tually is a fertilizer and kills weeds by "growing them to death," has been the subject of some highly controversial Farmers present discussed

their experience with the solution, pointing out how they thought many of their broadleafed crops had been ruined when grain fields nearby had been sprayed with the fertilizer.

County Agent Hugh Clearman read reports from government the First Baptist Church with bulletins pointing out that 2-4-D in dusting fields, and that the poison would travel 8 to 16 miles downwind with a 10 mile wind and 2 miles upwind.



The life of an early day Methdist preacher wasn't an easy The and sometimes the going was pretty steep. Eut he made every nurdle as the years went by filled with a succession of assignments from one charge to another, at the discretion of the conference.

To begin with, Beavers was a armer and expected to stay a armer, but an insistant urge that finally became a loud call led him into the ministry after the second attempt to leave the farm. Born in Arkansas he moved to Texas with his parents when a small boy and located on a farm, near Cisco. He married Miss Alma Munn in 1899 and not for several years after his marriage did he become a 'horse and preacher who rode the circuit regularly day after day. It was with her encouragement that he burned all his bridges cehind him, sold the farm and entered his mission of service. He moved with his wife and five children to his first charge at Haskell mission as a supply preacher in 1905, and because he didn't have time to go to colege, began a four year corres-

pondence course in theology. During the years of his ministry. Reverend Beavers served in fourteen different churches scattered over West and Northwest Texas. Two of these churches were built under his pastorship and he recalled that he





The same thing is true with fish. They must be harvested like any other crop. If they aren't, then the older fish never grow large, and the new fish will always stay small.

Tests show that little fish not more than three inches long will them grow any larger. They will them not at all. The result is over-population, with lots of fish. But all the fish are small and the longer it is allowed to continue, the longer the fishing will be bad and conditions grow worse.

As for "out-fishing a lake," tests by H. S. Swingle, Alabama expert who is one of the leading fish culturists in America, show that seems to be impossible.

Using shifts of men who fished 24 hours A DAY FOR ONE COM-PLETE YEAR Swingle found that not more than 50 per cent of the fish can possibly be removed by fishing, and by keeping the numbers from becoming too great, all the fish will be bigger

and healthier. Thus they produce more young and bigger young. When the fish are not too numerous and there is plenty of food, a bass will grow to one pound and other fish to proportionate sizes in less than one YEAR.

When there are too many fish, the fish may never reach one pound, as is seen by many tests and proved even forcefully by several Panhandle lakes.

There probably isn't a man in West Texas who would feel imposed on if a reasonable limit was setup, and 99 out of every 100 you can't fish a lake out, but if would stick to the regulation. In other words Im getting at this: seeing so many fish going out of the lake makes people unhappy, don't ban trotlines, just put on a

If some guys get recreation from running a trotline, and-some from pole fishing, then what right has one group to tell the other it must stop? The true sportsmen will give you honest opinions on which type of fishing they enjoy and why, but you'll look a long time before you'll find one who would take away the other fellow's dun.




