

## **Postal Volume Shows Decline** For November

For the first time all year the monthly postal receipts show a decline in volume over the amount for the corresponding month in the previous year, Elmer Patterson, postal em-ployee said Thursday.

He said they are cown \$162.44! from last year, the receipts for 1948 being \$2777.31 and for 1947 being \$2939.75.

November is regularly a slow month, coming right after fall harvest bustle and just before the Christmas rush, and the month's slump really shows up when compared with October's The Halloween month raked in the highest receipts for the year so far and was \$1510.70 above November.

Postal officials, however, are not worried over the November low. The first day of December brought in \$565.53 in stamps and requisitions, some \$200 more than the usual first of the month

Besides that, last year's total volume of intake was \$37,907.16. In the first eleven months of this year the local office revenue has been \$37,559.20, only \$347.96 short of the previous annual total, and they even ex-

ceeded that Dec. 1. If the Post Office takes in \$40,000 in annual receipts, it is elevated to first class rank top bracket among U. S. post offices. Hereford, on Nov. 30 was only \$2,440.80 short of that with December still to go.



Proposals Weighed Carefully In discussing the proposed bond election, Mr. Dameron said that the City Commission has spent considerable time in weighing the proposals and feels that passage of all four will be of benefit to the community.

"Proposals No. 1 and No. 2 involve \$52,000 in extensions and repairs on water and sewer extensions within the present city limits," Mr. Dameron said: "These improvements are absolutely necessary for continued operation and, if they are not passed in the election, they will have to be financed through issuance of warrants, which will be more expensive. Therefore, we recommend the first two proposals as economy measures. TELEPHONES ON THE FARM

Rural telephone service is rapidly expanding over the southwest. ofn 1947 The Brand carried extensive coverage on the system which blankets Floyd County. The following article from the Canadian Record brings out a practical plan on rural telephones for all areas with REA lines.

Rural telephone service may be available bere many more months to all farm families in Hemphill and Lipscomb counties who are con-

nected to Rural Electric lines.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is negotiating with directors of the North Plains Rural Electric cooperative which serves these countles for joint use of REA poles for electric and telephone lines.

A contract specifying values and rentals has been approved by the REA Cooperative, and another contract specifying the exact location of territory to be served is being prepared.

One of the newest methods of telephone ransmission, just out of the experimental stage. may be utilized in the Canadian and Glazier areas. Plans are to install the Carrier system. which utilizes REA lines for telephone transmission, in these areas.

A contract for the use of this system over REA lines in the Glazier-Canadian area has been sumbitted by the Telephone company to the Board of Directors of the cooperative.

If the system is adopted, and indications are now that it will be, low-cost rural telephone service will be available to every family in the area serviced by REA.

G. H. Newberry, of Pampa; district superintendent for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, reports that plans are well along for the gural phone system in this area.

Newberry would not predict, however, how on service might be made available; but it apeared certain that nothing could be done before CONVERSATION. next spring.

Adequate cooking is a final safeguard that should be ob-served at all times. To destroy any germs that may be present, the meat should be cooked at boiling temperatures for at least twenty minutes, regardless of whether it is to be fried or baked later.




