Two Local Men Wounded in Leyte Fighting

Two Hereford boys, both veterans of almost three years of action in the Pacific, were recently wounded in action in the Philippines, according to a letter received this week by Mrs. J. B. Harlin from her son, Cpl. J. B. Harlin, Jr., who said that he and Lt. George Ercei Brashear had recently been evacuated from the Philippines.

Harlin stated that he had been wounded in the left leg and arm and that Lieutenant Brashear also suffered an arm wound. Harlin was previously wounded in action on Jan. 1, 1944, at Arawa, New Britain; and Lieutenant Brashear received a battlefield commission for his outstanding leadership in the New Guinea campaign. Brashear is a brother of Mrs. W. S. Rice of Hereford.

New York Boy Makes "One for the Book" In Texas Question

Rogers Receives Purple Heart

Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Rogers have recently received the Purple Heart, awarded to their son, Staff Sgt. Leo C. Rogers, who has been missing since Sept. 9, 1943, when he took part in a bombing mission over Italy. According to regular custom, the War Department has declared Sgt. Rogers dead, after he had been missing for one year; but actually the department has no official information on the fate of Rogers and other members of his medium bomber crew.

The citation accompanying Sgt. Rogers Purple Heart reads "for military merit and for wounds received in action, resulting in his death on Sept. 9, 1943."

The citation was issued on Nov. 25 in Washington and is signed by J. A. Ulico, adjutant general, and by Henry L. Stimson, secretary of war.

Govt. Fertilizer Ruling Believed Unfair to Area

Despite the continued efforts of County Agent A. R. Bateman and Congressman Gene Worley to get an allocation of sulfate of ammonia fertilizer for use by potato growers in this district, Federal Agencies have not yet agreed to put the Hereford potato district in the area where such fertilizer will be available. According to present rulings, ammonia sulfate will be available in Colorado and New Mexico, but will not be for sale in Texas; and Hereford potato growers claim that the ammonia is far better for their needs than the nitrogen base fertilizer which will be available here.

Though efforts still continue to get a change in the government ruling, County Agent Bateman pointed out this week that local growers might solve the problem by ordering fertilizer to be delivered at Texico. Returning Servicemen Send Special Telegrams

The Federal Communications Commission has approved a "homeward bound" telegraph service which will be offered to military personnel returning from overseas. It was announced this week by Miss Dorothy Nell Adams, local Western Union manager.

The new service, providing 15 fixed-text messages, will be available at certain debarkation hospital, reception centers through which men returning from overseas will pass, and separation centers from which they will receive their final military discharges. The messages may be sent at a special 25 cent rate to any Western Union destination in the United States.

Miss Adams stated that the "homeward bound" service will provide the first domestic fixed-text telegrams offered since the discontinuance of standard greeting messages in 1942.

Two criminal cases head the docket for immediate trial when the new session of district court convenes in Hereford on Jan. 31, it was announced this week by County and District Clerk Robert L. Thompson. Court activity will be greater this term, Thompson said, though the docket could not qualify as heavy. Nearly all the cases are new, with only a few hold-overs on the docket.

Both men and women who have been discharged from the armed service were reminded this week that the Civil Service Commission has stationed a veteran's federal employment representative in each regional and branch regional office of the commission and that this representative will assist veterans in finding their way into federal service if they desire a government job.

Thomas W. Saling is the representative at the Dallas regional office and is now ready to inform veterans of their rights and privileges with respect to employment in the Federal Civil Service.

The Veteran's Preference Act of 1944 insures that veterans, their widows and wives will receive preferential consideration, with disabled veterans receiving the highest possible preference rating.

Air Medal Given To Pilot, Now POW in Germany

(Editor's Note: The following story, received this week from an Allied Fighter base in France, concerns decorations received by Lt. R. L. Dowell, Jr., prior to his being reported missing in action in October. He has since been listed a prisoner of war in Germany.)

A 19th TACTICAL AIR COMMAND FIGHTER BASE, France—2nd Lt. R. L. Dowell, Jr., of Hereford, Tex., was awarded the Air Medal with first Oak Leaf Cluster "for meritorious achievement in 20 combat flights." The presentation was made by Brig. Gen. O. P. Weyland, commanding general of the 19th Tactical Air Command.

Lieutenant Dowell has strafed and dive-bombed marshalling yards, bridges and other military installations and has also escorted bombers on long range missions as a member of the pioneer P-51 Mustang Fighter Group which has set a fighter record in the European theater by destroying over 650 enemy planes in 11 months of combat operations.

He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Dowell, Sr., of Hereford, and his wife, Nona Deen, makes her home there with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Rose.

Heavy Circulation At County Library

With a circulation of 970 books for the five days that the library was open last week, the Deaf Smith County Library is looking forward to its heaviest circulation period during the time between now and April 1. Mrs. Clara McLean, librarian, says that past experience indicates that circulation will stay around 1,000 books a week during the next three months.

Though it is increasingly difficult to buy new books, and bindery service is very slow, Mrs. McLean points out that the library has been fortunate in being able to keep most of the best sellers and that within the past couple of weeks a large order of new books and reprints, covering a wide subject range, has been received to meet the increased reading demands.

There is as much or more reading in non-fiction as in fiction, the librarian states, and war books head the non-fiction list, with an increasing demand for serious books of other types. Ernie Pyle's "Brave Men" stays at the head of the non-fiction list; and true to expectations, "Forever Amber" is having a phenomenal run, with two requests received for the book for every one received for anything else on the fiction shelf.

Miracle Insecticide To Be Tried in County

A chance to experiment with DDT, the new "miracle" insecticide in treating lice and horn flies in cattle will come to County Agent A. R. Bateman, who says that the Texas Sulphur Company is sending him a small supply of the insecticide for experimental use.

Bateman plans to use some of the sulphur for treatment of lice in cattle and to save some to try on horn flies, when they make their appearance later in the year.

DDT has been used with much success by the army in cutting down many of the diseases caused by insects, ticks, lice, etc., and the new drug, though non-toxic to human beings and animals is said to be the deadliest insecticide yet compounded.

Bateman says this was the first county to experiment with the highly successful vegetable sulphur dip for cattle, and he is enthusiastic about the possibilities of the new sulphur insecticide.

E. C. Eubanks presided at the meeting and Fred W. Baird gave the treasurer's report, with subcommittee reports given by Mrs. Bob Wilson, chairman of home nursing; A. J. Schroeter, disaster chairman; Mrs. Clyde Cave, Junior Red Cross; Mrs. P. H. Gilliland and Mrs. Dorothy Ross, camp and hospital service; Mrs. H. A. Close, home service, and Mrs. Carl Gilliland, production chairman (a post which she has held in both World War I and II).

Mrs. Dyalthisa Brady, executive secretary, summarized some of the local achievements and pointed out the task which lies before Red Cross in the coming year.

Still Need Farm Specimens for Coming Exhibit

Stating that very little material has come in as yet, E. B. Posey, chamber of commerce secretary, again this week urged Deaf Smith County people to submit samples of agricultural products for use in the county exhibit at the Panhandle Industrial Conference in Amarillo on Jan. 24 and 25.

Any outstanding specimen of an agricultural product raised in the county can be used, Posey said. The exhibit specimens may be left at the office of the county agent, at the chamber of commerce office or at J. B. Elliston's office. Such products should be turned in by Jan. 20.

"We know that we will be able to find some good exhibit samples," Posey stated. "But we believe that some of our people have specimens about which we would not know; and if these samples are added to our exhibit it will prove much better, and therefore of more value to the county."

Joining the Army in 1939, Dixon was in the Field Artillery and the Signal Corps before transferring to the Air Corps. He arrived in Italy in January, 1944, and is authorized to wear the European-African-Middle East Theater of Operations ribbon and the Air Medal with three clusters.

Plummer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Plummer, Hereford, Tex., is an assistant squad leader in his unit. He is authorized to wear the European-African-Middle East Theater ribbon and the Good Conduct ribbon. He has been awarded the Army driver's medal.

Truck drivers in Plummer's organization have driven nearly 2,000,000 miles since being overseas, without a major accident. Last summer this truck company was cited by Brigadier-General George H. Beverley, former commanding general of the XV Air Force Service Command, for its operations in Africa and in Italy.

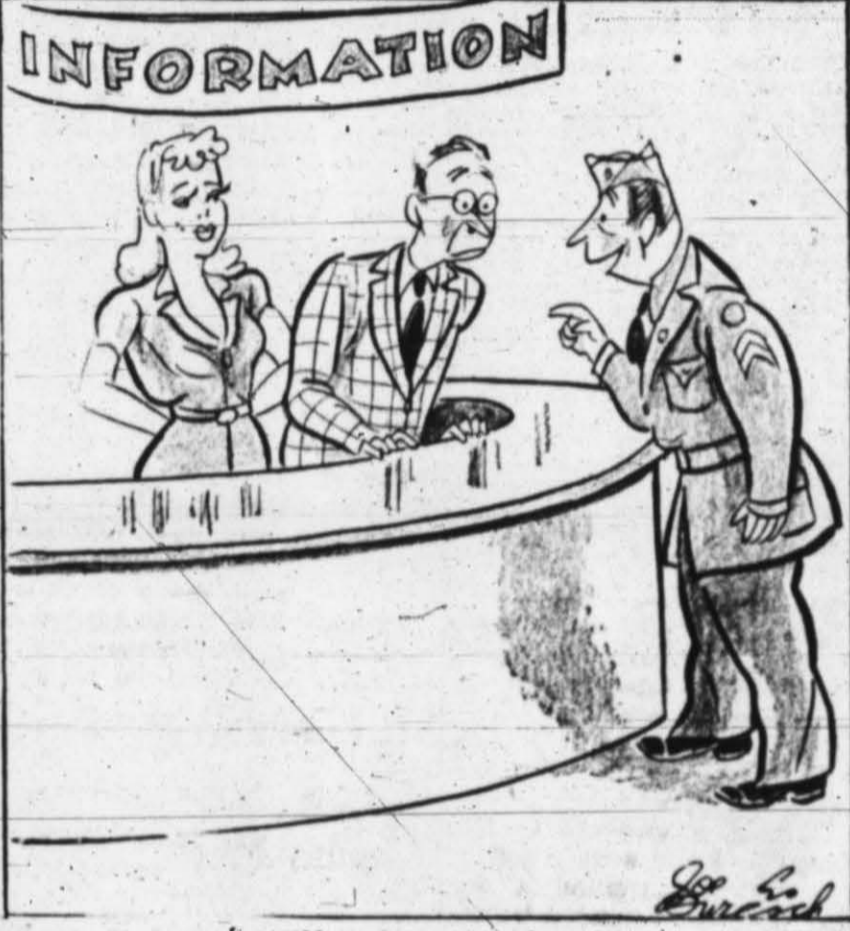

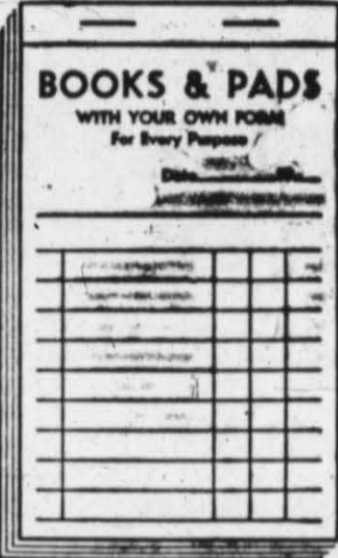

Under the present regulations, the ceiling price for all live barrows and gilts is \$14.75 per hundredweight and for all sows, stags and boars the ceiling is \$14.00 per hundredweight.
These ceiling prices are for Chicago only, and vary from market to market. The difference between the ceilings for sows, stags and boars, and for barrows and gilts is 75c at all markets, however.
Present support prices are as follows: "Good" to "Choice" barrows and gilts that weigh between 200 and 270 pounds have a floor price of \$12.50, Chicago basis. At terminal and interior markets other than Chicago, the support price is \$2.25 below the ceiling price (as of Nov. 15, 1944) at that market for hogs within the 200 to 270 pound weight range.
These support prices will remain in effect until June 1945.

What's Ahead for 1945?
Another new year starts, full of promise, and questions for American agriculture. Will the war end in 1945? How much food will Europe need from us? Will rationing and price controls be relaxed? What about the feed situation? These are but a few of the "ifs" we are up against when we make plans for the coming year. To help livestock producers, we here condense opinions recently expressed by War Food Administration economists.
CATTLE: They foresee for '45 an increase in the number of cattle and calves slaughtered, partially as a result of the tendency to reduce the size of herds. They also expect an increase in the number of cattle fed for slaughter. From 1946 to 1949, they expect a gradual decline in slaughtering, with yearly slaughter around 28 to 29 million head.
HOGS: Their estimate of total 1945 hog slaughter is about 79 million, against approximately 100 million in '44. They expect hog production in 1946 to be close to 1945 levels, depending on the feed situation.
SHEEP, LAMBS: Slaughter in '45 will likely be the smallest since 1929, due to recent selling of breeding stock. By 1946, they see a demand far exceeding the supply, leading to possible expansion of flocks over the following five years. This trend may be upset by wool-factor uncertainties.
