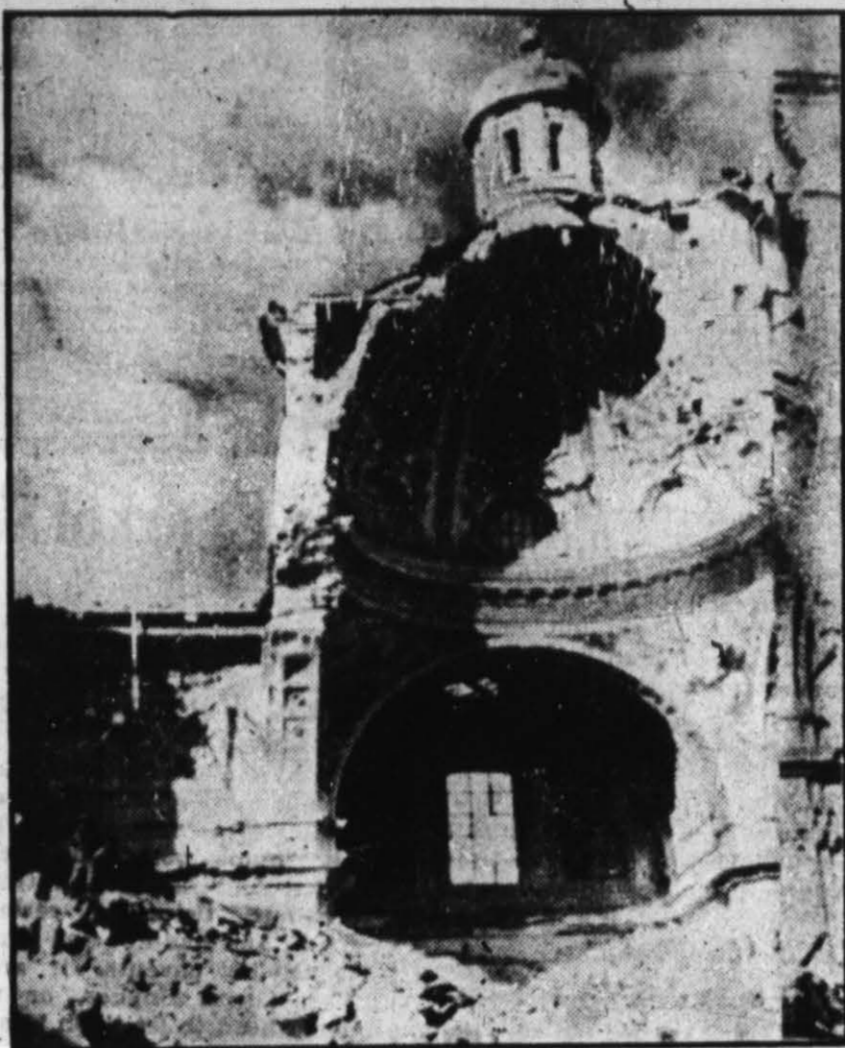

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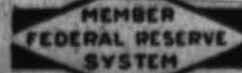

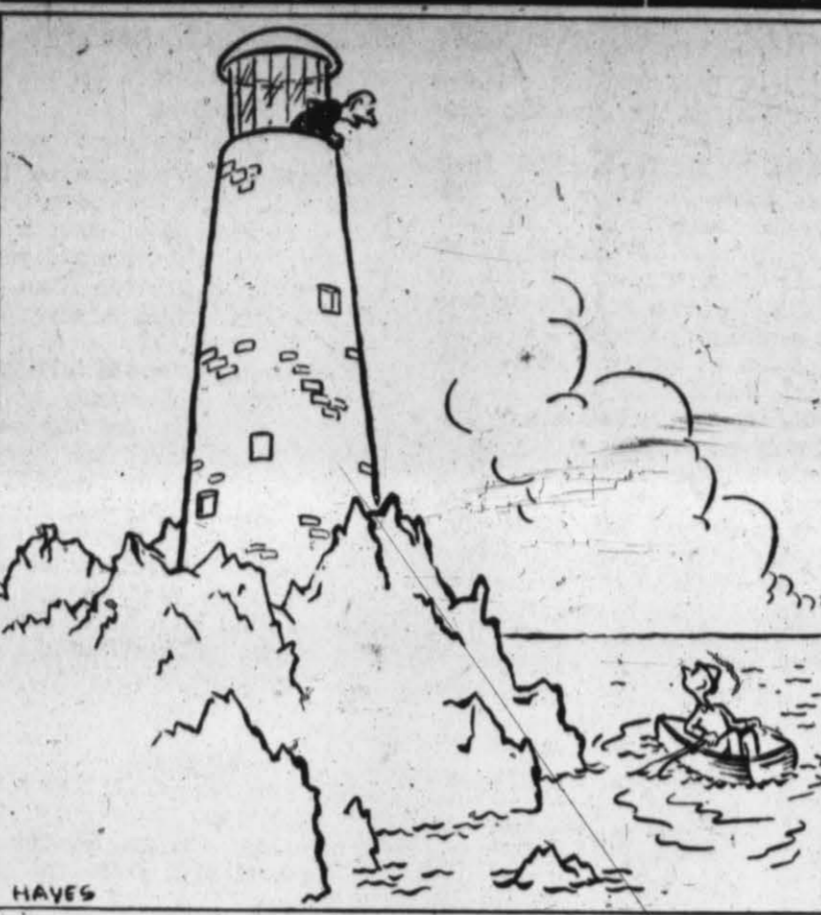
## Receives Pilot's Wings

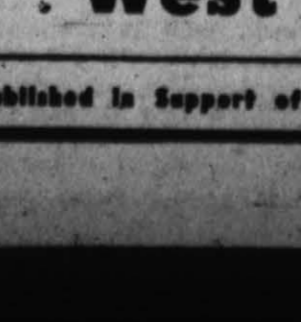

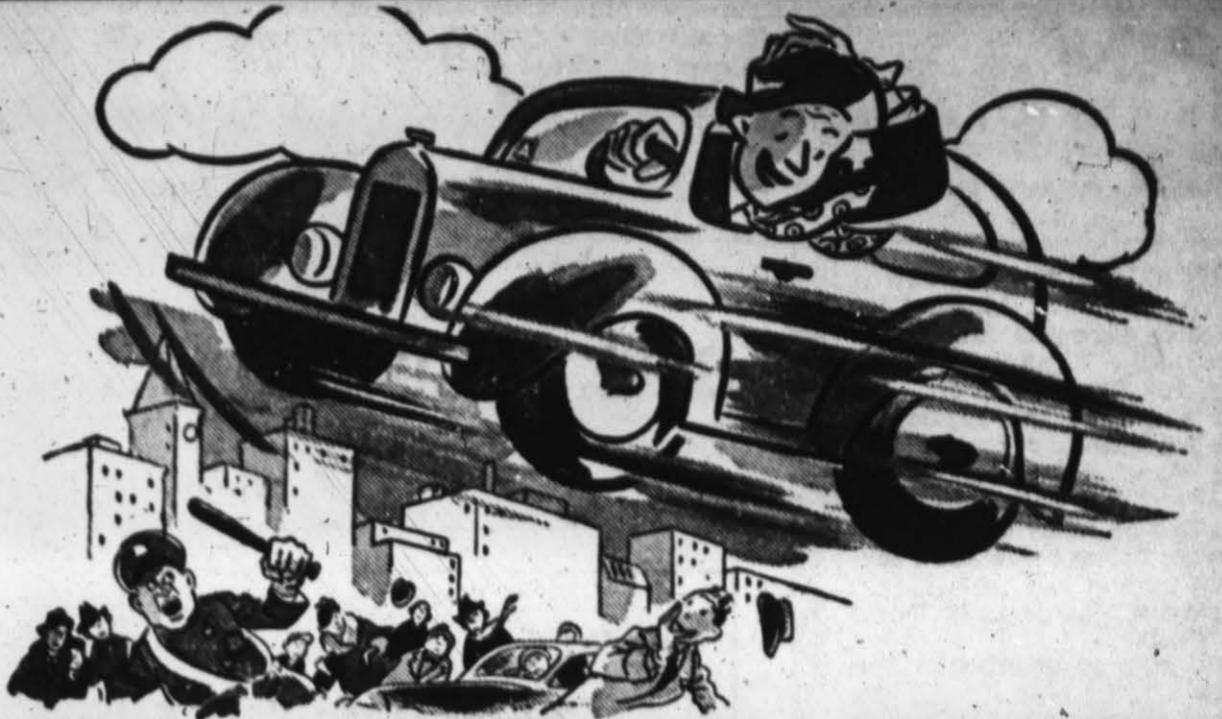

There is no substitute for strength of character in parents. One morally weak parent can undo the work of a strong parent.

## Texas Pioneer Celebrates at 89

Mrs. B. T. Bell, one of Hereford's oldest residents, celebrated her 89th birthday last Thursday. She was born in Brazoria County just 16 years after the Lone Star Republic had declared its independence.

She moved with her husband from near Austin to Dimmitt in 1904. He was a sheep raiser and farmer and farmed large tracts of land both in Castro and Deaf Smith Counties. Twelve years before his death he was injured in a fall and from then on he was unable to leave his wheelchair. All of those years he was nursed and cared for by Mrs. Bell.

She remembers four wars. In the Civil War her father, an old man, and her brother, just a youth, both served. Then came the Spanish-American war and in World War No. I her son James served as a scout with General Pershing. She has seven grandsons now serving in the present war.

When asked what had been her biggest thrill she replied, "It's all been thrilling" but she can tell some thrilling stories of her childhood and of trips taken with some member of the family for several years. One story (shades of meat points) had to do with splitting a beef open and dragging it along the ground before a prairie fire in order to stop the flames.

She attributes her longevity to her outdoor life and even though she cannot see or hear as well as in her younger days, she still spends a part of each day digging in her vegetable and flower garden. Now, her greatest hardship is not being able to read, but she says she has crocheted so much and so long that she can still do that without seeing.

Mrs. Bell is the mother of ten children, six of whom are still living. She resides with her

## "Texas Day" Is Featured By Bay View Club

A "Texas Day" program was featured at the meeting of the Bay View Club held Thursday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Marvin Boyd.

The current-events roll call was given by Mrs. Paul Mathers and Mrs. Knox Kinard.

Mrs. Mathers reviewed the book "Sure Enough-How Come" by Freida Van Emden, a native of Holland, who through a group of poems, describes the state of Texas as she sees it. The author cleverly describes in verse the people, their mannerisms, speech and customs, the weather, crops and the colored people of the state.

Mrs. Kinard gave an interesting excerpt from "Dear Tex" a weekly feature of the Dallas Morning News, and read two poems, "The Little Towns of Texas" by Clyde Walton Hill and Margaret Bell Houston's "Song From the Traffic."

Mrs. Henry Benson gave "Place Names in Texas" using J. Frank Dobie's "Straight Texas" as a basis for her discussion. She touched on the historical background of many of the cities of Texas and stated that the map of Texas is covered with names that tell stories of adventure, romance, plant-life, geological names and heroes. She told how the Spanish explorers gave so many rivers and streams their names, and how the features of the soil contributed to the names of places in the state. She recalled that many were named after the Saints and spoke of the many legends that have to do with rivers. She traced the names of many sites and places to the Indians and gave different versions of how the state itself got its name.

A paper on "Cross Sections of Texas Culture" prepared by Mrs. E. B. Hedrick, was read by Mrs. Knox Kinard, in which the vast land and water areas of the state were compared. She mentioned the Negroes who have played an important part in Texas history, told of their folk

songs and stories and of their spirituals, told of the Mexicans and Spaniards who have had an important place in Texas history since the day of the early Missions, and described some of the German colonies established in the early days. best eventual results. District May Act  
Emphasizing the fact that the problem of blowing land is a serious one for all farmers, County Judge Fred W. Baird states that many reports are being turned in to the Deaf Smith Conservation District.  
"Whenever a report is turned in, we immediately advise both the landlord and the tenant and urge that immediate steps be taken to stop the blowing," Judge Baird says. "In most cases, we believe that the farmer would rather do the necessary work himself than to have the conservation district bring in machinery, plow or list his land and then assess him for the cost."  
"Although the district will be forced to take action, if the individual farmer does not do his own work," Judge Baird states, "Our farmers for the most part know what ought to be done and they can do the job in the manner in which they prefer."

Just to make the "take" complete, Uncle Sam is going to tax the pocketbook itself. Ladies purses and Men's billfolds will carry a 20 per cent tax after April 1.
