14.5-cent loaf of bread. The other items that make up the price of bread are 8 cents for the miller, 9.7 cents for the baker and retailer, and one cent for all other costs—salt, soda, spices, storage charges and so forth.

Farm prices always dance up and down as market conditions play the tune, and today the market is flush with wheat from good crop years. But food processors' marketing costs move forward or backward very slowly under the stimulus of market conditions. It will take many a price decline in other fields to move them from their present peak.

### Duster Pilot Is Killed In Crash

Don D. Fritz, 29 years old, was killed early Sunday morning when the Piper Cub he was flying crashed on a farm a mile west of the Plainview city limits. According to accounts, the plane, which had been converted into a crop duster, must have stalled at the end of the field while Fritz was making a turn or trying to get over the high lines. The plane burst into flames and was destroyed as soon as it hit the ground.

Last week and the week before Fritz and his partner, Doug Craig, had been engaged by local potato growers to dust potato fields in the Hereford area. In turning around at the end of a field on the Mark Koenig place last Saturday, Fritz snap-

ped two high lines and crashed to the ground, damaging the plane but causing no injury. Among those who employed him here were Gus Schiabs, John Paetzold, Raymond Paetzold, Vern Pickens, Mark Koenig, Ollie Peters and Ernest Hardeman.

Fritz had lived in Plainview for about a year and a half. He served as a flight officer in the Army Air Corp for about six years during World War II, taking part in the European campaigns.

In 1942, he was married to Miss Latrice Loe, and they had three children, Donna, 5; Kenneth, 2; and Stephen, six months old. Formerly, he had been local manager of the Pioneer Airlines in Plainview. Funeral services were conducted Monday morning at the Lamesa Church of Christ, and burial was in Lamesa.

# As I Knew Deaf Smith County

By VERN WITHERSPOON  
(Second Installment)

Now we have the county organized and officers installed but as a surprise to everyone we found very few cattle stolen. Two men were killed the first year—the sheriff killed one and one man was killed on the Carter ranch.

After the county was organized the population more than doubled in the strip (this strip as it was called consisted of the east part of the county east of the KIT Ranch) but not for long as most of them were farmers who could not make a living with the equipment we had at that time. Can you feature a farmer out here in this country with two small ponies and a twelve inch plow making a living raising millet, sorghum and stalks of corn with cobs; but no corn on the cob, as the worms would get the corn.

The farming equipment we had at that time consisted of two small ponies, one 12-inch walking plow and a sryup bucket filling with holes in one end and a wire through the ends. The bucket was filled with seed and as it rolled, the seed would spill out through the holes. We would go two rounds, then tie on the bucket, plant a row, then make two rounds and plant again.

We did not have to cultivate as there were no weeds. If we raised any crop we cut it by hand with a corn knife, laid it in piles and then shocked it.

Farming in this way in this county brings to my mind a story that fits in so well I will have to repeat it. Back in the early day there was a certain young lady who came from the east out here to teach school, and as usual, she got married and in due time there was a baby born. Every time the mother wrote home she would brag about what a fine baby they had. After a time she and her husband went back to visit her folks. On arrival the grandmother kept looking at the baby, saying, "Why is he such a frail little fellow?"

The cowboy, after listening some time, said, "Lady, you don't know that country out there. It is so dry we are glad to get our seed back."

After failing at farming, we had our choice of leaving the country—which about fifty per cent did—or going in the cattle business. And that business was not all roses.

First we had prairie fires which some times started at the New Mexico state line and burned off the caprock east. Next was the loco year, which happened as a rule about every five years. Ask the old cattle men what loco will do to horses and cattle. One year out of three hundred mother cows my father and I branded, we had twelve calves to ship that fall.

Next we had the bad winters

with their losses which we figured amounted to about 10 per cent. If you missed the fires, loco years, and bad winters, you felt good. Your calves would bring from 12 to 16 dollars at weaning time, but we generally held them until spring when we could get \$20 to \$25 a head.

Our finances did not bother us, as the bankers looked after that—such bankers as W. H. Fuqua of Amarillo, and later John Ferguson, George Muse, and Bill Obrien of Hereford.

Some times after a loco year we would have to pad our tally list or borrow some of our neighbor's cattle so we could renew our loans. This was the policy of those bankers: if you didn't have the money and went in and told them you wanted to renew your note, they wanted the money; but if you went in and told them you wanted to pay the note they would say, "Can't you use this money to buy some more cows? We want to loan you this money."

You can guess it was not long before we knew how to get this loan renewed. I wonder if they ever suspected we padded the tally sheet!

The first sale of land I know of was in Oldham County. It was land the state put up to the highest bidder to get money to pay for surveying. The highest bid was 25¢ cents an acre. At this time the state sold the school land for \$2.00 an acre on forty years time, but you had to live on this land three years and you were allowed only 640 acres.

Every section of this land except two was forfeited to the state for non-payment. Not only in Deaf Smith County, but in practically all the counties on the plains was forfeited, so Texas got back her land.

Through the influence of the cattle men, the Legislature revised the one section law and reclassified all West Texas lands as grazing land, allowing four to eight sections to the man. The price was to be \$1.00 per acre, 10 years time to pay, at 3 per cent interest. This made the greatest change the country had seen. I will say that within one year practically all the school land was sold to nesters, as we called them, from 4 to 20 sections to the man, who fenced their land, put down wells, and began raising feed for their cattle.

These men soon become prosperous, as every alternate section was patented land with free grass. On this eight sections a man would run between four to five hundred cattle.

In the election of 1892 we missed some faces, but could see new ones, as we gained seven votes in that election. Some of these new faces were: Robert Hare, George Sache of the North Draw, Jacob Butran, the Farley

family, George Muse, Lee Goats, Henry Von Linin, Judge J. P. Connell of the South draw, J. C. Womble and others; from the Northeast part of the county. Yes, and there were Billie Higgins, Summie Higgins, John Higgins, Charlie Hodges, Clarence Wheeler and others.

Well, I must bring up my town, as it was the only one in the county. Yes, we had preaching. I wonder how many remember the old circuit rider preachers. We had one that drove a horse and buggy from Clarendon to LaPlata once a month, and others from Amarillo. So we had church and Sunday school most of the time.

The Presbyterian Church of Hereford was organized at LaPlata, and later was moved to Hereford. As you see, we changed the name of our town from Grenada to LaPlata about eighteen months after the County seat was located there, as there was another Grenada in Texas and we had to change the name to get a post office. We had mail delivered twice a week from Amarillo.

Oh yes, and we had a newspaper called the LaPlata Star, a copy of which my nephew still has. Before passing from ranching to farming I want to pay tribute to Ira Aten, E. P. Connell, Captain McDonald, and Judge

Bishop for the splendid job they did in enforcing the law. This alone would make a nice story.
