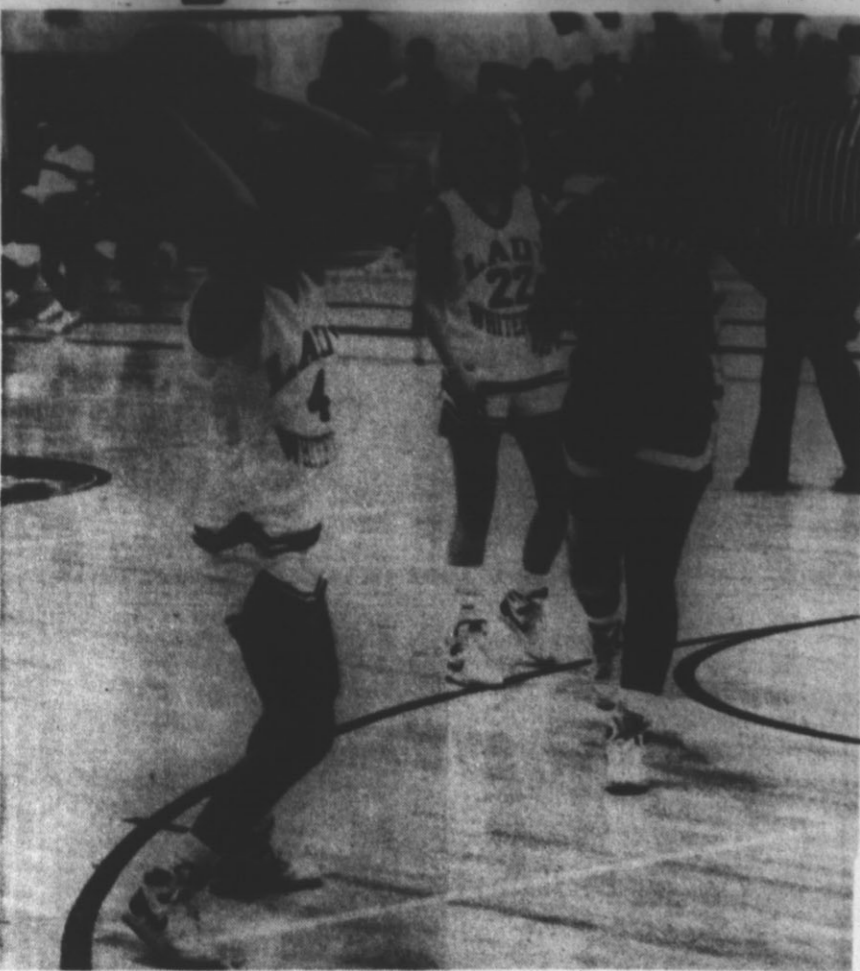

## 50-43 over Lubbock Dunbar

# Lady Whitefaces score district win

The winner of the fourth quarter was the winner of the varsity girls' basketball game Thursday night at the La Plata gym - Hereford, which outscored Lubbock Dunbar 18-6 in that final period in a 50-43 victory.

The win was Hereford's first in District 1-4A competition this season, after six straight defeats. Overall, the Lady Whiteface varsity is now 6-14.

The HHS junior varsity girls scored their third straight victory and fourth in their last six games, walloping Dunbar 67-22. Hereford has a 4-9 season record in junior varsity contests.

On Monday, Hereford hosts Lubbock Estacado in a varsity game at 6:30 p.m. at the La Plata gym and in a junior varsity game at 8 p.m. at the HHS gym.

The Lady Whiteface varsity trailed Dunbar 37-32 after three quarters of play. Hereford had a five-point lead twice in the first half, 13-8 and 17-12, before trailing by one point at halftime, 21-20. That 37-32 lead by Dunbar was its biggest of the game.

Hereford tied up the score at 39-39 with 5:17 left in the game when Tricia Kahlich scored a field goal and free throw. Dunbar quickly gained back the lead, 41-39, on a pair of free throws, but the Lady Panthers could score only two points in the last five minutes of the game.

A basket by Cande Robbins tied the game at 41-41 with 4:52 left, and Susan Bell's field goal with 3:41 left gave the Lady Whitefaces the lead for good.

In a minute and a half, Dunbar missed the first free throw in three one-and-ones until it hit a foul shot with 3:30 left. Only eight combined points were scored by the two teams the rest of the way, but there were opportunities for many more points than that.

Dunbar missed three more foul shots which were the first in one-and-ones, and made two of four other free throws. Hereford made five of nine free throws.

Robbins led Hereford with 15 points and 13 rebounds, Stacy White scored 10 points, and Kahlich scored nine points and five assists. Carmen Brockman had eight rebounds, and Susan Bell had four assists.

"I'm proud of the kids for the way they came back in the fourth quarter

and did what they needed to, to win," Hereford Coach Frank Belcher said. "We played good defensively and we did what we had to do to stop them, to give us a chance. The kids have worked hard all year, and they deserved to win."

Hereford's Chandra Brown nearly outscored the entire Lubbock Dunbar team in the junior varsity game. Brown totaled 19 points, and Libby Kosub added 14 points, to help lead Hereford over Dunbar 67-22.

Hereford built up a 38-12 halftime lead. Other HHS scorers included Brianna Townsend with eight points and Jessica Dearing with six points.

Brown also led Hereford in rebounds with nine, and Dearing and Belinda Britten each grabbed five rebounds. Townsend and Nikki Self each had four assists.

**Hereford JV wins in overtime, 59-53**

**Herd varsity falls to Dunbar, 64-59**

The big plays were not made when they were needed by the Hereford Whiteface varsity boys' basketball team Thursday night when they suffered a 64-59 loss to Lubbock Dunbar.

Hereford trailed the visitors by one point at halftime, 26-25, but fell behind 49-38 in the third quarter. The loss dropped the Whitefaces to 1-4 in District 1-4A and 6-12 for the season.

Hereford's junior varsity boys rallied from five points down with less than a minute left in the game to tie Dunbar 51-51 and sent the game into overtime. Hereford went on to beat Dunbar 59-53 to up its season record to 9-3.

On Monday, Hereford plays at home against Lubbock Estacado. The junior varsity game is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. at the Hereford High School gym, and the varsity game will be played at 8 p.m. at the La Plata gym.

In Thursday's varsity game, Dunbar gained an early 7-2 lead and also led 13-8 before Hereford came back on a pair of three-pointers to take the lead, 14-13. Marcus Brown and Kevin Hansen scored those three-point goals.

A basket by Chad Clements with 18 seconds left in the first quarter gave Hereford a 16-15 lead.

The first four minutes of the second quarter saw both teams go cold. Only six combined points were scored by the two teams, with Dunbar holding a 19-18 lead at the four-minute mark.

Later, Hereford gained a 23-21 lead on a three-point goal by Brown. Dunbar then held its halftime lead of 26-25.

The score was tied at 30-30 in the third quarter, but Dunbar scored 11 straight points for a 41-30 lead with 4:05 left in the period. Hereford still trailed by 11 points when the quarter ended, 49-38.

Each team scored a field goal in the first minute of the final period. Hereford then began a comeback.

Clint Cotten hit a pair of free throws, and Brown and Hansen each scored a field goal, bringing Hereford to within six points, 51-45.

Perhaps the most crucial call of the game occurred when Cotten made a jump shot, only to have it taken away on an offensive foul shot. Dunbar quickly scored a field goal for a 53-45 lead with 4:48 left.

A minute later, a basket by Rodney McCracken brought the Herd back to

within six points, 55-49, but then with 2:48 left, Dunbar scored a three-point goal for a nine-point lead.

Brown hit both free throws in a one-and-one with 2:29 left, Pat Mercer hit a shot with 2:08 left, and Hansen scored a basket with 1:27 left, enabling Hereford to close the gap to three points, 58-55.

Dunbar scored with 59 seconds left, and then the Whitefaces committed turnover, destroying the comeback attempt. The Panthers led by seven, 62-55 with 36 seconds left.

The Herd did not give up, moving to within three points again, 62-59 on Ross Torres' field goal with 12 seconds left, but time ran out on Hereford.

"We played hard, but we missed too many shots. We've just got to shoot better. Dunbar played well," Hereford Coach Mike Fields said.

Hansen and McCracken each finished with 14 points to lead the Herd, and Brown scored 12 points. Leaders in other statistical categories included McCracken with eight rebounds, Cotten with seven rebounds, Hansen with five assists and five steals, and Brown with four assists and four steals.

Hereford hit 25 of 67 shots from the field for 36 percent.

In the junior varsity game, Lubbock Dunbar had a 49-44 lead but saw it evaporate in the final 31 seconds of the game. Hereford's Todd Schroeder scored a three-point goal with 31 seconds left, and Jason Scott hit a shot with 21 seconds remaining, tying the game at 49-49.

Dunbar then went ahead, 51-49, but

Keith Brown scored for Hereford with four seconds left to tie up the contest and send it into overtime.

In the overtime, Hereford scored first on a Schroeder basket with 1:56 left. Dunbar then tied the game, 53-53, with 1:27 left.

Stuart Mitts scored with 1:10 left, and then Keith Brown hit four clutch free throws in the next 30 seconds to help boost Hereford to its 59-53 win.

The game was a close one most of the way. Hereford led at halftime 25-23, and trailed Dunbar 37-36 after three quarters of play.

Hereford's leading scorers were Scott with 18, Brown with 13, and Schroeder with 10. Roger McCracken added nine points. Rebound leaders were McCracken with nine and Scott with seven.

Schroeder and Brown each had seven steals, and Scott led in assists with three.

## Doctor turns to film

HURST, Texas (AP) — A cosmetic surgeon is marketing a system that allows doctors to videotape surgical procedures to help cut down on malpractice lawsuits.

Dr. Bart Mazeika, 37, says he hasn't been threatened with a lawsuit since he installed the system in his office 18 months ago.

Mazeika began using a camera after his sixth malpractice lawsuit. He found he couldn't defend himself in court because his written medical records were incomplete.

"With surgical procedures on camera, you can see exactly what the doctors were doing, you can hear exactly what was said in examinations, and it's all accurate," he said. "More and more doctors and hospitals that are paying exorbitant malpractice premiums will want something like this."

Malpractice suits have increased in recent years. In Texas, 2,869 malpractice suits were filed in 1985, compared with 640 seven years earlier. The average settlement in 1985 was \$84,518.

But the videotaping idea has gained mixed reviews among some doctors and was blasted by a representative of a civil liberties group.

"I think it's reprehensible for doctors to go to that extent to protect themselves. A system like that assumes that a patient might be a problem," Joe Cook, president of the Dallas Civil Liberties Union, said Monday.

One Fort Worth doctor is using the system and said it has allowed him to devote more time to his patients.

"It lightens my load from writing and allows me to spend more time with my patients," said Dr. Bob Terrigan, a family practitioner.

But Al Karbach, an Arlington general practitioner, doesn't like the idea of keeping a video record.

"I wouldn't use such a system because I don't see the need for it if we're nice and informative and giving patients detailed information,"

he said.

Mazeika said he receives permission from his patients before rolling the tape and that all of them have been enthusiastic.

"The pathway of ideal manhood is in Christ. That moral and supreme idealism was Christ's greatest contribution toward civilizing mankind. He showed us a God of forgiveness and love. PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Singer Smokey Robinson says he might have joined other celebrities boycotting the state of Arizona because of Evan Mecham, but was heartened by the recall campaign against the embattled governor.  
"Because this action has been taken and because I do love my fans there, then I want to see them and

want them to see me," the singer said before a concert Thursday night in Phoenix.  
Many big-name rock groups and singers have either boycotted Arizona or contributed to the recall movement against Mecham, who shortly after taking office last January rescinded the state holiday honoring slain civil rights leader Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.  
Mecham contended his predecessor had declared the holiday illegally.  
Robinson's high-pitched, tremulous voice characterized such 1960s hits as "The Tracks of My Tears," "Shop Around," "Tears of a Clown" and "Ooh Baby, Baby."

LONDON (AP) — Princess Anne plans to fly to Uganda, Mozambique and Somalia early next year to inspect health and development projects as president of the Save the Children Fund, an official said.  
Nicholas Hinton, director-general of Save the Children, said the princess' tour will include programs run by the charity for the treatment of preventable conditions such as measles and diarrhea.

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexicans have launched a tribute to the country's best-known living artist, Rufino Tamayo.  
The centerpiece of the tribute was an exhibit called, "Tamayo 70" opening Wednesday at the Rufino Tamayo Museum of Contemporary International Art and the Museum of the Palace of Fine Arts.

### Diabetes

BY LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D.  
DEAR DR. LAMB: I am 44 years old and have had juvenile diabetes since I was 20. For many years I denied my condition and did not take very good care of myself. Four years ago I suffered an acidosis attack that nearly killed me. Since then, I have taken very good care of myself and follow my doctor's instructions.  
Despite my years of neglect, my overall health is not too bad, much to the surprise of my doctors. The worst complication is neuropathy in both legs and to a lesser degree in my arms. For a while after my brush with disaster I walked with a cane and had difficulty performing tasks requiring manual dexterity, such as buttoning my shirt. Now I can dress myself with no problems.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My husband and I never kissed our children on the lips, nor anyone else's children. Our daughter, who is expecting her first child — twins — has informed us that she will not follow that tradition. As far as she is concerned, anyone can kiss her children on the lips. What is your opinion on this?  
DEAR READER: As affectionate as kissing is, it is not a sanitary practice. The Eskimos may have been wise to rub noses instead. Kissing is the main way of transmitting herpes simplex of the lips and that is why as many as 80 percent of the public has been infected with it.

Is there any new treatment on the horizon that may reverse this condition? The neurologist just shakes his head. The neuropathy has curtailed my activities. I can no longer go hiking, play sports or do many things most people take for granted.  
DEAR READER: I'm sorry you had to have this complication. It is more often in type I diabetes, also called juvenile diabetes or insulin dependent diabetes. Many individuals with this type of diabetes simply do not form any insulin. The body then cannot really use glucose efficiently, even if it is glucose made from proteins.  
There are some promising new developments in research on diabetic neuropathy. I hope it will make it possible to offer much better help for people like you. But nothing has been developed to the point that I can say there is something that is now available. Don't give up hope. If the nature of the damage to the nerves can be defined and a treatment offered, many of these nerve fibers are capable of regeneration. Meanwhile, the best approach is to have your blood glucose levels controlled very well. And it is better to do this from the beginning of the disease to help prevent diabetic neuropathy.

Kissing also transmits the virus for infectious mononucleosis, called the kissing disease. Most people will get this virus disease sooner or later anyway. These diseases are usually milder in children than when they occur for the first time in adults.  
Kissing is an important way of expressing affection. And affection is important to the development of normal emotions and the ability to develop intimate relations with other people. However, lip kissing with just anybody, outside the family and close friends, seems like overdoing it.  
DEAR DR. LAMB: I was particularly interested in your column about the young woman who was having menopausal symptoms plus some irrational behavior strangely similar to the behavior of a young man in my family, also age 32. He wants it to be like it was when he was 16. Could it be that the male also goes through changes at this age? Would estrogen help him or does he need a swift kick in the pants?

The form of diabetes you have is quite different in many respects from the more common type II, or adult onset diabetes. I have discussed both in my new Special Report 89, Diabetes: The Sweet Sickness. I am sending you a copy. Others who want this report can send \$1 with a long,

I am a grandma who has seen many hard times and many strange people in my life, but this young man's behavior takes the cake.  
DEAR READER: Men do not have a menopause. They may have psychological problems in mid-life, better called a mid-life crisis. This is psychological, not hormonal. And estrogen would not help for such psychological symptoms.  
Behavior is not always dependent upon underlying medical problems. The young man's behavior more likely reflects his personality and upbringing. So you are left with your suggestion of a swift kick in the pants.

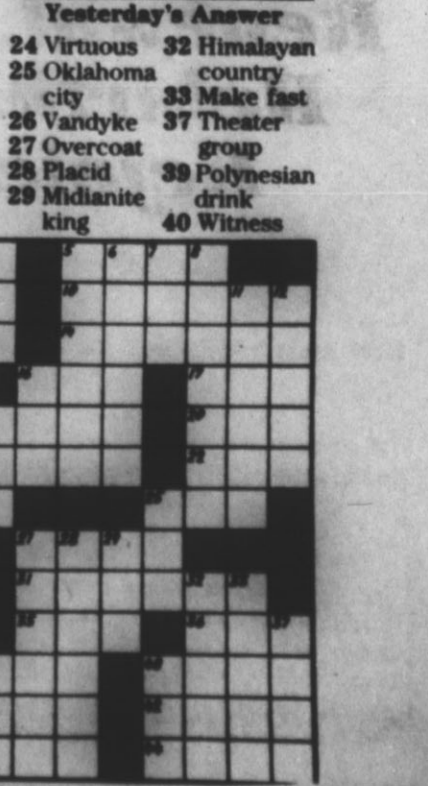

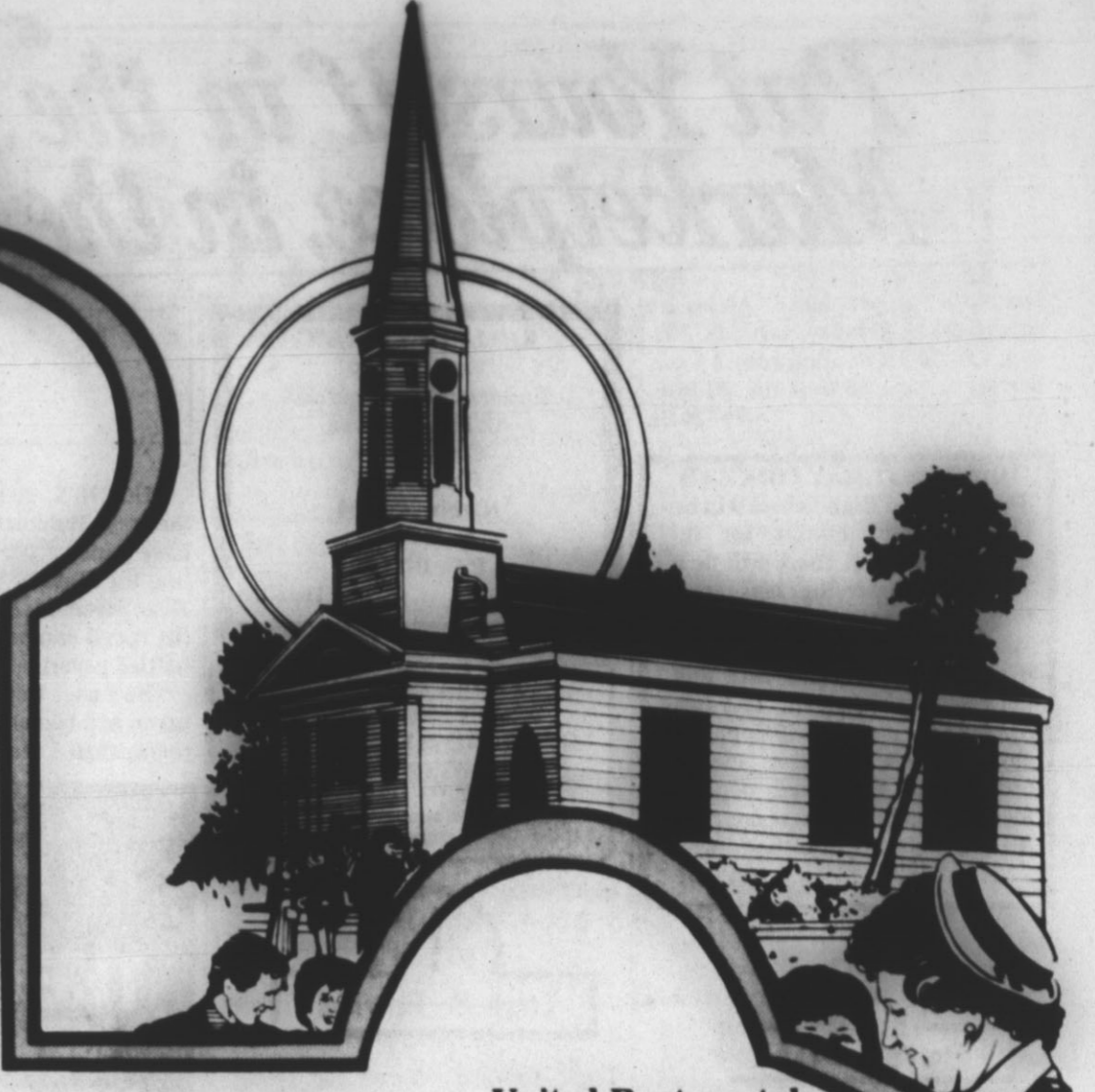
