Lieutenant Montgomery, who is in the Air Corps, expects to be home soon for a visit with his parents, who live in Christoval, Tex.


## Lt. Clyde Hussey Receives Medal

## Backyard Crack-Up

## Plane Crashes In Back Yard At Beams Place

Serious damage to life and property was miraculously escaped, when a small, trainer-type plane crash-landed in the back yard at the J. L. Beams place on Lake Street Saturday morning shortly after 11:30 o'clock.

Though the plane was badly damaged—the landing gear smashed, propeller splintered, motor caved in and the cover ripped from much of the fuselage, neither the pilot, who gave his name as Jack Campbell, nor either of his two women companions, suffered any injuries other than minor cuts and bruises.

The license revealed that the plane was registered at Laredo, Texas, and Campbell stated that he had come here to use the plane in potato spraying. Accounts of the accident varied, with witnesses reporting that the plane had over shot a landing field west of town and was circling back, flying low, to try another landing, when it nosed into the Beams' back yard after literally skimming the roofs of neighboring houses.

## One Farm Salvage Drive Sets Record

Mrs. Bess Werner of Westway reads the pleas for scrap paper, tin and fat needed in the war effort—and then she goes out and does something about it.

Maybe it's because her two sons, Daniel and George Turrentine are still very much in the middle of the Pacific War that Mrs. Werner has tried to put punch into the salvage drive on her farm. And also, she says, she has had the help of her brother, Wray T. Ridgeway, a veteran of 1918, to carry out most of the actual work.

At any rate, this one farm salvage record stands as tops in Deaf Smith County:

Saved have been 125 pounds of fat, for which 250 red points—and \$5.00 have been collected. Four hundred pounds of tin cans have been prepared as required, delivered at the Sales Barn and hauled by the P. O. W. truck to a salvage depot in Amarillo. (This operation proved the end of a good can opener, Mrs. Werner said, as all cans must have both tops and bottoms removed so that the can may be pressed flat.)

In addition, one ton of papers—about \$10 worth—has been bundled as required and is ready to go on its way back to the paper mills and into useful war and civilian production.

## Twenty-Year-Old Blue Prints Reveal Hereford Hotel Project

Hereford built a \$100,000 hotel back in 1926—but the construction was strictly on paper—as shown by blueprints unearthed at the courthouse last week by Alex Thompson and turned over to the Hereford Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the hotel building project about 20 years ago.

The blue prints show a five-story brick building, with banquet hall, drug store and coffee-quet hall, drug store and coffee-quet on the ground floor and 75 rooms on the other floors of the structure, which was to be called Hotel Hereford, and was planned to be located on the corner across from the courthouse, back of the present location of the Hereford News Stand.

"The hotel was a good post-war plan after the first World War," comments E. B. Posey, chamber of commerce secretary, adding that a hotel would still be an excellent post-war project after World War II—especially if the building were brought beyond the blue print stage.

## Memorial to a "Swell Guy"



"The boys sure did think Ernie Pyle was a swell guy," writes Cpl. Leonard Johnson of Hereford, pictured above with an unnamed lieutenant colonel and some of the money which the GI's of Johnson's outfit gave for a suitable memorial for the pint-size correspondent who was the favorite of American fighting men because, as Johnson puts it: "He wrote the kind of stories they liked . . . true stories."

Writing to his mother, Mrs. W. A. Johnson, Cpl. Johnson said: "In the picture you will note there is a lot of money. I can't tell you exactly how much . . . but the boys gave lots for the little guy. There will be a statue somewhere to his memory."

One of seven brothers in service, Johnson is with the Air Corps ground personnel in France and has been overseas since November, 1943. He reports having met Ernie Pyle twice in the States and twice in England.

## New Dairy Test Program Frees Herds from Bangs

A new Federal program of cattle testing was announced this week by County Agent A. R. Bateman who said that the new system is by far the best ever offered and that it will be to the advantage of every dairyman to take advantage of it.

According to the plan, at least 20 dairy herds would be tested during one period; and if any reactors to the Bang's Disease test are found, the cows will be marked and may be kept in the dairymen's herd until the government notifies the owner of an approved packer or slaughterer to whom the cow may be sold. In the past, infected cows had to be sold immediately, with the result that they were often sold to cattle traders and eventually got back into other dairy herds.

By selling cows to approved slaughterers, and by vaccinating all calves between the ages of four and eight months, the dairymen may finally work up to having a fully accredited herd, Bateman said, urging that dairy herd owners take advantage of the testing program, which is carried out entirely without cost by the Federal (Continued on Page 12)

## Lightning Starts Damaging Fire At Dean Ranch

Lightning, which struck a large barn at the Arlie Dean place 20 miles northwest of Hereford, Saturday night, caused an estimated loss of \$10,000. The fire started between 5:30 and 6 o'clock, while Mr. and Mrs. Jack Dean, who are operating the place, were away from home. A neighbor remembered hearing a loud clap of thunder before he saw the blaze at the Dean farm. The barn had already burned before anyone could get to it.

The combine had been pulled up to the barn for repairs and was burned so badly that it cannot be repaired in time for the harvest this year. All of the farm tools and other equipment were kept in the barn along with 55 thousand pounds of sudan and 1400 bushels of other grain.

Insurance will partly cover the loss of the barn, which had stood on the place for 40 years, but there was no insurance on the grain, combine, tools, and other equipment.

Mr. and Mrs. Arlie Dean of Park Vista, N. M., owners of the property, were in Hereford this week checking up on damage and making arrangements for replacement.

## F. L. Lucas Killed in Action On Okinawa

F. L. Lucas, Jr., 21, pharmacist's mate first class in the Navy Medical Corps, was killed in action on Okinawa while serving with a Medical unit attached to the 22nd Marine Regiment. The message was received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank L. Lucas, Saturday morning.

According to a letter from one of F. L.'s buddies, young Lucas "gave his life instantly, with no knowledge of pain or fear, while giving aid to an injured comrade." Writing to Mr. and Mrs. Lucas the medical corpsman said that "Frank had earned the respect and love of every man in his outfit."

Born Mar. 2, 1924 in Hereford, F. L. attended Hereford schools, graduating from Hereford High School in 1941 as one of the most popular boys in his class. He was a member of the First Christian Church of Hereford and had taken an active part in church activities as a leader in the Sunday School and young people's work. He had completed his freshman work at Texas Christian University, Fort (Continued on Page 12)

## Two More Local Men Freed From Nazi POW Camps

Two more Hereford men, Lt. George Jones and Pfc. Roger Hartman, have been liberated from German prisoner of war camps, according to official notice received here on Saturday and Sunday by their parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Jones and G. C. Hartman.

Lieutenant Jones, a bomber pilot had been in prison since December, 1940, when his plane was shot down in a raid over Germany. He entered service on Nov. 25, 1940, transferring to the Air Corps from the Army ground forces in September, 1942, and receiving his wings and commission on July 28, 1943. He was assigned to duty with the Eighth Air Force in November, 1943.

Lieutenant Jones, liberated by the Russians, was in France when he wrote his parents and expected to be home in a few weeks.

Pvt. Hartman was listed as missing in action on Dec. 21, 1944, during the German counter-offensive in Belgium and was reported a prisoner on Jan. 11.

Hartman attended Texas A. & M. prior to entering the Army one and a half years ago. He trained at Rutgers College in New Jersey and at Camp Atterbury, Ind., and went overseas in October, 1944, to enter active duty as a combat infantryman.

## Wheat Acreage Hits Low Mark

According to present estimates, approximately 75,000 acres of wheat will be harvested in Deaf Smith County this year, as compared to an average of 250,000 acres during the past several seasons.

This is the opinion of County Agent A. R. Bateman, who says that a good deal of wheat is still "on the borderline," with farmers having a hard time making up their minds whether it will be worth harvesting.

Irrigated wheat, on the other hand, is good; and some of it will probably make as high as 40 bushels an acre to bring up the county average which will still be the lowest of the past ten years.

Though dry weather has prevented the planting of row crop, several quick-maturing varieties such as Martin Maize, sweet sorghum and African millet can still be planted as late as June 15 and have time to mature grain before frost; and irrigation farmers will probably plant large acreage to row crops, with the dry land acreage depending on a break in the drouth.

Paul Getty, gets his millions from Texas oil wells.

Mrs. Lynch is using the money earned from her coast-to-coast radio broadcast to finance her new business venture—and with good results. The water is purchased from the City of Hereford and shipped to Los Angeles in a special tank car.

SECTION 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"SECTION 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

EACH voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting, and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

A JOINT RESOLUTION  
PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO

the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"ARTICLE 5. SECTION 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall

continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

SEC. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members;"

and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the

same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members;"

and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the

same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."



### LEGAL NOTICE

#### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

PROPOSING an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter; providing that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations; and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article VI, and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

"SECTION 2A. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of holding any such election was, a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part of such armed forces or Armed Force Reserve, or the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine, and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws

and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for any poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state, during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated.

"PROVIDED, however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps; and provided further, that all persons in the armed forces of the United States, or the component branches thereof, not members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, are hereby declared not to be disqualified from voting by reason of any provision of subsection "Fifth" of Section 1, of this Article."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 25, 1945, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following:

"FOR the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

THOSE OPPOSED to such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"AGAINST THE amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamations relating to the publication of the foregoing Resolution, in the various counties of the state, and shall cause the same to be published as required by the statutes and the Constitution in connection with the sub-

mission of proposed amendments to the Constitution, to the people for their action at a statewide election. If it shall appear from the returns of the election at which the foregoing amendment to the Constitution is voted upon that a majority of the qualified voters have voted for said amendment, same shall then become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

SEC. 4. There is hereby ap-

propriated out of the General Fund of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of advertising said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.





**LEGAL NOTICE**

H. J. R. No. 13  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51a, 51b, 51c and 51d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same are hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be numbered 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to

limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over One (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal Funds; and, provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year.

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 25th day of August, 1945, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause: "For the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided

that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

"Against the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and provid-

ing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of funds of the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay expenses of such publication and election.
