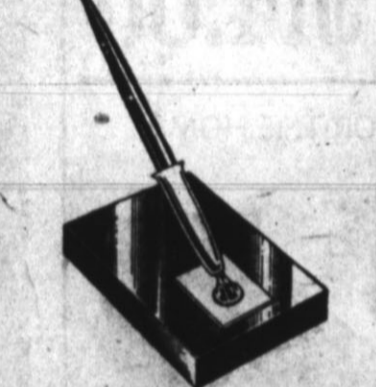

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REFUGEE REPORT MADE AT GENEVA

GENEVA (AP)—A total of 19,244 refugees left Germany, Austria, Italy and other European countries for new homes in Europe and abroad in September and 1,810 more were repatriated, mostly to Poland, the International Refugee Organization says.

Canada offered homes to most of the refugees, receiving 5,888,

Pelastine took 3,811, Venezuela, 2,100, Argentina, 1,813, France, 1,155, Australia, 1,032 and the United Kingdom 814. Smaller numbers of these homeless victims of the war went to a score of other countries.

The total number of refugees re-established since IRO began operations July 1, 1947 is now over 300,000. At the end of September 555,300 refugees were still receiving IRO care and maintenance.

KOREA WATCHING WITHDRAWAL MOVES

INCHON, Korea (AP)—Piled high on the docks of this west coast port is the evidence that the U. S. army is preparing to quit Korea. Here are guns, tanks, trucks, jeeps, refrigerators, tools, engineering and communications equipment, even door knobs, all ready for shipment.

The official U. S. position is to be ready to leave on short notice if the United Nations approves the Korean republic which came into being in the U. N.-observed elections in south Korea in May.

Some Americans say ruefully the United States wasted the three years in Korea because it had no definite program. The Russians in the north knew what they wanted to do, and did it. Koreans watch the withdrawal preparations with mixed emotions. One highly-placed Korean blames the U. S. for Korea's plight. He says if Koreans had been allowed to take over their country at the end of the war there would be no civil strife in Korea.

Other Koreans glance fearfully to the north as they see the Russians withdrawing. In the north are well-armed Koreans, puppets of the Russians, who daily denounce the south Korean government. In the south are the armed rebels who staged the October revolt with the announced intention of uniting south Korea with the communist north. These two forces, it is believed, could form a vise which would squeeze the life out of the Orient's newest republic.

MEDALS RIBBONS
PRAGUE (AP)—The scarcity of metals in Czechoslovakia is reflected in soldier's decorations. Instead of metal badges, they now wear ribbons on their blouses. Red, blue and green ribbons are given for marksmanship and skill in field fighting. A gold, silver or steel colored linden leaf on the ribbon means extra distinction. Soldiers will also be authorized to wear the decorations after they leave the service and go into plain clothes.

History Stirred By Kremlin Restoration

MOSCOW, (AP)—The recent restoration work on the Kremlin has been responsible for many discoveries about this ancient citadel.

A wall older than the Kremlin wall has been found in the lower section of the Blagoveschensky tower. It is part of the former whistone wall which was built at the time of Dimitry Donskoy.

A well preserved fresco of the Sixteenth Century made by Feodica, son of the famous artist, Dionisia, was found when some-old layers of paint were removed from one of the cathedrals inside the Kremlin.

In the Nineteenth Century it was believed that these frescoes were lost forever.

In the corner of the Kremlin's Arsenal tower workers found a bronze signet ring embedded in a wall. The name on the ring was "Yakov" and the family name had been rubbed away.

Warning Against Tuleremia In Wild Rabbits Is Sounded

Austin—Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer warned recently every wild rabbit should be handled with extreme care from the time he is bagged until it is placed on the table because dread tuleremia or "rabbit fever" is transmitted to human beings through careless handling of wild rabbits.

Most cases of tuleremia is transmitted through diseased animals, Dr. Cox said, adding that each year many persons contract the disease because they fail to use proper precautions in handling of rabbits killed for food.

Dr. Cox said that one of the first precautions recommended is to shoot only the healthy rabbits with enough energy to run away from the hunter as he approaches. A listless rabbit that fails to run is probably sick, and should not be taken by the hunter.

A second important safeguard is for the hunter or the housewife to use rubber gloves in cleaning and preparing the rabbit for cooking. The gloves should be sterilized after using, and the refuse and paper that has touched the rabbit should be thoroughly washed after the meat has been set to cook.

Adequate cooking is a final safeguard that should be observed at all times. To destroy any germs that may be present, the meat should be cooked at boiling temperatures for at least twenty minutes, regardless of whether it is to be fried or baked later.

By observing these safety rules, Texans may enjoy their rabbit hunts and rabbit dinners without fear of tuleremia.

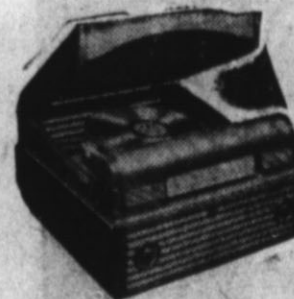

Texans in Washington

WASHINGTON (AP)—Texas is about to get a place once more on the powerful House Rules Committee.

Rep. John E. Lyle, Jr., of Corpus Christi, is the man. If he makes the grade, he will be the first Texan to serve on the committee since Martin Dies of Orange, who lost a reelection contest four years ago.

Although the Rules Committee has little glamor for the man of the street, it is exceedingly important. It acts as a sort of traffic cop for all legislation reported out of other committees and readied for the house floor. If it chooses it can bottle up a measure indefinitely.

A few members of the committee in the past have used this procedure to block administration bills carrying the approval of committees which had studied them thoroughly.

Lyle has acquired a reputation for his independence on roll call votes, but his friends say he would favor sending a bill to the house floor for settlement by a majority vote even though he personally might oppose it.

Comb May Succeed West
 Rep. J. M. Comb, of Beaumont apparently will be the choice to succeed the late Rep. Milton West of Brownsville on the Ways and Means Committee.

All tax, social security and tariff measures in the House are referred to that group. It serves also as the committee on committees for the majority party, making the assignments for all other legislative committees.

Considered the most important of all House Committees, its own members are elected by party caucuses at the beginning of each congress.

Rep. Clark Fisher of San Angelo has been in line to succeed West as Texas' sole member on Ways and Means, having seniority over Combs. Combs, however has the support of House Democratic leaders generally and he is expected to get the nod for the job.

Notwithstanding the fact that Fisher had been pledged to the

backing of Man. Of his Texas colleagues, he is expected to yield and avoid what otherwise might be an unpleasant situation.

It has been this ability of Texans in congress to settle their differences in the family, rather than airing them in public, that has contributed to their reputation and influence as a solid-front delegation.

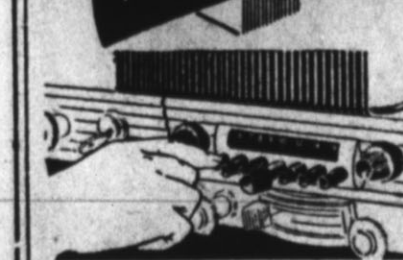

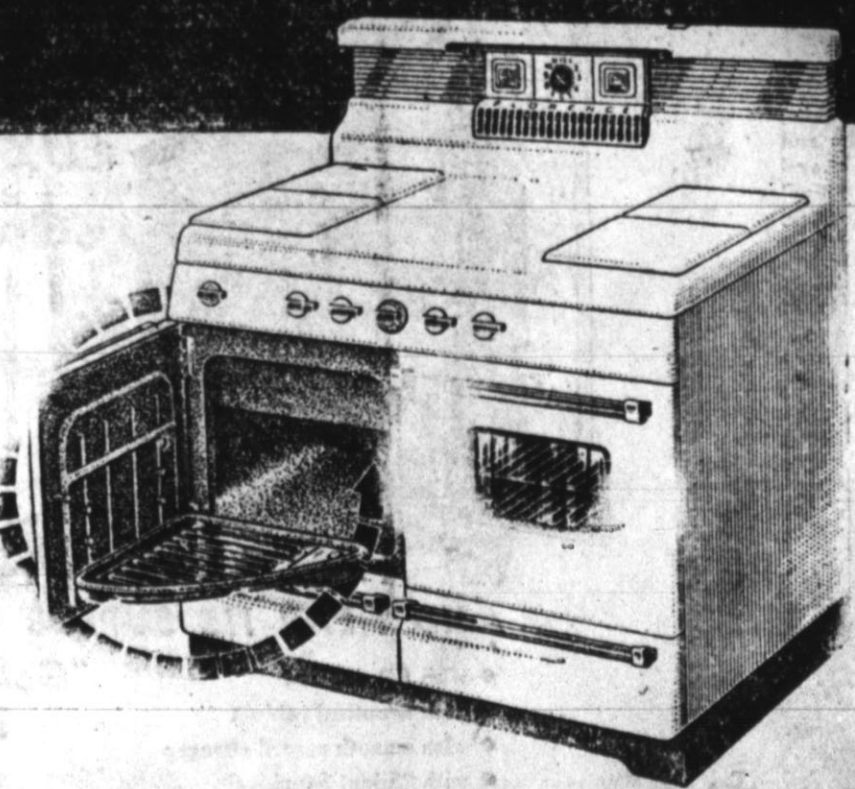
