Work Will Start In 60 Days

Contracts were let Tuesday afternoon by the Hereford City Commission to C. Hunter Strain of San Angelo for paving of 120 blocks of city streets and 9 blocks of business alleys. Construction on the paving pro-

ject is slated to start in about 60 days, and the contractor voiced hope that the entire project would completed this year. The contract went to the

Angelo firm on a low bid of \$393,464.92. Strain's bid was some \$28,000 under

the nearest bidder for the same type of paving. The bid includes complete paving, curb and gutter. City officials and engineers were

elated over the low bid, which was considerably under the most optimistic estimates by the city's engineers. The cost of paving to individual property owners will be based on the width of the street to be paved.

Cost schedule per front foot, including curb and gutter, to individual property owners will be:

50-Foot Street \$4.90 per foot. 40-Foot Street \$4.15 per foot. 36-Foot Street \$3.85 per foot. 30-Foot Street \$3.88 per foot. Business Alleys \$4.17 per foot The paving will be a hot-mix

Work on the project will start as soon as the necessary legal pro-ceedings can be taken. Mayor Dem-eron estimated that this would reire about 60 days,





Cosby's article, on free lance writing, follows;

"Three lance work has many advantages not found in any other work. One of the most important of these is that it may be part time. A person may hold down a job in another occupation and write in his spare time. Later, after he has attained some success, he may give up

spare time. Later, after he has attained some success, he may give up his bread and butter job and devote his entire time to writing.

"Some writers make fabulous sums; the majority earn very little. For instance, Margaret Mitchell spent ten years writing her "Gone With the Wind" but a million copies were sold at three dollars each in hix months after publication. Writers are paid on a royalty: that is, they get a specified sum for each copy sold. Authors may sell limited rights that is, they may sell a book to a magazine for serial publication, in which case they receive a lump sum payment. They may then sell the book rights; and later sell the picture and stage rights and possibly the radio rights.

"The best advise that can be given to persons interested in writing is not to become easily discouraged.

"A good old fashioned spring hous cleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a lot of good toward furthering good health in this state," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today, in urging operate in Texas Clean-Up Week April 4-11.

A general clean-up program of tate-wide proportions with the ob-ective of bettering health conditions for our citizenship should in-clude surface cleaning, drainage, the graveling of streets and alleys, the cleaning of all parks and play-grounds and the clearing of weeds and rubbish off of vacant lots.

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises will be, said Dr. Cox, "of inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such a disease typhold and police. keep down summer health hazards such as dysetery, typhoid and polio-myelitis. Good community house-keeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection all through the state."

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many dangerous diseases are filth-borne, and the only possible way to control them is to eliminate the insanitary conditions responsible for their stream.
