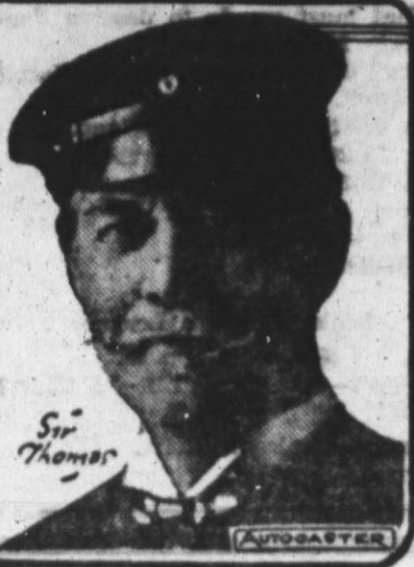
The long continued wet weather has been a great hindrance to the work on the new school building. The roof is not all on yet but Supt. Moore is proceeding with the work of plastering.

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RED CROSS ADVANCING IN HEALTH CAMPAIGN

Extends Service to New Fields and Brings Healing Hope to Remote Sections.

"The supreme opportunity for leadership" for the American Red Cross is its health service. Thus a committee made up of prominent physicians, sanitarians and public health experts after months of exhaustive study, reported and urged that not only should the Red Cross continue its present service, but should undertake a comprehensive educational campaign along public health lines.

The annual report of the American Red Cross, just issued, discloses that it has grasped this opportunity in the fields of public health nursing, instruction in home hygiene and care of the sick, nutrition work, first aid to the injured and in water life-saving.

Health service is fundamentally, historically and practically an important function of the Red Cross, and each year marks its extension into new fields and along broader lines. In the Red Cross Nursing Service there are enrolled nearly 40,000 nurses, 20,000 of whom served during the World War.

The benefits derived from meals balanced to meet each person's peculiar needs is winning widespread recognition through the work of the Red Cross Nutrition Service, particularly in the schools.

CONTINUED RAINS BREAK ALL PREVIOUS RECORDS: CROPS WILL BE DAMAGED

Hanlan Awarded \$3,500 Damages In Federal Court

J. W. Hanlan, who formerly lived between Hereford and Summerfield, obtained judgment for \$3,500.00, as actual and exemplary damages, against C. C. Rockwell and Omer Baker of Hereford, in Federal Court at Amarillo Wednesday.

Hanlan sued Rockwell and Baker for alleged wrongful conversion of personal property, belonging to Hanlan, which, he claimed, he delivered to Rockwell and Baker, to be by them sold and paid on an indebtedness owed Mrs. Britain, et al, others.

Hanlan claimed that a short time after the death of F. H. Britain, Rockwell and Baker came to his place and told him that a mob was being formed in Hereford to do him some violence, and that they would protect him from the mob, and advised him to turn his personal property, a considerable portion of which was mortgaged to secure the Britain debt, to be sold and paid on the debts and leave the country.

Hanlan claimed that he believed their statement in regard to the mob, and for that reason turned the property over to them to be sold by them, and paid on the debts, but claimed that their representation as to the mob was false and fraudulent and for that reason sought to recover actual and exemplary damages from Rockwell and Baker, they having sold the property and applied the proceeds as a payment on debts Hanlan owed Mrs. Britain and other people in Hereford.

Hanlan was represented by Amarillo attorneys, and Rockwell and Baker were represented by Carl Gilliland and W. B. Russell of Hereford.

Young People Celebrate Hallowe'en by Big Party in Ray Barber's Barn

The most elaborate and pretentious social event yet attempted here this season was the Hallowe'en party and dance given by the young people of the community at the Ray Barber barn, just across the Tierra Blanco, last Tuesday night.

Mr. Barber's splendid barn was beautifully decorated by the ladies for the occasion, the decorations conforming to Hallowe'en customs.

ROADS ALMOST IMPASSABLE. PRAIRIES ARE VERY SOFT

A total of thirty and a quarter inches of rain has fallen in Hereford since January 1, up to Friday morning, November 2. Of this amount twenty three and five hundredths inches fell up to October 1. During October the precipitation amounted to six and eight tenths inches.

This record is shown on the gauge at the First National Bank. The greater part of this trade territory, however, has received much more than this figure, as Hereford missed several hard rains this fall that fell in the vicinity.

The average rainfall for this section over the years is something over twenty one inches. The year 1923 will break all recorded rainfall figures since the government began to keep figures on it in 1880.

Business, both farming and commercial, has been absolutely stopped by it. The roads are almost impassable, the fields are quagmires, the prairies so soft that the cattlemen are stumped. There is a large acreage of feed and cotton in the fields, some of the row crops on the ground, and the farmers are watching it deteriorate while the rain continues its steady downpour.

RED CROSS MET TEST IN JAPAN FUND DRIVE

Spirit of Service Demonstrated in Readiness for Nationwide Activity.

When President Coolidge by proclamation designated the American Red Cross as the medium through which contributions for relief of the Japanese earthquake sufferers should flow, the President's desire came as an order to the Red Cross.

This emergency test demonstrated the peace-time readiness of the Red Cross to cope with stupendous tasks in behalf of humanity.

President Coolidge, in expressing his thanks to the people, said: "When the news of the tragedy in Japan first reached us, the American Red Cross, pursuant to a proclamation, asked the country for \$5,000,000 to meet the great emergency."

The work of the Red Cross for Japan is expected to influence a very large enrollment of new recruits during the Roll Call, which starts Armistice Day.



AMERICAN ROYAL SHOW
The justification for increasing the capacity of the American Royal Show Building at the Stock Yards twenty-five percent over that of the new building opened last year is shown in the totals of the entries that will make up the breeding class sections American Royal week, November 17 to 24. An average of twenty-five per cent increase in entries of breeding live stock over 1922 is shown in the huge building with its eight acres of floor space.
Hereford Cattle lead in the 1923 show list with 338 head entered, more than twenty-five per cent increase over 1922, which was the largest Hereford cattle showing ever staged at any time or place. Breeding best Short Horns entered in 1923 total 310 head, the largest number ever entered in any American Royal. Fifty-five milking Short Horns are entered, the first time this breed has ever been shown at the American Royal. Aberdeen-Angus total 174 head, a substantial increase over 1922. Twenty-five Galloways will be shown this year, making a grand total of 1903 Pure Bred Cattle.
In the swine section, the Spotted Poland Chinas lead with 221 head

entered; Poland Chinas are second with 196 head; Hampshires third, with 140 head; Chester Whites fourth, with 136 head; and Duroc Jerseys fifth, with 146 head entered. Ninety-one Berkshires complete the open class swine show with a total of 902 swine.
The Sheep division will have 375 head.
Entries on the car lot cattle, swine, and sheep show do not close until November 10, so the totals in these sections cannot be arrived at as yet.

110 DISASTERS IN YEAR ENLIST RED CROSS AID

Nearly \$400,000 Spent in United States—Greek Refugee Work Completed.

For its preparedness to render relief through effective and generous aid to the sufferers from disaster the American Red Cross is universally regarded as the one organization from which response to appeal for help is immediate. In the last year, according to the annual report of the Red Cross, its disaster relief operations were carried out in 110 localities in the United States. This work, with activities carried over from the previous year, required the expenditure in the United States of \$397,463.04 by the American Red Cross; its Chapters and Branches. In the emergency following the defeat of the Greek forces in Turkey and the burning of the city of Smyrna, which entailed the relief of nearly 900,000 men, women and children, Red Cross National Headquarters expended \$2,805,696.09. The food distributed in Greece aggregated 25,000 tons; garments, 509,000; blankets, 45,550; new shoes, 5,000 pairs; medical, hospital and sanitary supplies, 204 tons. In the feeding of the refugees there was listed upwards of 22,000 children under three years of age.

The disasters in the United States during the past year reported 240 persons killed, 931 injured, 12,691 rendered homeless. The total property loss was estimated at \$20,710,000.

Relief of suffering caused by disasters of such magnitude as to overwhelm the resources of the communities in which they occur is fundamental to the charter of the American Red Cross. In addition to making appropriations from its treasury and assigning trained personnel to relief work, the Red Cross in disaster centralizes and makes more effective relief funds and supplies contributed by the country at large.

Since 1881 the Red Cross has administered more than \$20,000,000 for the single purpose of disaster relief. That it may continue to accept the responsibilities which grave emergencies place upon the American Red Cross appeal is made for a nationwide renewal of membership during the annual roll call, which opens on Armistice Day, November 11, and closes on Thanksgiving Day, November 29.

O. G. Hill of Hereford was a business visitor here Tuesday.

W. C. Crews has sold his farm to A. O. Drake. He sold his personal property at public auction Saturday and expects to depart in the near future for South Texas, where the family will locate. The move is made largely on account of Mrs. Crew's health.

A. C. Young, who now lives on A. N. Wentworth's farm north of town, and his brother, Woodson Young, have rented the James farm southeast of town and will move there and cultivate it next year. F. W. Perry has rented the Wentworth farm and will move his family there in the spring.

Prof. Dougherty, who is an expert musician, has consented to give private lessons in music and to serve as instructor for a band or orchestra if one can be organized here. Ten persons have already signified their desire to

become members and a meeting has been called for Thursday night as an effort to secure additional members.

Friona now offers a splendid opening for a good black smith since Mr. Perry quit the trade and has gone to truck driving and farming. F. M. Woodson, who now has the shop leased, not being a practical black smith, turns his attention mostly to garage work.
