Speed limit changes approved in city

Speed zones on three of Hereford's main thoroughfares will be reduced as soon as the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation changes the speed limit signs. City commissioners voted unanimously last night to adopt an ordinance for the speeds, as recommended by speed surveys performed by the state.

The highways concerned in the changes are U.S. 60, U.S. 385 and F.M. 1058, better known as First Street, 25 Mile Avenue, and the Harrison Highway or Park Avenue. City Manager Darwin McGill commented, "In most cases the speed limits will be lowered however there are a few areas where the traffic surveys resulted in a raised speed limit."

Speed surveys were performed by making checks of vehicle speeds at quarter-mile intervals. The limits were then determined by the speed at which 85 percent of the vehicles travel. Referred to as the "eighty-fifth percentile speed" this is a nationally accepted method for establishing speed zones. The checks were done over a two-hour period or for 125 vehicles passing through the zone.

The Highway Department Roadway Maintenance Supervisor, J.R. Blackwell, estimates the signs posting the new speed limits will be

up within a month. The speed limits will be as follows:

On U.S. 60

From the west city limit, 69 feet southwest of the railroad overpass, to 180 feet west of Fourth Avenue the limit will be 50 mph.

From 180 feet west of Fourth Avenue to 420 feet west of Knight Street the speed limit will be 45 mph.

From 420 feet west of Knight Street to 180 feet east of Witherspoon street the new limit will be 35 mph.

From 180 feet east of Witherspoon Street to 55 feet east of Dairy Street the limit will be 40 mph.

From 55 feet east of Dairy Street to 360 feet west of Mabel Street the limit will be 45 mph.

From 360 feet west of Mabel Street to the east city limit, at the Progressive Street right-of-way, the limit will be 50 mph.

On U.S. 385

From the north city limit, 560 feet north of 16th Street, to 50 feet north of 15th Street the limit will be 50 mph.

From 50 feet north of 15th Street to 920 feet north of 13th Street the limit will be 40 mph.

From 920 feet north of 13th Street to 235 feet south of North Avenue the limit will be 35 mph.

From 235 feet south of North Avenue to 605 feet north of Country Club Drive the limit will pick up to 50 mph.

From 605 feet north of Country Club Drive to the South city limit, 50 feet south of Columbia Street, the limit will return to 55 mph.

On F.M. 1058:

From the west city limit, 30 feet east of Campbell street, to 80 feet east of Aspen Street the limit will be established as 40 mph.

From 80 feet east of Aspen Street to the junction with Highway 385 the limit will be 35 mph.

The speed limits in school zone areas will remain 20 mph when lights are flashing or as posted.

The city commissioners also accepted the low bid on a clarifier trough repair for the wastewater treatment plant. The bid was awarded to Triple I. Utilities of Dumas at \$6,950.

In other business commissioners discussed budgeting funds to take care of drainage problems on the street north of Stevens Chevrolet and at the bottleneck formed where Centre and Douglas streets curve onto Park Avenue.

Allocated Revenue Sharing funds to be transferred into the general fund as previously approved in the curb and gutter project.

Corrected tax rolls for 1986, 1985, 1984, 1983 and 1981.

Reviewed a proposed city budget for 1987-88.

TEA rep explains how bilingual education works

Few adults learn a second language in their whole lifetime, but some children are expected to by the time they are five. That message on a poster portrays some of the misconceptions held about bilingual education, according to Ramon Magallanes of the Texas Education Agency.

Magallanes spoke to about 100 teachers, parents, students and school officials Monday night at a program sponsored by the Concerned Citizens of Deaf Smith County. Some parents in the school system have been curious about why a child who can speak English is kept in the bilingual program and why the new language isn't taught faster. Concerned Citizens called the meeting for informational purposes and in-

formed Magallanes and local officials to explain the bilingual programs on the state and local levels.

"We have a choice - fast language or good language," Magallanes said. Native language teaching is part of the overall process of education while a student also is taught the second language of English, he explained. There are two immediate needs from two cultures. He said if a teacher asks an English speaking parent the goal of their child's education the answer is to make the child successful and prepare for college. The primary goal the Spanish speaking parent asks for is for the child to learn English and learn to read.

The English is necessary because it is critical to the other aspects of learning, Magallanes said. It takes most children about 1 1/2 years of formal school for reading to really culminate as children's minds begin to understand the abstract.

That language skill, in whichever language is going to be the basis for all the other subjects. Children who have more Spanish proficiency than English are still taught the basic subjects in their native language so they are not behind classmates in information and can be more easily transferred into English speaking classes.

"We want to use that language to develop thinking skills," he said.

Subjects are designed to teach a child observance, discernment and generalization skills - the thought process. Through all of it, the children are picking up English more effectively, he said.

Also at the meeting, Ophelia

Echevarria, the Hereford Schools director of bilingual education, reviewed the process for placing a child in bilingual education and the district showed a video of first graders learning to read in English and in Spanish.

Deaf Smith jail only half full

While jails across the state are backed-up with prisoners due to the recent numerous closings of the Texas Department of Corrections, Deaf Smith County Jail is only at 50 percent of capacity. Sheriff Joe Brown operates the certified jail in accordance with the Texas Commission of Jail Standards. Capacity for the county jail is 99 and Brown estimates an average populace of 40.

Our giant neighbor to the north-east is not so lucky. Some Randall County Jail inmates are bunking down on the floor. The jail, which has 71 beds, is authorized by the Commission on Jail Standards to house 57 prisoners. Late last week occupancy at the jail stood at 74, 17 more inmates than permitted.

Brown comments, "I called up there and talked to a couple of the men, the chief deputy and the administrator, and told them that we had room here to take some of their overflow but they haven't sent any down here."

Potter County Jail charges the Randall County facility \$31 a day per prisoner to house overflow but Brown offered the Deaf Smith County facility at \$25 a day.

He says, "I wasn't making the offer to make a bunch of money off of them, I just wanted to help out. I don't know what their problem is." Actual costs for housing a prisoner at the new Deaf Smith County Jail averages \$10 a day.

Though Randall County jail administrator, Kirk Williams knows he is operating in violation of the Jail Standards, he says he isn't holding the prisoners under those conditions for very long and said in a newspaper interview, "...sometimes if you don't hold them too long, they (Commission on Jail Standards) don't do anything."

Sarpalius back in Senate, using cane

AUSTIN (AP) — Sen. Bill Sarpalius, "in a lot of pain" from an off-road vehicle accident and surgery two months ago, has returned to the Senate. He told his colleagues "your 31st vote is here."

Sarpalius, D-Amarillo, recalled in a Monday speech to the Senate that when his four-wheeler ran into a ditch and flipped over Dec. 26, "I hurt so bad that I prayed to God to just let me die."

Sarpalius, 39, had back surgery Jan. 2 at Northwest Texas Hospital

in Amarillo. Two steel rods were placed on either side of his spine, and a bone chip from his hip was fused to the fractured vertebra.

He said the accident was a "terrible experience, but when I was in the hospital and I began getting cards and phone calls from you, it gave me strength, and I appreciate it so much."

In his absence, other senators handled some of Sarpalius' work, and he said, "When I heard ... you offered as a body to help represent the

people of the 31st District, it meant so much to me, and I want to thank you for that."

"I'm awfully glad to be here with my friends. Sen. (Chet) Edwards for flying up and talking to me, and calling on the phone."

"I lost any appetite for food, and all of a sudden (Sen.) Bill Sims sent me a ham. And (Sen.) Ted Lyon for helping me with my bills," and Sen. Tati Santiesteban "for helping me with some of my bills..."

Sarpalius noted that he has switched sides of the aisles in the Senate since the special session last fall.

taking Oscar Mauzy's desk.

Voters approve bond issue

Deaf Smith County Hospital district voters approved a \$1.5 million bond issue Saturday. The 590 ballots were split with 435 in favor and 155 disapproving disapproving the issuance of bonds to refund outstanding indebtedness.

Refinancing equipment and remodeling expenditures will take \$1,029,000. The remaining \$470,000 will be used to purchase additional equipment for the facility over the next 18 months.

The funds will be transferred from the Texas Commerce Bank of Houston upon approval by the state attorney general.

Building permits up for 1987

City building permits for the first two months of 1987 are for more than twice the amount at this time in 1986. By the end of February this year permits totaling \$437,620 had been issued. In 1986 at this time permits for \$206,900 were issued.

Six permits were issued in January for a total of \$314,700. In February, 18 permits were issued for a total of \$122,920. One of the permits was for a new residence.

In January of 1986 there were eight permits for \$91,000 and in February 1986 there were 13 permits for \$114,900.

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We heard some reports of vandalism this past week in connection with the nuclear waste repository issue. It's a shame that a few folks have to resort to such tactics. It serves no purpose except to hurt the cause of good people who are opposing the DOE project. The vandals, sneaking around at night, painted some driveways and some real estate signs.

In connection with the controversy, we had an interesting conversation with a local resident the other day. He said some farmers took him down, cut his hair, called him a "Commie" and said he was un-American for not supporting his government.

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As a follow-up on the Dallas times Herald opinion-page column that lambasted Hereford for its discrimination, we should make note the newspaper used a letter from Hereford Mayor Wes Fisher as a rebuttal. On the same op page with Fisher's rebuttal writer Molly Ivins had another column—this one discussing National Condom Week in California. She also used part of the column to apologize to Dudley Bayne for reporting he had died two years ago. She brushes away the other errors in her attack on Hereford by writing: "My regret about the columns I wrote is that they seem to have produced only knee-jerk defensiveness from so many people, rather than a serious look at some of the terrible problems afflicting that town."

Our regret, here in Hereford, is that Ms. Ivins got all her information from several people who yell discrimination at any setback instead of when they have a legitimate complaint.

Prisons are open to new inmates

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — The Texas prison system is opening its doors to new inmates today after being closed for five days because the inmate population exceeded a state-mandated 95 percent capacity.

"We have to open because we're under 95 percent," Texas Department of Corrections spokesman David Nunnelee said Monday. However, he was quick to point out that officials expect the prison system to close again later this week.

"I expect more than we have for," he said in reference to today's expected admissions.

The population count at midnight Sunday was recorded at 94.17 percent, or 38,073 inmates — 335 beds under the limit. The population figure for Monday will be released this afternoon.

This weekend, 242 prison inmates were released, some made possible through legislation approved by Gov. Bill Clements, giving the prison system a population count under the 95 percent cap.

Prison spokesman Charles Brown said 187 convicts were released Sunday to halfway houses throughout the state under the legislation approved by the governor while 55 others were paroled.

Clements on Friday authorized the use of a new state law that awards up to 60 days of good-conduct time to selected prisoners, allowing them to be moved to supervised halfway houses.

The Legislature is working to control the prison population and provide additional funding at a time when the state is tightening its belt. If court-mandated improvements are not made by April 1, the state could be slapped with fines of up to \$800,500 a day by a federal judge.

The closing of the 26-unit prison system last week was the fifth time this year.

18 guilty in 'Pizza Connection' trial

NEW YORK (AP) — The "Pizza Connection" trial, marked by the slaying of one defendant and an attempt on another, ended with the convictions of a former Sicilian Mafia boss and 17 others as part of a ring that sold \$1.6 billion worth of heroin through pizza parlors.

U.S. District Court jurors who returned the verdicts Monday afternoon had listened to about 400 witnesses over 17 months, sorted through 15,000 exhibits, and studied a 410-page book that charted evidence against what U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani said was the biggest U.S. heroin ring to be smashed.

"This is a great victory for international law enforcement in its effort to smash the mob throughout the world," said Giuliani. "Some people thought it couldn't be done."

Of 22 men indicted in 1984, one was murdered, another was seriously wounded in a botched "hit," two pleaded guilty and one was acquitted of all charges.

One juror was excused during deliberations after her family got a threatening phone call, even though all jurors' names were kept confidential to avoid interference.

The former mob chief, Gaetano Badalamenti, 63, of Cinisì, Sicily, was convicted of narcotics conspiracy, carrying a maximum of 15 years in prison, and of running a continuing criminal enterprise, which carries a maximum penalty of life in prison without possibility of parole.

Mardi Gras moves into high gear

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A free-spending, hard-drinking crowd of thousands jammed the French Quarter early today for all-night merrymaking leading to the Mardi Gras parades that mark the boozey, bawdy last fling before Lent.

"The people — they're crazy, they don't care," Janet Knight, 29, of Newport, Mich., said in the crowded courtyard of a bar.

Mardi Gras, or Fat Tuesday, an exercise in excess estimated to pour \$250 million into the city economy, was expected to draw more than 1 million people into the Quarter for partying, 13 parades and a drag beauty pageant.

Among the gauges of the success of the pre-Lenten bash are the number of arrests for drunkenness or indecent behavior and the amount of garbage collected at midnight tonight from the Quarter's narrow streets.

After nearly two weeks of rain, today's forecast called for sunshine and 60-degree temperatures, meaning good crowds and good news for a city suffering from double-digit unemployment brought on by the depressed oil industry.

Police on Monday night had barricaded French Quarter streets to all but local traffic, while state police moved in Friday to reinforce the local department, whose officers usually tolerate all but the most flagrant Mardi Gras behavior.

International

Schultz asks China to remain open

DALIAN, China (AP) — Secretary of State George Shultz, in a strong call for China to remain open to foreign ideas and investment, warned today that no closed market is large enough to sustain a prosperous economy.

Shultz, the first senior Western official to visit China since student unrest led to the ouster of Communist Party General Secretary Hu Yaobang on Jan. 16, urged in a speech in the port city of Dalian that the Chinese continue to introduce market forces into their economy.

"Closed societies will fall behind and wither," Shultz said.

Earlier, he met with China's paramount leader, Deng Xiaoping, and they assured each other that the political problems faced by their two countries were largely overcome. Shultz had sought to determine the extent to which the political campaign against Western "bourgeois liberalism" in China may undermine the nation's new economic policies.

Shultz, referring to the Iran-Contra scandal, said President Reagan had "had a rough patch but he's dealt with it very swiftly." He said that with the appointment of Howard Baker as Reagan's chief of staff "he has a great person and a great team."

Deng said that "as for the troubles we recently encountered, they are also finished."

Police, protestors clash in riot

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Tens of thousands of riot police firing tear gas on Tuesday blocked an opposition-sponsored "peace march" commemorating a dissident college student who died under police torture.

There were no immediate reports of clashes in six other provincial cities where similar marches were scheduled to take place simultaneously at noon.

The clashes in Seoul broke out as thousands of people tried to march along sidewalks marking the 49th day after the death of Park Chong-chul, 21, a Seoul National University student who died by police torture Jan. 14.

Police acknowledged that Park suffocated when his head was forced into water twice during an interrogation by two police officers about his connection with a fugitive student activist.

A 49th-day memorial rite is a Buddhist practice to mark the entry of the deceased person's soul into another world.

Local teachers attend meeting

AUSTIN — Local teachers, Judy Bullard, Judy Neumayer, Tricia Sims, Catherine Cortez, Aurora Dominguez, Wanda Nall and Teddie Poindexter were some of the 700 participants who attended the Annual State Convention of the Texas Classroom Teachers Association in Austin, Feb. 27-March 1.

TCTA is an organization representing 25,000 teachers with headquarters in Austin.

Teachers attending the three-day convention heard Gov. Bill Clements give his first major address to an

educational group. Participants also had an opportunity to attend mini-conferences on legal and legislative issues, the teacher appraisal process, education reform, the new tax laws, public relations, and stress management.

The Association presented its annual Friend of Education Awards to Land Commissioner, Garry Mauro, and San Antonio home builder, Ray Ellison. Mauro was honored for his involvement in a suit that saved millions in oil and gas royalties for the state's public school system. Ellison was honored for a billboard campaign that praised Texas teachers.

Other award winners honored at the convention were Tommy Brawley, Littlefield; Maudie L. Gilmer, Edinburg; and Jack Gordon Stone, Midland, as TCTA Administrators of the Year and Wendell Huddleston, Lubbock, and Dorothy Alderman, Grand Prairie, as TCTA Retirees of the Year. Jodi Ann Victor, KCRS-Midland, received the Silver Apple Award for outstanding education media coverage.

TCTA State President Eva Jo Kasinger, Abilene, praised convention participants. "Educators face more complex issues than ever before. Along with keeping abreast of the latest developments in all areas of education, they must be informed about new laws, regulations and court decisions. They must be able to participate changes before they happen," Kasinger said.

"By participating in a meeting such as this, we can assure the people of Hereford that they have teachers who are committed and dedicated to providing the best education possible for the young people of Texas."

White house tries to boost Reagan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Battling suggestions that President Reagan is losing his grip on his job, the White House is mounting an extraordinary campaign to portray him as in charge, on top of events and not "an AWOL president."

In his first appearance as Reagan's new chief of staff, Howard Baker volunteered: "I've never seen Ronald Reagan more energetic, more fully engaged and more in command of difficult circumstances and questions. ... He's never been better."

Meanwhile, the administration pressed a search for a new nominee to head the CIA after agreeing to a request by acting director Robert M. Gates to withdraw his name.

Gates acknowledged there was a widespread belief in the Senate that action on his nomination should be delayed until the Senate Intelligence Committee completes its investigation of the secret sale of arms to Iran and the possible diversion of profits to Nicaragua's Contra rebels.

While praising Gates as "a remarkably talented and dedicated man," Reagan said, "It is clear that at this point confirmation proceedings would not be in the interest of the CIA or the nation."

Baker said the selection of a successor to Gates was "an urgent item on the president's agenda."

Speculation about possible candidates focused on both former Na-

tional Security Adviser Brent Scowcroft and former Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, both members of the Tower commission that investigated the Iran arms affair, along with Bobby R. Inman, a onetime CIA deputy director; U.N. Ambassador Vernon Walters; and Army Gen. William Odum, head of the National Security Agency.

Tower, contacted by The Associated Press late Monday, declined comment on a report in today's Washington Post that he had been offered the CIA post and turned it down.

When a new director is named, Gates will return to his job as the CIA's deputy director.

In other developments: —Independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh asked a federal court to dismiss a lawsuit in which Marine Lt. Col. Oliver L. North is seeking to halt Walsh's investigation. As long as North's suit is pending, "It invites potential witnesses to withhold cooperation. ... The mere pendency of this action may irreparably injure the ongoing criminal investigation," Walsh said.

Sarpalius, using a cane for support, also spoke briefly with reporters before the Senate went into session.

"I still have a lot of pain, but I'm living with it," he said.

Sarpalius said he is taking pain medication and will probably have another operation in six or eight months.

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DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT - I've just spent 2 1/2 weeks in bed with sciatic-nerve pain. Several doctors recommended using moisture heating pads, but others said to use ice packs. Which is the correct treatment?

DEAR READER - The purpose of heat for back pain due to sciatic-nerve irritation is to relieve the muscle spasms that accompany the disorder. I've found that either dry or moist heat is superior to cold packs, but some patients feel more comfortable applying cold. Let your back be the judge of which treatment is best for you.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I am 21, female and have excessive hair growth on my legs, underarms and upper lip. I shave and/or use a depilatory at night, and by morning it's all stubble. However, the hair on my head grows very slowly. Why does this happen?

DEAR READER - The hair on your scalp and face grows at about the same rate, but the growth of scalp hair is simply less obvious than facial stubble. Hair on the limbs, groin, underarms and eyebrows grows more slowly. See an endocrinologist to de-

termine if a glandular disturbance might be causing your prominent hair growth.

DEAR DR. GOTT - What does chronic lumbar dysfunction mean and what causes it?

DEAR READER - Chronic lumbar dysfunction is a cover-up phrase that means very little. "Chronic" indicates that it has lasted for more than a month. "lumbar" means that your lower back is involved, and "dysfunction" is a favorite medical word meaning something isn't working right.

Chronic low-back pain can result from abnormalities of the nerves, muscles or bones. When doctors are unable to pinpoint the cause of a person's back ailment, they sometimes use an impressive term like chronic lumbar dysfunction. Find a good orthopedic surgeon to get a more precise diagnosis.

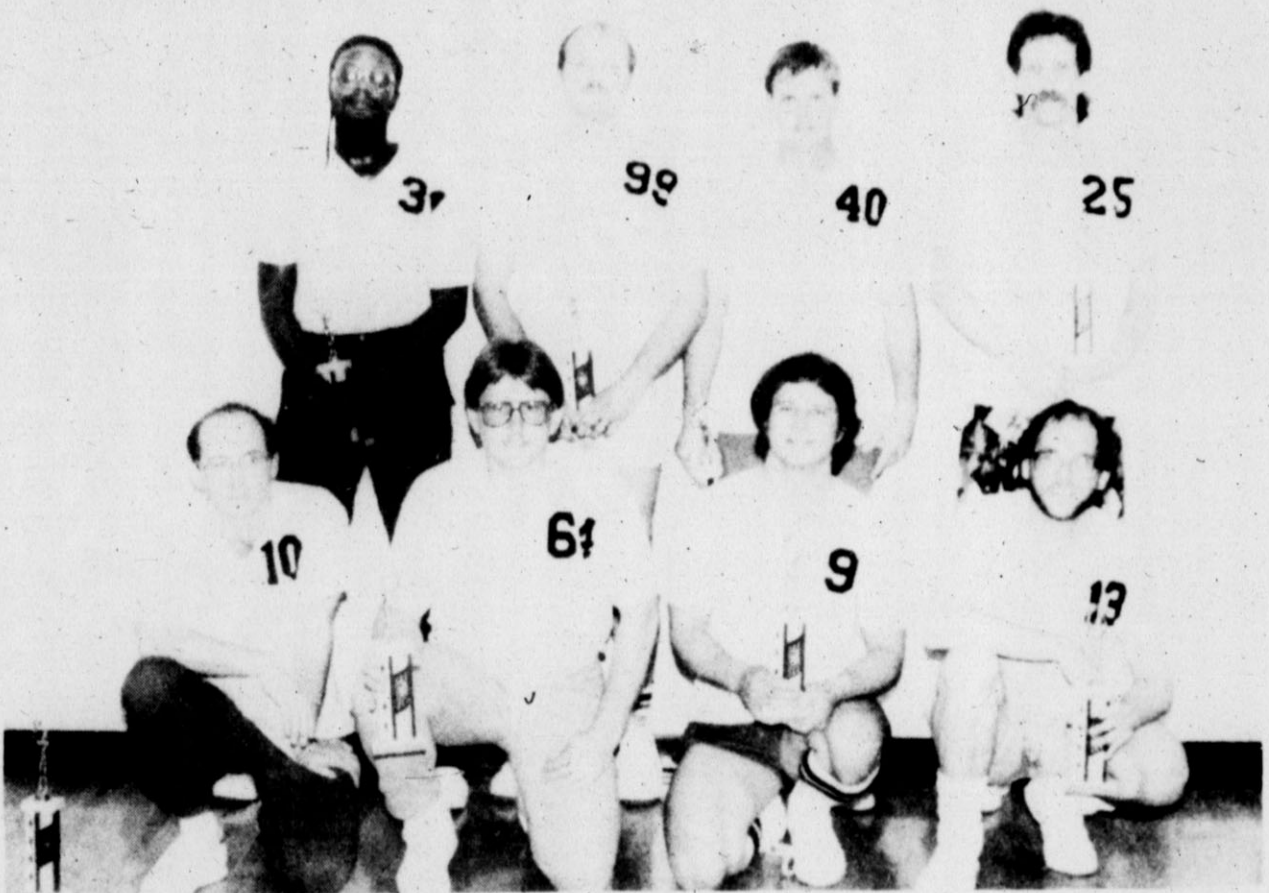

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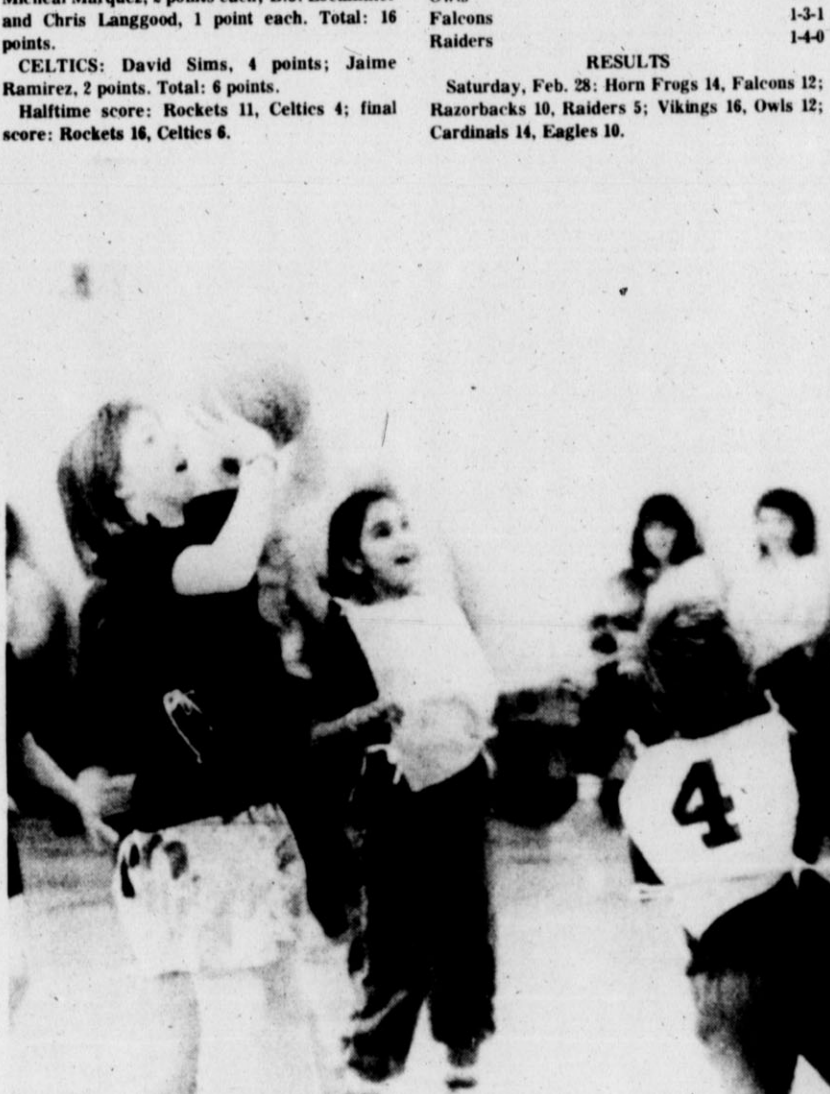

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Rockets defeat Spurs, 105-100

Mavericks cruise past Phoenix, 135-112

Phoenix center Alvin Adams disagreed with the hypothesis of a sports writer after the Suns' game with the Dallas Mavericks Monday night.

"What game?" Adams threw back at his questioner. "We played horrible. We let them get off to a good start. ... We had maybe three aggressive minutes the whole game, and that was with six minutes to go."

The Mavericks shot off to a 41-26 lead after one quarter, increased the advantage to 75-54 by halftime, and opened up a 33-point margin in the third quarter before finally cruising in with a 135-112 victory. Substitutes played much of the fourth quarter for Dallas.

Rolando Blackman scored 25, James Donaldson 22 and Mark Aguirre 21 for the Mavericks, who improved their Midwest Division-leading record to 38-20. The victory puts Dallas in position to go 19 games over .500 for the first time in club history if it can beat Denver on Wednesday night.

"I said at the start of the season that in order for us to improve on last year's record we would have to take advantage of our home court," said Blackman. "We are doing that. Also, I wanted to come out tonight and be aggressive since we had looked so bad in our last game (a 123-98 loss at San Antonio). We did that, too."

Larry Nance led the Suns with 25 points and guard Walter Davis had 17.

"Dallas did it inside and outside with their offense and their defense. They just took it to us," Adams said.

Dick Van Arsdale, leading the Suns for the second straight game after the firing of John MacLeod, said he had been apprehensive about coming into Reunion Arena.

"It's so hard to play a team as good as Dallas after they got beat so badly by San Antonio," Van Arsdale said.

"It was a tough day at the office," Van Arsdale said. "I don't think you could say that we were ever in this one. We tried everything. The problem was not necessarily offensively, but on defense."

For Donaldson, it was his sixth game of 20 or more points. He had been held under 10 points in his past seven games. The contest was also his 23rd game with double-digit points and rebounds. He had a game-high 11 rebounds.

Donaldson said, "We came out and played as hard as we possibly could. We felt we had to make up for the loss in San Antonio. We had a lot to prove to the coaches, fans and ourselves. A lot of people were starting to doubt us after that loss and we

really wanted to put out a concentrated effort tonight."

Dallas coach Dick Motta said, "We tried to do some things tonight on defense. We played more intense on defense tonight. Of course, we had a lot left over after the other night in San Antonio when we didn't play well at all."

Dallas rookie forward Roy Tarpley, who scored 15 points, said "We jumped out early and really got on them. We have been having fun at home lately by jumping out in front. We came out aggressive tonight. We have to keep ourselves going in these blowouts."

Phoenix guard Walter Davis echoed what others had said.

"We didn't play well and they did. They came out and were more aggressive than we were. They got all the loose balls and all the calls."

Elsewhere in the NBA, it was Houston 105, San Antonio 100, Atlanta 121, Washington 99, Sacramento 117, Denver 114 and Seattle 123, Cleveland 107.

Rockets 105, Spurs 100

Houston Coach Bill Fitch says defense is the key to the Rockets success.

"We had to play defense tonight in order to win," Fitch said after his teamed downed San Antonio 105-100 Monday night. "Defense is our game. If you score more than 101 points on us, you will probably beat us."

San Antonio Coach Bob Weiss didn't have much to say after the loss in NBA play.

Weiss, who earned a technical early in the game, greeted reporters in front of a television showing a tape of an inbound throw with 12 seconds left on the clock and the Spurs down by four points, 102-98.

The officials called a five-second infraction on the inbound and turned the ball over to the Rockets.

The Rockets were tagged with 13 fouls and the Spurs shot 15 free throws.

Akeem Olajuwon scored 32 points to lead the Rockets.

"I think we've been lucky against the Spurs this year," Olajuwon said. "None of the games we've had against them have been easy. The players they have are tough."

Olajuwon scored 32 points to lead the Rockets.

The Rockets beat the Spurs for the fifth time in as many tries this season and are now 31-26. San Antonio drops to 21-37.

San Antonio fought back from a 94-86 deficit on clutch shooting by forward Mike Mitchell. The eight-year veteran from Auburn scored eight of San Antonio's next 12 points to pull the Spurs within two, 100-98.

San Antonio was led by Alvin Robertson with 26 and Mike Mitchell with 20.

The Rockets led 56-49 at the half on a 15-8 surge at the end of the second period.

Olajuwon contributed 7 points during the Houston scoring spree and finished the first half with 20. Robertson led the Spurs in the first half with 16.

SuperSonics 123, Cavaliers 107

Seattle's Tom Chambers scored 36 points, including six in a row to defuse a fourth-quarter Cleveland rally, as the Sonics won their third straight game. Leading 106-100, Dale Ellis hit a 3-point jump shot and Chambers scored his six straight points for a 115-100 lead with 2:42 remaining.

NCAA takes step toward grid playoff

AUSTIN (AP) — An NCAA subcommittee has taken the first step towards instituting a collegiate football championship game for 1989.

The NCAA Football Postseason Subcommittee has recommended that a one-game championship between the nation's top two major college football teams be played on the Sunday before the Super Bowl in 1989.

The recommendation for a first-ever NCAA Division I-A national championship game emerged from a four-member committee headed by University of Texas athletic director DelLoss Dodds.

The report will be made in April to the NCAA Football Postseason Committee. It must be approved by that group and the NCAA Council before reaching the NCAA convention.

Dodds said the panel, in its meeting Sunday in Kansas City, Mo., suggested that a selection committee of eight pick the two teams from the bowl winners.

"If people are for a playoff, this would be an initial step," Dodds told the Austin American-Statesman. "It wouldn't solve all the problems, but it would painless, profitable and halfway conclusive."

Dodds' report recommends the selection committee — probably athletic directors — use "everything they can get their hands on" before picking the two finalists. That would include the wire-service polls, the NCAA's power-index computer system and advisory committees from each region.

A one-game playoff, after expenses, would pay each team about \$1.5 million and each of the 105 Division I-A football-playing schools between \$90,000 and \$180,000, Dodds said.

The game would be played either in a domed stadium or at a location with a warm climate, and the site would be moved annually.

"I think it's good," Dodds said of the report. "I'm not convinced it'll pass, but if they do it, I think we'd have a pretty good start."

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Julius Erving of the Philadelphia 76ers has received a lot of honors in pro basketball and he thinks one of his teammates, Maurice Cheeks, hasn't received enough.

"You look at him in action on the court and he's easy to take for granted," Erving said. "Maurice is special but he'd be the last to say it. He's a happy player, he's fluid in his movements, and he's not being asked to do anything he can't do. One thing he can do is to exceed his past accomplishments and you can bet he will try."

Shared language leads to spiritual harvest

NEW YORK (AP) — Whatever their nation or tongue, farmers understand a common medium — the voice of the soil, its produce and secrets of coaxing it to yield its best.

That is the universal language that a Florida couple, Doug and Evelyn Knapp, used in establishing rapport with a remote African tribe in mission work hailed for its bumper spiritual harvest.

Yet they had been feared and shunned until that agricultural mutuality took hold. It became so firm that

before a recent home leave, Knapp was armed by tribesmen for protection from "dangerous" Americans.

"Take this spear," said native pastors he had trained, "to protect yourselves from the 'wahuni' (hoodlums). We have heard on radio that there is much crime in America."

As agricultural missionaries for Southern Baptists, whose 3,700 foreign missionaries outnumber those of any denomination, the Knapps have been on the job 22 years in a tropical, mountainous part of southern Tanzania.

Their impact "has permeated the whole 1,000-square-mile district" of Kyela, says the Rev. Clell Coleman of Hollywood, Fla., who briefly worked with the Knapps there.

It was kinship with the land, Knapp says, that forged his ties with the people.

"Their shamba (farm) is their life," he relates in a new book about his experiences, "Thunder in the Valley," as told to Robert O'Brien and published by Broadman Press.

Knapp, 59, once an "intensive far-

ming" horticulturist of Socrum, Fla., and later assistant Dade County agent in Miami, says when he and his wife took up their mission post in 1964, the Nyakusa tribesmen would flee in fear.

"They treated 'us like the plague,'" he says. "We couldn't seem to get to first base." He says he learned that tribal witch doctors had spread a story that the couple sought to take blood to get power by black magic.

"Now that is a hard thing to overcome," he says.

He proceeded to clear an undeveloped valley area of tropical forest for a demonstration farm, initially of 10 acres, but since grown to more than 100 acres.

Once his "shamba" started producing its abundant fruit and vegetables and big-eared corn, and its cows and chickens yielding much milk and many eggs, the tribesmen got interested.

Soon Knapp was sending out seeds and hatching eggs. That "began to break the ice," he says, and gradually many changes in farming practices were introduced that have im-

proved the people's eating habits, nutrition and health.

Altogether, he says, it took 16 years before those agricultural relationships began to produce spiritual bonds, with Knapp blending talks about Christian faith with his farming tips.

That combination has brought a growing wave of Christian baptisms, 14,409 of them in 1986, an eighth of all baptisms projected for the denomination's entire missions corp, according to the denomination's Foreign Missions Board.

In the past nine years of the Knapps' ministry, baptisms have totalled 40,212, with about 270 churches and preaching points established.

In the Knapps' years on the field, they've endured many difficulties, he relates, bouts of hepatitis, typhoid fever, malaria and other ailments, spent nights in mosquito-infested swamps, been dumped from a capsized canoe, held at spear-point by drunk tribesmen, thwarted attempted robbery, been marooned by floods, and repeatedly stuck in mud.

But they see "many beneficial things we've helped introduce," he says, but what's more, he adds, the people "look on us as friends, not strangers. That goes a long ways."

DEAR POLLY — Is extra-fine sugar equal in measurement to granulated sugar? — ROSE

DEAR ROSE — Extra-fine sugar is granulated sugar, although finer than ordinary granulated sugar. The measurement would be slightly different, and the most accurate way to measure the sugar would be by weight rather than volume. However, the difference would be so small that for practical purposes, you can measure the extra-fine sugar exactly the same way as ordinary granulated sugar. — POLLY

DEAR POLLY — We Italians who cook with tomato sauce a lot know how to get tomato stains out of plastic containers. Wash the containers, set them in the sun for the day — that takes care of the stains. This method also removes tomato stains on tablecloths and clothing. — IDA

DEAR POLLY — Next summer when the zucchini is coming in, remember this idea. My husband really loved my potato pancakes with zucchini in them. This recipe is for two people: Grate 1/2 cup zucchini and 2/3 cup potato. Drain off as much of the liquid as possible. Mix together, and add 1 egg, 1 tablespoon grated onion, 1/2 teaspoon salt (or to taste), a dash of white pepper and enough flour to make a medium-thick batter. Fry as

for potato pancakes in a little oil browning on both sides. — ELVERA

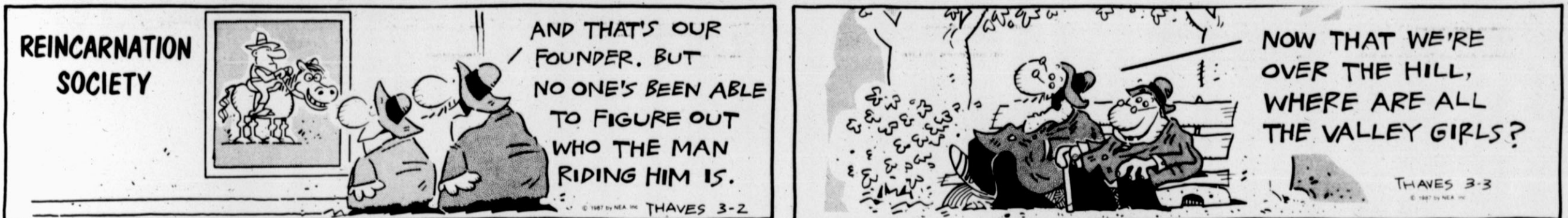

200 rally against sex education classes

SNYDER, Texas (AP) — About 200 people rallying against sex education courses for young students in Snyder schools were told by a local minister to fast and pray for guidance because "education has never cured sin."

Local church officials say the classes, to begin in about two months for fifth, seventh and ninth graders with parental permission, would encourage sexual activity.

Eleven churches and pastors endorsed a full page ad in the Snyder Daily News promoting the rally and decrying the proposed classes.

Friday night, ministers asked rally participants at the Scurry County Coliseum to pray while ministers decide what to do.

"I believe from my heart we need to get down on our knees and talk to God," said the Rev. Danny Williams, pastor of Lighthouse Assembly of God.

"Education has never cured sin, and it never will cure sin," Williams said.

Williams said the ministers are not against good health and hygiene but say sex education of the type to be given in Snyder would encourage

premarital sex.

"...Fornication and all uncleanness, let it not once be named among you," Williams said. "We must rise up to the occasion because of the word of God and not let this be taught to our children."

The seventh grade curriculum, titled "Seventh Grade Human Growth and Development," includes the proper use of condoms, birth control pills, and contraceptive foams, jellies and sponges. It also states that teachers stress that the best form of birth control is saying "no."

Williams told the group to go home

get their lives in order and fast from Monday through Wednesday. Thursday, ministers will meet to decide to approach the school board about the classes.

"If we're going to rise up we must go home from here and take the messages these men preach and practice," he said, referring to the ministers.

"Loved ones, we can not jump down the throats of the school board if we are practicing this in our homes," said Williams.

In a Feb. 22 Snyder Daily News ad promoting the meeting, the churches

charged the sex education classes with "aiding and abetting sexual promiscuity."

However, a Snyder Independent School District official said that many parents and church leaders have approved of the district's sex education curriculum.

Assistant Superintendent Jerry Scannichio said that the school board began talking about the classes after school counselors said more Snyder students are getting pregnant.

Scannichio said an advisory group that included parents, teachers and a minister recommended that the

classes be offered.

During a Feb. 17 board meeting, trustees approved teaching birth control methods to seventh-grade students. However, the material was changed to stress the means of preventing sexually transmitted diseases rather than preventing pregnancy when parents became worried the classes would encourage sexual activity.

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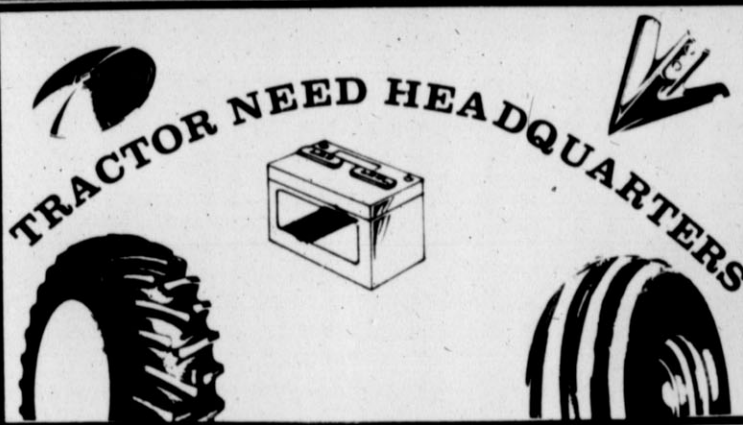
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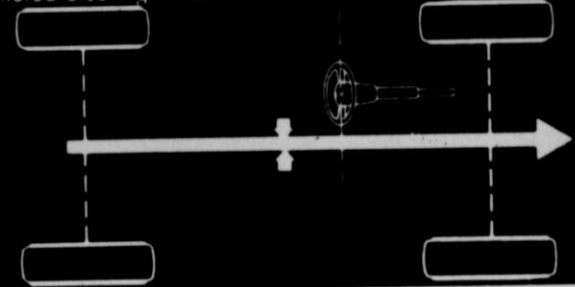
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
