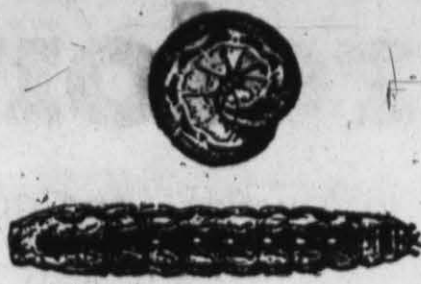
ing class, 1906. Her diploma was still in excellent condition.

See the July issue of "Better Homes and Gardens" for an excellent two page spread with the most up-to-date information on food preservation; however, because of the effect of Panhandle altitude on canning times, you'd better come by the office of the county home demonstration agent for a processing time chart designed to fit local needs.

The C. H. D. A. also has a maximum thermometer and a master gauge assembly for testing your pressure cooker—and food is entirely too precious to take any risks on a faulty cook-

er, so be sure your cooker is functioning properly. A small rental charge is made for use of the gauge and thermometer and you can get instructions for the use of this equipment at the office of the county home demonstration agent.

Plant Lice Plague Gardeners in County

Plant lice, which are the current plague of most victory gardeners in the county, come in three colors—green, black and orange—and have three names—aphis and aphid in addition to the regular "plant lice" designation. But any way you take them they are a menace to your garden, according to Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, who says that she has received garden trouble calls from Mrs. G. P. Owen, Mrs. Marvin Boyd, Mrs. Elmer Patterson and Mrs. Bub Newell within the past few days, and in every case the offending insects turned out to be plant lice.

Plant lice, says Miss Oliver, thrive on cool weather and therefore got a good start during the rains of a couple of weeks ago. While they can be knocked off plants with a hard stream of water, the best method to combat the pests is with a spray made of one teaspoonful of Black Leaf 40 (nicotine sulphate) to one quart or one-half gallon of water. The poison should be applied during the heat of the day and should be repeated after about five days.

If the poison fails to stick to smooth-leaved plants, simply add a little soap to the mixture.

from
The Garden Club

Note—In preparation for the Garden Club Gladiolus Show, which will be held soon, Mrs. A. O. Thompson prepared this article for the club on "Cutting and Keeping Gladiolus" and those intending to show gladiolus will profit by following the directions outlined.

Cutting and Keeping Gladiolus

To the impatient beginner whose gladiolus plants have been growing vigorously for several weeks, it may seem that the flowers will never develop. Then some fine morning appears the spike for which he has been waiting. Suddenly and mysteri-

ously it usually appears inside the seventh leaf and shoots up rapidly to be followed soon by the first flower, the lowest bud on the stalk which will begin to show color at its tip.

Most varieties of gladiolus should be cut when the second flower begins to open; if then properly treated, the remaining flowers will open one by one indoors—the spike lasting from a week to ten days.

Where good bulbs are wanted for the next season, at least three, and preferably four, leaves should be left on the plant. If cut to one or two leaves the growth of the new bulb will be practically stopped. By using a sharp knife, not scissors, and cutting carefully, the spike may be cut far down with a long, slanting cut, and the stem pulled out of the enclosing sheaf of leaves. In doing this hold the base of the plant firmly in position with the foot, otherwise the bulb may be twisted and the roots broken in the soil.

The spikes of choice new varieties should be cut with no foliage or at most with only the top leaf. Such naked spikes may

be arranged in vases or baskets with leaves cut from less desirable varieties, with sprays of baby's breath, with common garden asparagus, or with any suitable foliage.

The stems should be cut always with a slanting cut and the best time to cut is early in the morning. As soon as the flower is cut, remove the spikes to a cool, shady room or cellar and leave in fresh cool water for a half day or more before arranging for the bouquet. Change the water daily, cutting off a small portion of the stem, leaving a fresh surface to absorb the water more readily. As soon as the bottom flower fades, it should be removed. Snap it off by pressing the flower down close to the stem instead of attempting to pull it off. When only three or four blossoms remain, the rest of the spikes may be cut off and arranged in shallow bowls or with other flowers. The tips are more attractive than when left at the top of long denuded spikes.

In the National Council of State Garden Clubs Bulletin for May, 1942, it is suggested that one tablespoon of alcohol to one quart of water will help keep gladiolus fresh. As soon as the flower is cut, plunge the stem in a bucket of water, being sure that all stem ends are immersed. When you get in the house place the flowers in deep water immediately and if cut late in the evening leave the blossoms in deep water overnight before arranging.

One ounce of hydrous sulphate to one quart of water will also help keep the cut flowers fresh longer.

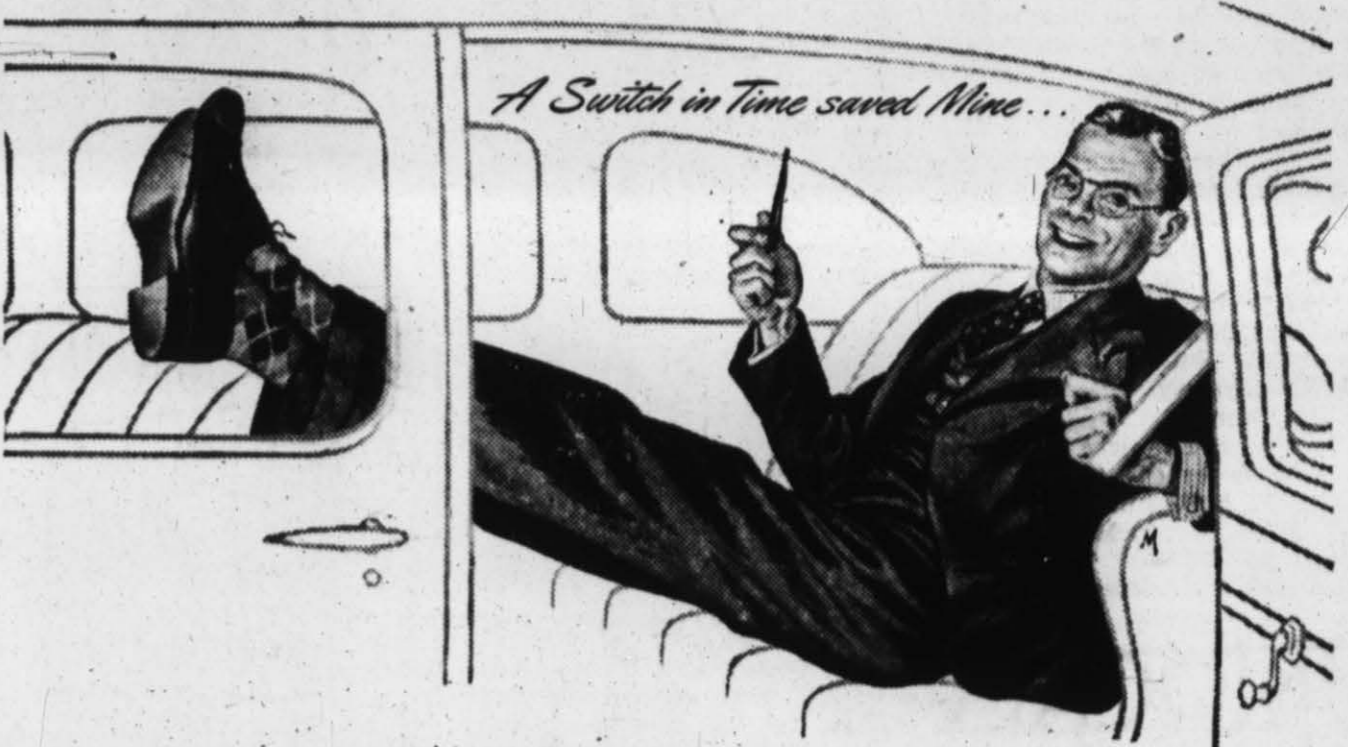

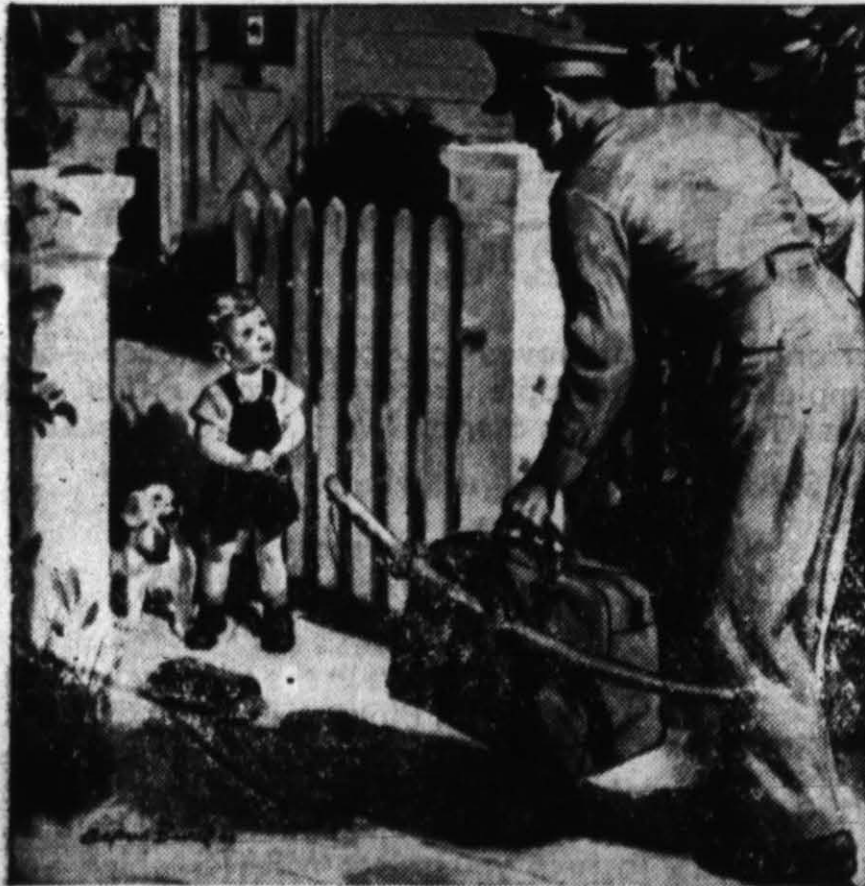

P. O. W. Labor Out of Picture For the Season

Reports received last week of improvement in the Prison labor situation, were incorrect according to later information received by the county agent and the Hereford Chamber of Commerce, and latest reports are that no prison labor will be available in this territory. Just 4,500 prisoners have been allotted for farm work in Texas and according to reports from Washington and from state extension service headquarters, none of this supply will be allocated here.

However, County Agent A. R. Bateman reported Monday that he still hopes to get approximately 30 tents, 16 x 16 size, and that if these tents are secured it is believed that sufficient Mexican labor can be imported to take care of the potato and onion harvest and perhaps to help later in shocking feed.

If the tents are secured, present tentative plans call for the construction of a tent city under official supervision.

which for the most part was gathered in the territory around Throckmorton and Crowell.

Trucking charges have been running from eight to 12 cents a hundred for the first ten miles and a cent a hundred for the remainder of the hauling distance, with long hauls sometimes drawing as much as 12 to 15 cents per hundred.

"The harvest labor supply will be far from plentiful," Mr. Bateman points out, "since harvest in much of Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado gets underway at approximately the same time as it does in the Texas Panhandle." However, the county agent believes that farmers will be able to get the necessary labor—and urges them to make use of the free employment service operated by the extension service at a Main Street Office.

The problem of harvest labor supply is still not settled; though local extension service officials believe that sufficient labor will be available by the time harvest gets into full swing. Custom combiners have begun to arrive from the area below the caprock and crews from the south plains are expected to be here by the time the peak-season starts.

Price Best in Years

With approximately two and one half million bushels of storage in the county, and most of this storage empty and ready for the new crop, elevator men do not anticipate such a serious

storage problem as was faced two years ago. If freight car movements go through with reasonable speed, available elevator and farm storage will probably be able to meet local needs.

Government officials admit that they are "in the dark" as to how much wheat will be put in government loans, the rate for which is \$1.38 a bushel this year for elevator-stored wheat. The price for No. 1 wheat in Hereford this morning was \$1.31 a bushel.
