East Germans may investigate Honecker

EAST BERLIN (AP) - East German leader Egon Krenz said in an interview published today that he favors abolishing the Communist Party's constitutional claim to total power, making yet another concession to the pro-democracy movement.

But while explicitly advocating the removal of the constitutional provision guaranteeing the party a monopoly on power - a key demand of demonstrators advocating reform - he made it clear he expects the party to remain a leading force.

On Thursday, the embattled party announced it had opened a probe against ousted leader Erich Honecker and expelled the former economy chief from the party, blaming them for the crisis gripping the country.

Krenz, a former Honecker disciple now trying to distance himself from his old mentor, also said in a television interview Thursday that he would step down if the party asked to leave during a party congress next month.

The party also revoked the membership of Honecker's former economic czar, who had been thrown out of the ruling Politburo in the purge last month that launched a wave of reform and opened up the Berlin Wall.

The moves reflected the party's desperate attempts to restore its sinking credibility and authority.

Meanwhile, pro-democracy demonstrations continued with about 10,000 protesters rallying in the city of Erfurt on Thursday night, said East Germany's ADN news agency.

The protesters demanded an end to the Communist Party's dominant role in the government and the legalization of pro-democracy opposition groups, ADN said.

In the interview published today by the Communist party daily Neues Deutschland, Krenz called for major constitutional changes to separate the party, state and economy.

Asked by the interviewer about the country's deep political crisis, Krenz mentioned the constitutional provision guaranteeing Communist authority and said, "We are in favor of abolishing it."

"How a party proceeds with the development of society is not put forth through laws or declarations but can only result from work, performance and its attitude," he told the newspaper.

But when asked about demands by pro-democracy demonstrators for

curbing party "interference" in all aspects of life, Krenz replied: "One has to say very clearly that we will interfere with all our energy. Not least because we represent a considerable part of the population, particularly the working class."

He added, "We are not a corrupt party."

Krenz said hard-line policies of the past decades caused "many basic mistakes, ultimately the crisis of our society."

The disciplinary investigation, against the ailing Honecker, former economy czar Guenter Mittag and two other former officials was based on "grave abuses" of the party statute and "responsibility for the current situation in the party and the country," ADN said without elaborating Thursday.

ADN also said that Mittag was expelled from the party.

The party's probe of Honecker and other former senior officials could result in various sanctions ranging from an official rebuke to expulsion from the party.

Krenz replaced Honecker on Oct. 18. Honecker led the country for 18

years, staunchly resisting the kind of reforms launched by Gorbachev nearly five years ago.

Since taking over, Krenz has embraced a whirlwind program of reforms and concessions to opposition demands, including the long-denied freedom to travel, the promise of free elections, and sweeping changes in the economy.

But the dramatic changes have failed to shore up the party's standing and Krenz's own credibility among the citizenry, which has staged massive demonstrations to press demands for more democracy.

Krenz, 52, long viewed as a hard-liner, said in an interview with West Germany's ARD television network that he had been "inspired by the new thinking of Gorbachev." He said 1985, when Gorbachev came to power, was "decisive" for him.

"This new thinking of Gorbachev led me to rethink many things," Krenz said in the 45-minute interview.

Krenz also said that Honecker was too ill to make any public statements, adding that he had talked several times to Honecker by telephone and that the former leader "accepts that he is largely responsible for this situation."

Czechs continue call for new leaders

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) - Communist Party leaders met in emergency session today to consider major leadership changes in response to the burgeoning pro-democracy movement. There were strong signs of a power struggle.

In a major break with the national leadership, the influential Communist Party in the city of Prague called for more democracy and changes in the ruling Politburo as "the only way out of the present situation."

Today's Central Committee meeting came one day after the biggest rallies in the nation's history. Hundreds of thousands of protesters marched nationwide demanding democratic reforms.

Party general secretary Milos Jakes, who has resisted reforms demanded by increasingly restive citizenry, was the first official to speak at today's meeting, the official news agency CTK said without giving further details.

The demonstrators seek the resignation of Jakes, President Gustav Husak and other leaders associated

with the hard-line policies pursued since Warsaw Pact tanks snuffed out Communist reforms in 1968.

Premier Ladislav Adamec, seen as a moderate member of the 13-man party Politburo, broke with years of policy this week by receiving a delegation that included prominent dissidents leading the demands for reform.

Jakes has paid lip service to reform and adopted some cautious economic changes since replacing Husak as party leader in December 1987.

But he and other hard-line members of his Politburo have refused to join in the kind of political reform launched by Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev that has produced radical changes in Poland, Hungary and East Germany.

The strongest hint of an impending leadership shuffle came Thursday from Prague Communist Party Chief Miroslav Stepan, a member of the ruling Politburo.

Stepan said today's Central Committee session would "deal with personnel issues" that might affect

officials in "the highest positions," the state news agency CTK reported.

The Prague party leadership reiterated Stepan's words in a separate statement published early today that called for "fundamental cadre changes" in the Politburo.

The statement talked of the need to restore confidence in the party's policy by allowing much more democracy within Communist ranks.

It also called for genuine dialogue, which it termed "a fundamental norm of political life in the process of democratization."

Today's meeting came one day after hundreds of thousands of people crowded into Prague's Wenceslas Square and urged party hard-liners to relinquish power. The rally Thursday drew at least 300,000 people, the biggest ever in Czechoslovakia.

The masses shouted "Shame" and "Resign."

"We will never return to the old system of totalitarian rule," playwright Vaclav Havel, the country's best known dissident, told the crowd.

"We shall see whether our country will reach democracy in a political way or whether an isolated group of sadists will prevail, who want, at any cost, to hide their power and privileges by empty words about reform," he said.

At another rally that drew tens of thousands of people in Bratislava, ousted leader Alexander Dubcek, whose own attempts at reform were crushed 20 years ago, endorsed the demands for change but warned of "tragic consequences" if protesters press too hard.


Dubcek, who headed the Communist "Prague Spring" reforms that were crushed by the Soviet-led invasion of 1968, made his first public speech Thursday since he was expelled from the party in the purge of reformers that put Jakes and the rest of the current leadership in power.

In addition to Prague and Bratislava, state media said thousands of people attended anti-government protests Thursday in the cities of Usci Nad Labem, Plzen, Hradec Kralove, Ostrava and Eanska Eystrica.

Firefighters make calls

Thanksgiving Day was interrupted for Hereford firefighters at 1:20 p.m. when they were called to a fire on South Main. Someone had apparently set on fire the decorative turkey (made of hay and wood) which was part of a Thanksgiving display in the yard of the First Methodist Church.

WASHINGTON - President Bush's meeting with British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher today comes one week before the U.S. summit with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, as western leaders seek a united response to the changes in Eastern Europe.

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia - Former leader Alexander Dubcek, whose own reforms were crushed 20 years ago, tells thousands of pro-democracy protesters to proceed with caution or risk "tragic consequences." The ruling Communist Party sets a crucial meeting today that could lead to the resignation of party hard-liners.

EAST BERLIN - The embattled East German Communist Party opens a probe to determine whether Erich Honecker, the man who led the country for 18 years, abused his power and caused the crisis gripping the nation. New leader Egon Krenz says he's ready to step down if that is the party's decision at a congress next month.

ACROSS THE USA - Those dreaming of a white Thanksgiving got their wish in the East and South, but the snow caused some treacherous traveling conditions and chilled holiday parade watchers as Americans paused to ponder their blessings.

CHICAGO - The U.S. Supreme Court still has a chance to clarify or extend its July abortion decision, despite the out-of-court settlement of an Illinois case, as the judges hear two other cases scheduled next week.

SPACE CENTER, Houston - The Discovery astronauts, apparently finished with the task of putting a satellite in orbit to spy on the Soviets, continued their secret military mission today and planned to return home Sunday with a night landing in the California desert.

BEIRUT, Lebanon - Parliament was expected to convene today to choose a successor to President Rene Mouawad, who was slain while forming a government he hoped could end Lebanon's civil war.

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador - President Alfredo Cristiani rejects a guerrilla truce proposal and says the leftist rebel movement's 11-day offensive was a failure. The rebels set off a series of small bombs in response.

State

CORPUS CHRISTI - The Coast Guard gave up hope of finding a woman and her two children alive in the Gulf of Mexico after their single engine plane crashed in turbulent weather. Her husband was able to swim to a nearby oil rig for help.

GALVESTON - Thirteen oil rig workers were injured in an explosion on an off-shore oil rig in the Gulf of Mexico, authorities said.

CROCKETT - A man who witnessed the crash of an Army helicopter pulled a victim from the wreckage moments before it burst into flames, officials said.

HOUSTON - Doctors are very optimistic about a new drug that has triggered remissions in mice injected with human colon cancer cells.

AUSTIN - Attorney General Jim Mattox says a federal audit critical of the state's child support program is outdated because of recent improvements not reflected in the report.

HOUSTON - Baseball strikeout king Nolan Ryan probably will not seek the Texas agriculture commissioner's office, sources told the Houston Chronicle.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 24, 1859, British naturalist Charles Darwin published "On the Origin of Species," a paper in which he explained his theory of evolution through the process of natural selection.

On this date:

In 1784, Zachary Taylor, the 12th president of the United States, was born in Orange County, Va.

In 1863, the Civil War battle for Lookout Mountain began in Tennessee. Union forces succeeded in taking the mountain two days later.

In 1864, French artist Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec was born in Albi.

In 1871, the National Rifle Association was incorporated, and its first president named: Maj. Gen. Ambrose E. Burnside.

In 1944, U.S. bombers based on Saipan attacked Tokyo in what was the first raid against the Japanese capital by land-based planes.

In 1947, a group of motion picture writers, producers and directors who came to be known as the "Hollywood Ten" were cited for contempt of Congress because of their refusal to answer questions about alleged Communist influence in the movie business.

In 1947, John Steinbeck's novel "The Pearl" was published.

In 1963, in a scene captured on live network television, Dallas nightclub owner Jack Ruby shot and mortally wounded Lee Harvey Oswald, the accused assassin of President Kennedy.

In 1969, Apollo 12 splashed down safely in the Pacific, ending the second manned mission to the moon.

In 1971, a hijacker identified as "Dan Cooper" parachuted from a Northwest Airlines 727 over Washington state with \$200,000 dollars in ransom. The skyjacker has never been heard from since.

In 1985, 58 people died when Egyptian forces stormed a hijacked Egyptian jetliner parked on the ground at Valletta, Malta.

In 1987, the United States and the Soviet Union agreed to scrap shorter- and medium-range missiles in the first superpower treaty to eliminate an entire class of nuclear weapons.

Ten years ago: President Carter conferred with his military advisers at Camp David, Md., as the Iran hostage crisis entered its fourth week.

Five years ago: A tragic mix-up came to light in Sioux City, Iowa, as 16-year-old Patricia Noonan, who was injured in a bus-car collision two weeks earlier, emerged from a coma: She had been mistakenly identified as her friend, 14-year-old Shawn Lake, who died in the accident and was buried under the wrong name.

One year ago: South Africa's justice minister announced that black leader Nelson Mandela wouldn't be returned to prison upon his recovery from tuberculosis, but would instead remain in custody in another location.

Today's Birthdays: Producer-writer Garson Kanin is 77. Actor Howard Duff is 72. Columnist William F. Buckley is 64. White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater is 47.

Cristiani rejects cease-fire, rebels respond with bombs

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) - President Alfredo Cristiani said the assault by leftist rebels was a failure and he rejected their conditions for peace.

His comments were punctuated by rebel bombs that exploded near his news conference.

The series of bombs exploded about five blocks from where Cristiani was speaking to reporters Thursday evening. Cristiani jumped, but kept talking, telling everyone "not to worry." No injuries were reported.

Cristiani termed "nonsense" the guerrillas' call for political negotiations leading to a cease-fire. The rightist government is demanding a truce first, then talks.

"Without a cease-fire the guerrillas will use the peace process for propaganda," said Cristiani.

Rebel leaders traveled to Caracas, Venezuela, on Thursday to meet with President Carlos Andres Perez. But Salvadoran government officials didn't plan to attend the meeting, dashing any hopes of talks.

Perez, however, said he was in touch with Cristiani's government.

"I will say the same things to the representatives of the Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front that I said to the ministers of the Cristiani government: We need to look for sincere solutions," Perez said.

Meanwhile, traffic moved normally in San Salvador for the first time since Nov. 11, when the offensive that killed more than 1,000 people was launched in the capital and several provinces. Many of the capital's 1 million residents tried to stock up on food, gas and other necessities.

"We've been cooking with wood," said truck driver Israel Herrera, standing in line for a fourth day at a natural gas distributorship with 50 other people.

"Since I don't have any fuel for the truck I'm spending my days in line." At the Soyapango cemetery east of the city, gravediggers buried five bodies that had been left at the cemetery gates and said they expected more work.

Much of the city was blacked out after darkness, and an electric company spokesman said damage during the battles left a 70 percent power outage.

Cristiani said the Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front had used the negotiating process as a propaganda tool while it prepared the largest

offensive of the rebels' 10-year-old war against U.S.-backed governments.

The guerrilla group has said it launched its offensive to prove that it cannot be defeated and that the country cannot have peace without accepting the rebels as a political factor.

The guerrillas tried to steal Cristiani's show by setting off at least five small bombs in a ravine about five blocks away. His news conference was interrupted shortly after he claimed the army controlled the city, but he said "anybody with a small group of people" could "launch terrorism."

Cristiani was surprised, but maintained his composure. The news conference was interrupted for 1 minute and 34 seconds, but then resumed even as helicopters roared overhead, dropping bombs and rocketing the slopes of a volcano

where rebels were believed to be hiding.

Explosions continued to be heard just north of the city into the late evening.

The news conference was held in an open-air pavilion at military headquarters, which has been attacked numerous times during the war that has cost an estimated 71,000 lives.

There was little fighting elsewhere as the country experienced a second day of relative calm.

"They tried it and lost," said Cristiani of the rebel offensive. He said the guerrilla group must "come to its senses and stop its aggression against the people. Then we can sit down to look at the few things we can do to facilitate their incorporation into the democratic process."

Audit criticizes system

AUSTIN (AP) - Attorney General Jim Mattox says a federal audit critical of the state's child support program is outdated because of recent improvements not reflected in the report.

The audit, which says the collection program is inadequate in key areas, could lead to a loss in federal funds.

The federal audit says the state program failed to establish the paternity of men who owed child support payments, failed in almost half the cases to find delinquent parents, and took steps only two-thirds of the time to have delinquent payments deducted from paychecks as required by federal law.

Mattox's office issued a statement saying the program has made significant improvements since fiscal 1987, the period covered by the audit.

"I am confident that an audit of the present program would show total compliance," Harmon Lisnow, the attorney general's executive assistant, said.

The audit was conducted by the Office of Child Support Enforcement, a division of the Department of Health and Human Services in Washington.

The study, released Wednesday, covered the period from October of 1986 to September of 1987, the most recent fiscal year available to the federal team when it began work in February of 1988.

Michelle Jefferson, a spokeswoman

for the Office of Child Support Enforcement in Washington, said the state will be notified that federal Aid For Dependent Children payments to the state will be reduced as a penalty unless the problems are corrected. The Office of Child Support Enforcement is a part of the Department of Health and Human Services.

The attorney general's office will have 60 days to submit a plan for making improvements, she said.

Lisnow said that although the state faces the possibility of penalties for failing to meet federal standards, he said he is confident "Texas will never pay one penny in audit fines" because of improvements implemented.

A comparison of the program between 1987 and 1989, he said, shows that child support collection has increased from \$72 million to \$133 million; more than 6,000 paternitys have been established as compared with 648; and interstate collections increased from \$10.5 million to \$16 million.

The attorney general's office was given a copy of the audit in advance and portions of its response were included in the final report.

According to the audit, Mattox's office contended that its failings were of "a technical nature" that did not hurt the program's performance. The federal audit disagreed.

Astronauts deploy spy satellite

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - Discovery's astronauts set their sights on a Sunday landing for a secret military space shuttle mission that sources said included deployment of a spy satellite.

Silence has surrounded most of the classified flight, but NASA did interrupt the quiet briefly on Thanksgiving Day to announce that the shuttle was scheduled to land at 7:02 p.m. PST Sunday at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif.

"The crew is doing well and the orbiter continues to perform satisfactorily," Mission Control commentator Billie Deason said in the brief status report Thursday evening.

According to sources close to the project, a 2½-ton, \$300 million payload was released from the shuttle's cargo bay early Thursday morning about 10 hours into the flight.

It was a satellite capable of monitoring Soviet missile tests and eavesdropping on military and diplomatic communications in the Soviet Union and other countries, said the sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The satellite was to be maneuvered into a stationary orbit 22,300 miles above the equator, on a line of sight to the Soviet Union, China, the Middle East, Africa and all of Europe.

The sources were unable to provide information on how the satellite was operating. A similar satellite was launched by a shuttle crew in 1985.

They were expected to tend experiments for the "Star Wars" missile defense system and other military projects.

The Defense Department has said the news blackout is necessary to try to keep the Soviets from finding out about what the astronauts are doing.

Discovery is commanded by Air Force Col. Frederick D. Gregory. His four-person crew: Air Force Col. John Blaha, the pilot, and the three mission specialists, Navy Capt. Manley Carter Jr., F. Story Musgrave and Kathryn C. Thornton.

The flight, the fifth dedicated to the military, began Wednesday night with a spectacular nighttime liftoff that brightened the sky over the central Florida coast. The launch time was dictated by the secret cargo and its mission.

Know when to boil water

NEW YORK (AP) - There's no need to boil tap water unless advised by local or state water authorities.

Boiling water for 10 minutes kills bacteria and releases volatile chemicals like chlorine into the air. But it can also concentrate metals like lead, and some pesticides, according to the Environmental Nutrition newsletter. If the presence of these substances is suspected, do not boil water for drinking purposes.

WHEN TO TEST FOR TAP WATER=

Considering testing tap water in the following cases:

- When a hazardous waste dump or industrial park is nearby.
- When pipes at home are lead or use lead solder.
- When tap water changes in taste, color or odor.
- When water comes from a well or is purchased from a private supplier.

WHERE TO HAVE WATER TESTED=

Some state health departments or

local water suppliers provide free testing of tap water.

State-certified water testing laboratories will test water against Environmental Protection Agency standards. Prices vary from about \$15 for a test for lead only, to more than \$200 for a series of tests that can identify about 60 contaminants.

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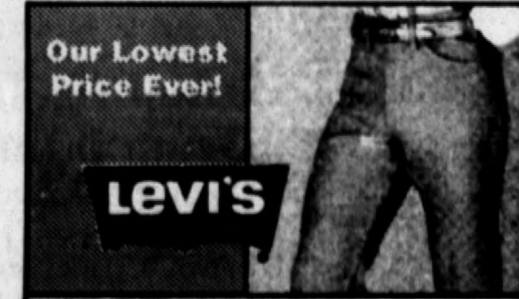

Herd set to begin 'second season'

It will be the Battle of the Cattle Saturday when the Herford Whitefaces take on the Big Spring Steers at 7:30 p.m. in a Class 4A area playoff game at Lubbock's Lowrey Field.

Herford, 8-2 on the year, comes into the contest as the District 1-4A runnerup while Big Spring, also 8-2, is the champion in 4-4A.

Both teams finished the regular season last week in impressive style. The Herd overcame a sluggish first quarter to beat Dumas, 36-15, and the Steers jumped all over Fort Stockton, 49-6.

And both teams have been putting up some big numbers as each has gained more than 3,600 yards of offense during the season.

Herford has been led by tailback Matt Bromlow, who has rushed for a school-record 1367 yards and 12 touchdowns. Bromlow has also caught five passes for 92 yards and a score.

Herd quarterback Jason Walterscheid has completed 59 of 101 passes for 931 yards and nine TDs to become Herford's second most accurate passer ever.

Russell Backus has hauled in 37 receptions for 665 yards and 10 scores to lead the receiving corp.

Big Spring head coach David Thompson said the Steers will try to slow the Herd down.

"You're not going to stop a team like Herford," Thompson said. "Bromlow is a great back and they have a great line blocking for him. And their quarterback has played very well and they can throw the ball adequately. So what we're going to try to do is slow them down. We're going to have to play very good defense against Herford because they are so overpowering on offense."

Thompson added that the Herd's defense will also pose a challenge for his team.

"Everybody that's still playing is playing good defense," he said, "and Herford is no different. They're pretty big and physical on that side of the ball, but we feel we can match up with them pretty well and move on them."

Linebacker Oscar Garcia and defensive tackles Aaron Savage and Brian Wagner head the defense, which has allowed only 2,577 yards and 21 touchdowns on the year. Garcia leads the team with 95 tackles and has three interceptions and three fumble recoveries to lead in both categories. Wagner has recorded 81 stops, including a team-high 17 for losses, despite moving from middle linebacker halfway through the season. Savage has 71 tackles and has been credited with hurrying 18 passes. Defensive end Burt Noland has also helped give the Herd an effective pass rush with seven sacks and 15 hurried passes.

The Herd secondary has held opponents to 968 passing yards and picked off five passes.

Big Spring's offense has been built around all-purpose back Neal Mayfield, who has rushed for more than 800 yards and caught 30 passes for another 550. Mayfield leads the Steers in scoring with 18 touchdowns.

Big Spring quarterback Rance Thompson, son of the Steers' head coach, has racked up 1131 passing yards by completing 77 of 143 attempts.

Herd head coach Don Cumpton said the teams will be almost mirror images when they take the field Saturday.

"They're a lot like we are," Cumpton said of the Steers. "They do a lot of the same things we do, both offensively and defensively."

"They're primarily an I-formation team offensively. They run a lot of counters and traps and stuff and they run a little option every now and then. They run that wingback counter with Mayfield a lot. They throw the ball pretty efficiently, too. They throw a lot of play-action passes.

"They're real balanced. You have to defend the whole field. They're going to run it and they're going to throw it and they're going to power and they're going to finesse. You've got to defend the whole field."

"They're basically a 4-3 defensive team with variations off that. They mix up their passing and running on offense and they mix up their secondary coverage and stuff on defense like we do."

Cumpton added that the teams will also match up well in size.

"We're both pretty similar as far as size. I don't think size - either way - is going to make much of a difference in the game."

The teams have played one common opponent, Estacado, and both lost - Big Spring in the second week of the season, 20-14, and Herford the next week, 22-14. Neither coach thought there were any secrets to be learned from films of the two contests.

"That was so long ago that I don't think you can make a valid comparison of our teams based on that," Thompson said. "Estacado beat both of us by about the same amount and in the same way. Both teams are playing better now and have improved a lot since playing Estacado."

Cumpton echoed his counterpart's sentiments, saying, "You can't judge because that was back their second game."

"They're just like us," Cumpton added, "they've come through the

season and worked some things out, and now they're doing the things they do well. Back that early, everybody was still experimenting with what they were going to do."

One other factor in the game will be coping with the Thanksgiving holiday break. Thompson felt the break was a necessary evil faced when making the playoffs while Cumpton said his team should be more relaxed as a result.

"I don't like it because it interrupts our routine," Thompson said, "but it's something you have to live through. It's no different for us than it is for Herford, we both have to put up with it. But I will say that we're glad to still be here this late in the season. There's a lot of teams that aren't working out this week and we are."

"I don't think it's a problem at all," Cumpton said. "In fact, I kind of enjoy it because the guys don't have to go to school and they can stay home with their families for a day. I don't think it will be a factor at all."

Cumpton said the Herd will go into the game relatively free of injury.

"We don't have any new injuries, so we're adding on instead of losing players for a change," he said.

Cumpton said defensive end Steve Tucker, who suffered a broken leg and dislocated ankle against Estacado, has received clearance from doctors and will play while offensive guard Benny Gonzales, who was held out last week with a sore shoulder, will also return.

Offense continues record pace

Herford High School has become a football powerhouse in this decade, reaching the playoffs in 5 of the 10 years. The teams' have compiled a 50-10-1 won-loss-tied record in the 80's.

For the record, HHS grid teams have been in the playoffs 21 times and have a record of 24 wins, 16 losses and 5 ties. The 1981 team advanced the farthest, losing a close 10-7 contest to Richardson Lake Highlands in the state semifinals at Lubbock.

Records are made to be broken and this year's team proves the point. The team posted a new offensive record by amassing 3,651 total yards in 10 games—416 more yards than the record set by the 1988 squad.

Running back Matt Bromlow became the school's all-time rushing leader by gaining 1,367 yards in just eight games this season. He broke the regular-season record set by Mack Cansler back in 1961 of 1,284 yards. He needs just 49 yards in the next

playoff game to surpass Wayne High's 14-game total of 1,416.

The career individual rushing mark is held by Paul Bell(77-78) who totalled 2,188 yards. Bell had a game average of 109.4, where Bromlow, a junior, currently averages 170.9 per game. Cansler is second in career rushing with 2,016, and James Harris is third

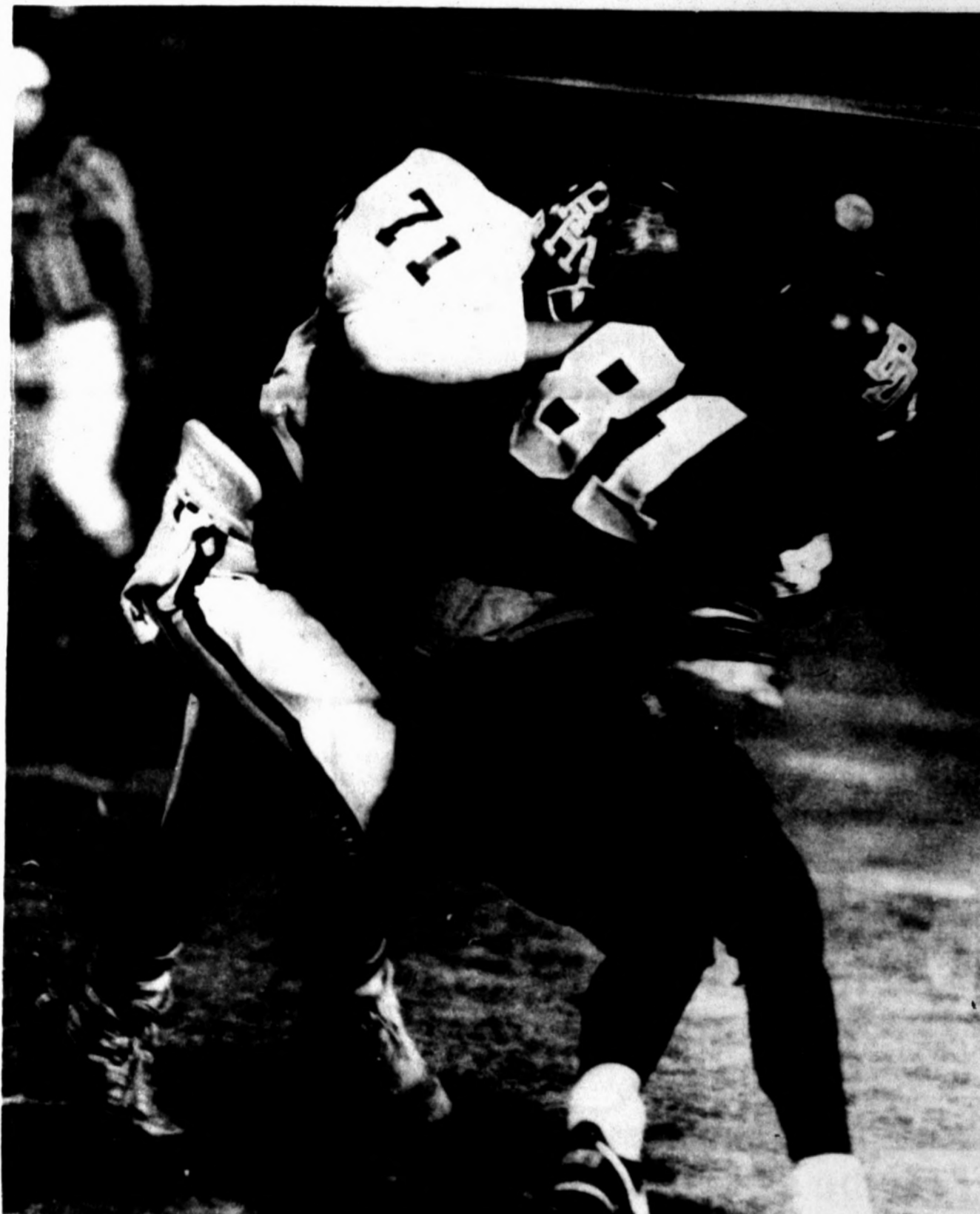
with 1,750.

Quarterback Jason Walterscheid is currently in second place in percentage of completions in the Herd record book. Jason Scott carried a .599 mark in passing accuracy last year, and Walterscheid is now at .584. Walterscheid ranks seventh on passing yardage.

Russell Backus has moved up to

fourth place on the all-time receiver record list. Backus has totalled 665 yards, 10 touchdowns and 37 catches this year. Bobby Baker('86) leads this list with 61 catches for 814 yards and 11 scores.

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'Pokes say Ryan offered bounties

IRVING (AP) - Buddy Ryan has another victory and another NFL enemy.

The Philadelphia Eagles inflicted a 27-0 Thanksgiving Day flogging on the Dallas Cowboys and Dallas coach Jimmy Johnson claimed Ryan had a \$200 bounty out to injure kicker Louis

Zendejas and \$500 on quarterback Troy Aikman.

Ryan belly-laughed off the charge, saying "I don't have that kind of money. It's ridiculous."

"I didn't think a head football coach would stoop this low," Johnson

said. Philadelphia increased its record to 8-4 while Dallas dropped to 1-11.

Johnson, who shook Ryan's hand and joked with him before the game, had a change in mood after the Dallas' first Thanksgiving Day shutout loss.

"I have no respect for the way Philadelphia played the game," Johnson said. "An (Eagles) assistant coach told us last night and it was verified by two players today that there was a \$200 bounty on Zendejas and \$500 on Aikman. I will file a protest to the league office."

"I would have said something to Buddy but he wouldn't stand on the field long enough. He put his fat rear end into the dressing room."

Zendejas, who was cut by Ryan two weeks ago, was hit in the head by linebacker Jessie Small after the second half kickoff.

"I got a call on Friday from a friend who said, 'They are coming after you,'" Zendejas said. "That just tells you what Buddy Ryan is. I saw Small coming and all I could do was duck because he was going for my legs. He just came straight at me."

"I told Zendejas it was no big deal and I was just doing my job," Small said. "Coach Ryan is a good honest coach and he doesn't pay anybody for that."

Aikman was nonplussed and said, "I think as a quarterback there's always a bounty hanging over your head. I have no idea if it's true. I didn't feel any of the hits were unusual."

Randall Cunningham hit Cris Carter with two touchdown passes and the Eagles forced five turnovers in the

Dallas' worst Thanksgiving Day loss. San Francisco beat Dallas 31-10 on Thanksgiving 1972.

Cunningham ignored the bounty furor and talked about Carter.

"I have a lot of confidence in Cris because he has great leaping ability," Cunningham said. "They can try to stop him but it's mighty hard to do."

Dallas offensive guard Nate Newton also dismissed the bounty talk.

"He just plays physical football and that's what happened out there," Newton said of Ryan.

Earlier this season, the Chicago Bears and Phoenix Cardinals claimed Ryan paid bounties.

"That's not what you want to have in football no matter what level you are playing at," Johnson said.

Dallas plays the Eagles again in two weeks at Philadelphia.

"Our day will come," Johnson said.

Irish, 'Canes to battle

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - While the Miami-Notre Dame series is new to first-year Hurricane coach Dennis Erickson, he's familiar with the sort of hoopla surrounding it.

"I remember the Everett High-Cascade games when my dad was the coach at Cascade High School and I played at Everett (Wash.)," Erickson said Tuesday. "That went on for years and years at my house. My mom was right in the middle of it. It was unbelievable."

Erickson said the anticipation of Saturday's Miami-Notre Dame game has stirred up even more hype than Everett-Cascade.

Seventh-ranked Miami is 9-1, top-ranked Notre Dame 11-0. The Hurricanes are hoping to avenge a 31-30 loss at South Bend last year, when Notre Dame and Miami finished the season ranked 1-2.

"People have been talking about this game since last year, and it's good it's finally here," Erickson said. "Our players are relieved."

The Hurricanes, whose only loss was 24-10 at Florida State on Oct. 28, remain in contention for the national championship.

"We know, obviously, that if we lose this game there's no chance," Erickson said. "This is our biggest game of the season, regardless of what happens."

Erickson said Miami's injury situation is the worst it has been all season. Wesley Carroll, the team's leading receiver and punt returner, is

"very doubtful" because of a separated shoulder. Tight end Randy Bethel (knee sprain) and defensive end Shane Curry (ankle) are questionable.

The game will match quarterbacks with contrasting styles. Notre Dame's slick Tony Rice is a master at running the option. Miami's strong-armed Craig Erickson has passed for 1,797 yards in the seven games he has played, but has thrown 12 interceptions.

"Craig is ready to play this game," the coach said. "He needs to play this game. I think he'll play very, very well."

As for Rice, Erickson said, "In my

opinion he's the best player in college football right now because of the things he's done over the last couple of years. He's a great player, a great leader and he's extremely tough."

Erickson knows the importance of quarterbacks in big games, because that's the position he played in the Everett-Cascade showdowns.

"My dad beat me the first year," the quarterback said. "And then I got him the next two, strictly because of great talent at quarterback at Everett High School."

The Aggies, making a fourth Shootout appearance, open against Connecticut, 18-13 last season. The Huskies hope freshman Scott Burrell's jump shot is as good as his 90-plus mph fastball. Burrell turned down a major league baseball bonus to play for UConn in the Big East.

Chris Gaines brings back 17 points

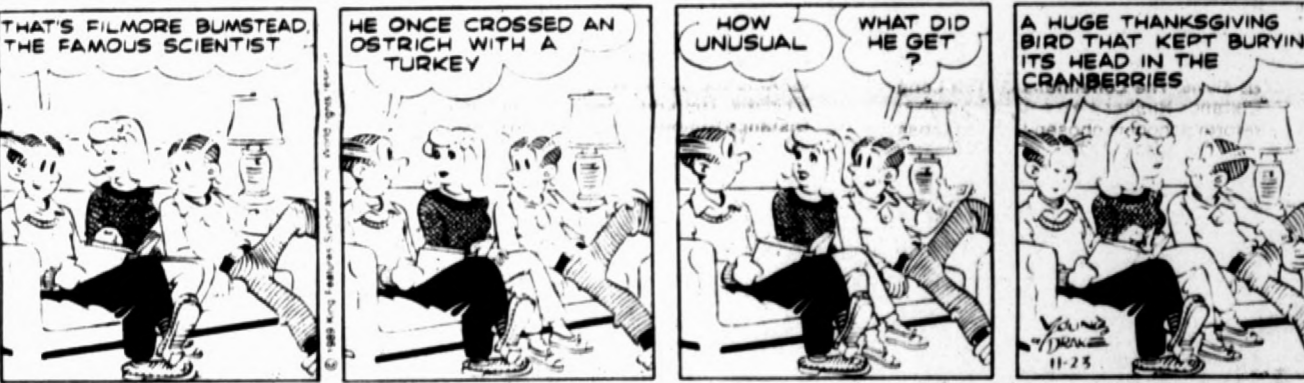
a game to Hawaii's attack after sitting out the last half of the season because of academic woes.

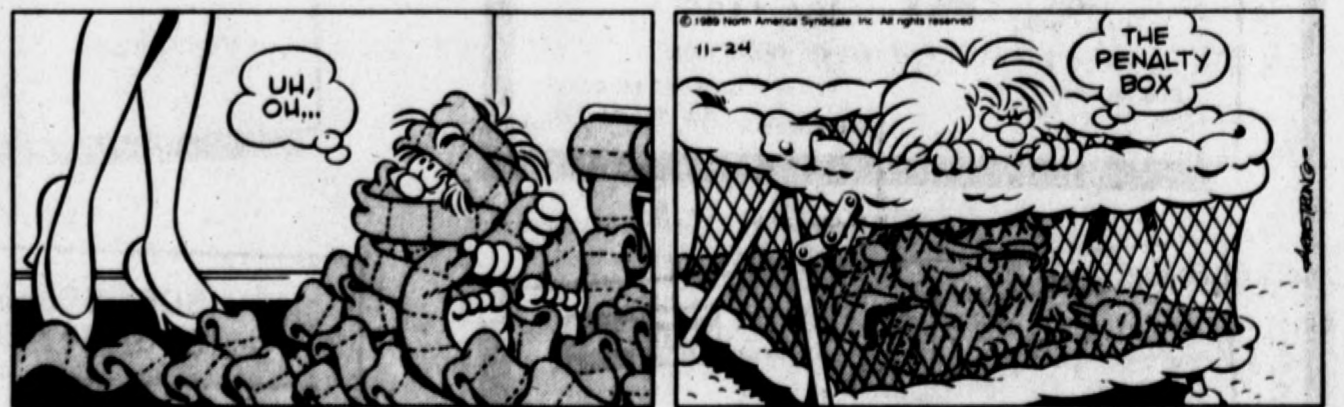

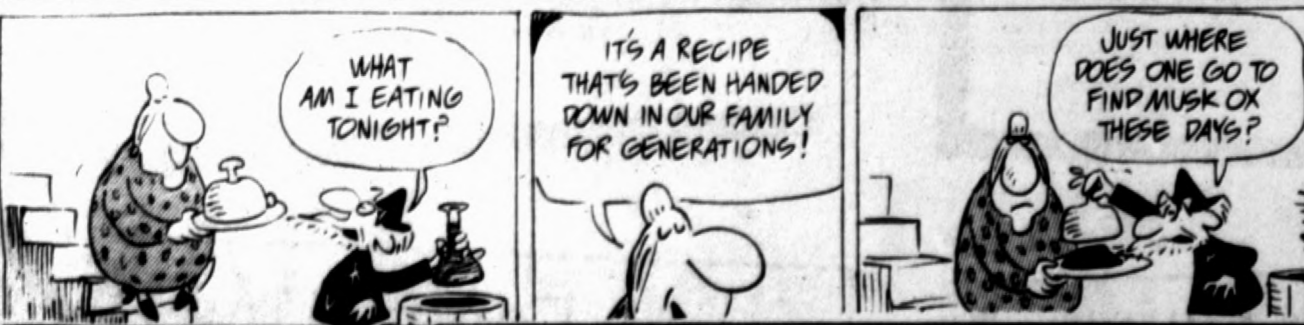

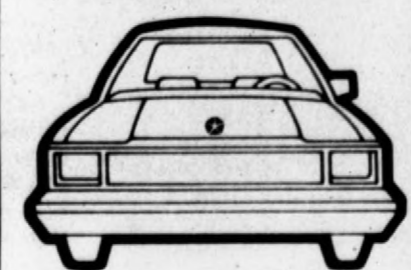
