New Chemical Brings Death to Bindweed

A new weed killer that spells death to such weed pests as bindweed, dandelion, poison ivy, ragweed and chickweed, has been developed; and Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, county home demonstration agent, plans to give it a try in this county.

According to tests already conducted, the killer gets results on more than 25 weed varieties and one pound will kill the weeds on an acre of ground. The weed killer may be used between May 15 and Sept. 15, and should be applied in the morning, on sunny days, when the temperature is above 70 degrees.

The solution is non-poisonous and non-inflammable but the dead plants should not be burned, as the smoke will be poisonous.

Effect of the new weed killer is to turn plants to autumn colors and finally kill them. The chemical has no effect on other crops in the field.

The solution is being sold under a commercial name, and complete description of its action is contained in an article in the February "Better Homes and Gardens."

Tire Dealers to Keep Inventory Reports

Tightening of tire dealers record-keeping requirements and several other changes in the

tire rationing program, all designed to protect the nation's small supply of tires, were announced by the Office of Price Administration today.

Tire dealers will be required, beginning June 1, 1945, to maintain current records and to take a monthly inventory to establish accountability for tires and tire certificates.

Coupled with the recent cancellation of tire certificates dated before December 1, 1944, and a requirement that tire manufacturers turn in certificates monthly to OPA verification centers for screening, today's action completes a comprehensive program to stop illegal tire sales and transfers.

The new bookkeeping and inventory forms, together with detailed instructions on their preparation will be mailed soon to all tire dealers, copies will be supplied to tire manufacturers, dealers association, and OPA regional and district offices so that dealers failing to receive copies by mail may obtain them from one of these sources.

County's Waste Paper Into "Suits of Armour"

Residents of Deaf Smith county can supply enough waste paper for 24,223 "suits of armor" for 105 mm. shells, if they will buckle down and save an average of 10 pounds of newspapers, wrapping paper and boxes a month. The 105's are the big ones that have been helping American forces in their advance toward Berlin and Tokyo.

Last year Americans saved 108 1-2 pounds of paper per capita, or enough for about 35 containers each for the 105 mm. shells.

For each ammunition container or "paper suit of armor" used to protect the shells from salt water, dents, nicks and corrosive dirt, approximately three pounds of waste paper are required, according to W. J. Wardell, vice president of the American Can Company, which is manufacturing millions of the containers. Ammunition container board, one of the principal materials used in making the "suits of armor," is made from mixed paper and old corrugated boxes, Mr. Wardell said. Another material used is called "tube and can stock," which is made from all types of waste paper.

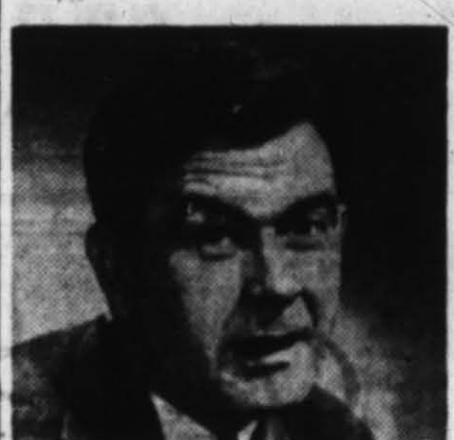

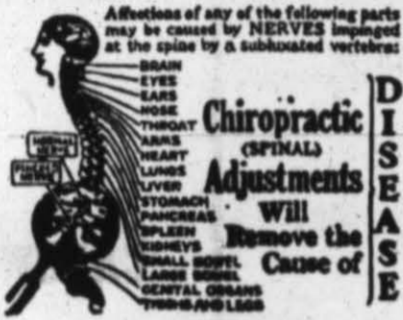

Red Cross Safety Course This Month

The annual Red Cross "First
Aid, Water Safety and Accident
Prevention Course" will be held
from May, 30 to June 5 at Rio
Vista, Ingram, Tex., and the
Deaf Smith County Red Cross
will send a delegate providing
an eligible person desires to at-
tend the camp.

There will be two sections of
the course, the first being for
training instructors of swim-
ming water safety and life-
saving. The second section will
be for the training of instruc-
tors in First Aid and Accident
Prevention.

To be eligible for the first
section, the applicant should be
18 years old, a good swimmer
and in good physical condition.
However, 17-year-old applicants
who satisfy all other require-
ments may be accepted.

To be eligible for the second
section the applicant should be
20 years old or hold a teacher's
certificate and be in sound phys-
ical condition. Participation in
the water safety course is pro-
vided for this section but is not
an absolute requirement.

Any person desiring to take
the course should leave applica-
tion at the local Red Cross Of-
fice in the court house Here-
ford.
