by the end of the Cold War. CIA agent Devlin (John Shea) recruits Alicia Velorus (Robertson), a well-known "party girl," to seduce and eventually marry Sebastian. When Alicia's motives are discovered, Alex begins to poison his wife, and it's up to Devlin to save her.

The new script simply doesn't work. For sheer dramatic weight, escaped Nazis, alive and scheming, are hard to beat. (And Cassel and his confederates are a dull bunch.) In the original, Rains was dominated by his strong-willed mother; Cassel is simply nagged by his listless sister (Marisa Berenson). Worst of all is writer Douglas Lloyd McIntosh's mechanism for getting Alicia to work for the CIA. Instead of blackmail, the hard-drinking, promiscuous young woman is motivated by patriotism!

The daughter of a convicted traitor, Alicia agrees to Devlin's plan in order to atone for her father's treachery.

The actors struggle nobly with the material, although Cassel's pacing sometimes slows things to a crawl. The romance between Robertson and Shea is unbelievable, the villains are nothing to hiss at, and this revamped *Notorious* unfolds with all the suspense of an instant-coffee commercial.

Ken Burns tells an American story

Ken Burns is one of the rarest of filmmakers: a documentarian of whom you've probably heard. His monumental achievement, *The Civil War*, has been called the best television documentary ever made. His newest work, *Empire of the Air: The Men Who Made Radio*, premieres Wednesday, Jan. 29, on PBS.

The 38-year-old resident of New Hampshire has been in the business of putting truth on film for half of his life now. His list of other award-winning documentaries include *Songs of the Civil War*, *The Shakers: Hands to Work, Hearts to God* and his first film, *Brooklyn Bridge*, which will air along with *Empire* on Wednesday.

Citing the late John Ford as the director most influential to him, Burns didn't always want to make documentaries. "I had planned to be a Hollywood director, but I ran into a bunch of teachers who reminded me that the ways things are and were, if told carefully, are much more dramatic than anything I could imagine on film."

The next big project for Burns is a film dealing with the history of baseball, which he expects to complete by the fall of 1994. His treatment of the American pastime promises to be much more than just a day in the park.

TV, the window on the world, will soon open doors for students. Fifteen public television stations and their local schools will begin a four-month test in March of a new satellite system that promises to provide a nationwide interactive communications network for educational institutions. Very small aperture terminal (VSAT) technology, which enables the transmission

and reception of voice, video and printed data, has the capability of linking students and teachers to libraries, museums, databases and

other classrooms throughout the PBS service area. Funded by public television stations and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, Project VSAT expects to have all PBS stations in America equipped with the cutting-edge technology by 1993.

To air or not to air, that is the question. Soon, home viewers may have a part in the process of deciding which programs get a shot at being on the tube. Producers Showcase Television, which begins limited runs early this year, will preview TV pilots of all genres from network and independent producers for audiences to comment upon by phone or mail. The service will enable producers to retool their programs in the case of negative responses, and allow them to supply marketing answers to potential buyers.

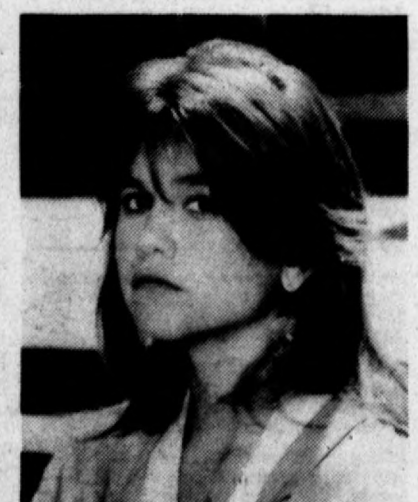

Kevin Costner tops on reader's list

A: Costner was born in Compton, Calif., on Jan. 18, 1955. In high school he was the class jock. He was halfway toward a degree in marketing at California State University before he decided on acting. Never one to put all his eggs in one basket, he continued his college courses and enrolled at the Southcoast Actors Co-op and appeared in a number of community produc-

tions. He earned his degree, married his college sweetheart, Cindy, and got a job at a major national firm. Determined to break into movies, he quit his job after 45 days. Finally, he landed a part in PBS' *Testament*. His reviews helped him get the role of Gardner Barnes in *Fandango*. After that, his career soared. Costner and his wife live in California with their three children. Even if I had a home address, I wouldn't give it out. You can write him care of CAA, 9830 Wilshire Blvd., Beverly Hills, Calif., 90212. Harrison Ford was born July 13, 1942, in Chicago and was raised in the suburbs. He flunked out of college three days before his class was to graduate, then moved to Los Angeles and was signed by Columbia Pictures for \$150 a week. He was released from

his contract (Ford claims he was too difficult) and headed over to Universal Studios. In 1977, George Lucas, who had picked Ford for a small role in *American Graffiti*, chose him for a lead in *Star Wars*. The movie was a hit, and Ford was catapulted to fame. Ford resists publicity, claiming it blurs an actor's vision. He is currently married and has two children from his first marriage. No address is available for him. **Q:** I've seen the address where to write Richard Dean Anderson in your column several times. Can you please give some information about him? —Mary Bowling, Corbin, Ky. **A:** The tall (6'2") actor was born Jan. 23, 1950, in Minneapolis. His mother was an artist and his father a

jazz bassist. Anderson wanted to be a hockey player, but after breaking both arms in different accidents, he decided to find a less violent occupation. He developed an interest in acting and moved to Los Angeles. Stints as a stage manager, street mime, juggler and even a jester singer at a Renaissance-style cabaret preceded a role in *Superman of the Bones* at a Los Angeles theater. Next came a role on *General Hospital* for five years. In 1982, he appeared in the short-lived series *Seven Brides for Seven Brothers*. Getting to know Jeter The 'Grazing' Zapper

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Before Michael Jeter won a Tony award for "Grand Hotel" and landed a role in the CBS comedy "Evening Shade" he once quit acting cold turkey, so to speak.

"Things for me had ground to a halt as an actor," he says. "I wasn't getting work. I didn't know any more if I wanted to be in the business. So I got out of it for a few years.

"I taught myself to type, learned some word-processing software programs and became a legal secretary. Although acting was what I wanted to do, I hadn't taught myself to work in any other way."

Jeter's decision to quit acting came at a time when he was recovering the second time from addiction to alcohol and narcotics. He felt the stress and uncertainty of an acting career might have contributed to his relapse.

"My decision to get into show business was not a sober decision," he says. "I was already into addiction. I started experimenting with drugs in college. My getting out of show business was a sober decision."

At the time he was living in New York. He worked mostly on stage, but had had small roles in such television movies as "My Old Man" and "Sentimental Journey" and in the short-lived series that followed the "From Here to Eternity" miniseries. He plays a cabaret singer named "Ethel Merman" in the recently released movie "The Fisher King."

He currently stars as Herman Stiles, the blustery assistant football coach on "Evening Shade." He won the 1990 Tony as best supporting actor in a musical for his role as provincial German Jewish bookkeeper named Otto Kringlein in "Grand Hotel."

It was a call he received at his secretarial desk that got him back into acting. He was offered a small role as a homeless man named Calvin Klein in "Designing Women," made by the same people who produce "Evening Shade."

"I don't know why they remembered me," he says. "It was just a tiny spot on 'Designing Women.' But Fran Bascom was head of casting at MTM. She had cast me years ago in a 'Lou Grant' episode. She got me on 'Night Court.' She just thought of me over the years. And not in a limited way because every role was different. When you're an actor you're always concerned that when you play a particular role that's how they'll remember you."

"Fran remembered me again when I was doing 'Grand Hotel' in New York. Harry Thomason came to see me in the play and we had breakfast at a little coffee shop. He said, 'My wife Linda has written this new TV show set in Arkansas and she wants you in it. What do I have to do to get you?' Actors don't usually hear this. I thought, 'What do I have to do to get on it?'"

Thomason is co-executive producer of "Evening Shade" with his wife and the show's creator, Linda Bloodworth-Thomason, and Burt Reynolds, the star.

Jeter couldn't get time off from "Grand Hotel," so he flew to Los Angeles, went directly to the studio to film his part and flew back to New York. He won the Tony after he did the pilot.

In his acceptance speech for the Tony, Jeter offered himself as proof that addiction to alcohol and drugs could be conquered. Still, he does not like to offer himself as a model.

"I took the time to send out a very specific message to a very specific audience," he says. "I felt very grateful for the turnaround in my life. I wanted to let people know you don't give up."

"What I don't like is using it as a way of drawing attention to myself. I don't know why my life changed. I don't take the credit for it. I would prefer that my work draw attention. My having gotten over this doesn't make me special."

He shrugs and adds: "Ninety-nine percent of acting is just showing up.

I feel the same way about life. You take what's in front of you and take it with as much grace as possible."

His friend William Devane got him onto "From Here to Eternity" in 1979-80.

Jeter also appeared on the soap opera "One Life to Live" and was in seven episodes of the series "Hot House," a 1988 summer series about a psychiatric hospital.

He's not letting his training on the computer go to waste. He's writing a treatment for a half-hour comedy series and he also writes short stories.

Jeter grew up in Lawrenceburg, Tenn., and studied acting at Memphis State University. He went to Baltimore first because he had heard it was tough to get work in New York without an Equity union card.

"I had a friend at the Center Stage in Baltimore," he says. "He offered me the use of his sofa and introduced me to the artistic director. I auditioned and was hired as an apprentice in the children's section. To supplement my income I tended bar at the theater."

Two years later, with an Equity card in his pocket, he moved to New York and stayed there for the next 14 years.

Jeter admits part of his attraction to acting is to the opportunity to submerge yourself in another personality.

"One of the things about being an actor is that you can play out all your socially unacceptable expressions and feelings," he says. "I often see myself in my private life as being a pinched and confined person. When I get on the stage I can open up."

NEW YORK (AP) - Ah, the zapper. That little TV remote control you hold in your hand is a powerful tool for freedom from the tyranny of commercials - but only if you know how to how to use it.

You've got to know how to graze. "Grazing," as it's called by wet-palmed Madison Avenue types and white-lipped network programmers, is the use of the zapper to flick rapidly from channel to channel. On multichannel cable TV systems, it's almost irresistible. "It's a dangerous weapon. It should be used carefully and, I think, with discretion," said Donny Deutsch, creative director for Deutsch Inc., a smaller, hipper New York City ad agency. He is kidding.

"It gives the viewer more choices, forcing advertisers and TV shows to make every second count," Deutsch said. "Some people, regardless of what you put on, watch TV that way."

Deutsch's agency created the "Your mother wears Nike" commercials for British Knight sneakers and other offbeat, attention-getting ads. He offers the following tips to help you zap:

- SHOW STARTERS (The Three-Camera Sitcom Rule): Always start grazing with half-hour sitcoms like "Cheers," which give you a brief introduction before the opening credits. After you see what the show is about, you get three minutes - one for credits, two for commercials - to see what's on the other channels.

- SHOW STOPPERS (The "thirtysomething" deviation): The one-hour drama breaks for commercials at 20 minutes past the hour, half-past, and 40 minutes after the hour. The 20- and 40-minute breaks are perfect for checking the competition, because other kinds of shows will not be at break. "You're going to get editorial on pretty much the rest of the dial," Deutsch notes.

- THE TBS SHIFT: Cable TV's Turner Broadcasting System network is the only one that starts and ends its shows at 5 minutes past the hour and half-hour - a key time advantage for

people either watching TBS or checking it out.

"I think they wanted to somehow to separate themselves from the pack and give people who are roaming a chance to check them out," Deutsch said. "I think it's been a helpful format for them."

- THE EVERY OTHER BREAK RULE: (Editors! Set this in boldface type!) The first commercial break on a show is usually about 2 minutes, but the SECOND break usually is about twice as long. That alternating pattern continues through most shows, especially the longer ones, like movies.

"That's where you've got that real grazing time, to leisurely go through 30 stations," Deutsch said. "It's no longer an arduous or time-consuming thing. Even if you only spend a second on each channel, that's a whole minute right there."

- THE SPORTS BREAK: Deutsch says NBC takes the longest breaks during a football game, followed by ABC and then CBS. Also, Deutsch says, ESPN rolls its scores at 28 minutes past the hour and 2 minutes before the hour.

- THE NETWORK NEWS BREAK: All three networks go directly into the national news once the local news broadcasts are over, and start with an overview of the night's stories. Clever grazers can find out what's going to be on on all three broadcasts in time to catch the syndicated reruns or syndicated game shows that run against the news.

- THE 'M-A-S-H' Vs. 'Cheers' THEOREM: In most of the big cities on this continent, "M-A-S-H" runs against "Cheers." The trick is that "M-A-S-H" has a long introduction while "Cheers" starts immediately. So, identify that "Cheers" rerun and click to "M-A-S-H."
