Staff Sgt. Spradley, 35, had been in service since July, 1942 and had been overseas since August of this year. He was a member of the famous 95th. Division which spearheaded the drive of Patton's Army around Metz.

Rearred in Hereford, Sgt. Spradley attended Hereford High School and West Texas State College. He had been employed on ranches in the Panhandle and was working for an oil company near Borger prior to his induction into the service.

Dorothy N. Trimble Enlists in WAVES

Miss Dorothy Nell Trimble, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Trimble of San Angelo, has joined the WAVES and will leave on Dec. 14 for her boot training at Hunter College, New York City.

The Trimbles formerly lived in Hereford and Dorothy Nell attended Hereford schools and was employed here until the family moved to San Angelo recently. She becomes the fourth Hereford girl to volunteer for service in the WAVES, and is the sixth member of her family to enter service.

Sanky Trimble, with the Army Air Corps in the South Pacific. Apprentice Seaman Larry Trimble, now attending midshipman's school in New York, and Kevin Coffman, awaiting his call to the Merchant Marines, Dallas.

Dowell Prisoner In Germany

Lt. R. L. Dowell, Jr., listed as missing in action since Oct. 12, was reported Friday as a prisoner of war in Germany, according to an official message received by his wife, the former Miss Nona Deen Rose.

Lieutenant Dowell, 21, had been overseas for several months and had been stationed in France as a fighter pilot.

He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Dowell, Sr., of Hereford and was rearred here, having graduated from Hereford High School in 1940.

Ford District Forced to Quit Bus Service

Because of lack of funds, the Ford School District will discontinue all school bus service, effective Dec. 1, it was announced this week by Zerrell Thomas, president of the board of trustees of common school District No. 7, who states that while some of these buses may be kept in operation by individual operators after Dec. 1, all bus maintenance by the district will stop on that date.

Buses from this district take children to schools in Adrian, Vega and Canyon, as well as to the Hereford Schools.

According to a financial report of the Common School District, a thousand dollar debt is anticipated by the end of the present school year; and a recent tax election held for the purpose of raising the tax rate to meet the increased expenses was defeated.

Regretting that the District must stop school bus service, the trustees have suggested that perhaps each community now being served by a bus belonging to the District, might take over the operation and maintenance of the bus as a community financed and managed proposition. In order for the community to do this, a meeting should be held and a committee of not less than three persons appointed to direct the raising of funds for such necessary expenses as payment of bus dri-

A nose gunner, Sgt. Beene is stationed in Italy with a veteran Liberator Bombardment Group, which has struck at enemy targets throughout central and southern Europe with nearly 150 bombing assaults.

Inducted Nov. 18, 1940, Sgt. Beene was one of the first volunteers from Deaf Smith County. He has four brothers in service—Weldon and Bruce who are in the Navy; O. J., in the Coast Guard; and Bill, in the Army.

With nearly all businesses in Hereford scheduled to close for Thanksgiving, a record crowd of Hereford fans will probably accompany the fighting Whitefaces Thursday afternoon to Friona, where the Whitefaces will tangle with the Friona Chiefs to determine the district representative to meet the Phillips Blackhawks in a bi-district game next week.

The Chiefs have a second chance at honors for which they have been striving, and if determination—and a smooth, big bal cun can do the job, they plan to roll over the Whitefaces.

In Stark, Chieftain backfield ace, the Whitefaces will meet one of the best backs in the district; and Robert Leach, Jr., a new man on the Chieftain squad, may provide some new troubles for Hereford. Earl Smith, 12 year old son of the late Mrs. Vera Smith of Hereford, Sunday was enrolled at Boys' Ranch, where he becomes the first Hereford boy to take part in the Panhandle equivalent of the famous "Boys' Town."

Earl's enrollment brought the total to 47 boys now living at the ranch, where the boys attend school, help with the chores, housework and laundry and take part in a well-supervised recreation program, under a system which makes for the maximum development of each boy as a good citizen of the Ranch.

The age of the boys varies from five years through high school age, and many Boys Ranch graduates are now serving in the armed forces and in useful civilian work. The ranch is a complete economic unit, with its own banking, farming and management activities in which the boys take part under the direction of the superintendent, Alton Weeks.

38th Christmas Seal Campaign Now Underway

The American People this week were urged to enlist in the fight against the greatest home front enemy—tuberculosis—by the generous purchase of Christmas seals.

Supporting the drive which opened Monday, President Roosevelt stated this week that this country "cannot afford to permit the strength of its people to be sapped by the insidious disease, tuberculosis."

The President's statement follows: "Tuberculosis is today taking a tremendous toll in the war-torn countries of Europe and Asia. We must not permit this to happen here."

"Knowing that tuberculosis has increased after all past wars, we must act now to prevent its spread. We can do this by joining with the medical profession and with official and voluntary agencies in their fight against tuberculosis."

"It is none too soon to act, I am informed that last year, tuberculosis took 56,000 lives in the United States and that the death rate from the disease increased in 21 industrial states, even though the rate in the nation as a whole declined slightly."

"Tuberculosis is a communicable disease, but it is also a controllable disease. Cooperation between the American people and the agencies devoted to spreading knowledge on the prevention of tuberculosis will result in victory against this great menace to mankind."



Conservation Exchange

News of the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District

G. W. Brumley, ranchman cooperating with the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District, has completed another improvement by constructing the second dam on his 8626 acre ranch.

This dam which impounds 21.24 acre feet of water or approximately seven million gallons has a drainage area of 4,790 acres of land, 3,502 acres of which are cultivated and 1,288 acres are pasture land. The construction of the dam, which required a fill of 7,217 cubic yards of earth, was done under the supervision of the soil conservation service technicians assigned to the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District. The two dams were built at an average cost of approximately \$700 each. Together these reservoirs will provide an ample amount of water for Mr. Brumley's 900 head of cattle during the season when water supply is critical.

Mr. Brumley built these dams across draws in the middle of his pasture in order to have a good distribution of livestock and reduce the distance the cattle must travel to water. This centralized water location will prove beneficial in efforts to improve the range condition by shifting the livestock from the poorer parts of the range back to the better places without overgrazing any part of the pasture.

Conservation work is nearing completion on the Colby Conkright ranch, the C. D. Carnahan and A. O. Thompson farms which is being done with Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District heavy construction equipment. About eight miles of fence row drifts were leveled for these farmers.

Mr. Conkright plans to construct diversions on the land made available by the removal of the fence drifts which will divert water from roadside ditches and spread water over the native grass pasture. The other land made available by fence-leveling will be planted to wheat in order that the land will have sufficient cover during the blowing season, to prevent soil erosion.

The Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District Supervisors are eager for all farmers needing the assistance of heavy construction equipment to make application as soon as possible. This equipment may be used for operations such as leveling terraces, fence row drifts, hummocks or the construction of dams, ponds and diversions. Application may be made to the District Supervisors or to the office personnel at the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District office in the Court-house.

Texans Won't Quit Fighting

Texans just won't quit fighting!

Even the boys who have spent months overseas, been seriously wounded and returned to the states to recover their health, insist upon doing their extra bit for victory. Dozens of men in McCloskey General Hospital at Temple have volunteered to help with war fund and war bond drives, even though they have won the right to sit back and take things easy.

Two returned veterans, Capt. R. E. Erisman of Ennis and Pfc. Paul Trotter of Sherman, are touring the state now, putting on one-day "clean-up" campaigns for the National War Fund, helping local war chest workers put their counties over the top.

Captain Erisman recently returned from China, where he spent 13 months fighting the Japs with Chinese troops. He is recovering now from a serious illness contracted there.

"People at home who think the war is almost over make me sick," he told a meeting at Stephenville last week. "If they realized how many of our boys will be killed before victory finally comes they would think differently. The Japs are tough, and it will take a long time to whip them."

Trotter, a likeable, lanky Texan, was wounded seriously

at Salerno Beach, captured by the Nazis, and spent almost seven months in a German prison camp. He returned on the Gripsholm a few weeks ago, and is recovering from bullet wounds in the left hand, arm and side, and shrapnel wounds of the shoulder and face.

While in the prisoner-of-war camp, he received athletic equipment, books and other recreational supplies from his Texas home-folks, through War Prisoners Aid, the National War Fund agency.

"I am making this tour to tell the people of Texas how much this help means to the men in Nazi camps," he explained. "Men would go crazy from sheer boredom if they didn't receive recreational equipment. Many close friends of mine are still prisoners, and I want to help them get the things they need."

He is helping plenty, too. At Stephenville, where the two heroes spoke, more than \$1,800 was raised in a one-hour public rally that put the Erath County War Chest well over the top.

And another Texas fighting "man" is back home, after engaging in two major battles in the Pacific. He is Alfred Wright of McAllen, who set a record by being the youngest gub to fight the Japs. Alfred took a heroic part in two tough fights before Navy officials discovered that he was only 15 years old. One of the battles was fought when he was 14.

The Navy sent him home when they learned his age. But no one can take from the fighting Texas youngster the two battle stars he wears so proudly.

OPA Crackdown On Gas Ration Abuse Promised by Bowles

Motorists who use gasoline illegally to travel to Winter Resorts face the loss of their mileage rations, the District Office of Price Administration advised today.

An enforcement program now in preparation to prevent misuse of rations provides that motorists who use their coupons illegally will be called before hearing commissioners who have the power to revoke not only the supplemental "B" or "C" rations, but basic "A" rations as well.

Administrator Chester Bowles pointed out that the millions of patriotic drivers throughout the country who are abiding by the mileage regulations and getting along on tight rations so that all may share fairly the scarce civilian supplies have every right to expect OPA to shut down hard on those who obtain gasoline unfairly for non-essential trips. "We intend to do just that," he said.

Each War Price and Rationing Board in Lubbock OPA District has been instructed to review the mileage regulations governing vacation travel to resorts and reminded that they must deny gasoline for this purpose.

In judging bigness solely by such things as number of employees, size of payrolls, or volume of sales, it overlooks the size of the job the particular business is required to do.

After all, any business exists because there's a demand for the things it produces or the services it renders. And it must either grow to the size necessary to satisfy these demands, or else make way for a competitor that can provide what is wanted.

Workers Leave Jobs to Cause Production Lag

A serious labor shortage which is slowing down production in 24 Texas war plants was attributed this week to the fact that workers are leaving vital war jobs and returning to their home towns to take less essential jobs in the hope of post war security. This statement, made by C. E. Belk, state director of the War Manpower Commission is borne out by recent records at the local selective service office, where a good many changes from war production work to ordinary civilian occupations have been classified recently.

plants are the most alarming setback to the war effort yet encountered, according to WMC Chairman Belk, who points out that General Eisenhower has placed the answer to the speedy conclusion of the war directly on the shoulders of workers and industry. No American soldier must be sacrificed because of the lack of sufficient ammunition and supplies.

To meet the present emergency need, 13,145 Texas workers, both skilled and unskilled, are required immediately to maintain full production flow, and this number will be increased to a net demand for 16,066 workers within the next 60 days.

"I feel that every employer in non-essential firms should take it as his patriotic duty to hire no workers who were formerly employed in war production," Belk stated, adding that war industry should also look to im-
