

Falls Asleep At Wheel, Car Goes On Rampage Mon.

A young airman from Clovis Air Force base -- Thomas Ren Parsons, 21, a native of Vernal, Utah -- miraculously escaped injury early Monday morning when his 1947 Pontiac overturned near

Time of the accident was shortly after midnight Sunday.

Parsons, who was returning to Clovis from Amarillo, told officers he apparently fell asleep at the wheel of his auto.

Before coming to rest on the parking just east of the Bull barn itself, the west-bound car jumped the curb at the corner of West First and Schley, uprooted the concrete street marker, sheared off an electric light pole, demollished about 50 feet of picket fence around the Bull barn show yard, and finally came to rest on its left side near the Bull barn

The auto itself was practically a total wreck. Some of it can probably be salvaged, though, Parsons said Wednesday. City Patrolman L. B. Redwine

investigated the accident.

The Parsons accident is one of a series of "freak" accidents of Deaf Smith county the past few weeks. All occupants of the autos involved in the wrecks have been fortunate in excaping without any serious injuries.

Mrs. Dyalthia Bradly, Red Cross executive secretary, resounded Childers' desire to end the drive by Friday, the 10th day for the


annual membership campaign.



Traffic accidents in Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro and Oldham counties take an average of eight lives each year and cause property damage exceeding a quarter million dollars annually.

Figures released to the local Texas State Highway Patrol team -- J. A. Dumas and James R. Kirkwood -- by the statistical division of the Department of Public Safety show that during the past seven years in these four counties, an economic loss of \$2,051,362 has resulted from traffic accidents in which a total of 57 persons were killed.



ALASKAN STATEHOOD: The Senate by a vote of 45 to 44 recommitted (which means in effect killed) Senate Bill 50, providing for the statehood of Alaska. The vote on this measure reflected an almost solid front of southern senators against the admission of Alaska. Senator Kefauver cast his vote with those favoring the admission of Alaska. Senator Taft cast his vote with those against the admission. Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, who is heading Eisenhower's campaign, did not vote. The two Texas senators voted with those opposed the admission of Alaska. I wish that I could put in this letter the entire context of the Senate debate, but that is impossible There is one pertinent point that had great weight. The records re-flect that as of 1950 Alaska had a population of 128,643. Had Alaska been admitted as a state, she would have been entitled to two members in the U.S. Senate, which would be composed of 98 members. On a comparison basis, Texas with over 6.000,000 people would have two senators, while Alaska, with a population of less than that of Potter ,Gray and Hutchinson counties, would have the same number of Senators. This would hardly be equal representation as far as a Tex-
