When it begins to get dark, the lights automatically come on and, likewise, go off each morning. No clocks or other mechanical devices are needed."

Mr. Brumble was unable to say at exactly what point the "magic eyes" would function, but added: "I would guess a real bad dust storm, like they used to have, would be about the point at which they would come on."

"Hereford will unquestionably be one of the best-lighted towns in the Panhandle," he concluded, "and will have the most modern of incandescent equipment."

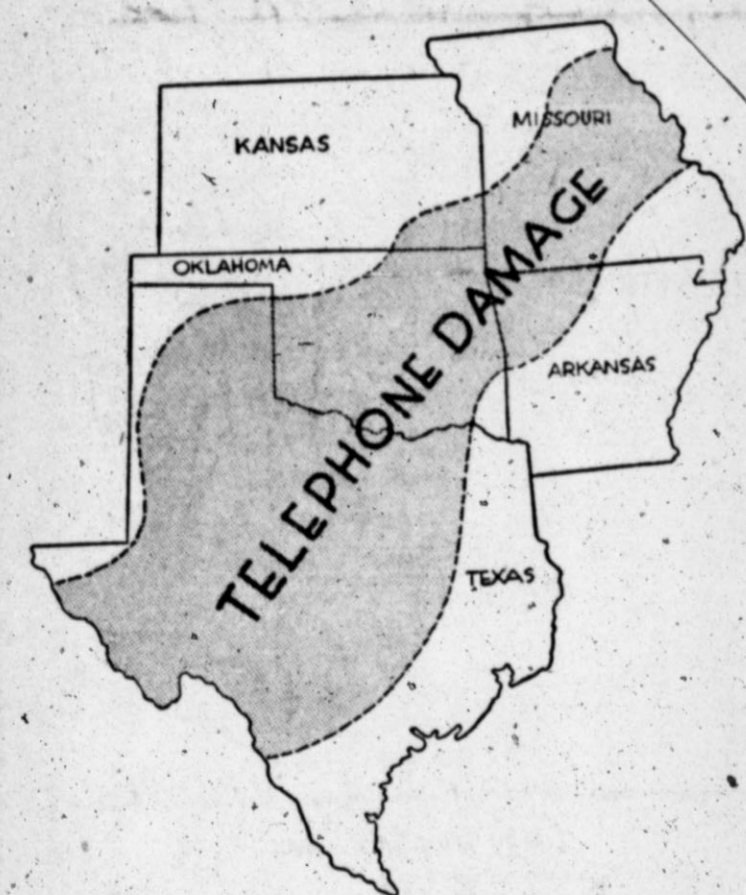

pounds of lint cotton to the acre. So with 127 pounds of lint cotton as the Texas average why shouldn't we feel elated over our 1923 cotton crop?"

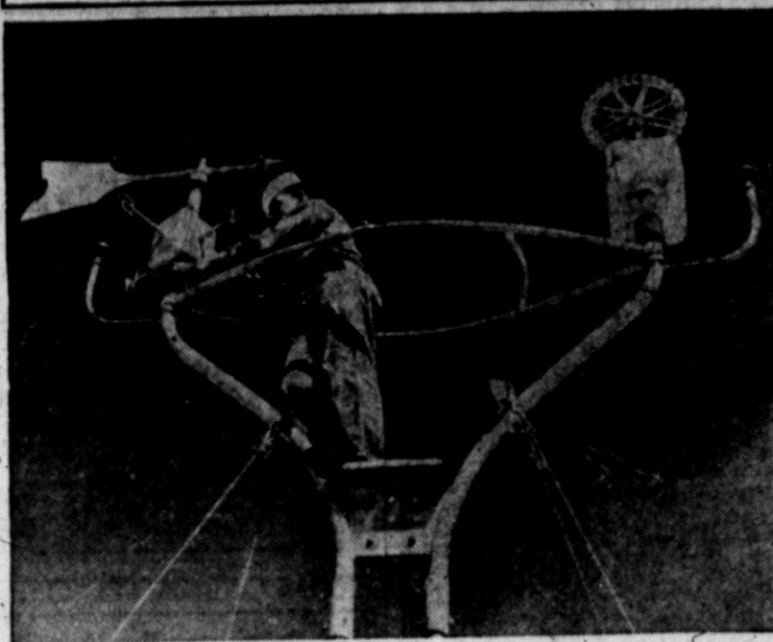

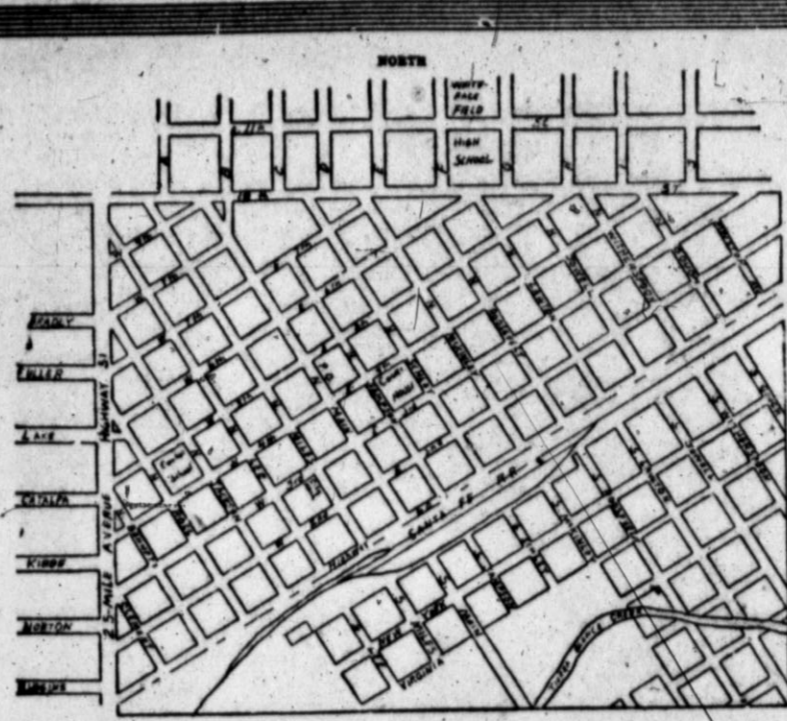

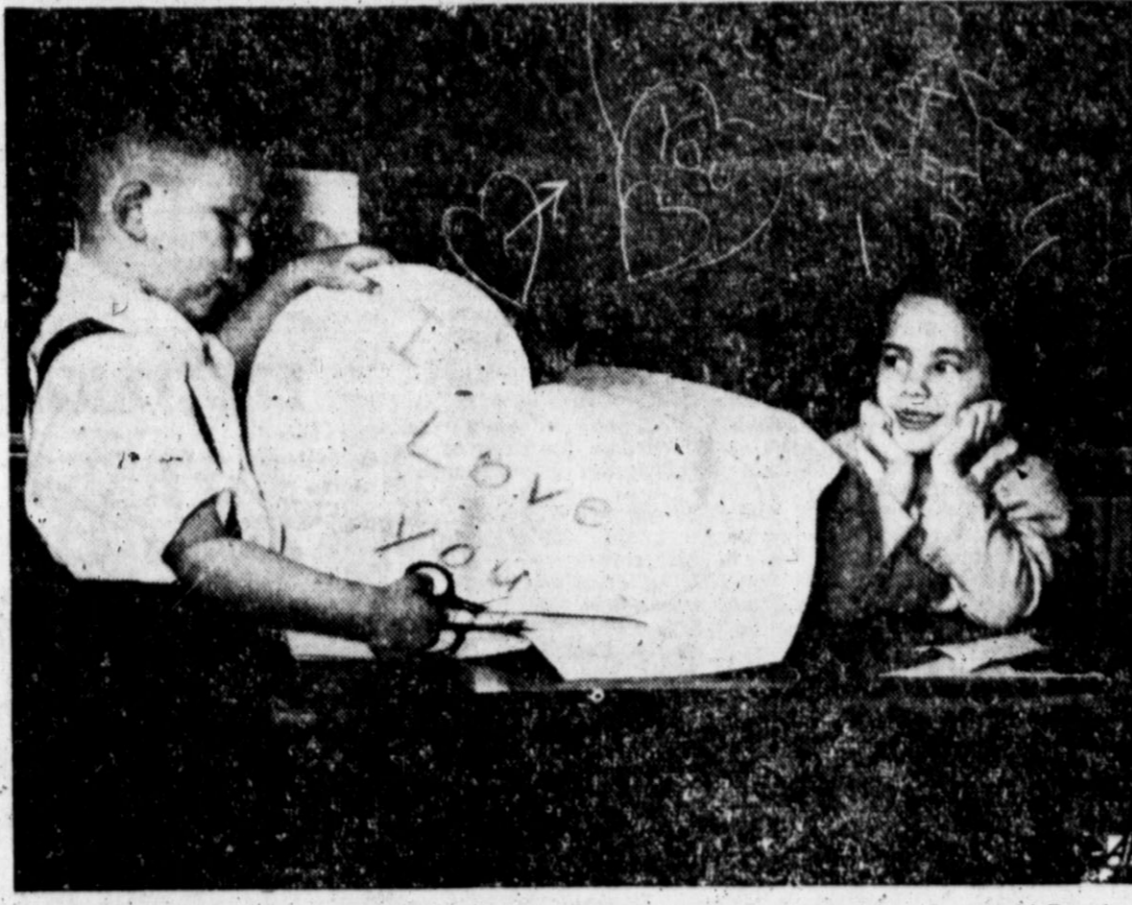

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Pennsylvania growers predict they will raise 1,441,000 turkeys in 1949.
The state agriculture department reports that if the growers' plans are carried out, it means an autumn crop within 19,000 of the all time record raised in 1945.
Major factors fostering increased production include a plentiful supply of feed and the strong demand for turkey before and during the holiday season.
A federal-state survey discloses there will be a 25 per cent increase in turkey growing nationally.

'Black List' Stops Drinking

St. Peter Port, Guernsey (AP)—Guernsey men say the finest cure for drunkenness is the "black list."
That is simply a list of men—and women—who must not be served with alcoholic drinks on the 16,000 square mile island. And anyone disregarding it and selling or giving a drink to a listed man is liable to \$200 fine or six months' imprisonment. It's a medieval practice that works so well it's been preserved.
Chief Inspector John Banneville of the Guernsey civil investigation department quoted one man black listed for the last two years.
"It is impossible for me to get a drink on this island now. No one dares serve me; no one ever dreams of asking me to have a drink."
Some are black listed voluntarily; others are listed on magistrates' orders for excessive drunkenness.
Those on the black list are photographed holding a blackboard on which is written his name and age and the period for which he is blacklisted. The sentence records that he is on

the black list for a period varying from one year to life.
Then copies of the photograph are sent to every hotel and bar proprietor on the island. It must be exhibited but every proprietor must keep it near his bar for quick reference.

INDIAN WAYS AND TIMES
BY EVETTS HALEY
ILLUSTRATED BY H. D. BUGBEE
As a PROUD REGION reaches a measure of maturity it is inclined to hark back to the lessons of its beginning, much as reflection and reminiscence follow action with a man of age. It is easy now to recall that white settlers once rushed to cross over and forget these southwestern plains, mesas and breaks—this section that even those tough travelers found so austere, so severe, so unforgiving.
But as the trails of these first white men—Santa Fe traders, gold seekers, army explorers and others—cut their significant ruts through the clean sod, a race of rugged red men went their free and independent ways along dim trails, the beginnings of which were even then lost with age.
Scientists still potter around in ancient ruins and ponder the origins of the Indians, artists continue to portray their life and customs in lasting oils, and historians dig into the written records to depict in print their durable nature. In the light of all the records, those of the Great Plains and the bordering mountain ranges were a notable breed.
There were the wily Apaches and the more stable Utes on the western fringes, the mighty Comanches and the Kiowas on and around the Staked Plains, and the fighting Cheyennes and a host of others farther north. In a way, and by modern standards, they lived upon a squalid level of subsistence. Fortunately for those who cherish the heroic qualities of the human race, however, their glory was not dependent on their plumbing, but on their rugged character and their dauntless courage.
Still this is not to gloss over the violence of their period or the savagery of their deeds. For nearly a hundred years on the Southwestern frontiers, it was never gentle but it was war to the knife. For those wars then, as are wars now, were for survival. The pattern of the story in this section is generally known. Marble shafts mark the spots where bitter memories record the deeds: Carson's fight on the Canadian; Mackenzie's battle in the Palo Duro; Chivington's massacre on the Big Sandy; Custer's on the Washita; embattled buffalo hunters fighting for their lives at Adobe Walls; and many others just as important and sometimes more commendable.
Yet on through the sixties and seventies these mighty warriors held the southwestern peaks and plains to within the memory of our oldest men—until the regions round about were fairly civilized and settled. Only when the combined forces of the Texas Rangers and the regular army from outposts in Kansas, present Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico—with a riotous sprinkling of outraged settlers—moved against them, was their resistance definitely broken. And then their tactics and their strategy—models of mobility and movement—were apparently forgotten until the late world war.
And while a mechanical age makes a mockery of distance, there is still something wildly challenging to the imagination in the magnificent sweep of the Comanches, from their buffalo ranges on the upper reaches of the Arkansas across half a continent, to depredate upon the cattle ranches of central Mexico. There was the stubborn mettle of determined men in the long resistance of the bloody Apaches in their mountain strongholds. There was pathos and tragedy, as well as bold maneuver and military genius, in the last flight of the Cheyennes from the hated reservations in Indian Territory, back to their ancestral home on the northern ranges. And finally, when all were subdued and beaten, if never conquered, they simply submitted with the grave stoicism and the high and haughty dignity of worthy warriors and real men.
In retrospect, it should be conducive to civilized tolerance to realize that there is no monopoly upon virtue in the rugged realms of the human heart.

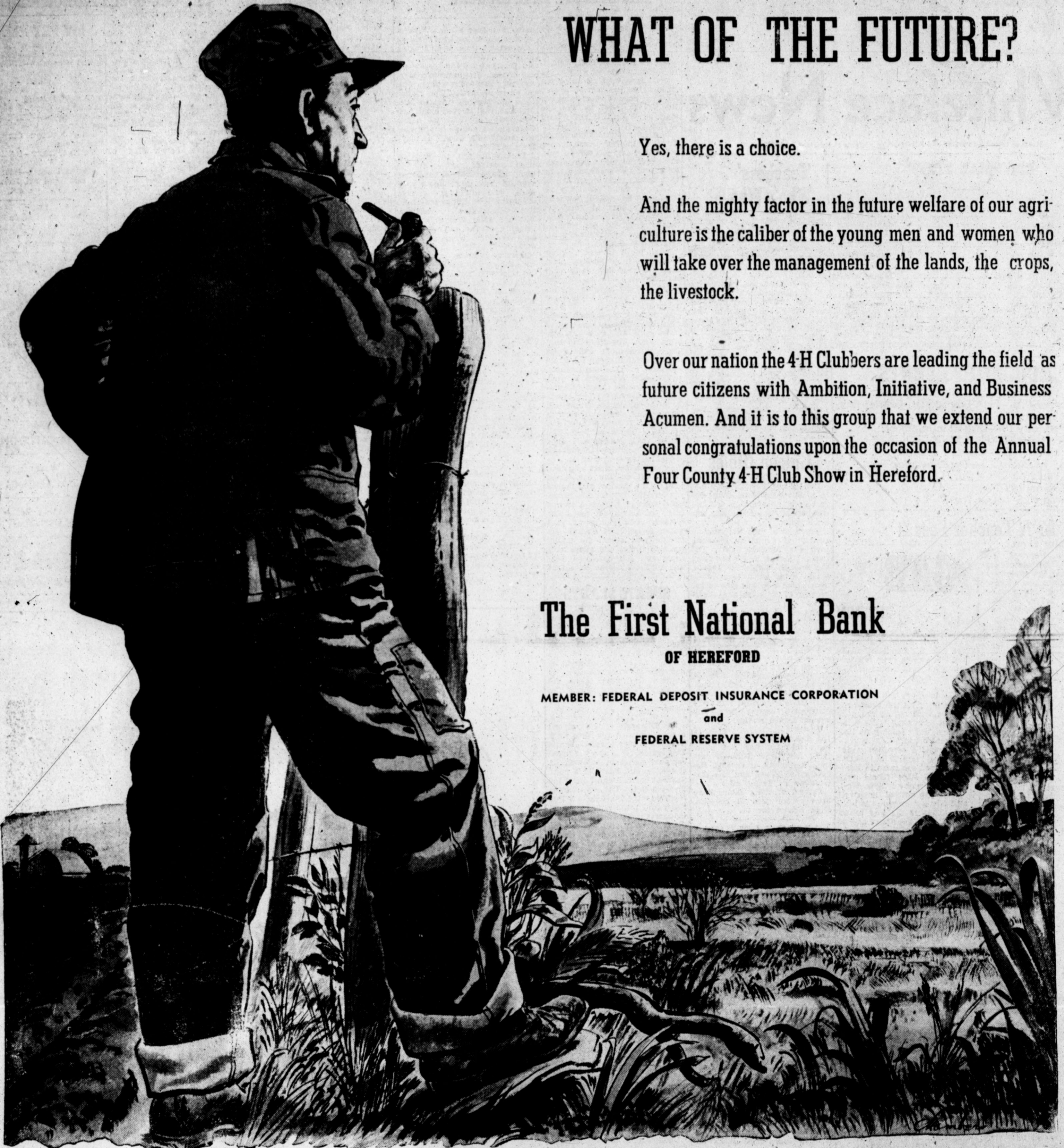

Delivers Letters Inside Fresh Eggs

DES MOINES, Ia. (AP)—If you know a hen's egg-assembly line layout you can put messages inside chicken eggs—before the eggs are laid. Dr. Robert E. Phillips, head of the department of poultry husbandry at Iowa State College, has been doing it for years. Dr. Phillips, who has surprised friends with greetings or congratulatory messages sent inside freshly laid eggs, says anyone can do it. All you need is to be handy with a scalpel and know the inner workings of a live hen. You simply substitute the message for the regular yolk at the precise moment the yolk starts its journey toward becoming an egg. Dr. Phillips explained. The hen does the rest. Best results are obtained by placing the message in a container smaller than the egg yolk, Dr. Phillips said. Many birds, including storks, parrots, woodpeckers and even ducks, can regenerate beaks which have been broken off.

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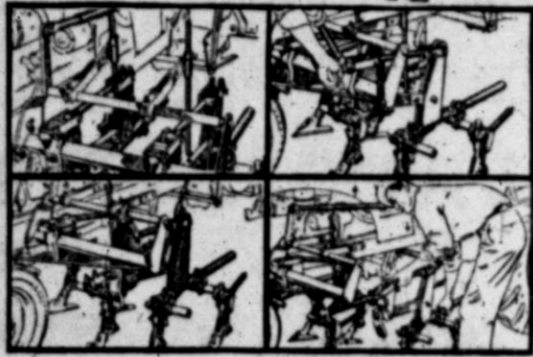
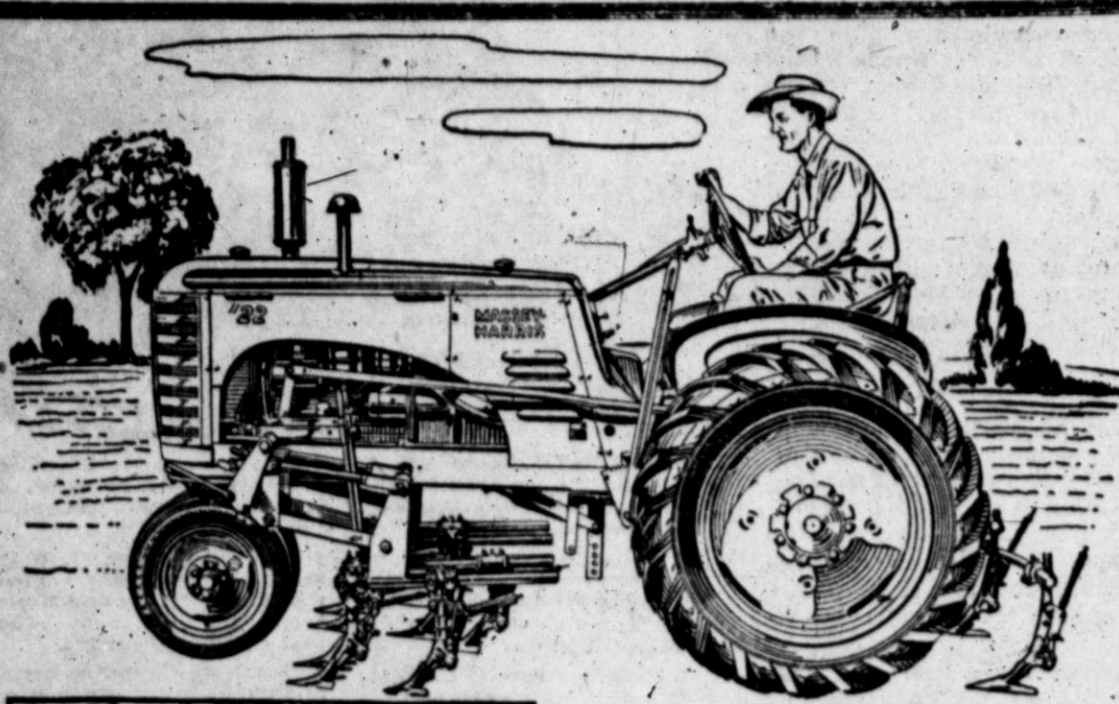
