The prisoners at first had only the clothes which they were wearing when captured and the Germans gave out a few old clothes, but little help in the clothing situation was felt until Red Cross packages containing American uniforms began to arrive. Severe cold weather and a very short fuel allowance caused suffering. Miller states, "We got a few lumps of coal as an allowance for two days use; actually it kept our quarters warm for maybe a couple of hours."

CONTAINERS. Pineapple canjars. However, these containers may be used if plain tins are not available.

PREPARATION OF FRUIT: Make syrup before cutting pineapple. Dissolve 1-2 to 3-4 cup sugar in one cup hot water. This amount is usualy suffifor one quart of fruit. Wash the fruit with a stiff brush. Cut off stem and twist out top. Lay the pineapple on its side on a cutting board and cut in 12 inch slices. Peel each slice, and drop slices into syrup at once to prevent exposure to air which causes loss of vitamin C and discoloration.

PACK RAW AND STEAM: When all pineapple is prepared, pack cans or jars full of slices of raw fruit. Bring the syrup to a boil and pour over the fruit to within one inch of the top of the container. To steam, place uncovered jars or fruit in a water bath with warm water up to the neck of the jar. Cans without lids may be placed in a water bath with boiling water about 1 1-2 inches below the rim. Cover the water bath kettle. As soon as the water starts boiling and has formed a good steam, count time. A slow, even boil is better than vigorous

PROCESS IN BOILING WA-TER BATH: After jars have been sealed, they should be put back into the water bath and covered with boiling water. Count time when water begins boiling. Process No. 2 and No. 3 cans 15 minutes; pint and quart jars, 20 minutes.

COOL AND STORE: Remove from water bath. Cool cans in cold water immediately. Tighten lids on jars, other than selfseal type, and cool as quickly as possible without putting in draft. Store in cool, dry, dark

Note: Cores and trimmings may be ground, cooked with ty, at the Court House in Heresyrup and made into juice or canned as crushed pineapple. PINEAPPLE JUICE

Follow suggestions for selection of fruit and containers as given above. It's especially important that fruit be ripe and sweet to yield a good quantity of good flavored juice. Peel and cut pineapple into pieces. There are two ways to extract juice: (1) A seprosieve is ideal for grinding and extracting juice at the same time. (2) If seprosieve is not available, the pieces may be run through a meat grinder, then heated to 140 degrees, F. (a little hotter than the hand can stand). Stir to prevent sticking. Press the warm pulp through any type of fruit juice press. A fair yield may be obtained by squeezing pulp through a cheese cloth.

Add 1-2 cup sugar to each quart of extracted juice and heat to 140 degrees F. or 150 degrees F. Pour into clean cans or clean, hot jars. Seal, process and store the same as described in canning pineapple.

Instructions for the preparation of candied pineapple and for freezing pineapple may be obtained from the county home demonstration agent.


being allowed because the percentage of these two top grades in the total cattle supply is relatively high during the spring, OPA said.

The agency also exempted from the percentage limitation anyone whose slaughter is confined exclusively to 4-H or other club cattle purchased at OPA approved sales.

For the April and May periods the increases allowed in this zone are from 50 to 75 per cent Higher percentages for the accounting period ending about June 30 will be fixed later.


OPA said that with market prices for lower grade cattle now nearer ceilings than are those for better grades, the larger kill of choice and good cattle "will distribute slaughterers' demand for cattle more evenly over all grades."
