HOSPITAL FACTS

The hospital can be built without increasing taxes.

The improvement tax of 20e on the \$100.00 now being levied, if continued during 1924 and 1925 will take care of a hospital bond issue and also take care of the county debt.

A reduction of the improvement tax to 16c on the \$100.00 levied for the years 1926, 1927 and 1928 will continue to take care of the hospital bond issue and the out-

standing county debt. In 1929 the last court house warrant will be paid leaving only the hospital warrants charge-able gainst this improvement fund and the tax can then be reced to 5c on the \$100.00.

HOSPITALS IN OTHER PANHANDLE COUNTIES



The Lubbock Sanitarium is a larger building than the one contemplated at Hereford and cost, with its equipment, about \$150,000. But it gives an idea of what a county hospital is and what other Panhandle counties are doing for their sick. This building is two stories and basement, built of brick and fireproof throughout. Capacity is forty beds and boasts a complete X-Ray and Pathological laboratory. They also have a training school for nurses, with about twenty-five nurses at work. This institution is now arranging for the addition of two more stories to the building and an increase in capacity to eighty-five beds.



The number of prescriptions filled n all the states reached a total of 11,268,469, the total amount of whisky prescribed being 1,347,573 gallons.
