A standard bed is equipped with 6 cotton sheets each 3 yards long, 6 pillow slips, 2 pillow covers to be used inside the slips, one quilted cotton mattress pad, one mattress slip cover and one cotton spring cover.

If a housewife runs short of household linens between regular washdays this probably means that she should buy more. Cotton is the material most often selected for towels, whether they be hand towels, bath towels, so called guest towels or cup towels, and wash rags, dish rags, and cleaning cloths.


