## END OF RAINBOW.

### Editor of Princeton, Mo., Post Says Proverbial Sack of Gold Is Located in The Panhandle of Texas.

Ever since the day of the landing of good Noah's ark on Mount Ararat, the youngsters of this country have been entertained with the proverbial story of the sack of gold at the end of the rainbow. And many are the tales of suffering and privation of the searchers for this high sack of wealth. The end of this many colored circle has at last been located. The proverbial sack of gold at its resting place is there--not in coins and nuggets, but in valuable lands, healthful climate and golden opportunities. It's the Panhandle of Texas.

It was the writer's pleasure to take a trip to that country recently. We did not go in fairy carts, towed by winged horses as believers in the story would suppose. Trains of pullman cars on the Santa Fe take you there--high trains of from ten to fifteen coaches each. The day we went it required five such trains to start the crowd out of Kansas City. Hundreds of people make the trip every two weeks on these excursions. Rainbow chasers, if you please, but not of the variety who proverbially return with empty hands. Nine out of every ten come back with something to show for the trip, and all tell of the rich harvest that is to be garnered there.

Imagine if you can a broad stretch of high level land, containing thousands of acres, smooth as a floor, carpeted with a soft green covering of mesquite and buffalo grasses (save where some thrifty farmer has a section or two under cultivation) neatly painted farm houses in the distance, each one with a windmill, altogether a lovely country--here you have Texas.

Then think of a hustling little city of 3000 people, a place where they have no police, no saloon, no gambling dens or other places of vice, no tough characters, where every man wears a happy smile of welcome and you have Hereford. The writer's view of that country was limited to this city and the country north of it. However, there is but slight difference in the country except that the north part is higher.

The soil of that country varies in depth from three to five feet. It is especially adapted to the production of crops, such as maize, kaffir corn, cane, oats, millet, alfalfa and many fields of Indian corn may be seen. Fruits of many kinds grow in abundance. The peach, plum and grape crop this year is

simply immense. The wheat crop will average better than twenty bushels to the acre. Water is found at a depth of 30 or 40 feet. The climate is just right. The high altitude gives cool breezes in summer and at night you are assured a good rest. The winters are mild and short. The rain fall is abundant. A Mercer Countian, who has resided there five years, informed the writer that during that time they had but one dry season, and that was not dry enough to materially injure the crops.

There is but one drawback to the country. They need settlers rather than speculators. But settlers are beginning to come in. While waiting for a train to bring us home, we saw six car loads of settlers' outfits unloaded. They were from Illinois, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas. These people will soon come from all directions, and when they do, the Panhandle will blossom as the most favored spots, and tales from there will rival the "Arabian Nights". The country is there, the farmers will do the rest.

Mercer Countians have purchased several thousand acres of this Panhandle land and the first instance is yet unknown where the investor lost a dollar. To the contrary some have doubled their money. One year ago land could be bought here for \$3.00 and \$5.00 per acre. Today it cost from \$12.00 to \$15.00. It is still advancing.

Standing on the streets of a lively Panhandle town, shortly after a train load of land buyers have arrived, is not unlike being in the west. Along the street on both sides, are numerous land offices, their many colored signs in high letters announcing bargains in real estate, while around their front doors are crowds of men, and some women, eager to be shown--for many of them are from Missouri. The streets are lined with buggies, carriages and sometimes automobiles, in which the prospective buyers are hauled about over the country. Scraps of conversation on the streets are interesting. A man with his hands in his pockets up to his elbows and a broad rim felt hat on drops a quiet tip that Sam Turner's fifteen section tract over east is for sale and there is a chance to turn it in two days at a profit of \$5000. Another party informs that Jim Peters cleaned up \$14,000 yesterday on that ranch he purchased up north of town last week. Then there are fellows who are "just layin' around to pick up something". These fellows are not robbers, but moneyed men with check books, ready to take up a land bargain on sight.

And these towns have their characters. They are not old timer who sit around on

the street, tell yarns and squirt tobacco juice as they do in Missouri. These characters are former cowboys, "born and raised here, sir; know the land from sky to sky". They are in the real estate business, pilot you about over the landscape, bring you in at night and unload a half section on you on luck. And so far, this luck has been a winner. Many a man has gone away kicking himself because he didn't take a dozen halves.

As evidence of the possibilities of that country, we were sighted to a former Mercer Countian--William Smith. Mr. Smith lived near Modena in this country before he went to Texas, and is well and favorably known here. Mr. Smith lives on a ranch of 3292 acres twenty miles south of Hereford. Going there seven years ago with less than \$10,000, his wealth now passes the \$100,000 mark--and he made it right there. When he went, land was cheap. He purchased four sections, a house, barn and windmill, for \$1000. The rest of his land he got at \$2.00 an acre. Last week he refused an offer of \$25.00 an acre for the entire tract.

Mr. Smith's ranch is one of the best in that section of the country. He has an orchard of twenty acres. From this orchard he is now picking a crop of more than 2,000 bushels of peaches. Besides peaches he has much other fruit. He has good crops of Indian corn, kaffir corn, oats and wheat. He is now sowing a 50 acre tract in wheat. He has a small bunch of cattle (only 400 head) hogs and horses. He has a cozy home and is independent. He may now have the pleasure of sitting there and watching his holdings grow. His good management, foresight--and Texas--has made him rich.

This big country uses big methods in farming. There we got our first view of plowing with steam power. A huge engine, such as is used by threshers, was plowing in a field of several hundred acres. This engine was pulling sixteen plows and a harrow; turning sixteen furrows and harrowing it as it goes. The furrows are just one mile in length. In this way they plow on an average of thirty acres per day. For this work they get \$2.00 per acre.

While Hereford has received much attention by the writer, Bovina, about 40 miles southwest, is also in the favored section. Land here is just the same and just as valuable. Excursions are being run in there every two weeks.

There is a great demand for laborers in Hereford. In a drive over the city, we counted thirteen houses in course of con-

struction. A contractor told us he was ready to commence on several more, but could not get the men. The houses are of the large, substantial kind. They are nicely painted, the yards well kept, and all seem to take an interest in the town. During our visit there we met many former Mercer Countians, some of whom are farming. All are doing well. They like Texas--have fallen in love with her. They all do.

It is pleasing to note the im-

#### From Cattle to Wheat

A year or so ago, it was generally known throughout this part of the Panhandle that C. R. Moreman was the possessor of a bunch of white-faced cattle which never failed to arouse the admiration of northern buyers when they chanced to visit his ranch. The cause of his herd being so far superior to the ordinary herd was obvious to those who knew the care which was exercised in selecting his breed and afterwards in producing an abundance of feed to keep them well through the winter. While, we say, Mr. Moreman's success in raising fine Hereford cattle has seldom been equaled in this western country, we are now able to attribute other successes to him which will likely prove of far more reaching effect than those achieved in the cattle industry, viz: in respect to growing fine wheat and oats.

Our president urges every member of the Home Mission Society to be at the church next Tuesday afternoon at three thirty, for the October business session.

Program for the week of prayer observance will be published in next week's Brand.

During the past year four new auxiliaries have been organized in our Clarendon district and an old one reorganized.

From the minutes of last spring's conference we find the three following resolutions in the report of the committee on finance: That a collection for the benefit of the conference expense fund be taken on occasion of the annual sermon during the week of prayer; That each society pay \$1.00 for every twenty-five members to our Deaconess' Scholarship; and, That each auxiliary be urged to send not less than \$1.00 per member each year for connectional purposes. The conference expense fund is 25 cents per year for each member and should be paid into the treasury at the beginning of the year. In our conference president's annual address she says, "There is one point in our work that needs special stressing, that being our conference expense fund. If local treasurers would collect this 25 cents per member, we need never draw from our general fund for expense money. This is a small sum, yet if collected would bring our total to \$800, whereas there is a deficit of nearly \$500."

The amount per year for the Deaconess' Scholarship has heretofore been \$1.00 to each society, the call having received no response from the Hereford auxiliary.

The \$1.00 per member is made up from the Baby Roll dues, Mite Box collections, Week of Prayer offerings and the \$3.00 per quarter that's asked for the Mission Home at Dallas. Last year we sent in an amount averaging about 75 cents per member.

From report of committee on extension of work, resolution ninth says: That we recommend that Auxiliary presidents conduct quiz meetings once a quarter on some phase of W. H. M. S. work; also,

that each auxiliary appoint a parliamentarian, adopt Mrs. Shattuck's Rules of Order and hold parliamentary drills at least once a quarter.

The Parsonage Committee of the Northwest Texas Conference granted the \$150.00 asked for our new parsonage, for which the Hereford church is abundantly thankful.
