Big Decrease in Cattle.

Amarillo Daily News.—The H. C. Harding Commission Co., of this city, in its usual annual estimate on the available aged steers in the 41 Panhandle counties of Texas and tributary sections, gives the total number at 160,556. H. C. Harding, the senior member of the firm, says that a more careful canvas has been made this year than ever before.

There are 103,105 coming three and 57,451 coming four and up. Of the latter number 18,800 are cattle which were shipped back last year from the drought-stricken pastures of Kansas; also cattle owned by operators who will graze them in Kansas, all of which are off the market. This will further reduce the trade supply. As compared with the figures of January 1, 1913, there is shown a shortage in these ages alone of about 100,000 cattle. No estimate has been made on young steers or breeding cattle, but it is generally believed there is a still greater shortage of yearlings in this territory—both steers and heifers.

Baptist Calls Preacher.

Rev. Farmer of Higgins has been called by the Baptist church as pastor. He arrived in the city Wednesday and will occupy the pulpit next Sunday.

Meeting Still in Progress.

A recess was taken in the revival being conducted at the Methodist church till Wednesday, but a men's meeting Monday night, it was decided that the interest demanded that the revival be resumed at once. So services were held Tuesday night and every night this week. Some fifty additions have been made to the Methodist church up to date and a number have united with the Baptist and Presbyterian churches. The house has been filled every night. The meeting will continue over Sunday.

Minutes of Prohibition Democratic Convention.

In accordance to a call of State Chairman A. W. Walker, the Prohibition Democrats of Deaf Smith county met at the court house, on Saturday, February 14, 1914, at 3 o'clock in convention and there transacted the following business:

Judge C. D. Wright was chosen as chairman and A. C. Elliott as secretary.

Motion was made and carried that the convention of Deaf Smith county elect two delegates to attend the State Convention to be held at Fort Worth, on February 21, 1914, said delegates to be authorized to cast the entire vote of the county. Whereupon, W. E. Dameron and J. I. Walker both of Hereford were duly nominated and elected.

Motion was made and carried that the Deaf Smith county delegates be instructed to cast the vote of this county for the Hon. Thomas Ball of Houston and to continue to do so as long as they, in their judgment, think he has any chance of being chosen by that convention as the candidate of the Prohibition Democrats for governor.

Motion was made and carried that a second choice for candidate for governor be made. Whereupon nominations were made as follows: Cullen Thomas of Dallas, W. P. Lane of Austin, and William Mayes of Brownwood. The number of votes for the different nominees was as follows: Thomas 11; Lane 2; Mayes 3. The chair declared Mr. Thomas as the second choice of this convention and so instructed the delegates.

Motion was made and carried that the Deaf Smith county delegates be instructed to vote for any resolution which sought to allow "proxies" in the Fort Worth Convention where the delegates from any county have been instructed.

The convention then adjourned sine die.

Mrs. Bradley Buys Fine Young Bull.

Mrs. L. R. Bradley, proprietor and owner of the Bradley White Face herds and ranch has received from stock raisers in Missouri a very fine young Hereford bull. The animal comes from the very best grade of that kind of cattle, and is a perfect picture. The purchaser thought so much of the animal that she had him shipped by express, the charges being \$31.60. She paid the handsome sum of \$600.00 for this thoroughbred and registered animal.

Deep Well at Canyon.

Canyon, Feb. 13.—Will A. Miller of Amarillo has been in the city this week soliciting subscriptions for the prospecting oil well which is being put down northwest of the city. A contract with D. L. Hickcox for a well 2,000 feet will be completed this week and Mr. Miller is soliciting funds to put the well down to at least the 2,500 foot mark. He is confident that oil will be struck in paying quantities about 2,300 feet down.

Saturday afternoon Mr. Hickcox had but 20 more feet to go to finish his contract when the drillers had an accident that almost wrecked his outfit, doing \$700 damages. A wagon load of repairs came by express and work will be resumed and the contract completed this week. Mr. Hickcox is very hopeful that the work will be continued as he believes like Mr. Miller that all indications point toward paying oil before many more feet. \$17,000 have already been spent on the project.—Randall Co. News.

Texans Disregard Irrigation Law.

Little regard is being paid to the new general irrigation law of the last legislature by those interested in irrigation in the western and northwestern portion of the state, declares Maj. John Wilson, member of the state board of water engineers, who has just returned from an extended tour of inspection in that territory.

He says that he found considerable development in progress and approximately 200 persons, firms and corporations engaged in irrigating land, but none of them have as yet applied to the state for a permit as is required under the new law. This is in a measure at least, accounted for by the fact that the law gives all such water consumers until July, 1914, in which to file their applications and get their permits from the board.

Maj. Wilson found many thousands of acres of fertile land susceptible to irrigation, but the people he says, appear not to be familiar with the requirements and provisions of this new statute.

During his absence he visited Elephant Butte, where the federal government is engaged in the construction of a gigantic dam, which, when completed, will provide irrigation for 85,000 acres of land in Texas, Mexico and New Mexico.

Buys Fine Jack.

J. H. Harris received by express this week a fine Jack from Junction City, Ky., at the fancy price of \$750.00. It is said the knowing animal kept the time of day correctly while en route, braying at the exact hour of 4 o'clock in the morning and 12 o'clock noon each day.

Drawing Would Constitute a Lottery.

Austin, Jan. 1.—Any scheme for the distribution of prizes by chance is held by the attorney general's department to be a violation of the law prohibiting lotteries. This question came from the district attorney at Amarillo, who wanted to know when a merchant gives to each customer buying 50 cents worth of goods a ticket bearing a number and a duplicate retained by the merchant, and at the end of three months the duplicates are placed in a box and a drawing is conducted for an auto, would that constitute a violation of the anti lottery laws. The department held it would.

Local Enterprises.

Many people in Hereford are not aware that the city has within its borders a modern machine and repair shop. While it was designed for automobile repair work, the equipment enables the shop to turn out repair and original pieces for all kinds of machines. A visit to the Hereford Garage will convince you. There will be found a large and powerful lathe upon which the most intricate and accurate work may be done. Another solidly built machine they call a "shaper." With this, all sorts of tooling, dressing and shaping is done. Then in addition, the shop has a drill press, power emery wheel, forges, and a general blacksmithing equipment. A gasoline engine furnishes the power for all these machines. One thing which is a very useful accessory to the shop is an air compressor, operated by the engine. This enables the proprietors to furnish free air to their customers and it is "on tap" at all times. Only expert workmen are employed and the shop has turned out some quite intricate work. Their large concrete building is a sort of auto sanitarium where the "lame and halt" are made to run. The proprietors, J. W. Barnett and C. H. Dyar, are ever ready to talk auto and to help you out of your "tire" trouble.

Court House Trees Trimmed.

The court house trees have been undergoing a severe pruning this week, a number of men being on the job. Nearly all of the trees have been topped and pruned. Where they were too thick, the trees were taken up and transplanted in some needed place. The fine setting of blue grass will thus have a better chance to grow as the shade was too much last year. The limbs taken from the trees made a large pile of wood and was sold by the commissioners for stove wood.

The special lectures being given at the prayer meeting at the First Christian church by Rev. Faris are attracting considerable interest. A good congregation was had Wednesday at the first lecture. After the prayer meeting a social half-hour was spent. Light refreshments were served.

Chamber of Commerce Meets.

At a call meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last Friday afternoon, some important work was taken up. In the absence of J. I. Walker, president, L. Baskin acted as chairman. One of the things was the discussion of an overall and shirt factory. The Chamber has a proposition from an Illinois concern to move a factory to Hereford. If the deal can be effected, some 30 people will be employed from the opening of the factory. A committee composed of Geo. Stambaugh, D. R. Gass and F. H. Oberthier was appointed to take up the proposition.

At the same meeting two other important committees were appointed: one on the general legal status of the old defunct railroad and composed of F. T. Roloson, J. P. Slaton and W. M. Knight; the other on the right-of-way and composed of J. S. Jones, D. F. Ashbrook and F. T. Roloson. Still another committee composed of J. Frank Potts and W. S. Higgins to make investigation of any parties who many contemplate building a road into Hereford. These committees are at work and will be ready for a report at the next meeting which will likely be held next Monday or Tuesday.

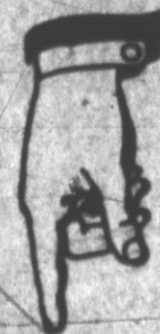
