The principal gains are in interior space, beauty and harmony appointments, and provision passenger safety, convenience for and comfort, Such established advances as Fisher no draft ventilation and all-stient all-steel bodies are continued, as is safety glass, all around in all models, at no extra cost.

Rear seats have bee widened to 47 inches, a two-inch increase assuring greater comfort for rear seat passengers. The improvement was effected by widening the rear wheel houses. In the front seats of the two-door models in the Master DeLuxe series, and in the seat of the Sport Coupe, the seat back is split down the center, permitting the back of either side to be folded down independently to facilitate rear seat entry and egress, but enabling three persons to ride comfortably side by side.

The driver's seat is adjustable over several inches' range, and it rises and tilts ahead slightly when in the forwardmost position, an arrangement which drivers of small stature appreciate, since it gives them greater visibility over the hood of the car.

#### **Color** Contrast

An important change in the interests both of safety and of convenience has been made in the construction of the front seats in all five-passenger models.
