Traffic Rules To Be Enforced

Pointing out that observance of traffic rules has become increasingly lax in Hereford recently, City Marshal Edd Curtzinger this week announced stricter enforcement of all traffic regulations and requested the cooperation of drivers in observing safety rules.

Pedestrian right-of-ways have been clearly marked at all intersections in the downtown district, Curtzinger said, and drivers are asked to be careful to slow down in time to give the pedestrians right-of-way at these points.

Parking spaces have also been re-marked, and drivers are asked to park within those spaces. "Our downtown parking space is crowded," Curtzinger says, "and we cannot afford to waste several spaces in every block simply because drivers take up more than their share of parking space."

Curtzinger also warned against double parking, and reminded truck drivers that trucks are not supposed to be parked on Main Street.

"Our traffic is growing heavier all the time," the city marshal declared, "and we must observe regulations more strictly than we have in the past."

Veteran to Take Aviation Training

Lester F. Wagner, medically discharged after seeing battle service in North Africa and being wounded in the Tunisian campaign, this week became the first Hereford youth to take advantage of educational opportunities being made available to veterans.

Wagner, who held the rank of staff sergeant when he was discharged in October, 1944, after almost four years of army service, has been accepted by the Veterans' Administration for vocational training at a Dallas aviation school.

He is following up training which he received in the army as a radio man on a tank crew. The local Red Cross chapter handled Wagner's application for vocational training.

Local Board Issues Rules on Farm Slaughter

Because the OPA wants more meat channeled through federally inspected slaughter houses, restrictions will be placed on slaughtering of meat by non-federally inspected slaughterers and by farm slaughterers. It was announced this week at the local ration office. Only federally-inspected meat may be shipped across state lines, it is explained, and by moving meat into these channels, it is hoped to help solve the meat shortage which is serious in some parts of the country.

According to instructions received by the local board, all non-federally inspected commercial slaughterers must register with the local board and obtain a farm slaughter application (form R-315). This application must be approved by the district office and the permit received by the slaughterer by May 14, as no meat may be sold or transferred without this permit after the deadline date.

Farm slaughterers must also apply on Form R-315 and state the quantity of meat which they transferred during the calendar year of 1944. Generally speaking, the permit will be limited to the amount sold or transferred by the slaughterer in 1944.

Posey's letter of Apr. 17, he stated that he had been wounded in the right ear and the right leg by German bazooka fire, but that he was recovering from his injuries.

Sgt. Posey is a member of a reconnaissance group in a Ninth Army mechanized division. He has been overseas since September, 1944.

The Purple Heart Medal, which he received for his wounds, has been sent to his wife, whose home is in Crosbyton.

Present Notary Public Commissions Renewed By Secretary of State

In response to many inquiries received at the office of the county clerk relative to the commissioning of notary public whose commissions expire on June 1, County Clerk Robert L. Thompson announced this week that all persons now holding notary public commissions will be reappointed by the Secretary of State for the term beginning June 1, 1945 and ending June 1, 1947. All these persons will be notified of their appointments at the time and in the manner required by law, and they will have ten days from the date of such notice in which to appear and file their bonds and take the oath of office if they wish to qualify. However, the law requires that no bond be filed and no oath taken until June 1.

Persons not now holding notary public commissions and who wish to be appointed for the coming two year term should notify the county clerk of their wishes not later than May 15, 1945, in order that their appointments may be effected in time for them to qualify on June 1.

Because of a previous ruling by the attorney general that separate propositions must be submitted for the voting of bonds for waterworks and sewer extension, the bond issue previously approved by Hereford voters on April 10, must be re-voted and the election has been set by city officials for Monday, May 21.

Advising the city commission that it will be necessary to hold the election over, the attorney for the purchaser of the bonds pointed out that, in the past, the attorney general has refused to approve a similar issue to the one voted in Hereford last month. According to the attorney general's ruling in the previous case, two propositions must be submitted, one covering water works and the other covering the sewer system extension; as, according to the opinion rendered, combining the two "does not afford the voters an opportunity to freely express themselves."

The necessity of a second election, will not result in any delay in the actual improvements planned, officials state, pointing out that the City will continue with the proposed work on the assumption that voters will again favor the issue. It is hoped, however, that a greater number will express themselves that did so in the former election.

Mayor E. S. Ireland states that the city has, in the past, issued and sold both warrants and bonds, with the two combined for waterworks and sewer improvement purposes; and no legal objections have been (Continued on Page 12)

Tin Cans to Be Delivered to Amarillo Depot

Results in the tin can salvage drive in Deaf Smith County are still below expectations, it was announced this week by County Judge Fred W. Baird, who reminded Deaf Smith County people that cans may now be left at the sales pavilion, from where they will be sent to a salvage depot.

Arrangements have been made with the Amarillo Army Air Field for a truck to pick up the tin cans at the sales pavilion at the same time that salvage collections are made at the Hereford P. O. W. camp.

Cans should be taken to the south door of the sales pavilion, Judge Baird said, repeating instructions for the preparation of cans for salvage. Both the top and the bottom of the can should be cut out, and the can then mashed flat. Do not bring cans, unless they have been prepared in this way.

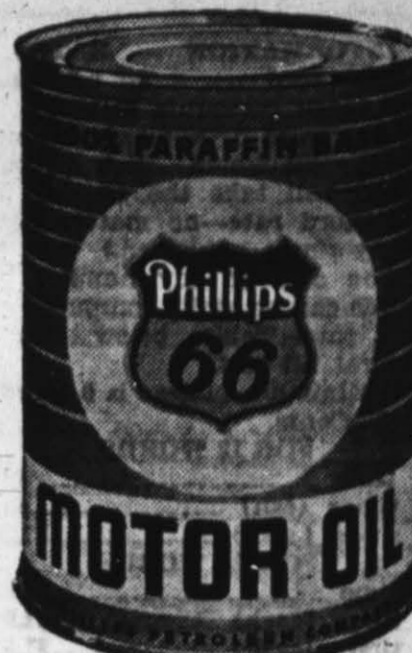

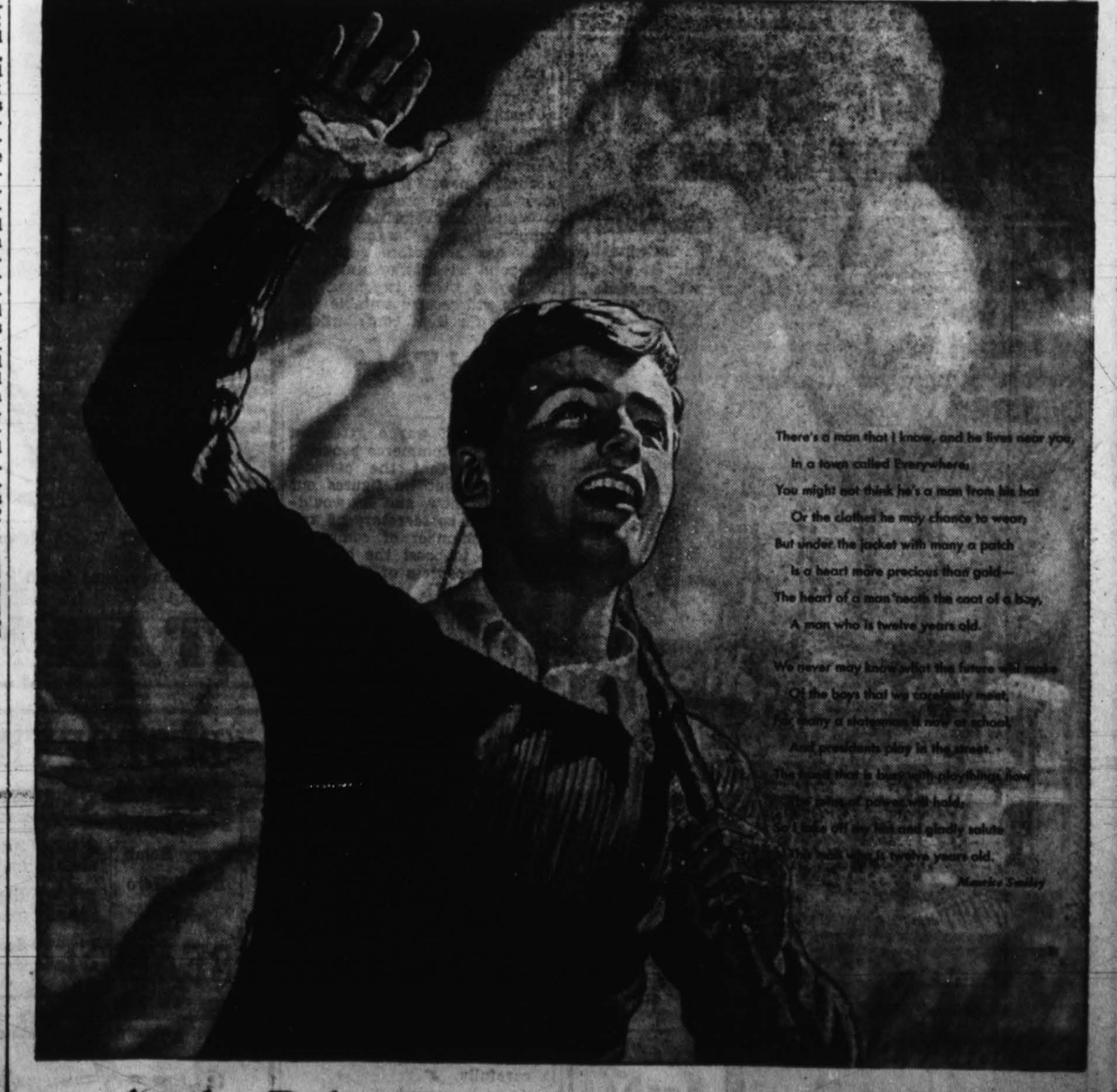

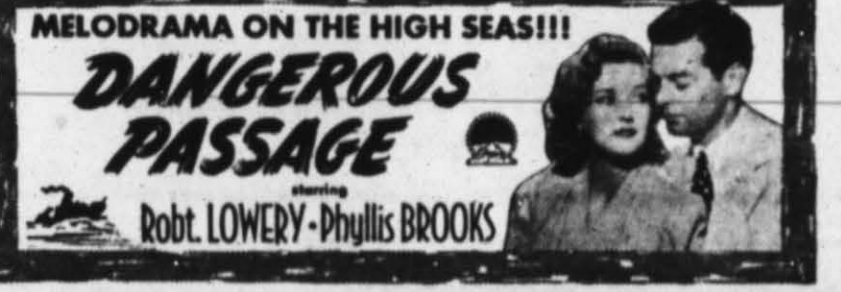
