From Cattle to Wheat

A year or so ago, it was generally known throughout this part of the Panhandle that C. R. Moreman was the possessor of a bunch of whitefaced cattle which never failed to arouse the admiration of northern buyers when they chanced to visit his ranch. The cause of his herd being so far superior to the ordinary herd was obvious to those who knew the care which was exercised in selecting his breed and afterwards in producing an abundance of feed to keep them well through the winter. While, we say, Mr. Moreman's success in raising fine Hereford cattle has seldom been equaled in this western country, we are now able to attribute other suscesses to him which will likely prove of far more reaching effect than those achieved in the cattle industry, viz: in respect to growing fine wheat and oats.

Mr. Moreman tells us that he now has in his grainery about 3400 bushels of these valuable grains, repesenting this year's crop. At the proper time, this will be put on the market, and we dare say the amount of the "coin of the realm" received will be a sufficient recompense for his trou-

Mr. Moreman is not satisfied to stop with the results of this year. but is now busily engaged in preparing 200 acres of land to be sown in wheat this fall. It might be stated in this connection that Mr. Moreman still has his white-faced cattle, but agricultural pursuits are also demanding a portion of his attention.

Mr. Graves Resigns. It is with profound regret we are compelled to make public the resignation of T. J. Graves from the place as president of the Board of Trustees of our public schools. We say that we are regretful because of the fact that we realize how extremely difficult it will be to fill the vacancy with one who will take as much genuine interest in the welfare of our schools. For almost four years the providing for the training of the boys and girls of our community has been almost entirely in his hands. How well he has performed his duties is plainly evidenced in the able faculty which has been secured from time to time, as well as in the rapid strides which the schools have made in forging their way to the front of the very best schools in West Texas.

While he has not perhaps been in a position to conform to the wishes of all in each and every instance, Mr. Graves, acting from principle, has done what he conceived to be for the best interests of the schools. His place as president of the school board will be a hard one to fill.
