A new world's record was made when Donna Anna 66th, 15-monthsold Hereford, sold to D. F. Urschel of Strong City, Kansas, for \$5,200. This is the highest price paid for a Hereford female in the past 15 years and is believed to be an all-time record for cattle under two years old. The bidding was spirited between three buyers, J. P. Osborn, Miami, Texas; W. D. Corley, Colorado Springs, Colorado, and Mr. Urschel. The heifer topped the sale.

The fine Herefords of both male and females, 72 in all, brought an average price of \$401. Twenty-four cows averaged \$502, and 48 bulls \$331. The record-breaking heifer is a daughter of Prince Domino and Donna Anna 5th, and a straight line-bred Anxiety 4th. The eleven year-old mother of the heifer sold for \$2,100, another record for aged
