## Rain To Aid Wheat Drilling A rain, badly needed by farm-

ers who were short on moisture to sow fall wheat, ftll here last Friday night. In Hereford the rain guage showed 1.14 inches. This territory had been dry since a rain early in August. The rain, for the most part, fell slowly and was fairly general over this county. Amounts which fell varied but there were few instances where more than

an inch was registered. The moisture is expected to be of immediate benefit to row crops, besides preparing the way for fall wheat sowing. Some sowing has been reported already this week, chiefly in those districts which received the most mositure Friday night. In other places where small amounts of rain fell, wheat sowing is still being held up. Some farmers are waiting for the volunteer wheat to come up.

Pastures were also benefited by the rain.

The following reports have been received on the amount of rain received in various communities: Vega, .95 inch; Pro-Adrian, 1½ inches; and 1½ inches at Summerfield.
