## TDA has new goals, directions

They are milling flour in Dawn, Texas and selling corn chips with picante sauce at Fenway Park in Boston, Mass.

Both are thanks, in part, to the efforts of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Angela Lamb, who heads TDA's office in Amarillo, told the Hereford Lions Club on Wednesday about TDA's programs that help push products from the field to processing and sell processed goods all over.

"When I joined TDA in 1982 our main job was to put posters in grocery stores telling people to 'Eat More Beef' or 'Eat More Flour,'" Lamb said. There is still in-store and point-of-purchase selling, but TDA has varied its program to meet the needs of producers and processors.

"We are very involved in economic development," Lamb said. She outlined how Harold Dillehay came to TDA with the idea for Panhandle Milling, a flour mill north of Dawn that opened in 1987.

"We did a marketing survey, asking every flour buyer within 150 miles if they would use the flour if it were available," Lamb said. "Most of said they would because their transportation charges would be cheaper if they bought it from Harold."

TDA also did profitability and feasibility studies for Panhandle Milling, and uncovered financing sources.

"These services are free," Lamb said. "And they're confidential. We don't share the information with anyone else."

Lamb said TDA has also worked with Azteca Milling, which is considering Hereford as a site for a corn mill that could be a huge boost to the economy.

"We provided them with some marketing information and showed them our corn growing areas," Lamb said. "They wanted somewhere that had a steady supply of corn that wouldn't be as subject to a bad year because of drought. With our water supply for irrigation, they don't have to worry about that. They'll have a steady flow of product."

Lamb detailed other programs, including the Country Crafted program that supplies sources of Texas handmade goods to buyers for major companies, and the Taste of Texas program.

Taste of Texas is used for foods grown and processed in Texas. TDA representatives travel across the country to major events to promote Texas-made products.

"Because of a booth we had in Boston they are now serving picante sauce and chips at Fenway Park in Boston," Lamb said. "We have beef and wine and other products from Hereford and things from all over the state at the booths, and you'd be amazed at what we do, what we're able to sell to people because of our Taste of Texas program. It's a very important project."

## CSF still accepting applications

Today begins the final week of applications for assistance from the Christmas Stocking Fund. Deadline for applications, except in the case of emergencies, is Friday, December 9.

Already, nearly 300 families and individuals have applied for help from CSF and the total is expected to go higher in the week ahead.

Applications must be made in person at the county Red Cross office, 224 South Main. Each applicant must provide proof of Deaf Smith County residence. Acceptable forms of documentation include bills, driver's license or rent receipts that show the address of the applicant, from a source other than the individual.

Merely filling out a form does not guarantee that an applicant will receive assistance from CSF. Because of the large number of applications and the limited funds available to CSF, not everyone who applies can be helped, says a CSF spokesman.



Members of the volunteer committee that administers CSF will begin screening applications next week. A CSF spokesman says a thorough job of screening is done to insure that the most needy receive assistance, and also to avoid duplication of assistance to some families, while others might be excluded.

The fundraising drive that finances all CSF operations is currently underway in Hereford and Deaf Smith County. Donations to CSF may be left at the official collection point, The Hereford Brand, 313 Lee, or mailed to CSF care of The Brand, Box 673, Hereford. Individuals wishing to remain anonymous should so designate their contributions at the time they are made.

Members of the CSF committee are hopeful a new fundraising record can be set for the project this year. The 1987 CSF effort set a new all-time record of \$13,600. A successful drive this holiday season could hopefully push the project past the \$14,000 barrier.

## Soviet plane hijacked to Israel

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — A Soviet airliner was hijacked in the Soviet Union today, and the hijackers demanded to be allowed to land in Israel, officials said.

The plane was on the ground at an undisclosed location in the Soviet Union, said Menahem Eyal, spokesman for Ben Gurion International Airport near Tel Aviv.

Aviation officials in Nicosia, Cyprus, said Aeroflot officials told them the plane was at an airport near Moscow. The aviation officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Aeroflot did not give them any other information.

The Civil Aviation Ministry in Moscow refused to comment on the hijack and referred calls to the

Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Calls to the ministry did not go through.

Israel radio said many children were among the passengers. It said authorities did not know if the hijackers were Soviet Jews.

The hijacking occurred the day after Soviet officials informed 45 Jewish refuseniks who have been denied visas on grounds of state secrecy that barriers to their leaving the country were being dropped.

The notification did not amount to permission to emigrate but was a signal that officials probably will let many of them leave in the near future.

Initial reports said the plane took off and was en route to Israel via Turkey and Cyprus and that officials

in all three countries had been alerted by Soviet authorities.

But Eyal and Israel radio's monitor, Mickey Gurdus, said the plane was still on the ground.

It was not clear whether the hijackers still had control over the plane, said Eyal, adding that Ben Gurion was on a low-grade alert.

"The plane as far as we know is on the ground somewhere in Russia. The latest information from Russia is it has not taken off," Eyal said in a telephone interview.

"We don't know who the hijackers are, whether they are in control of the plane or whether the Russians will let them take off," Eyal added.

Eyal said the information came from Soviet civil aviation authorities

who contacted officials at Ben Gurion.

Israeli Foreign Ministry officials said they found out about the incident through media reports.

The last reported hijacking in the Soviet Union occurred in March, when members of a family musical group from Irkutsk in Siberia hid guns and explosives inside their instruments and seized an Aeroflot jet en route to Leningrad.

The plane landed near Leningrad after the pilot said he was running low on fuel. An army assault team stormed the plane, and the hijackers opened fire and set off a bomb.

Five of the hijackers died. Three passengers and a flight attendant also were killed.

## Babbling Brooks

In the next few weeks (at least we hope it's in the next few weeks) you'll be seeing some subtle changes in the Hereford Brand as we enter the new-fangled computer age.

The newspaper industry has been through a lot of changes in the past few years, and this is the latest move.

10 years ago, it would have been ordinary to see or hear a Linotype or similar machine at work in a newspaper building. The Linotype machine was a single step up from what Gutenberg invented seven centuries ago: movable type on a printing press.

The Linotype machine took the process a step further, using molten lead, millions of mechanical parts and one heckuva lot of clacking to set type one line at a time.

What we're using now is "cold type." It's an early version of the computer age. Call it the old-fangled version, a version that was a tremendous change in the way type was set.

That's cold type as opposed to the hot type of molten lead. No longer are printer's devils being "initiated" like they were in the old days, when they were told to pick up a lead ingot

by a Linotype operator trying to keep a straight face.

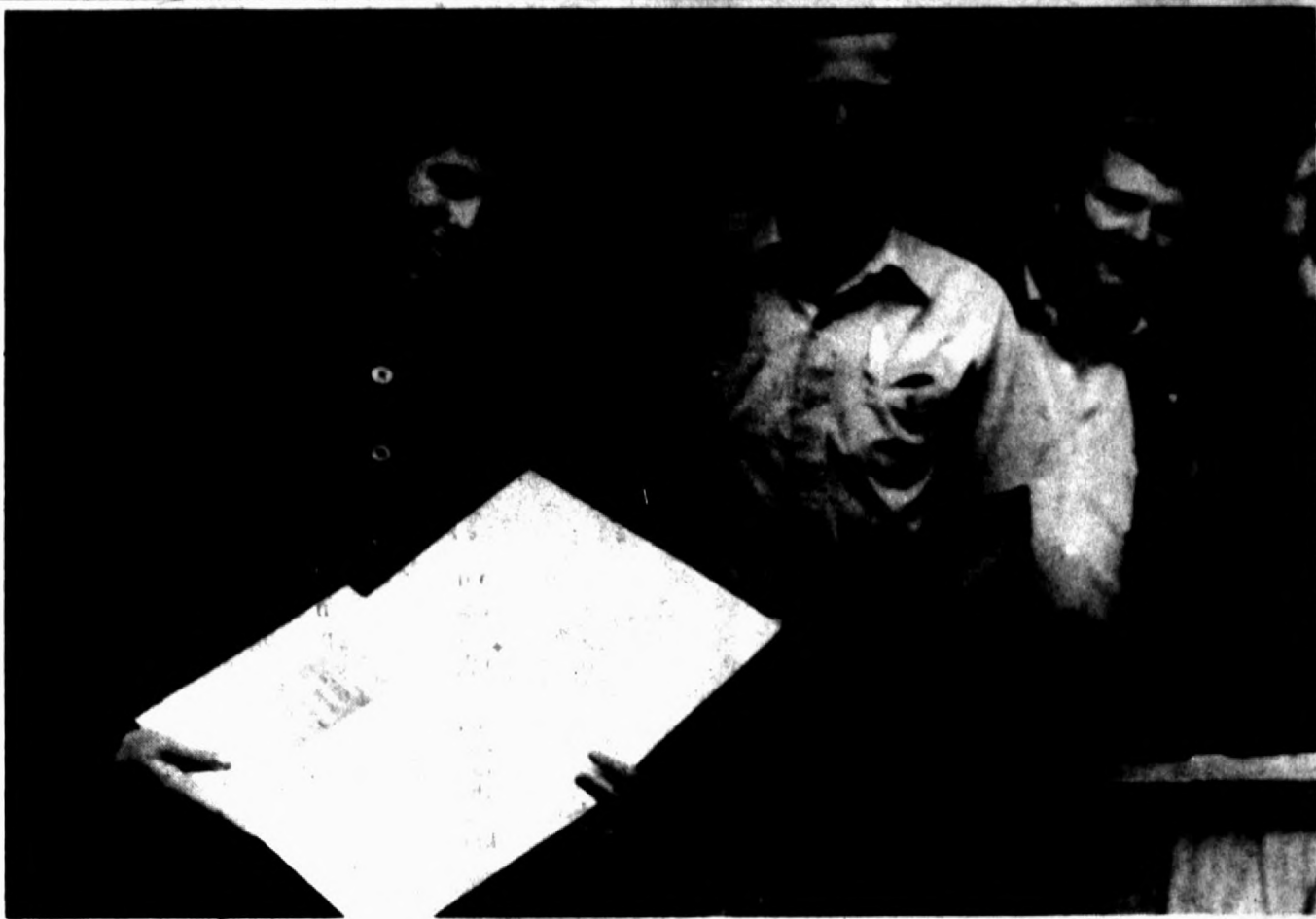
Usually, the ingot had cooled just enough to have the color of cold lead. It was still hot enough to leave a fairly permanent brand on the hand of some unsuspecting boy.

We use diskettes and other things associated with computers, but we also use special paper and chemicals and all kinds of stuff that are getting more and more expensive all the time. You could buy two cars a year with what we're spending for this stuff. You could buy my car twice with what we spend each month on paper and chemicals.

So, to heck with that. We're going to buy some not-too-fancy computers that will save us some money, eventually, and at the same time bring you a better product.

Course, the better product may not be readily apparent. There'll be a learning process as we learn what the computer can do easily and what the computer won't do at all. And the times we learn the computers can do it if we'll just give it the proper commands.

It could be interesting. Our main goal is to make things better for us and for you.

## FBI drug sting began in Buffalo

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — The FBI says a sting operation that began in a small suburban Buffalo storefront knocked out a massive American and Sicilian Mafia drug operation that was selling millions of dollars worth of heroin in the United States and cocaine in Italy.

Although the international food trading company set up by agents three years ago never handled any drug shipments, it allowed the FBI to establish contacts with organized crime operations in the United States and Italy. G. Robert Langford, special agent in charge of the FBI's Buffalo office, said Thursday.

As a result of the investigation, which broadened to include FBI offices nationwide, the FBI and Italian authorities have charged more than 200 people in a multimillion-dollar heroin importation and cocaine distribution operation involving Sicilian Mafia figures and the Gambino crime family in New York.

A total of 68 people were charged in the United States and 133 in Italy as a result of a three-year FBI undercover operation in which agents traveled to Italy and posed as buyers who discussed making major drug purchases, the FBI said.

Substantial amounts of imported heroin were sold to the Gambino Mafia family in New York, which allegedly arranged for nationwide distribution, according to a complaint filed in the case in Philadelphia. Some of the heroin was passed to buyers in U.S. pizza parlors. Other drugs were concealed in wine shipments.

One of those arrested in the police roundup was Giuseppe Gambino, a nephew of Carlo Gambino, the late reputed head of the Gambino crime family.

A complaint filed in Manhattan against 28 people alleged that the organization "obtained cocaine in the U.S., transported the cocaine over to Italy, exchanged the cocaine for heroin, so the cocaine was sold in Italy, and the heroin was sold in the U.S.," U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani said.

"They found the best market for their product," the U.S. attorney added.

"This is the largest example so far of the Mafia's involvement in cocaine, which is something that was unheard of a few years ago," Giuliani said.

"They were selling kilos of heroin for approximately \$200,000 a kilo; they were trading in multi-kilo quantities," said James Fox, assistant director of the FBI's New York office. "There were millions and millions of dollars."

What had started as an independent FBI probe of drug trafficking in Philadelphia, code-named "Iron Tower," was coordinated with the Buffalo probe when some names of suspected traffickers turned up in both, said the FBI.

# Reagan: keeping documents not ploy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration's refusal to turn over classified documents for the Iran-Contra trial of Oliver North jeopardizes the prosecution's central charges against the former national security aide.

President Reagan insists that the documents are being withheld for national security reasons, and says the decision is not a ploy to prevent North from going to trial.

"The things we're blocking are the things that duty requires we block," Reagan said Thursday. "These are things that are national security secrets."

Asked if the move were a backdoor maneuver to keep the case against North from going to trial, he replied: "No, this is something that from the very beginning we knew we would have to do."

Reagan was questioned at the

beginning of a meeting on forthcoming trade talks. Although he defended the decision to withhold documents from the trial, he backed away from his previous insistence that North and his former boss, John M. Poindexter, are innocent.

On June 27, Reagan had said: "I believe in the innocence of the two men and I would like to see that

established once and for all."

On Thursday, Reagan said, "At this stage I don't think I should comment on guilt or innocence or anything of this kind. I think the law has got to take its course."

Still, the decision to withhold classified documents could enable North's lawyers to claim that he is being prevented from presenting a

full defense to the key allegation against him — that he conspired illegally to divert more than \$14 million in profits from the Reagan administration's secret Iranian weapons deals to the Nicaraguan Contra rebels.

North's lawyers claim that they need some 40,000 pages of secret documents to defend him. Independent counsel Lawrence Walsh, the special prosecutor assigned to the case, has indicated he can proceed without use of the classified information.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said heads of government agencies concerned with national security decided in July not to release some material sought for the trial. He said Walsh indicated at the time that he could prosecute North on the basis of unclassified material.

North's lawyers, however, are in-

sisting on use of the classified material.

The secret materials bear most heavily on two charges relating to the diversion — conspiracy and theft of government property. However, North also could be tried on charges he made false statements to Congress and conspired to use a tax-exempt foundation for a non-exempt purpose — raising money for the Contras.

In a court filing made public late Thursday, Walsh disclosed some of the types of information that the Reagan administration is preventing him from using. It includes the names of several South American countries, and the names of officials from those nations, involved in aiding the Contras.

Walsh's document also indicates that the administration is trying to suppress the names of nations from which it tried to solicit secret contributions for the Contras.

## Arabs want Geneva meeting

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Arab diplomats said they will introduce a resolution today to move the General Assembly to Geneva so PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat, barred from entering the United States, can address the body.

On Thursday night, the United States refused the assembly's request to grant Arafat a visa. Arafat planned to speak to the assembly about the Palestinian situation.

"This reply from the United States

is negative and will be contained in a report by the secretary-general to come out tomorrow morning," U.N. spokesman Francois Giuliani said Thursday night.

A diplomatic source who saw the United States' response said it was "extremely negative."

It came in reaction to a General Assembly resolution that urged the United States to reverse itself on Arafat and gave it 24 hours to reply. The resolution passed 151-2 Wednesday,

with the United States and Israel opposed.

The State Department said Saturday it denied Arafat a visa because he encourages and condones terrorism by the Palestine Liberation Organization. Washington has said it does not object to the assembly shifting to Geneva and would participate in debate there.

An assembly vote on the move would likely come early next week. Arab diplomats and U.N. officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said passage was assured.

A rally originally planned to welcome Arafat on Thursday turned into a protest outside the United Nations, with about 400 people, including Palestinians and a few dozen anti-Zionist Orthodox Jews, denouncing the visa denial.

Waving PLO flags and pictures of Arafat, the demonstrators chanted "Long Live the PLO!" Most of the Palestinians wore red or black checked head scarves, a PLO symbol.

Holding anti-Zionist banners were ultra-Orthodox Jews in long black coats and wide brimmed hats, with traditional sideburn curls and beards. They oppose the concept of a Jewish homeland.

The Orthodox Jews Against Zionism believe God has forbidden the Jewish people to have their own state.

Arab diplomats said they would move quickly to shift the General Assembly to Geneva in mid-December. U.N. and Arab sources said the Geneva session would be held the week of Dec. 12-16.

The diplomats and U.N. officials said a General Assembly vote on the Geneva move could come Monday.

Arafat has said he wants to explain the new position taken by the PLO's Palestine National Council in its recent meeting in Algiers. The council, the PLO's parliament-in-exile, implicitly recognized Israel's right to exist, accepting key U.N. resolutions on the Middle East calling for negotiations with states in the region.

## New lawmakers arriving early

AUSTIN (AP) — A total of 31 new House and Senate members will be sworn in when the new Legislature gathers in January, but a three-day introduction session for new members this week has brought most of them to the Capitol early.

The orientation session, which ends today, is a baptism into the complexities of state budgets and bureaucracies as well as some words of wisdom from senior lawmakers.

"Keep your ears open and your mouths shut," advised House Speaker Gib Lewis, D-Fort Worth. Asked later when the freshmen could reverse that, Lewis said, "About midway through the session. Gradually."

Twenty-six House members and five senators, two of whom are moving up from the House, will be taking their seats on Jan. 10, the opening day of the new session.

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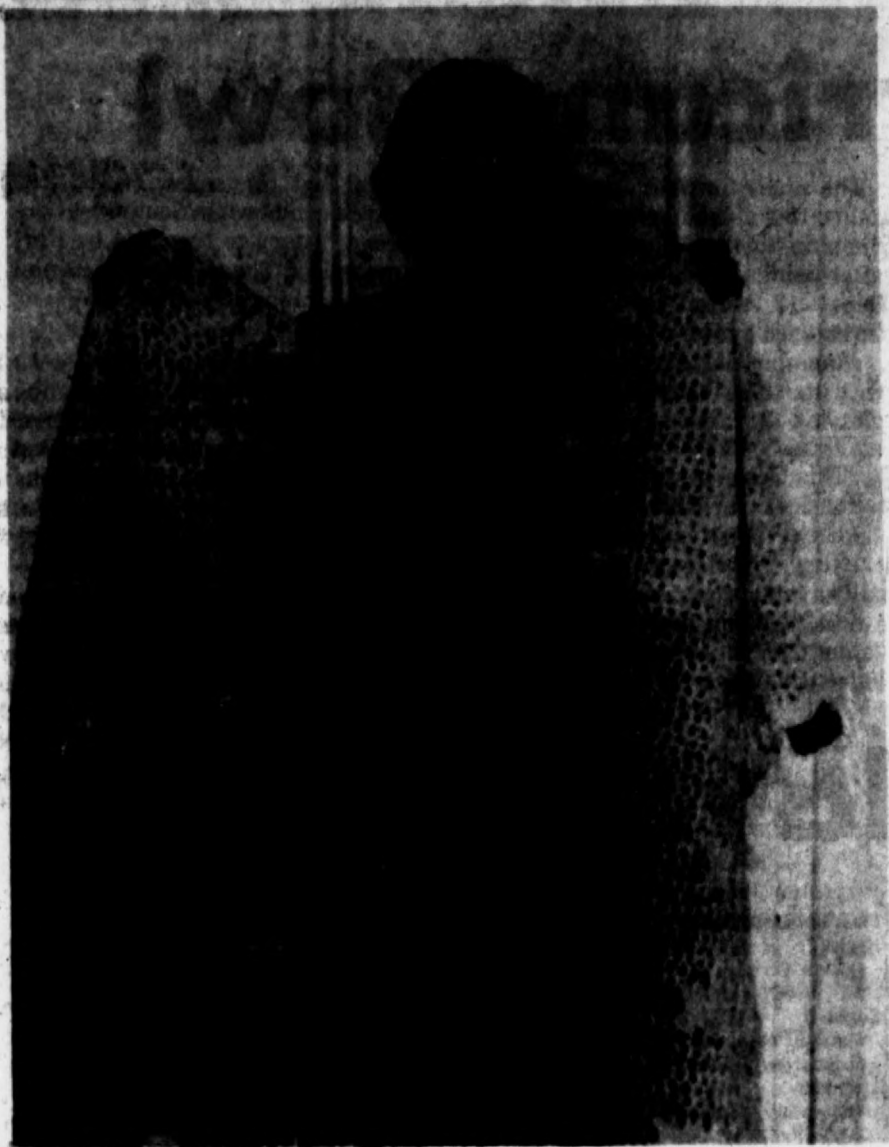

## Hints from Heloise

**PANCAKE FREEZING**  
 Dear Heloise: Don't throw away your leftover pancake batter. Go ahead and cook the pancakes (not too thin and not too brown). Cool them completely in a single layer on a cookie sheet. Then wrap in groups of three using waxed paper in between. Store in a recloseable freezer bag and freeze.  
 Remove as needed and heat in microwave oven (about 1 1/2 minutes for a stack of three pancakes spread out). You can also heat them in your toaster, but a microwave is better. Also works with waffle batter. — Mrs. James Checkett, St. Louis, Mo.  
**MICROWAVE SAUTEING**

Dear Heloise: I discovered that if I put cut-up onion and green pepper, sprinkled with a bit of water, in the microwave oven, they will soften quickly.

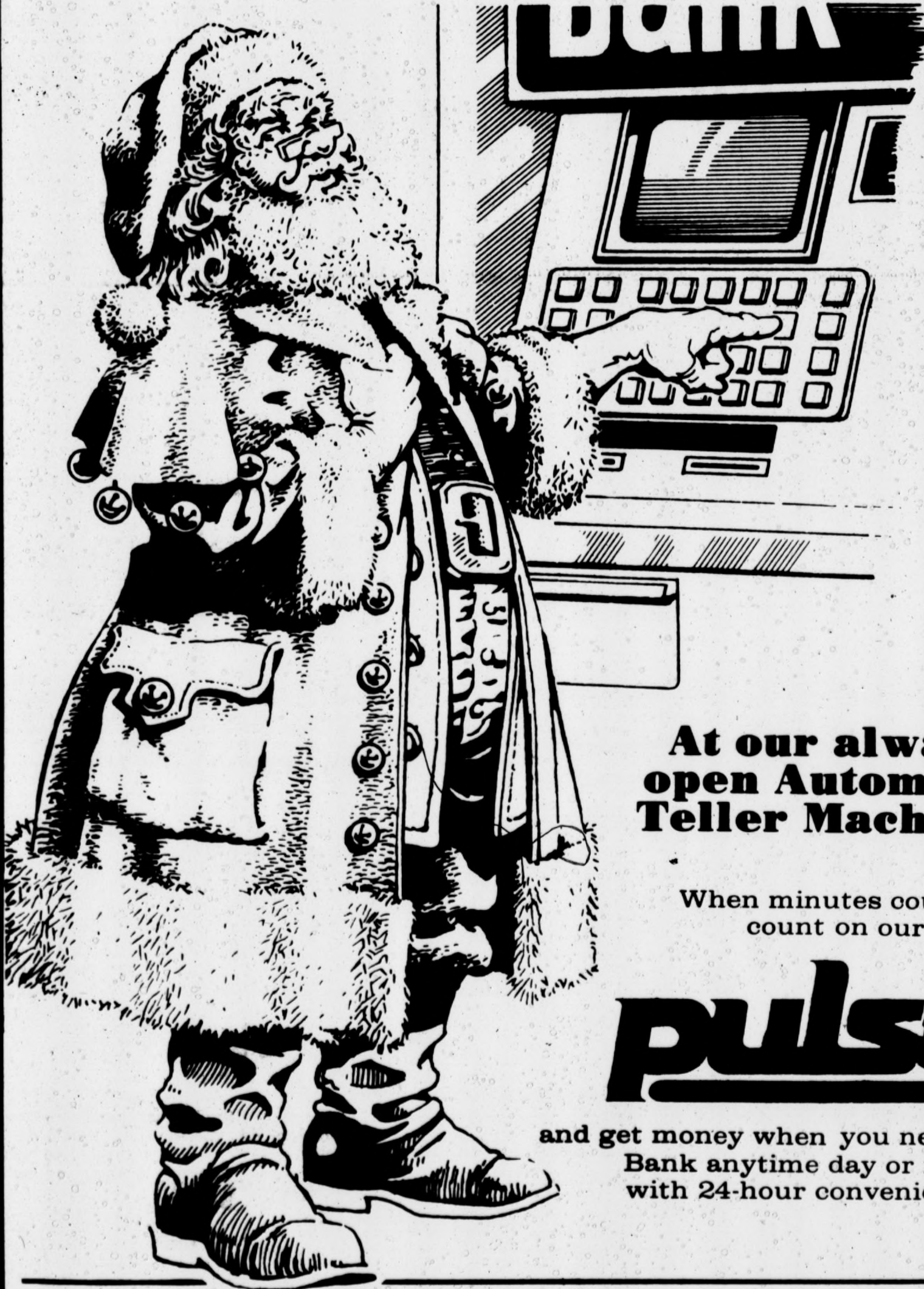

## Tide blows out Aggies in Hurricane Bowl

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — "See you in September, maybe," said Texas A&M's Jackie Sherrill as Alabama's Bill Curry celebrated a 30-10 "Hurricane Bowl" victory and a "contract in concrete" through 1992.

Sherrill departed the locker room in a huff when he was peppered with questions about his future after Thursday night's loss to his alma mater.

Texas A&M president Dr. William H. Mobley is investigating charges against Sherrill that "hush" money was paid to former player George Smith during an NCAA probe that cost the Aggies a chance at a bowl

game. The NCAA said it won't act on this allegation until the A&M investigation of Sherrill is completed.

Sherrill fooled the rumor mongers again after the game. Several television stations reported he would resign. Sherrill didn't resign, and refused to shed any light on whether he will stay at Texas A&M.

"You guys want to talk about football, then talk football. I didn't even talk about all this with the team. That's not even a question."

Someone asked: "Will you be coaching at A&M next year?"

"I guess you don't want to talk about football, evidently you don't," Sherrill said. "Good luck and I'll see

you in September, I guess," and he left.

Later, he talked recruiting on his call-in radio show, saying to one caller, "The big thing we have to do is replace some of our defensive players, particularly in the defensive line."

Curry was like someone on death row who got a reprieve call from the governor. An Alabama alumni group was reported to have a \$2 million trust fund to buy out his contract.

The "governor," in this case, was Alabama interim president Roger Sayers, who announced nine hours before the game that Curry's contract "wasn't for sale" and would be

honored for the next three years.

The Crimson Tide, apparently relaxed with Curry's future secure, dominated the Aggies.

"With the way our program is being looked at, we made a step upward," Curry said. "You have to realize how close we are to having a great season."

The game itself was almost a sideshow to the rumors concerning the two coaches.

Alabama's David Smith threw two touchdown passes and Philip Doyle kicked three field goals for 20th-ranked Alabama, which will play Army in the Sun Bowl on Christmas Eve.

The Aggies, who finished 7-5, had called this makeup game their bowl, dubbing it the "Hurricane Bowl" after Alabama failed to show on Sept. 17 when the game was threatened by Hurricane Gilbert.

Alabama players had some fun with the idea of this being a bowl game.

"This was a really big win," tailback Murry Hill said with tongue in cheek. "We won the first, the only existing Hurricane Bowl. That's quite a feat."

A&M running back Darren Lewis gained 128 yards on 34 carries, his 10th straight game over 100 yards.

He finished the season with 1,692 yards, second-best in Southwest Conference history to the 1,744 by Earl Campbell of Texas in his Heisman Trophy-winning season of 1977.

Alabama's Derrick Thomas, the Butkus Award winner as the best linebacker in the nation, crippled A&M's passing game with four sacks and a fumble recovery.

"All the hype about the game was great," Thomas said. "I think it really fired us up."

Doyle's three field goals gave him 19 for the season, two more than Van Tiffen's school mark in 1985.

## Lamar-Permian highlights playoff slate

The spotlight will be on Odessa Permian running back Chris Comer and Arlington Lamar quarterback J.J. Joe in a Class 5A schoolboy football game Saturday in Odessa.

Comer will be after his third straight 200-yard game for Permian, 11-2, which has won its three playoff games this season by a combined score of 120-27.

Joe, one of the state's top passers, will give Permian the toughest aerial attack it has faced all season. Arlington Lamar, 11-2, has swept past its three playoff foes by a combined score of 108-0.

Each offense has gained more than 5,000 yards this season, and each defense has allowed slightly over 2,000.

Willowridge, ranked No. 1 in 5A in the Associated Press schoolboy poll at the end of regular season play, will try to run its record to 13-0 Saturday night in the Astrodome against Houston Stratford (11-1), whose only loss came to Willowridge in the season-opener.

Corpus Christi Carroll, which boasts one of Texas' top running backs in Tiandre Sanders, hopes to go 14-0 in its game at 2 p.m. Saturday in Corpus Christi against Converse Judson (12-1). Carroll's only loss in two seasons under coach Jim Slaughter was to Willowridge in bidistrict last year.

In Judson, Carroll will face one of the top offenses in South Texas this season. Judson shuttles quarterbacks and running backs every series.

Kerrville Tivy, the state's only remaining undefeated team in Class 4A, puts its 12-0 record on the line against Uvalde (12-1) at 8 p.m. Friday at Memorial Stadium in Austin.

West Orange-Stark (10-2), last year's 4A champ, plays at 3:30 p.m. Saturday in the Astrodome against Tomball (10-1-1).

## Carter still in playoffs

AUSTIN (AP) — Time was running out today in efforts to keep Dallas Carter High School from continuing in the quarterfinal round of the Texas schoolboy football playoffs as a hearing over allegations about grade-changing continued in state court.

State District Judge Paul Davis Thursday told Dallas Independent School District attorneys that they were free to send Carter coaches home to prepare for Saturday's game against Marshall High School in Waco and then have them return to the Travis County Courthouse Monday to testify in the case.

"It means they play Saturday," Leonard Schwartz, one of four DISD attorneys who participated in the proceeding, said.

The judge made the decision after hearing testimony Thursday from only three of more than a dozen witnesses scheduled to testify in the hearing.

Dallas Carter running back Gary Edwards had failed a class and played in some of the school's regular season games in violation of the state's "no-pass, no-play rule," Texas Education Agency Commissioner William Kirby told the judge in testimony Thursday.

Kirby's comments capped the first day of testimony in the case pitting Dallas Carter against the TEA and the University Interscholastic League.

Kirby ousted Dallas Carter from the playoffs after investigators found that Edwards had failed an algebra class, but continued playing football.

But the football team, with Edwards, has advanced two rounds in the Class 5A playoffs since receiving a temporary court order that blocked Kirby's action.

Judge Davis said the temporary order will remain in effect during the duration of the hearing. He said the hearing will probably end Monday.

"We're in for a long siege, I'm afraid," Davis said.

Investigators had determined that Edwards earned a 68 in algebra, and that his initial passing grade was in error, Kirby said.

"An error was made in the calculation of the grade," said Kirby.

Dallas Independent School District superintendent Marvin Edwards disputed this charge.

Edwards, who is not related to the football player, said he initially believed Edwards had failed, but a closer review of the grades showed the student passed with a 72.

"I saw grade reports different than what (the investigators saw)," said Edwards.

Asked if he had been pressured to change his mind about the grade, Edwards said, "Absolutely not."

The student's attorney, Royce West, asked Edwards, "No one changed a grade for Gary Edwards?"

"That's correct," the superintendent replied.

DISD lawyers contend that Kirby did not have the authority to knock Dallas Carter out of the playoffs. They also argued Kirby failed to follow rules for administrative procedures when he conducted a hearing on the issue.

The no-pass, no-play rule requires a student must maintain a grade average of 70 in all classes in order to be eligible for sports and other extracurricular activities.

Carter has defeated Plano East, Dallas Samuell and Lufkin to move into the quarterfinals of the schoolboy football playoffs. They are now two victories away from the championship game.

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# TAC takes big stand on drugs

PHOENIX (AP) — Track and field athletes have taken their strongest stand for an out-of-competition drug testing program.

At The Athletics Congress convention late Thursday night, the Athletics Advisory Council adopted a resolution supporting such a program.

It is designed according to guidelines proposed by the U.S. Olympic Committee and as required by the International Amateur Athletic Federation, the world governing body for the sport. The IAAF passed an out-of-competition testing rule last year.

However, the IAAF has yet to fully implement the rule throughout the world. Instead, it has asked each federation for ideas on individual implementation. So far, only the Scandinavian countries, led by Sweden, have adopted out-of-competition testing.

The IAAF rule provides that an athlete who is requested to submit to doping control by a responsible official must do so whether such a request is made during or outside of competition. Failure to comply constitutes a breach of IAAF rules and the athlete will be treated as if he or she had tested positively for drugs.

The athletes said those who would be tested would include the top 25 U.S. performers in each event beginning with the 1988 annual performance results and those who subsequently enter the list under updated lists provided each month by TAC, and athletes who receive financial assistance through any amateur sports organization.

Under the resolution, athletes would be given 24 to 48 hours notice before testing would be conducted.

Testing would be for steroids, masking agents, diuretics, stimulants not including cold medicines, and other training- and performance-enhancing compounds.

The athletes' committee said it

supported the creation of an independent body which would be the exclusive custodian of test results.

The committee also said that a voluntary out-of-competition program would be instituted immediately to cover the period between the consideration of the proposal on Saturday by the General Session of TAC and by TAC's board of directors at its next meeting in March.

"This is a fantastic start to give credibility to our sport and to our athletes — to say to the rest of the world, that we in the U.S., and particularly our athletes, are concerned with what we want to do," Cassell, TAC's executive director, said.

There had previously been some concern about the legality of such a rule, but Peter Alkalay, TAC's legal counsel, assured the athletes there should be no problems.

"This is a fantastic start ... terrific," he said. "I think it could be supported legally."

One of the athletes who helped draft the resolution was Edwin Moses, two-time Olympic gold medalist in the men's 400-meter intermediate hurdles. Earlier Thursday, Moses said that the drug issue wouldn't be cleaned up until random, out-of-season testing was implemented.

In addition, Moses had said that the testing in track and field — and in all other Olympic sports in the United States — should be done by an independent agency, rather than the national governing bodies.

He said that if out-of-season testing was approved, that it must be random, not strictly voluntary.

"It would not be effective otherwise," he said. "It would be a waste of money."

Currently, drug testing among track and field athletes in the United States is conducted only during national championship meets and at selected events.

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# Hornets buzz past Sixers

Would you take a charge from 6-foot-4, 253-pound Charles Barkley? Rex Chapman and Tim Kempton would, at least with the game on the line. They did Thursday night and Barkley drew a charging foul at the buzzer, preserving Charlotte's 100-107 victory. The win gave the expansion Hornets, 4-10, a two-game winning streak — they beat Miami, the other new team, on Tuesday night.

Kelly Tripucka hit a layup with four seconds left, giving the Hornets a two-point lead. Then Barkley stormed down the lane, ran into the pair of Hornets and was whistled for the foul.

"You don't call a charge on that!" Barkley said. "You don't call

anything!"

Tripucka disagreed. "He made a great basket, but he knocked down three or four guys to do it," said Tripucka, who finished with 25 points. "If it were first-and-10 on the goal line, it would have been no penalty."

Ed Badger, Charlotte's assistant coach, had offered \$10 to any player who would take a charge from Barkley. But money wasn't on Chapman's mind when he made the play.

Ron Anderson scored 30 points for Philadelphia and Mike Gminski added 23.

Elsewhere, it was Atlanta 127, Washington 115; Cleveland 99, Milwaukee 96; and Denver 133, Sacramento 126 in overtime.

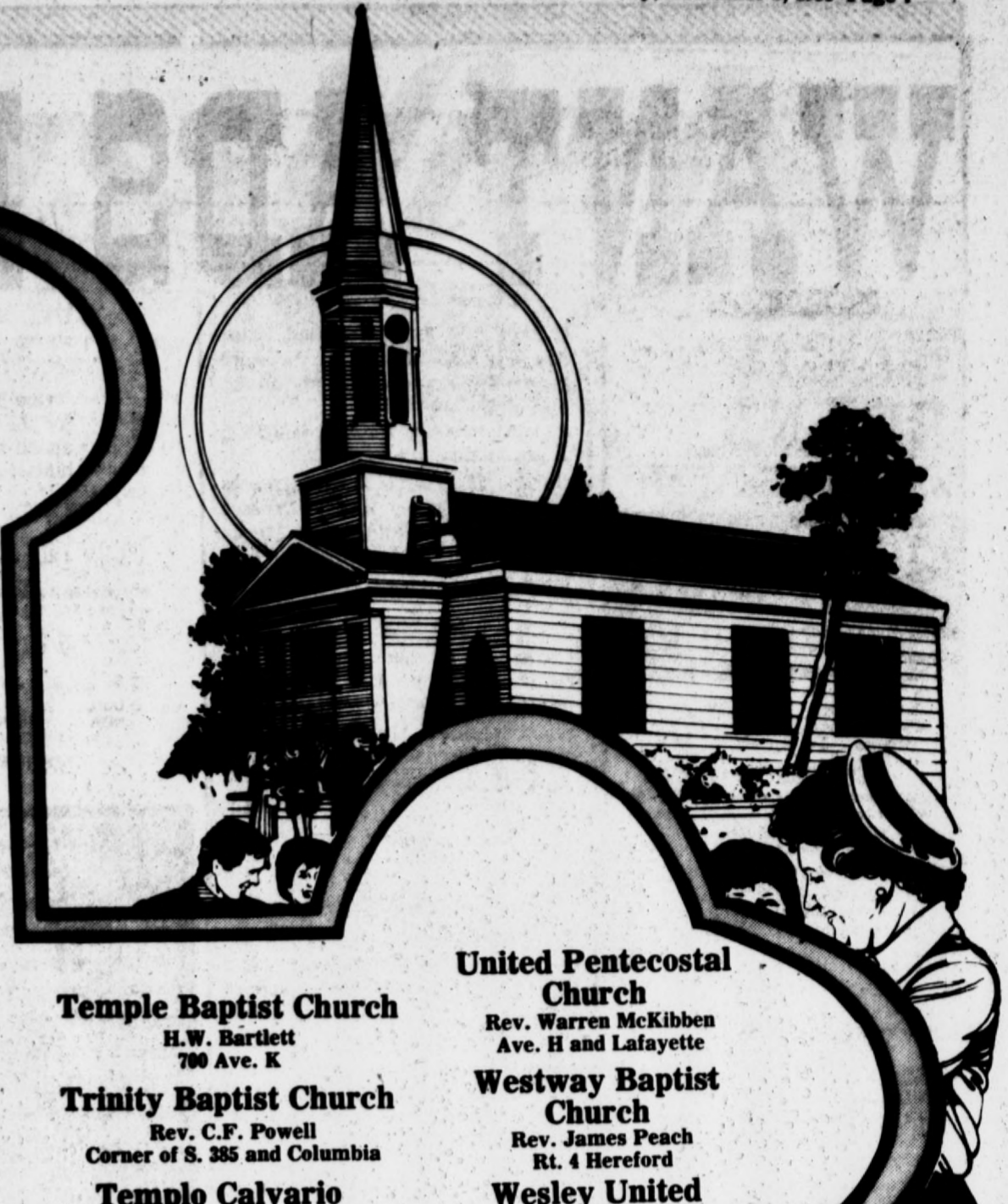

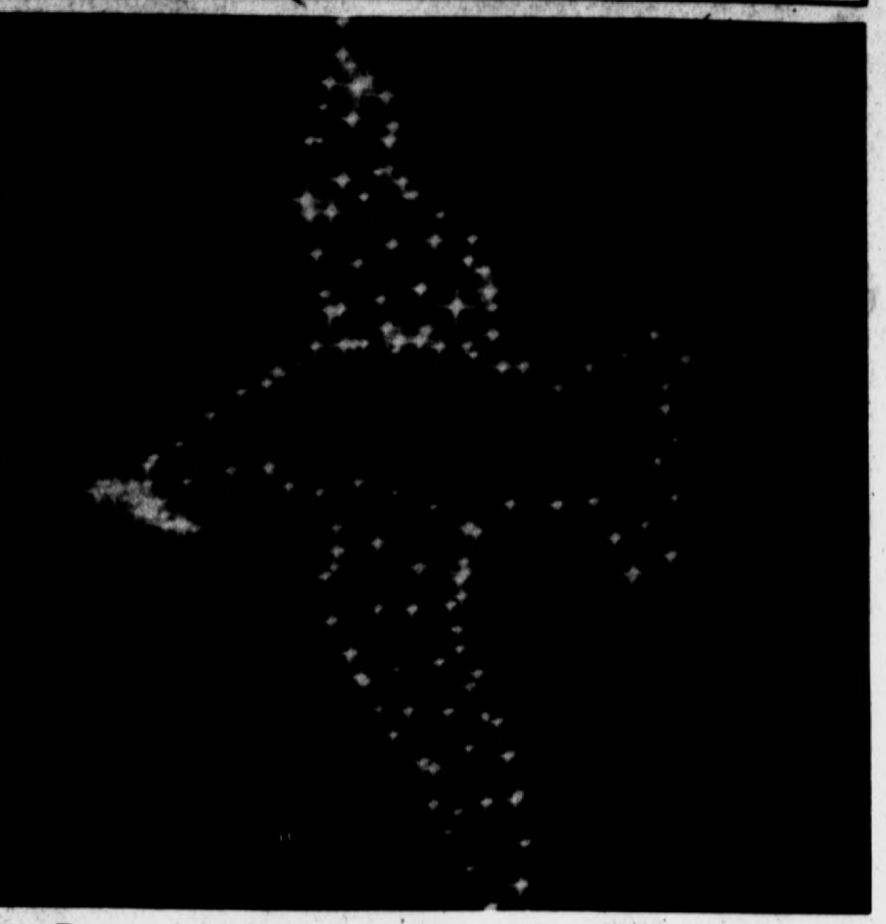

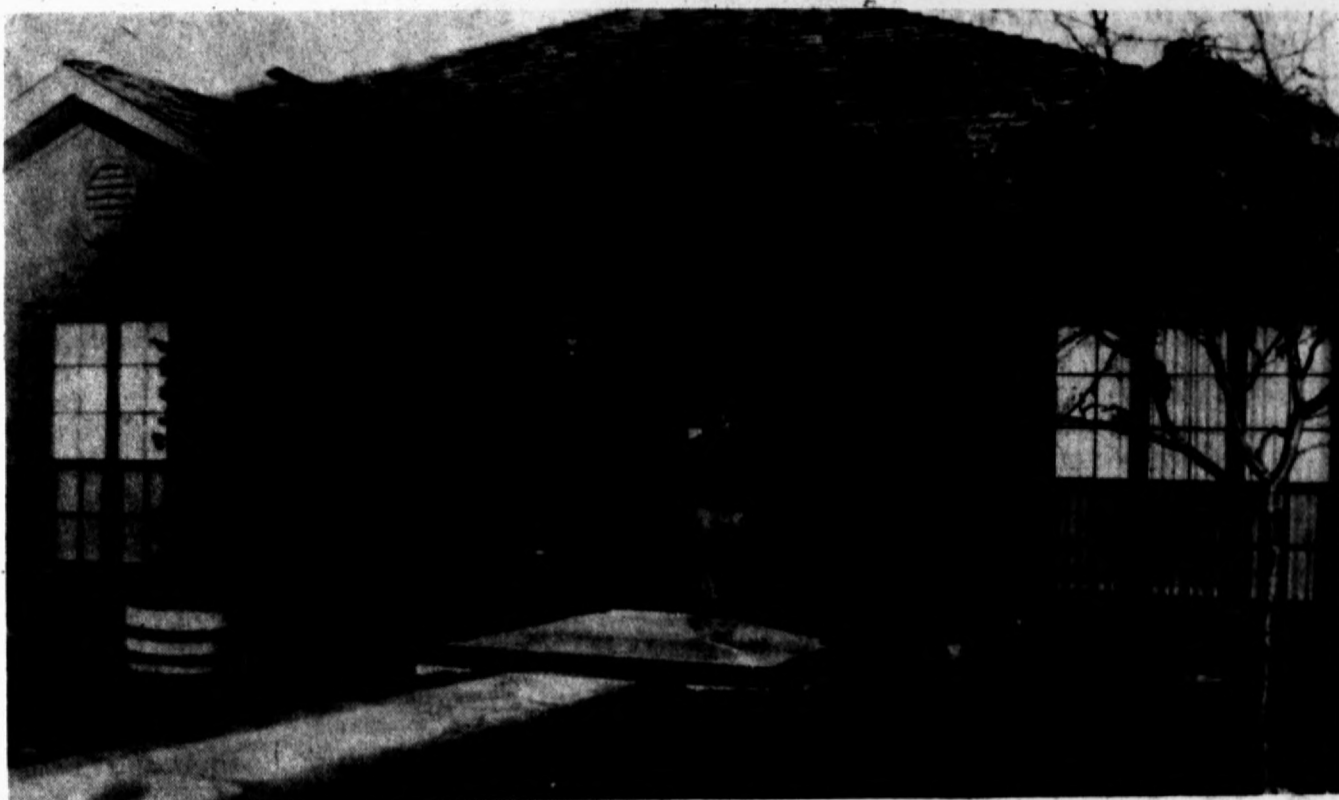
This program is one of a series presented in Sunday evening services leading up to Christmas Day.
