More Showers Add to Already-Heavy Totals

Some clearing was noted this morning following two straight days of-heavy rains in the Deaf Smith County area, but clouds still loomed in the distance holding at least a 30 percent chance of more rain for the local area in the offing.

Clouds welled up to unleash a brief cloudburst Thursday night with KPAN radio logging .10 inches from the shower in Hereford.

Light rainshowers occurred intermittently through the early portion of Thursday. then gave way to a brief clearing period during midday and early afternoon.

Those showers came on the heels of rainfall that gave areas of Hereford up to two inch accumulations and also unloaded two inch totals on portions of the dryland country to the west of

A whopping three inches of rain was reported from farmland to the north of the

Hereford.

Dawn community early vesterday as Deaf Smith County received a thorough saturating on virtually all sides.

Overcast conditions and occasional rainshowers are a continuation of a storm system which covers much of the state.

Heavy rain, high winds

and some hail pounded portions of Southeast and South Central Texas throughout the night and early today after turbulent conditions touched off funnel clouds and resulted in at least one death in the state yesterday.

An Atascosa County woman died Thursday in flash flooding when swirling waters washed her car off a ranch road.

Another woman was struck by a lightning bolt at her home near Tomball:

Three tornadoes struck in Montgomery County yesterday with an apartment complex near Conroe damaged and power lines downed and trees uprooted in that

Weather activity was of a more beneficial nature locally as heavy rainfall accumulations should come as a blessing to local agriculture. for the most part.

The timing of the rains should help the irrigated wheat crop here and will prove a definite boon to those

farmers who had "dry planted" their corn crop. hoping to cut out the need for one irrigation.

Excellent soil moisture should be available for the beginning of the irrigated grain sorghum planting season as well.

But there's one Aggie that Texans ought to stand applaud--freshman congressman Phil Gramm, a conservative economics professor from Texas A&M.

It was Gramm who took the president at his word a couple of months ago when Carter said the nation needed to beef up its defense spending in order to cope, militarily, with Russian

Gramm joined forces with GOP congresswoman Marjorie Holt of Maryland and the two sponsored a House amendment that would have transferred \$5.1 billion from social welfare to defense. Gramm immediately became ostracized by his fellow Democrats, threatened by House Speaker Tip O'Neal, and

found himself on the "out" list with White House aides. Fervent lobbyists for food stamps and other welfare programs descended on Washington like locusts on a wheat crop and soon had the politicians with one eye on November elections, wilting away from their posture on defense.

The president came out strongly opposed to the Gramm amendment and, in the end, the House voted down the amendment by 246 to 164. Once again, this nation's military might must play second fiddle to social welfare programs. 000

Food Stamps Kept Alive after Vote

WASHINGTON (AP) - The 21 million Americans who rely on food stamps to help feed themselves can take comfort today, assured that their subsidies will not be halted next

Congress gave speedy final approval Thursday to a \$2.56 billion appropriation to keep the program going for at least a few more months.

The emergency appropriations was sent to President Carter to be signed into law, along with companion legislation authorizing continuation of the program for the remainder of this fiscal year and for all of fiscal 1981.

The emergency money bill passed the House, 316-56, and the Senate, 57-17.

But Congress left the future of the food stamp program in doubt by rejecting additional funds supporters insist will be needed to keep the program in business through Sept. 30, the end of the current fiscal year.

Sponsors of the move to expand and continue the program said the extra \$2.56 billion probably will run out by Sept. 1. They suggested Congress will be obliged to return during the summer for another hurry-up rescue effort.

Both houses raced to meet a deadline set by Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland. The \$6.2 billion previously appropriated for food stamps this fiscal year is expected to run out this month and Bergland had said he would be forced to tell the states the program would be suspended June 1 if new food stamp money was not appropriated by Thursday,

A Senate-House confererence committee acknowledged that the \$2.56 billion in emergency relief it eventually agreed on almost certainly will not be enough to pay for food sub-

sidies through the summer. But House conferees, led by Rep. Jamie L. Whitten, D-Miss., rejected a Senate proposal to increase the supplemental appropriation by \$440 million, to \$3 billion.

Sheriff a Rare Breed

Forsaking the gruff-guy, tobacco-chewing, boot-wearing. image. Travis McPherson isn't your typical sheriff, instead taking a modern, scientific approach to enforcing laws in Deaf Smith County

You can thank a tornado for it.

"When we had that tornado back a few years ago, it made me realize we've got to be ready for anything. I almost lost my home and family," said McPherson, taking a serious turn from his trademark of joviality.

McPherson, on duty at the time, called home to tell his wife. Joan, and son and daughter to get out of their house in the 800 block of Blevins, a half block from the twister. They almost met the tornado head-on. Highlines

crashed toward the street, falling across their van. "It changed my thinking. I realize now that anything can happen," said McPherson as to why he is a hypnotist and fingerprint expert.

McPherson has attended schools in forensic hypnosis, fingerprinting and almost every other phase of law enforcement.

"I have no idea how many schools I've been to. I've been to everything I felt like would better myself. I want to be the best law-enforcement officer in the state," he said while sitting behind a desk cluttered with offense reports, teletype messages and books on hypnosis.

His readiness is evident in another program he instituted in the county--a Special Weapons and Tactical (SWAT) team similar to the one made famous years ago by the Los Angeles Police Department. Team members, trained under a Federal Bureau of

Investigation program in Amarillo, are prepared to deal with hostage situations. "We may never have a hostage situation, but we've got

to be ready,' McPherson said. "In the event I ever have to run an assault on my jail,

I need a SWAT team. Law enforcement, says McPherson, is becoming a

science everywhere, adding that smarter criminals have forced the new trend. McPherson is chairman of the legislative committee of the International Association of Forensic Hypnosis. He

and Detective Jim LaFavers of the Amarillo Police Department pioneered the use of hypnosis in Texas law enforcement. 'It's a very fascinating thing: it's a science. We're all sight-oriented. We will look at something and might not

remember it. But our eyes are like cameras--everything that goes in our eyes stays in our mind and hypnosis can retrieve it." the sheriff said.

McPherson is often called upon by police departments in the area to hypnotize witnesses to crimes.

One of his many successes in hypnosis was the recent "traveling rapist" caper. Putting victim Helen Ward, who was stabbed repeatedly and raped, under hypnosis helped lead to the arrest of Samuel Christopher Hawkins III.

The case became an obsession with me. I worked day and night. My wife wanted it solved as bad as I did, so she understood." McPherson reflected.

"I didn't hate him. I became intrigued with him. I wanted to meet him to see what made him tick. Now that I've met him, I don't even dislike him. I don't like the things he did, though," McPherson said.

"One thing I learned about Hawkins was that killing was like blowing out a candle to him." McPherson admits to a callousness in dealing with

serious crimes. "The only thing that really tears me up is when children

McPherson, not long after he was appointed sheriff in 1970, went out to a house where a 3-year-old

Mexican-American girl had been raped by a 50-year-old The man was still in the house when the sheriff arrived. "I had to pick up this little, crying 3-year-old girl and

hold her in my arms. While I did, this guy was laughing about it. He thought it was funny. "I wanted him to try to escape, do anything, so I could

shoot him." McPherson now will not go alone to a place where a

"I'll have to get someone to go with me," he said. "I

recognize my limitations. I don't want to be in that situation again. It's not up to me to decide punishment on someone, no matter what the crime.'

Travis McPherson was born 38 years ago in Mississippi. His father was committed to an institution for the criminally insane when McPherson was 8-years-old. "Because of my father, I didn't have much of a home

life. He'd escape and we would live in fear." Travis was the oldest of his brothers, the head of the family until his mother married a man 25 years older than

"My stepdad's as good as gold. He means a lot to me." The McPhersons moved to Texico, near Clovis, N.M. It

was at Texico High School where McPherson met Ottis Foster, who changed his life. "Ottis Foster was, and still is, a New Mexico state police

agent. He'd come to school and talk to us about law enforcement. It made a big impression on me. "It seems that I've always needed a certain amount of

excitement and danger: I wasn't going to be comfortable with an everyday desk job." Death does not scare McPherson, he claims. He's been

in life-and-death situations many times and calls them "You can't imagine the crazy, wild feeling you get

when you're almost killed. It's a good rush," he says with a sane grin. "Maybe I'm not normal, but I'm not a scared

McPherson's atypical lifestyle is exemplified in his homelife. He is a most-accomplished artist, loves classical music and drives a replica of a 1964 MG.

"I don't really have much of a social life. My job takes so much of my time so I don't have time for much more than a little painting and my family."

Joan McPherson, he says, is a "sexy lady" who once refused to wake up with him and cook breakfast. A hypnosis session with her resulted in ham and eggs for McPherson for quite some time--until she read in a

Carter: Congress Buckling

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Carter is complaining that Congress appears to be buckling under pressure, endangering his proposed gasoline import fee and the goal of a balanced federal budget.

"It does require political courage in the Congress and executive branch," Carter said Thursday to a group of businessmen at the White

He said oil imports are down 12 percent so far this year, and he said the fee which would raise gasoline prices 10 cents a gallon - is needed to continue that trend.

fact, he said, congressional leaders urged him in March to take the action. The idea is not so popular "now, he acknowledged, but he said failure to impose the fee would lead to even higher prices for imported oil.

In addition, he said, "It will tend to make our allies and other major consuming nations reverse, perhaps, or stop their additional commitment to intense conservation measures. It's a small price to pay.

As Carter was speaking to the businessmen, the House Ways and Means Committee was postponing until next. week its efforts to stop the president from imposing the

A U.S. District Court judge in Washington ruled earlier this week that Carter overstepped his authority in trying to make the fee apply only to gasoline, and a hearing on the White House appeal of that ruling has been set for the first week in

Carter also told the businessmen that political pressures of the election year are "working counter" to steps he and Congress agreed upon to reduce in-

defuse world tensions. Muskie, on his first diplomatic foray since succeeding Cyrus Vance as secretary of state last week, predicted Thursday that his talks with the Kremlin's. foreign affairs chief will be a "diplomatic minuet" that is not likely to yield any significant changes in Soviet

Muskie-Gromyko The session will be the first Cabinet-level meeting of U.S. and Soviet officials since the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan last December chilled relations between the superpowers.

The two men will meet after attending ceremonies here marking the 25th anniversary of the end of the post-World War II Allied occupation of Austria. Their talks are expected to focus on a new Afghan peace plan proposed Wednesday by the pro-Soviet government in Kabul, and the world peace initiative raised Thursday by

DES-Treated Cattle May Be Slaughtered

WASHINGTON (AP) - Commercial slaughter can resume this weekend of some of the hundreds of thousands of cattle illegally treated with the cancer-causing drug DES, federal officials say

"The packers have been wanting cattle, and the 41-day withdrawal period for some is just about over." said Dr. Wallace Leary, livestock slaughter officer for the Agriculture Department. "The first 41-day cattle will be ready May 16 or 17.

After finding seven weeks ago that some 70,000 head in five states had been illegally treated with the growth stimulant, the USDA and the Food and Drug Administration immediately 'ordered at least a 41-day delay before slaughter so the drug residue could be

Through April, the total number of affected animals soared to more than 400,000 in 21 states, and the FDA say that is still finding cattle that have been treated with DES.

Agnese Might Try **Politics Once More**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Spiro Agnew says he just might try a little more politics.

Agnew made his comments in a television interview Thursday night, nearly seven years after resigning as Richard Nixon's vice president to avoid trial on income tax evasion charges.

"Can you think of a better way to rehabilitate your image than to be elected again to something?" Agnew said in the ABC interview.

He also suggested he might accept an appointment from Ronald Reagan if the former California governor is elected president.

"I'd like that." he said, adding that he has talked with Reagan but giving

But he also said, "If I were to go back into politics, it will be to run for something, not to be appointed to something.

Coast Guard Wards Off Refugees

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) - Coast Guard reinforcements have been dispatched to help shut off the "Freedom Flotilla" of Cuban refugees amid reports that some unwilling U.S. skippers were being forced at gunpoint to carry refugees from a Cuban port.

The Coast Guard late Thursday

dispatched 400 active and reserve Guardsmen, six cutters, nine aircraft, six utility boats and 14 boating safety detachments to South Florida.

'We're going to have half the Coast Guard down here." said quartermaster Lou Merck, duty officer at the Coast Guard Station in Key West.

Merck said a handful of boats were known to have left Key West Thursday for the Cuban port of Mariel, despite warnings of seizures and stiff fines if they returned with refugees.

Court Backs Communes

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -The California commune, a species that proliferated in the 1960s and became endangered in the '70s, has The court, which split 4-3, won some protection from the state Supreme Court.

The court ruled Thursday that a "family" of 12 unrelated adults, including a lawyer, a real estate broker and a graduate student, can continue to live together in a 24-room house in Santa Barbara, where they share expenses and chores and eat

City officials had attempted to break up the group, citing a city ordinance that says no more than five unrelated persons can live in single-family houses in certain neighborhoods.

The ruling could invalidate

similar ordinances in at least 36 other California cities, including Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego.

said the ordinance violated the California Constitution, which guarantees the rights of "enaoying life and liberty." possessing property, and "pursuing and obtaining ...happiness, and privacy.

The right to privacy, the court said, includes "the right to live with whomever one wishes, or at least, to live in an alternate family with persons not related by blood, marriage or adoption."

The city said the ordinance was aimed at limiting population density and maintaining an environment suitable to family life.

The Supreme Court said density could be regulated by ordinances governing the number of persons allowed in a given floor space and that solice already had the power to regulate noise and

morality. The Supreme Court said it was not addressing the question of how many people should be allowed in one

A dissent by Justice Wiley

Manuel said a recent U.S.

Supreme Court ruling had

upheld a similar ordinance. The challenge to the law was brought by Beverly Adamson, who bought the house in 1977, and two of her tenants. They said the ordinance violated their right to privacy and their right to live with whom they chose.

The city obtained a preliminary injunction in Santa Barbara Superior Court in 1978 requiring compliance with the ordinance and a Court of Appeal upheld that order in 1979. Ms. Adamson and the tenants appealed the rulings to the Supreme Court.

Ms. Adamson was not immediately available for comment, but her attorney, Ben Bycel, praised the ruling. He said cities "have no business in these times of tough real estate markets to have ordinances like this."

There was no Ann Landers to write to in those days and no guidance counselors. It would never have occurred to me to turn to a family friend. Questioning my mother's conduct would have been interpreted as criticism. The fact that "Heartsick" wrote to you is a good indication that she will achieve a far better understanding of her father's mental condition earlier than I did. Small Talk

You can't hear a mockingbird singing when you stop at a traffic light in just any city. I'll bet, but this week, waiting for the light to change at Main and Third I kept hearing what I first supposed to be a recorded song advertising

When I looked up: there was a real live mockingbird perched on a TV aerial on top of a building, singing as heartily as though he were swaying on a tree branch.

Talking about the "Save Buffalo Lake" campaign the other day. Marn Tyler was remembering pleasant outings there only a few years ago, when the whole family would go over for a picnic lunch, relaxing in cool shade of the trees around the lake, maybe fishing from the bank and splashing in the water for a lot of fun even without a boat. She says she sympathizes with wildlife, but "I want them to save the lake for people, not just the ducks!"

Bugs are not real entertaining subjects, but my experience with some this year might help someone who finds that hundreds of little red and black things that look to me like flying beetles, have suddenly appeared at their

New kinds of bugs are always showing up in this country, so I wasn't surprised when I saw them on a vine on the back porch last fall. I used some spray recommended for all sorts of insects, and it seemed to kill the ones it hit but they came back redoubled.


So I waited for a freeze to kill them; it didn't, not even well into the winter and they were staying under the house and even getting inside, also crawling around in the grass on warm days. I took some to Juston McBride, who didn't know what they were either, but sent them to an Extension Service entomologist at Amarillo.

Not hearing of anyone else invaded by the bugs I hoped they were localized at my place, but at the Hereford Garden Club's plant sale I found that some of the women had discovered the same insects, again by thousands, around the Garden Center building.

So maybe they are a problem to others, who might be interested in what the entomologist. Carl Patrick, said.

His good news is that they do no actual harm in the house, they are just a nuisance. The bad news is that they do damage the leaves of boxelder, maple and fruit trees. They are called boxelder bugs.

Crude Oil Supplies High

NEW YORK (AP) -Crude oil supplies are at an all-time high and refineries are cutting back production because they can't find enough customers, but that won't mean lower prices at gasoline prices will go up this summer anyway.

The increases, however, could be tempered for part of the summer by price wars in parts of the country .particularly in New York. Washington and sections of the Midwest - one analyst

The retail price will rise about one cent per gallon each month, predicts Dave Knapp, an analyst with the Economics Group of Chase Manhattan Bank. He assumes there will be no unexpected changes in the production or pricing of foreign oil.

There are several reasons the impending glut is notexpected to reduce prices. For one, gasoline prices

traditionally rise in . the summer, when driving increases.

Another is that, even with slackening demand overall, the price of crude oil is not . going down. Saudi Arabia the gas pump. Analysts say has just raised the price of its oil to \$28 a barrel, bringing it closer to the prices of \$30 and up charged by other members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries. There are 42

gallons in a barrel.

And the federal government is gradually removing price controls on domestic oil, allowing those prices to rise to world levels. "No one can say for sure

what's going to happen, but . the underlying cost of making gasoline will continue to go up because, in part, of the government's decontrol program," said Gary Ross of the Petroleum Industry Research Foun-

President Carter's effort to impose a fee of 10 cents per gallon on gasoline has been stymied for the moment, but gasoline prices would of course go up again if he

succeeded in imposing that fee. It has been blocked by a judge and faces stiff congressional o opposition.
