## Farm and Ranch INS crackdown is Dec. 1

WASHINGTON (AP) - The American Farm Bureau Federation says it fears federal agents are
waiting with "bated breath" to corwaiting with "bated breath" to cor-
ral farmers who hire undocumented aliens when the immigration sanetions take effect Dec. 1 .
But a spokesman for the Immigraion and Naturalization Service says
hose worries are unfounded and that the agency will be evenhanded in enorcing the employer sanctions against farmers.
Nevertheless, a labor specialist at acknowledged that some farmers are afraid of an INS crackdown.
Most employers including Most employers, including
farmers of non-perishables, dairy farmers of non-perishables, dairy
farmers and cattlemen, have been barred from hiring undocumented workers since June 1987, and have been subject to fines on the first of-
fense since this past June. But perishable crop farmers won a reprieve from full sanctions until Dec. 1 under the 1986 Immigration Reform and Control Act
ficials of the American Farm Bureau, the nation's largest farm organization in membership, say
they believe the decks are now clear hey believe the decks are now clear They also complain the law is tightening up the farm labor market, which could lead to shortages come
next year's harvests. next year's harvests.
"Any farmer starting Dec. 1 who
(cnowingly hires an undocumented worker ought to have his head examined because he's more than like-
ly to get caught," said Chuck Fields, an assistant director of national affairs for the American Farm Bureau. waiting in line to pounce on the farmers and we're warning farmers that they should not take the risk of employing anyone illegally," Fields
Fields said the INS fought giving farmers the extra time, but "we beat their hides on that and they never lik-
Teras Farm Bureau spokesman Vernie Glasson said the INS, with its ranks boosted by the legislation, is obligated to carry out the law "and I ully expect they'll carry it out to their fullest."
he agency has no reason to treat farmers any differently than other businesses and "our approach to reasonable one. We're not interested in collecting fines, we're interested in compliance."
Al French, labor specialist at the U.S. Department of Agriculture, said a little paranoia to a fear of being NS because of beliefs it will NS because of beliefs it will be im "We can expect constant, steady enforcement activity on the part of the INS," French said.
French said it is too early to tell
whether farmers will face labor shortages because of the law, which included a provision that allowed aliens who had worked in perisable U.S. agriculture to seek amnesty
through Nov. 30. Under the special agricultural worker (SAW) program, the INS said more than 1 million aliens have sought amnesty. But it is unknown how many will conmany will seek other jobs.
