Monday, January 8, is scheduled as Dollar Day No. 2 in Hereford. The date originally set for Tuesday, January 3, was rescheduled by merchants today in view of the snow storm and blizzard which swept this area on the first day.

Postal Receipts Exceed 1949 By Almost \$3,000

Remaining ahead of 1949 by several hundred dollars during every quarter postal receipts during 1950 exceeded the total for last year by \$2,815.89.

The heaviest quarter for both years was the final one ending in December. Receipts during the final quarter of 1950 amounted to \$15473.95, and \$14490.49 was the total for the December quarter in 1949.

In the first quarter this year the post office at Hereford received a total of \$11628.41, as compared to \$11268.12 in receipts for a similar period in 1949.

The June quarter of 1950 saw receipts jump to more than \$1000 above the same period in 1949.

Although no definite statement could be made, the recent embargo on mail may have caused postal receipts to be less than the would have been otherwise.

The total this year, however, remains high above that for 1949.

Brownlow surrendered Sunday at a Dallas police station. He said after Vargo had been hit he (Brownlow) had driven to Carrollton where he let a passenger from his car. He said he then drove to Park Springs, in Wise County, where he decided to "return and clear up this business."

Charges were filed Tuesday before Justice of the Peace Pierce McBride Brownlow was released Tuesday on bond of \$2,500 for each charge.

Plans Underway For Polio Drive

In announcing preliminary plans for the 1951 March of Dimes drive, January 15 through January 31, John D. Aiken, campaign director for Deaf Smith County, said the community should get behind the polio drive this year and do everything possible to put it over Polio in Texas this year and his "hard."

The Lions Club has decided to have its booth one week during the drive. Mr. Aiken announced, at present, leaders of the March of Dimes drive.

Working with the chairman in plans for the drive are: Bill Warren, G. H. Howard, and Paul Harvey, who is county polio chairman.

For the third successive year polio has hammered Texas with epidemic force, said Mr. Aiken.

In 1950, Texas outranked every other state in overall March of Dimes aid received. Into Texas went the most respirators, most hot pack machines, most cribs and beds, most nurses and physical therapists, most resident physicians and most orthopedic nursing advisers.

Texas was second only to Michigan among states, whose own March of Dimes funds were depleted by the 1950 epidemic. Michigan received more than \$600,000 in March of Dimes advances from the national epidemic aid fund and Texas was close behind with well over half a million," he added.

Wheat harvest hopes are up again as drouth ends. The county had deep moisture underneath by wheat roots are extremely shallow this year and until now have not been taking advantage of the deep moisture.

The present rains and snow, wheat farmers say, may bring the roots down to the deep moisture and make the crop a success.

Another snow and rain containing as much moisture as the present spell of weather would almost assure the crop, farmers report. Green bugs—always a wheat threat—were not reported to have done extreme damage and were not expected to be a cause if wheat fails again this year.

A low norther laden with snow was reported on its way to the Panhandle from northern states. Radio weather broadcasters said Wednesday the new moisture should arrive Friday or Saturday.

Although severe drouths have been felt in this area before, the recently formed dry spell had all the earmarks of a "toast-er"—the kind old-timers report ravaged verdure in the plains in years past. The last rains fell here in September.

Had the drouth continued, farming in Deaf Smith County would have fallen far down the ladder of averages as far as income is concerned. The wheat crop was lost and farm income was supplemented only by an abundant grain harvest and a steady market for it.

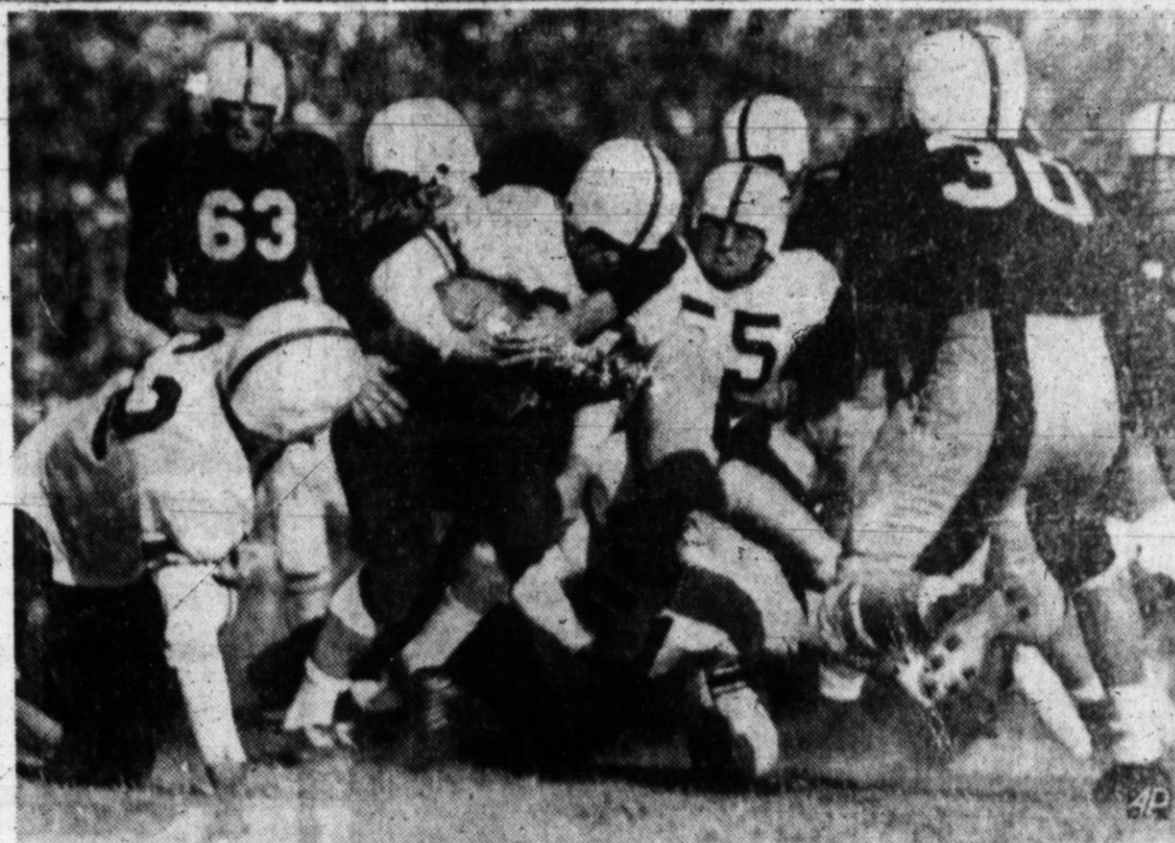

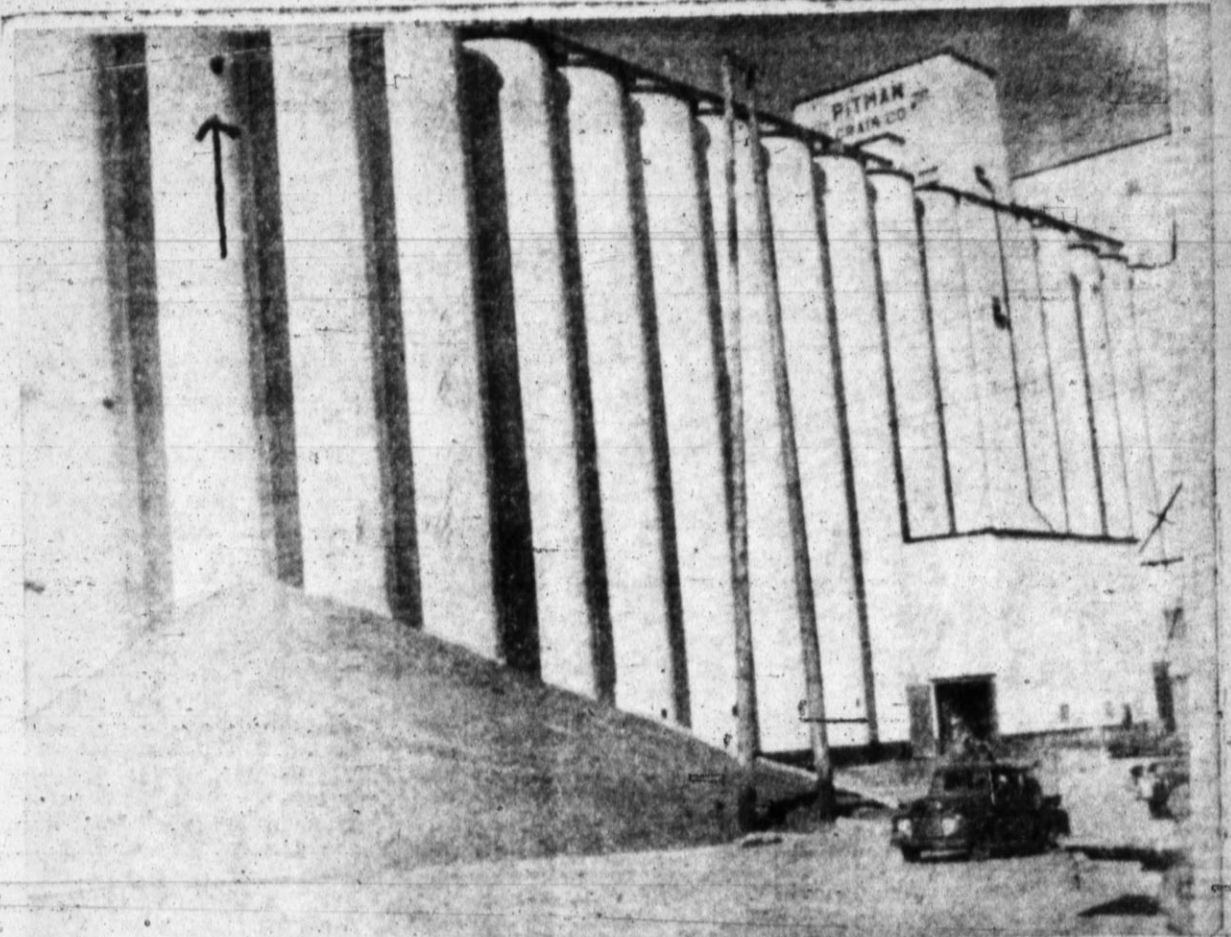

Yes, 1950, brought progress to Hereford and Deaf Smith County—along with prosperity for some and heartaches for others. After losing the wheat crop from insects and drought, farmers failed to make substantial yields on lettuce, potatoes and sugar beets, but the country was saved by one of the largest grain yields in history. The picture, left, shows grain piled on the ground as elevators overflowed, unable to handle the tremendous yield. This fact, coupled with moisture the past week changed the outlook of the area completely.



A highlight of 1950 was the formal opening of Harrison Highway last August. Above may be seen a portion of the crowd which turned out for the big event as literally thousands of Texans invaded Eastern New Mexico to celebrate the occasion. Fred Wimple, State Highway Chairman cut the ribbon and to the right Mrs. E. W. Harrison officially stepped across the New Mexico line as first lady of the day. Mrs. Harrison, wife of the man for whom the highway was named, viewed the proceedings with pride—a tribute to an outstanding pioneer.

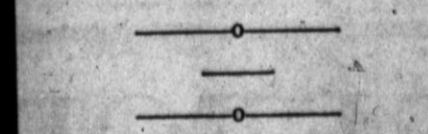

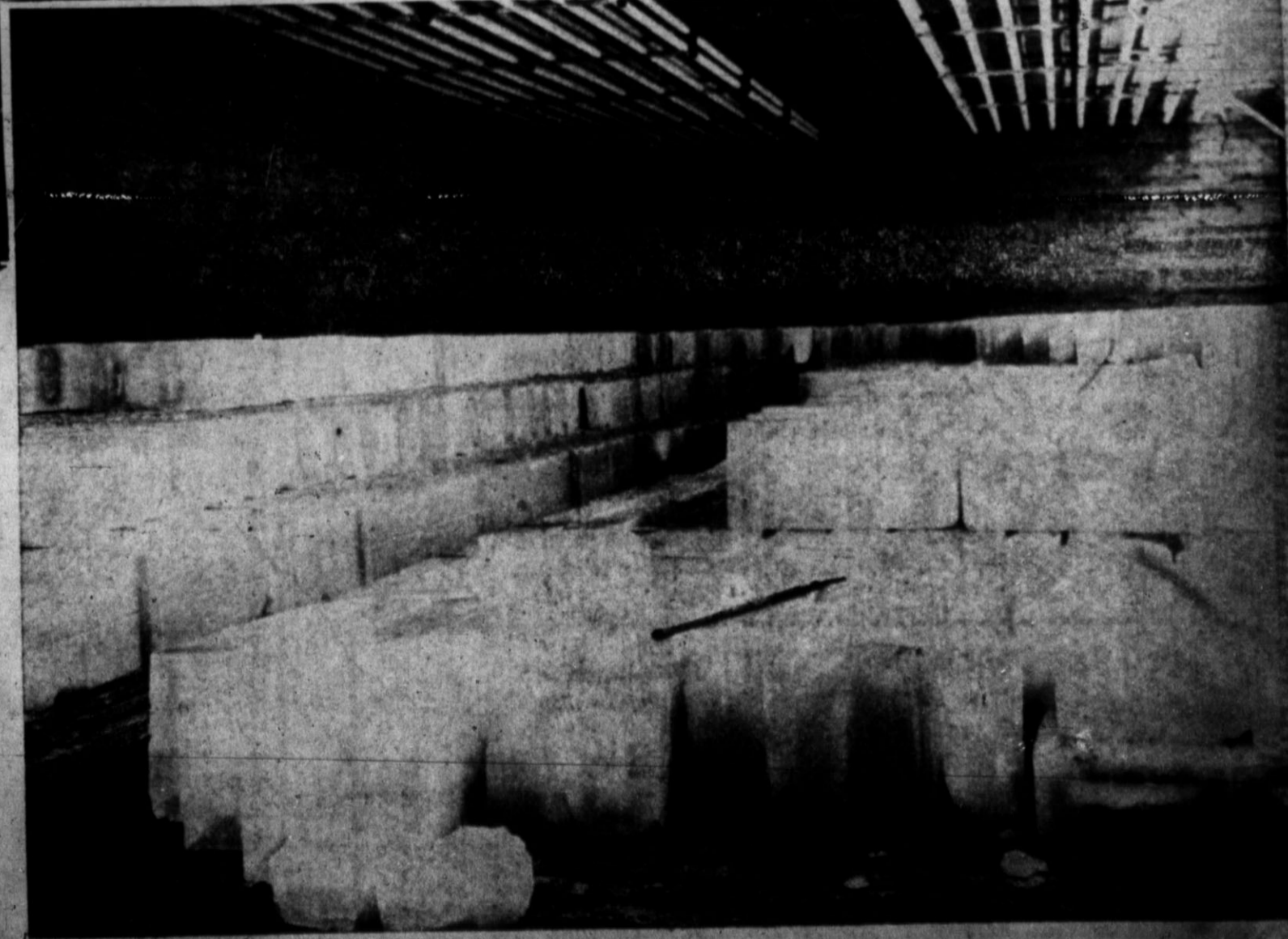

Silver Anniversary of Opening of High School Building is Today

Twenty-five years ago today "practically all of Hereford turned out" to witness the formal opening of the new \$125,000 high school building which today is still serving, but is rapidly being outgrown by a big student body. Scholastics now number 2038 as compared with the approximately 900 scholastics of 25 years ago, according to Supt. George Graham.

Eighty teachers are employed now in the Hereford schools as compared with the 27 teachers, 25 years ago. Present evaluation of the school building is \$755,000 said Fred Baird, school tax assessor and collector, as compared with approximately \$150,000 25 years ago. The entire school plant is valued at \$933,769.

(Editor's Note: The following story is from the Brand of 1925 giving the history of the Hereford schools to that date.)

Opening Program
Dr. J. A. Hill, president of West Texas Teachers College gave the main address at the formal opening. Also included on the program were E. S. Ireland, president of the School Board; Gwendolyn Spradley, president of the senior class; vocal solo Miss Gladys Kilgore; Travis M. Dameron, principal of the high school; E. B. Black, president of the school board at time district was made independent; high school orchestra, directed by Ralph Smith.

First Building, 1898
The opening of the new high school marks another milestone in the development of the educational system in Hereford. Since the erection of the small frame building back in 1898, when the first session was taught, the system has been steadily growing until today, the educational facilities in this city will compare favorably with the best in this section, when the population is considered.

From 1898 to 1908 all of Deaf Smith county was included in the Hereford district, but as this territory developed, authorities saw that the school was trying to cover too much ground. In 1908 E. B. Black, who was then president of the school board, and a number of other staunch school supporters launched a drive to create an independent school district, and at the same time vote \$25,000 worth of bonds to erect a new building. Mr. Black carried the petition and the project was heartily endorsed with the consequences that Central School was erected, the present independent district of 72 sections was created and seven trustees elected. Mr. Black was the man who carried the petition last winter asking for the \$125,000 bond election to erect the present new building which has just been completed.

The spirit of the people was shown in 1902 when they raised most of the money, locally, for the erection of the old Christian College and a large frame dormitory, which were used for college purposes for a number of years. The Christian College was sold to the Hereford school board in 1913 and has been used as a High School building since that time. In 1906 a three-room annex was built for the Hereford schools entirely by popular subscription.

Pioneers in Music
Hereford folks pioneered public school music, and were among the first in Texas to introduce the teaching of Bible as a regular subject in the schools. This is the ninth year that Bible has been taught here. C. H. Dillehay is serving his third year (1926) as superintendent of the Hereford Public Schools. Members of the school board are: E. S. Ireland, president; J. O. Newell, vice-president; E. B. Posey, secretary, H. G. Conkright, J. T. Glibbreath, J. W. Houston, C. O. Lee.

Travis M. Dameron is high school principal (1926) and Mrs. Isabell Garrison, Central school principal. Special teachers include Ralph Smith, band and orchestra; Gladys Kilgore and Mafalda Isaacs, public school

verted into a cafeteria for the high school and junior high.

Since 1947 the bus barn has been used with 18 school buses now covering approximately 1400 miles per day in the district. Transportation foreman is Bob Wilson, and Jay Shaw serves as full-time employee in that department.

High School Building
The high school building is still much the same as it was when built 25 years ago; however, the entire building is frequently repainted.

Outlook for Future
Supt. George Graham said the school board is in the process of planning a new high school building and has already employed the service of an architect. "The elementary planning is being done," he said. "But it will be a good two years before we can have a building if plans are approved." The plan now is to use the present high school building for a Junior High School. The school is operating at capacity, said Mr. Graham. "By the time we get a building built, we will have another overflow if the population continues to increase as it is now."

Cafeterias
The first cafeteria was started at Central school about 1933. Three cafeterias, employing a dietitian, Mrs. Claude Francis, and 17 workers and cooks, operate at Shirley-Central, and the high school and junior high combined.

Have Masters
Fifteen of the 80 teachers employed in the school system have their master's degrees, said Mr. Graham, and nearly all

the others are working toward master's.

Don Martin is high school principal; H. V. Stanton, junior high; D. C. Martin, Central; and Bryon Durham, Shirley. Miss Della Stagner is serving her second year as coordinator of the elementary schools.

Budget
The greatest item on the budget, said Mr. Baird, is the teacher's salaries which run nearly a quarter of a million dollars per year. \$240,000 is the figure set in the budget. In addition \$45,000 is required for salaries of the superintendent, business office, and the five janitors. \$426,000 is set aside for their expenses, including replacement of busses and other equipment, maintenance, and payment on indebtedness.

700 Square Miles
The present district, said Mr. Graham, includes 700 square miles. The Deaf Smith school is a part of the Hereford system, and one other school, Walcott, operates in the county. The district was 72 miles square before consolidation.

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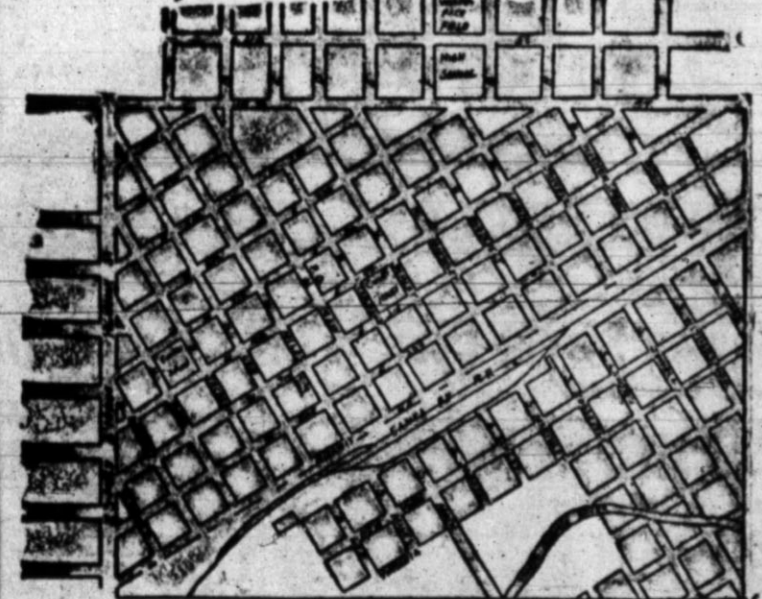
