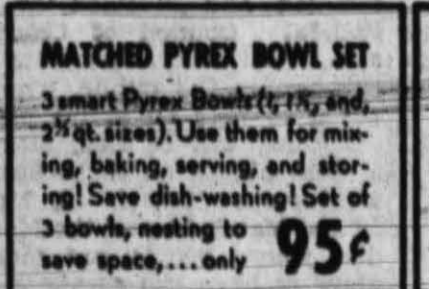

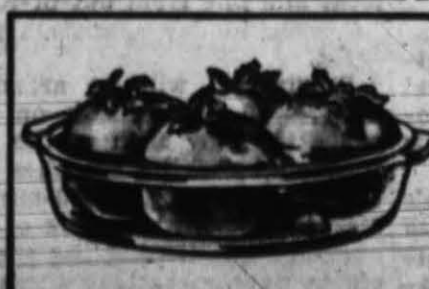

"Music of the Americas" Is Featured At Music Study Club Meeting Monday

She said in part—"One of the most encouraging things that has emerged out of this war-time stress, is the assurance of new unity between the American Republics. against the forces of aggression, and that in all the world North and South America are becoming the only havens for the musically oppressed, as well as guardians of the art of many lands."

Signs of Spring

THE days are still short; half the nation shivers under a blanket of snow—but there are signs of spring everywhere if you know where to look for them.

They are little things—such as new seed catalogs, ads clipped from magazines, reminders, scribbled on backs of envelopes, of things to be done.

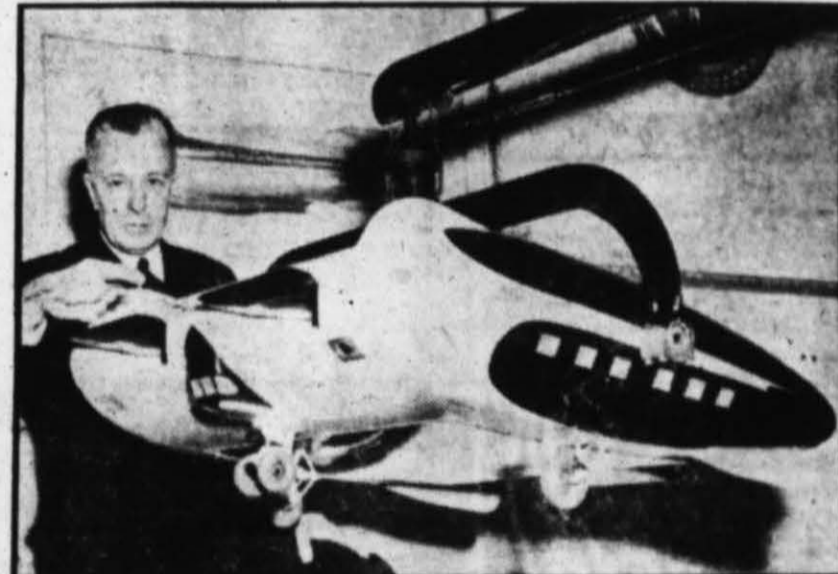

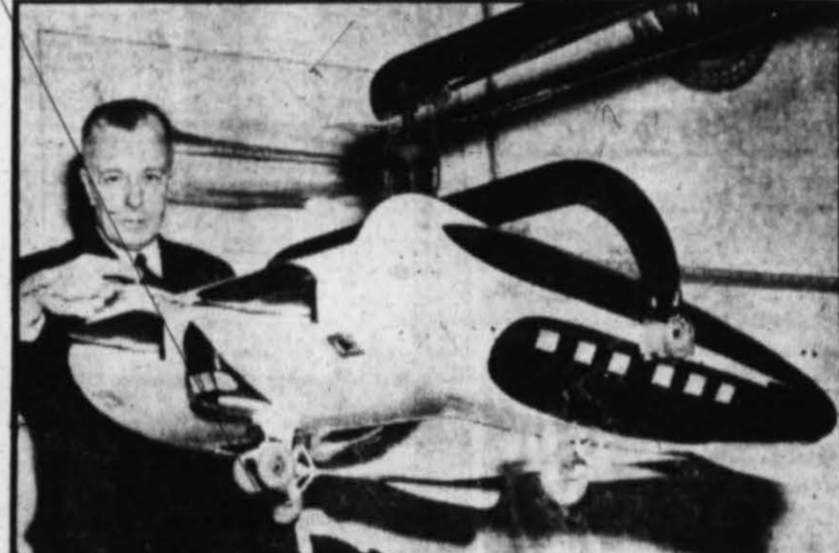

Americans Have Many Privileges; Don't Abuse Them

We, who are Americans claim and have many rights as citizens of our country, community, and school. We certainly cherish the foremost one of these rights and privileges, namely freedom. However, at times there are those among us who forget that our freedom extends only to the point it limits the freedom of some other citizen with as strong claims to those rights and privileges as we have.

Along with this privilege another that we cherish and exercise more than any other people on earth is the right to own property. We have the guarantee, by our government, that our property will remain unmolesated so long as it remains ours. We feel free to leave it unguarded and expect to return at any time to find it exactly as we left it. We also expect that same respect for public property, which in reality is cooperative property. However, the feeling that we own an interest in anything does not give us the right to deface or destroy it as that would certainly be intruding upon the rights of the co-owner.

There are two habits that many of us, as Americans, have developed that are contrary to our beliefs on this subject. Usually they are developed and practiced without our having given them serious thought. The first of these is carelessness, with both public and private property. Many times we carve, mark, or otherwise deface the property of others or of the school, community, and state. This would probably be eliminated by one serious thought on the matter of the rights of others.

The other habit is that of so-called practical jokes but probably should be renamed impractical jokes. Under this pretense we often do things to the great discomfort of another person and feel that we are entirely within our rights. Some times this is carried to the extent that the discomfort is costly to the victim either in time or money, and often both. Misplacing, disarranging, or damaging the personal property of another is surely carrying the joke too far. Often the practical joker is a person who could not "take it" if the joke were turned on him as often as he attempts it on some one else.

It can be seen that the extreme practice of either, or both of these habits could border on vandalism, a decidedly un-American activity. At this time, when materials are scarce, our friends are dying on the battle fields; and our civilians are sacrificing financially, all in the name of America, wouldn't it be well for everyone of us to be as truly American as we know how to be?

On March 2, 1836, Texas declared her independence from Mexico, but trouble had been brewing for a long time before that. In the early dealings with Mexico, the Mexican government had been liberal; but after a series of Revolutions in Mexico, the unfriendly people had power. It was their acts that led to the Texas Revolution.

The first shot was fired at Gonzales on October 2 in 1835. During October and December the Texas Army was victorious, and in December the Mexican Army evacuated Texas. They came back; and during March, Texas suffered many defeats, the Alamo and Goliad being two of the major losses. On April 21, 1836 the tide turned, and the Texas Army commanded by General Sam Houston attacked and defeated Santa Anna's army. The attack surprised the Mexicans. They fled in disorder. Texas was free!

The freedom of Texas led to her annexation. This led to the Mexican War and the acquisition of almost one-third the present area of the United States. So March 2 is a very important day for all Texans.

Red Cross Field Men Tackle Yanks' Problems Overseas

On Masera Island, up in the Persian Gulf, where there is not a single tree standing and the wind blows across the island ceaselessly, Red Cross field men brought fishing tackle, books and writing paper to service men. Most welcome gift for hair cutting—the boys had been without a barber for months.

In Persia, a Red Cross Field Director was able to locate a soldier's mother whom he hadn't seen for 25 years.

In Africa, Red Cross field men flew in Army planes, hitch-hiked in supply trucks, bumped in jeeps over bombed convoy routes, through blinding sand storms and glaring sun to help men with personal problems and emergency communications, and to deliver magazines and books, cigarettes and chocolate to isolated posts and bases.

In Italy, Red Cross field men accompanied the troops in on the invasion barges.

In India, a sergeant was sentenced to the guard house for disorderly conduct. His officer couldn't understand the boy's behaviour. He was a nice kid—he'd never gone to pieces before.

The officer asked the Red Cross Field Director to see him. The Red Cross man discovered a very worried boy. His wife had not been receiving his allotments, she wasn't well and needed an operation. She thought the soldier must have cancelled his allotments and a misunderstanding had arisen between them so that she was no longer writing him.

The field man got in touch with the Red Cross chapter in the boy's

home town immediately. It took care of her, financed her operation and saw that she had adequate funds to provide for herself until the allotment again came through.

When the Red Cross man explained what had happened to the soldier's Commanding Officer, the latter promptly released the boy from the guard house. From then on the boy was all right. His worries were over, and the Army had gained a good fighting man.

All over the world, in every theatre of war and active battle front go the American Red Cross field men—helping soldiers with major and minor personal problems, bringing them recreational items such as magazines, books, comfort articles, athletic equipment and re-establishing their contact with home. These men share the conditions and hazards under which the soldiers fight. They also share their lives. They are on call day and night whenever they are needed.

G.I.'s overseas have many problems. Often home seems very, very far away. With the Red Cross there at hand wherever he may be, the soldier knows he can always get in touch with home—that he need never feel alone with problems he doesn't know how to solve himself. More than 3,000,000 service men passed through Red Cross field men's offices last year.

On the mud clogged roads of Italy, through the far jungles of New Guinea, on lonely desert posts, Red Cross field men take your place beside your boy. In order to continue this service, the Red Cross urgently needs contributions from the American people to its \$200,000,000 War Fund drive this month.
