Pointing out that observance of traffic rules has become increasingly lax in Hereford recently, City Mashal Edd Curtsinger this week announced enforcement of all traffic regulations and requested the cooperation of drivers in observing safety rules.

Pedestrian right - of - ways have been clearly marked at all intersections in the downtown district, Curtsinger said, and drivers are asked to be careful to slow down in time to give the pedestrians right-ofway at these points.

Parking spaces have also been re-marked, and drivers are asked to park within those spaces. "Our downtown parking space is crowded," Curtsinger says, "and we cannot afford to waste several spaces in every block simply because drivers take up more than their share of parking space."

You want your package to reach its destination—so wrap it carefully.


