

#### Graham Addresses nittee deems fit. Included in School Leaders On Gilmer-Aikin Bill

How well the high school systems have anticipated modern trends in education, business and civic progress was emphasized Saturday in Amarillo when school administrators held a meeting to discuss current school problems.

The program was part of the regular session of the Panhandle Superintendents and principals Association with Dr. A. M. Meyers, president of Amarillo Junior College, in which 650 col\_ lege students participated to de-termine how well the average high school student is fitted for

C. M. Rogers, superintendent of Amarillo schools, spoke on school legislation now pending in Austin and told how the Gilmer-Aiken Bill would affect city schools.

Gilmer-Aiken Bill Using 1947-48, statistics as a basis for figures, George Graham, superintendent of Hereford schools, explained what the bill, if passed, would mean to class A schools or schools from 1.000 to 2,000 pupils enrolled. "There are three items which would be affected mainly," he said, "State apportionment under the Gilmer-Aiken Bill would be lowered from \$55 to \$50 per capita, which would have been a loss to our district of \$7,925. Under the State Aid plan we received \$31,-581 last year and under the Gil\_ mer-Aiken plan we would have received \$56,491; however, the new plans calls for increases in teachers salaries, etc., to the extent of \$20,964, meaning that Show at the Cogdell Building we would have received \$16,985 more state aid at a cost of \$3,979





## January Telephone Damage Reaches Ten Million Dollars

January was the most costly month Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ever has known-\$10 million dollars damage from ice, sleet, floods, zero cold, wind. Winter's paralyzing blows brought the most costly disaster in company history, and also the most extensive.

From San Antonio and Pecos, through most of central and west Texas, diagonally across Oklahoma, southeastern Kansas, northwest Arkansas, and Missouri to Hannibal on the banks of the Mississippi River, new storms caused additional damage every few days. #### Service restored quickly

Two things made it possible to restore service quickly.

First, the diligence and skill of 4,200 telephone men. They came with their trucks and tools from all parts of our company territory and from other Bell System companies-Mountain-States, Illinois Bell, Southern Bell.

Disregarding personal hardships and in the finest traditions of the business, these men worked from dawn to dark-from "can" to "can't" as Plant men say-seven days a week, under conditions that were always difficult. way or another, they got to where they were needed, and they got the job done.

Wire shipments during the month were more than was required by Southwestern Bell in all of the fourth quarter of 1948 for normal purposes. In addition to wire, thousands of poles, crossarms, and tons of pole-line hardware were moved by truck, by express, and by air into the storm areas.

#### **Equipment is standardized**

In the Bell System telephone equipment is standardized. The parts that fit in Texas work equally well in Missouri, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, or anywhere else. Thus, even the construction gangs from the other companies found no equipment puzzles-and their own tools worked perfectly.

Bell System teamwork met the challenge of these storms. Most of the service has been restored. But permanent repairs, especially on toll lines, will take months to complete. 



As a PROUD REGION reaches a measure of maturity it is inclined to hark back to the lessons of its beginning, much as reflection and reminiscence follow action with a man of age. It is easy now to recall that, white settlers once rushed to cross over and forget these southwestern plains, mesas and breaks-this section that even those tough travelers found so austere, so severe, so unforgiving.

But as the trails of these first white men-Santa Fe traders, gold seekers, army explorers and others-cut their significant ruts through the clean sod, a race of rugged red men went their free and independent ways along dim trails, the beginnings of which were even then lost with age.

Scientists still potter around in ancient ruins and ponder the origins of the Indians, artists continue to portray their life and customs in lasting oils, and historians dig into the writ-ten records to depict in print their durable nature. In the light of all the records, those of the Great Plains and the bordering mountain ranges, were a notable breed.

There were the wily Apaches and the more stable Utes on the western INDIAN WAYS AND TIMES BY EVETTS HALEY ILLUSTRATED BY H. D. BUGBEE .

fringes, the mighty Comanches and the Kiowas on and around the Staked Plains, and the fighting Cheyennes and a host of others farther north. In a way, and by modern standards, they lived upon a squalid level of subsistence. Fortunately for those who cherish the heroic qualities of the human race, however, their glory was not dependent on their plumbing, but on their rugged character and their dauntless cour-

Still this is not to gloss over the violence of their period or the savagery of their deeds. For nearly a hundred years on the Southwestern frontiers, it was never gentle but it was war to the knife. For those wars then, as are wars now, were for survival. The pattern of the story in this section is generally known. Marble

shafts mark the spots where bitter memories record the deeds: Carson's fight on the Canadian; Mackenzie's battle in the Palo Duro; Chivington's massacre on the Big Sandy; Custer's on the Washita; embattled buffalo hunters fighting for their lives at Adobe Walls; and many others just as important and sometimes more commendable.

Yet on through the sixties and seventies these mighty warriors held the southwestern peaks and plains to within the memory of our oldest men —until the regions round about were fairly civilized and settled. Only when the combined forces of the Texas Rangers and the regular army from outposts in Kansas, present Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico -with a riotous sprinkling of outraged settlers - moved against them,

was their resistance definitely broken. And then their tactics and their strategy — models of mobility and movement — were apparently forgotten until the late world war.

And while a mechanical age makes a mockery of distance, there is still something wildly challenging to the imagination in the magnificent sweep of the Comanches, from their buffalo ranges on the upper reaches of the Arkansas across half a continent, to depredate upon the cattle ranches of central Mexico. There was the stubborn mettle of determined men in the long resistance of the bloody Apaches in their mountain strongholds. There was pathos and tragedy, as well as bold maneuver and military genius, in the last flight of the Cheyennes from the hated reservations in Indian Territory, back to their ancestral home on the northern ranges. And finally, when all were subdued and beaten, if never conquered, they simply submitted with the grave stoicism and the high and haughty dignity of worthy war riors and real men.

In retrospect, it should be conduc-ive to civilized tolerance to realize that there is no monopoly upon virtue in the rugged realms of the


