Bobbies Take Edge in Texas-Iowa Cage Rivalry, Beat Hansell 38-30

The Dimmitt Bobbies, Texas McKamie league state girls basketball champions, trounced the Iowa state champs, the Hansell Queens, by a score of 38 to 30 in the fifth annual meeting of the two top teams last Securday night at the Drake fields are in Des Moines.

This is the second straight year the Bobbies have mastered their counterparts from the Tall Corn state, having dumped Slater, the Iowa 1950 titlists, at Waco last year by a 47 - 20 score. Texas now leads in the series with three victories as against two losses. Texas leads in total points for the five contests, 176-156.

The Bobbies took a commanding 12-1 lead in the early minutes of the first quarter and were never headed by the Iowa champs. At the end of the first quarter, the score was 16-3. At the half, the Texas titleholders were leading by a 26-9 margin, and at the end of the third quarter, Hansell had closed the gap slightly, but the Bobbies were ahead 34-21.

Offensively, Lometa Odom, all-state junior forward for Dimmitt took the honors for the night with 10 field goals, scoring 20 of the winners 38 points Forward Mary Nelson took second high scoring honors for the out-of-staters with 14 points. Johnny Godfrey sank two baskets for the victors. Dimmitt's scoring was done by these forwards.

On defense, the brightest performance of the game by far was the masterful guarding displayed by Maurinne Smithson, Dimmitt's all-state guard, who held the Queens' topscorer Alberta Van Dyke, to

only eight points. Hansell's star had previously made an average of 35 points

per game. All of Hansell's scoring was made by three cagers, as was the case with the Texans. Hansell Star Mary Harper scored

from the Iowa champions, Dimmitt made 62 per cent of their baskents while the hosts made only 29 per cent of their shots. The Queen came into the game with a season total of 984 and was limited to a mere eight points by Miss Smithson's stellar performance.

Dimmitt came into the game -which is recognized nationally as the top interscholastic contest of the year--with a record of 32 won, two-lost. Hansell claimed a 29-5 record in making its way to the top of Iowa girl's

basketball play. In state tourney play, Hansell had compiled a point total of \$244, while the Bobbies had a total of 189. The Queens', opponents ran up 244 points and the Bobbies has 107 points scored against them.



Draft Head Lists Changes In Status To Be Reported

Austin -- Brigadier General Prul L. Wakefield, state direct or of Selective Service, last week igninded all men registered with local draft boards that the law requires them to report any change in personal status to their respective boards.

The state director pointed to he following things which would be regarded as a change of personal status:

1. Change of address. This is change in the address at which a man expects to receive

2. Change in martail status. If a man marries, he should advise the local board of the name of the person he marries, the place and date of marriage, end the name of county in which the marriage is recorded.
If he has children, date and place of birth should be named, nd place where birth is recorded. If he begomes separated, diverced, or his wife dies, this hou'd be reported;

3. Change of job. The local board should be advised only if his is a permanent change. 4. Change in physical status. If a man has had a serious injury or has otherwise acquired

a physical defect, it should be reported. It should be reported whether it is permanent or tom-5. Students. If a man becomes a student in a school, college, or

university, this fact should be

reported. 6. Members of armed forces reserves or National Guard. If a men enters any of these, he should advise the local board, giving date of entry and name
