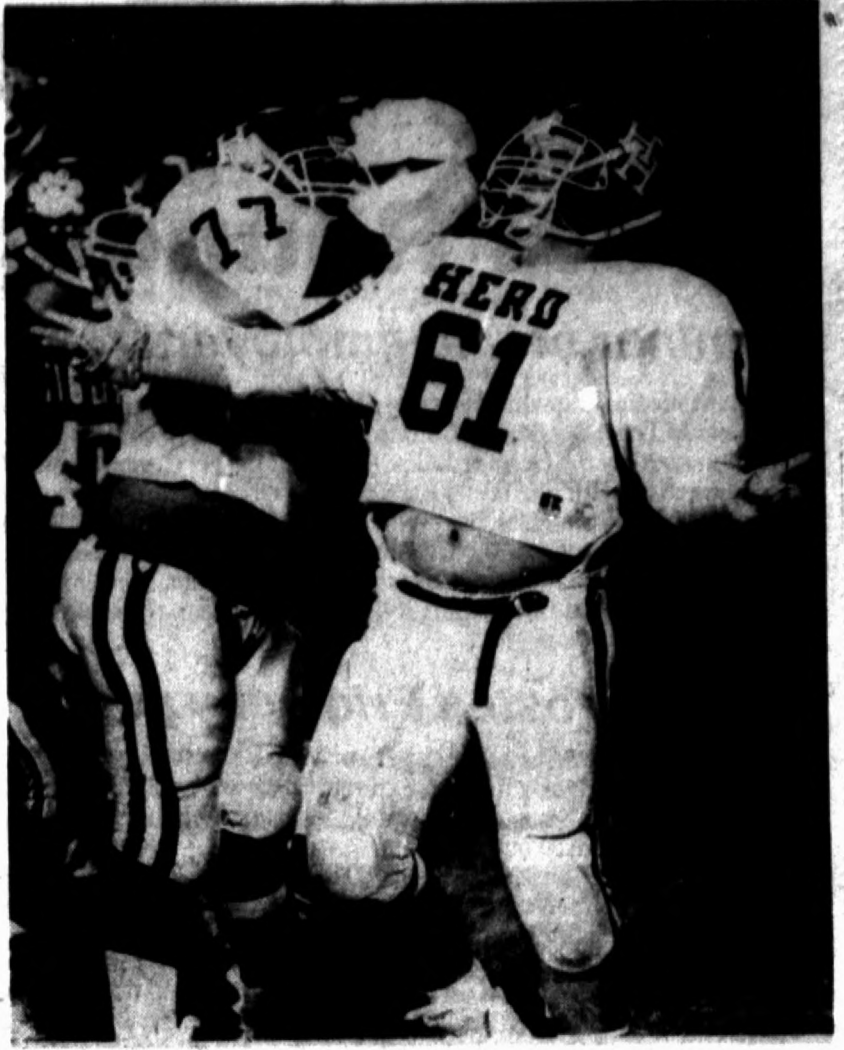

School tax rate up 21% over 1990-91

The "Robin Hood" school financing plan is supposed to take from the rich and give to the poor, but most Texans are finding themselves listed among the rich--if paying more taxes is any indication.

In Hereford, the new plan will give more relief to those 65 or older with homestead exemptions, and some relief to others with homesteads valued under \$40,000. It will mean increases above that level. Businesses will bear the brunt of the hike--paying about 21 percent more than last year.

On an \$80,000 home in the city, for example, the school tax will increase by about \$16.58 a year even for those with a homestead exemption.

An \$80,000 business--which gets no exemption--will see an increase of about \$159 a year.

The big increases are the result of the additional exemptions voters approved in the County Education District elections Aug. 10. Homeowners voted themselves a 20 percent break on the value of their home. That action, however, decreased the property tax base by about \$27 million--which, in turn, caused a larger hike in the rate.

A \$20,000 homeowner would save \$56.25 with the new exemption, compared to last year's rate.

The HISD rate was 69 cents per \$100 valuation five years ago. The rate has increased 41.9 cents since then, a 60.7 percent increase.

The accompanying box compares last year's school tax bill with the new rates, based on several property valuations. These are unofficial totals compiled by The Brand.

Five years ago, the school tax rate was 69 cents per \$100. Now, it's \$1.109, a 60 percent increase. It is a 21% increase over the rate for 1990-91.

The Deaf Smith Tax Appraisal District is scheduled to start mailing tax statements next week. The statements will include taxes on all local taxing entities. The total in-town rate--including city, county, school and new school district, hospital district and water district--will be \$2,226.1 per \$100 valuation.

This total tax bill is about a 14.6 percent increase over last year's total of \$1,943.2. City and county tax rates are the same as last year. However, the county retained 4.76 cents that was allocated for jail payments and had ended. The hospital district rate increased from 13.2 to 22 cents, and the water district increased from .72 of a cent to .74 of a cent. The increases in town added up to 28.29 cents per \$100 valuation.

The Telephone Man

Gamez' job takes him around world

Hereford native Charles Gamez has circled the globe to come back home for a while.

In the last two years, Gamez has traveled from rural America to Canton, China. He works for a company that changes telephone switching equipment to the latest in computerized electronics.

After China, Boston, and other less-noted sites, Gamez is in his hometown working on the new telephone equipment that will serve Hereford residents in the near future.

The 1980 HHS graduate went to work for Ericsson Network Systems in 1989, soon after his graduation from DeVry Institute in Dallas. He entered the three-year electronic engineering technology program after working for several years.

"I looked around and thought, 'I'm not going to do this with my life,' and went to DeVry," Gamez said. He earned a bachelor of science degree in his field.

The opportunity to go to work for Ericsson arose when first, two friends joined the company, then two more were hired.

"They told me I should apply," Gamez recalled. He did, was hired and has not regretted the decision.

The crew in Hereford installing the new digital switching equipment actually is divided into two groups: one installs the equipment and the other tests it.

Gamez is in the testing department. "We load the software and test it to get it ready for service," he explained.

He has done this kind of work in widely differing locales.

"I went to China before the first anniversary of the Tiananmen Square trouble," Gamez said. "Then, I was in Beijing near the anniversary."

Gamez found the atmosphere very tense in the Chinese capital during the

three days he was there.

When the opportunity came up to travel to China, Gamez jumped at it.

"I told them I wanted to go, even if I had to live on rice," he said, noting that the Chinese menu often raises eyebrows of Americans.

Gamez did quite a bit of sightseeing in China, including a trip to the Great Wall. He spent five months in the country.

He has been sent to less exotic places to do the same job he did in China and is doing in Hereford. Cities in Montana, Kansas, Idaho, Arkansas and East Texas have been on his itinerary.

He also spent some time in Boston, often called one of the unique cities of America. He said he enjoyed that experience, too.

The Ericsson personnel working in the Southwestern Bell Telephone project in Hereford are from around the world. Besides Americans, there are workers from England, Thailand and Denmark.

Gamez, 29, hopes his future with Ericsson will take him to other foreign shores.

"The company does work in Europe and I want to go over there," he said.

Gamez and a sister, Patricia, were in the same graduating class at DeVry. She now works for Boeing in Irving.

"Our class started with 120 to 140 but only 23 graduated," he noted.

While working in the telephone project, he is enjoying the opportunity to visit with friends and family,

including his mother, Trini Gamez, in Hereford.

Although he isn't sure of the exact date when the phone system will change from the cross bar system to digital switching, Gamez thinks he'll be in the area long enough to celebrate Thanksgiving with his family.

"Three members of my family live in Austin--we're all going there," he said.

In the meantime, he is loading and testing the new phone equipment in preparation for the switch-over sometime in the fall.

Gamez doesn't know where his next assignment will take him. But, he's ready to go.

DSGH launches new program

Deaf Smith General Hospital is celebrating National Purchasing and Materials Management Week by instituting a new inventory control system for more efficient management of supplies.

Beginning Oct. 1, the purchasing department of the hospital will be responsible for ordering all supplies for most of the departments in the hospital. The maintenance and dietary departments will continue to order their own supplies.

"We want to control and monitor the inventory on hand because there's no sense in having money on the shelf when it can be used elsewhere," administrator Ron Rives explained. "We're like any other business. We must maintain the supplies we need to do our job to serve the community, but we don't want to waste our resources."

The inventory will be based on a 30-day turnaround cycle in most departments.

Under the new system, the hospital has converted to a "sticker" method for charges. A sticker is placed on supplies as they are brought in to the hospital, and then the sticker is placed on the

patient's card when the material is used.

With a centralized purchasing system in place, supplies will be obtained with a purchase order. This will help monitor the inventory and provide daily control. "With this system, the department manager is more accountable for what he or she spends for the department," Rives said.

All purchase orders will be approved by Rives, for the present.

On Sept. 30, employees will be conducting a hospital-wide inventory, which will now be done twice each year.

Rives and Karen Haigood, head of the purchasing department will help each department determine an appropriate inventory level which will be constantly evaluated and revised as necessary.

"With the dramatic increase in the price of materials that we must purchase, it is vital for the hospital to be as efficient as possible when ordering and maintaining supplies," Rives said. The cost of materials is a major part of the bill that the patient gets, so we want to control those costs

as well as we can. As part of the Methodist Hospital system, DSGH will soon be receiving additional saving by purchasing many supplies through Voluntary Hospitals of America. We are patterning our new inventory control system on the system in place at Lubbock Methodist Hospital."

According to Rives, the purchasing department plays a major role in the hospital, since it orders supplies,

monitors supply levels, checks orders received, delivers materials to departments, and searches for the best price for materials purchased.

Haigood has been with Deaf Smith General Hospital for 26 years on Oct. 1. She is assisted by supply tech Elizabeth Hayes. Hayes has returned to the hospital, having previously worked as a nurse's aide. She will assist with the implementation of the new ordering system.

Bush unveils nuclear plan

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush wants the Soviets to join in scaling back the world's most powerful nuclear missiles as he commits the United States to eliminating most short-range missiles.

In an announcement detailing some of the biggest changes in nuclear history, Bush pledged Friday to "take steps to make the world a less dangerous place than ever before in the nuclear age."

Bush said in a nationwide television address that he will eliminate ground-launched short range nuclear weapons - most of them stored in Europe - as well as those carried on ships and submarines, including the Pentagon's 350-400 Tomahawk cruise missiles. But the United States will keep those carried aboard aircraft.

He further offered to open negotiations with the Soviet Union to eliminate all long-range ballistic missiles with multiple warheads, an area where the Soviet Union has a large advantage.

Bush, however, would keep U.S. ship-borne multiple warheads, where the United States has the edge.

It was not clear how many warheads would be eliminated under Bush's unilateral cuts, but a senior official who briefed reporters said it would be several thousand.

The president called on the Soviets to respond to his plan with "equally bold steps."

He telephoned Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev and Russian President Boris Yeltsin Friday morning to inform them of his decision and also consulted Friday with European leaders.

Cowtown Jet Town

Fort Worth assuming new image

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - They still call it "Cowtown." But maybe it should be "Jet City."

The truth is that Fort Worth and Tarrant County, despite an emotional link with a romantic Western past, is far more beholden to airplane than they ever were to longhorns.

Experts agree that with Dallas-Fort Worth and Fort Worth Alliance airports as its anchors, the Fort Worth-Dallas area - and Tarrant County in particular - is poised to become the global center of an already huge and still rapidly expanding commercial aviation business.

Two aviation companies that have been the economic cornerstones in the county for more than 40 years - General Dynamics and Bell Helicopter Textron - are affected by the shrinking defense budget, but aviation's impact continues to grow.

About 10,000 jobs have been lost at GD in the past 16 months, and the Pentagon plans to close nearby Carswell Air Force Base.

As many as 2,000 Bell jobs depend upon continued funding of the V-22 Osprey tilt-rotor aircraft in the defense budget. Congressional supporters have kept the program alive despite opposition from Defense Secretary Dick Cheney.

Yet the commercial side of the multi-faceted aviation business is blossoming.

AMR Corp., parent of American Airlines, has seen its local employment grow from about 11,000 to nearly 27,000 in just four years. Early this year, AMR moved ahead of the shrinking GD to become the county's largest employer.

Even without the recent layoffs, American likely would have passed GD in just a couple of years. In addition to its growing operations at DFW and at its corporate campus in far east Fort Worth, in January, American will open Phase I of its new \$800 million maintenance base at Alliance, adding at least 4,500 jobs to the local economy over the next five years.

Meanwhile, Delta Air Lines, the No. 2 carrier at DFW, has seen its local employment grow nearly 40 percent since 1988, from 4,770 to 6,700, making it the county's fifth-largest employer.

Both carriers are in the midst of multimillion-dollar terminal expansion and refurbishment plans. And both plan to build huge new terminals - the price tag for American's is expected to top \$1 billion - to replace existing facilities. Those plans are tied to the airport winning approval for two controversial runways.

Including the runways, terminals and other projects - some of which already are under way - the DFW Airport Board plans to spend more than \$3.5 billion by the turn of the century to update and increase capacity.

On another level of commercial aviation, Florida-based page Avjet Corp. recently opened a new facility at Fort Worth Meacham Airport. Page Avjet, which will repair, refurbish

and maintain aging jetliners, ultimately expects demand to require as many as 1,000 workers in Fort Worth.

In 1989, Meacham was the nation's sixth-busiest airport - the busiest without scheduled airline service. One reason is that Meacham has become the largest professional pilot training center for foreign students in the nation.

"There's 11 or 12 flight schools at Meacham right now, and none of the students are from the U.S.," says Norm Scroggins, regional representative of the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association. Scroggins retired last year from the Federal Aviation Administration after serving eight years as manager of the DFW control tower.

"That's a multimillion (dollar) impact right there," Scroggins says. "Plus, these people who are training at Meacham become very aware of what this community has to offer to businesses. When they go home and become pilots for their national airlines or corporate pilots for major industries over there, they take with them that knowledge. As highly educated and trained professionals, many of them are in a position to influence companies over there to do business with companies in this area."

Then there's Alliance, the world's first so-called industrial airport. Developer Ross Perot Jr. predicts employment at his Alliance Center, which surrounds the city-owned runways at Alliance, and at his other commercial developments nearby will rise to between 30,000 and 40,000 in the next 15 to 20 years.

By comparison, at its peak, the General Dynamics-Carswell employment center in west Fort Worth totaled around 40,000 jobs.

Many of those future Alliance-area workers will be employed by companies directly involved in commercial aviation such as American or the Ishida Group which plans to develop and build a commercial tilt-wing aircraft.

McDonnell Douglas Corp. is another potential Alliance employer. The company's Douglas Aircraft division has included Alliance on its list of nine potential sites for a new \$1 billion-plus assembly plant where its proposed new MD-12 long-range wide body jet would be built.

Other jobs will be created at Alliance by companies that frequently use aviation services. And still more will be generated by companies that serve as suppliers to Alliance-area businesses.

Hank Newman came to Fort Worth in 1969 as regional administrator of the FAA's Southwest Regional with orders to do whatever was necessary to keep the then-new and precarious partnership between Fort Worth and Dallas alive long enough to get DFW up and running.

Not only did he see that happen, but Newman, now retired and living in Fort Worth, saw DFW grow in less than 20 years into something few people ever dreamed it would become.

Now, Newman says, "There's no question about it." Alliance Airport will be as successful at its mission as DFW has been at its own.

"With the Perot money and drive behind it, and American Airlines'

maintenance base out there as a magnet, it's going to be successful," Newman says. "They only real question is just how successful. Either way, it's going to have a huge impact on Fort Worth and the Metroplex."

The same basic catalyst that 100 years ago made Fort Worth "Cowtown," today is behind the emergence of commercial aviation as

Tarrant County's largest engine of economic growth: the need to move people and goods to and from a landlocked and relatively remote center of commerce.

"Transportation has been the defining factor of where economic activity has occurred, and it will continue to be," says Ray Perryman, a Baylor University economics professor who frequently consults with businesses and groups on the regional economic outlook.

DFW has grown from 322,000 operations - takeoffs and landings - in 1974 to 731,036 in 1990. In 1974, about 6.9 million passengers boarded airplanes there. Last year, 48.5 million people got on airplanes at DFW.

And the percentage of passengers who begin or end their trips at DFW - a key indicator of the relative vibrancy of the local business environment - increased from about one-third of all passengers at DFW in 1974 to more than 40 percent last year.

DFW is the second-busiest airport in the world in terms of passenger boardings. And the FAA expects it to overtake Chicago's O'Hare International Airport by mid-decade.

Oris Dunham, former DFW executive director and now executive director of the Airports Association Council International in Geneva, says the numbers don't tell the whole story.

"I don't know how you put a number on it, but from my conversa-

County will meet Monday

The goal of sending new commissioner precinct boundary lines to the U.S. Department of Justice by early October may be met after all.

Deaf Smith County Commissioners' Court will meet at 8:30 a.m. Monday to look at the latest proposal from the Austin law firm serving as consultant on the project.

Changes in precinct lines to meet certain requirements of federal voting rights laws must be submitted to the justice department for preclearance.

Officials feel some urgency in obtaining Justice Department approval because filing for 1992 elections begins in early December.

Commissioners' Court had hoped to act on proposals from Jim Allison and Associates, the consulting firm, last Monday. However, County Clerk David Ruland discovered that some current voting boxes were not in the right precincts.

Those errors have been corrected, Ruland said, in the latest materials received from the consultant.

New precinct lines are based on population recorded in the 1990 U.S. Census.

Another item on the agenda for the special meeting is to consider seal-coating for county roads.

with the top people at dozens upon dozens of companies around here, I do know that you wouldn't have a JCPenney, an Exxon, a federal currency plant, an IBM Solon development, an American Airlines or maybe even a super collider here if the airport wasn't here," he says. Perryman agrees. Even the impressive employment growth tends to obscure the airport's broader effect, he says.

"People need to remember that the critical role the airport plays is not so much the direct employment it creates, although that's nice. It is the ability to give this area the access to the world that we need."

In a February 1990 speech, AMR Chairman Robert Crandall said massive changes occurring in the airline industry "present the Metroplex with an unparalleled opportunity to achieve undisputed worldwide aviation leadership."

"There isn't anywhere else in the United States that has the capacity, the ability and the opportunity we have right here," he says.

Perot, who like Crandall stands to benefit, scoffs at the suggestion that the economy might become too dependent on commercial aviation. North Texas, he says, should "play to its strength," to speed the recovery from the recent economic downturn and to secure the Metroplex's position as a major international city on a par with New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, London, Paris and Tokyo.

"Basically, the strength of this area is going to be DFW," Perot says. "DFW has become truly a world hub, promoting more and more international business, making this more of an international community. We are rapidly becoming an international community. We need to focus on that, to bring in as many international companies as we can into our market."

In addition to business directly involved in aviation, Perot is trying to attract distribution centers and manufacturers who want to ship parts into Alliance and ship finished goods out.

"Cargo is going to play more and more of a dominant role," Perot says. "In 20 or 30 years, you might see more cargo carried around the world than you do people."

"You'll see automobiles being flown directly from Japan to Alliance Airport for distribution before its all over. Pretty soon, it'll be cheaper to fly than to use ships. And that's when the revolution really will take hold."

"I have asked the Soviets to go down this road with us - to destroy their entire inventory of ground-launched theater nuclear weapons," Bush said.

Soviet Foreign Minister Boris Pankin, briefed in New York by Secretary of State James A. Baker III, said his country is "prepared to give

a positive response to an initiative of the United States and to meet U.S. steps halfway."

From Capitol Hill, Democratic Chairman Les Aspin of the House Armed Services Committee, said of Bush's announcement:

"The thrust of his new policy is right and he's targeted the right systems."

But he complained the proposal would save only \$500 million from the \$291 billion defense budget. Administration officials did not

offer cost estimates but said some of the scaling down steps would likely end up costing money.

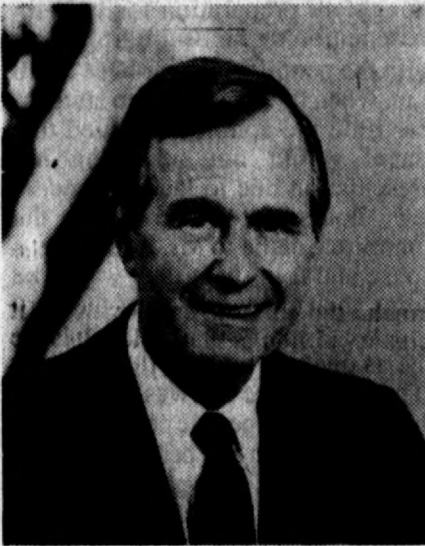
Bush warned against any expectations for "a budget windfall for domestic programs."

Much of Bush's plan is geared toward reducing the hair-trigger status of U.S. and Soviet nuclear arsenals, which has caused great concern about an unintended nuclear exchange.

Eliminating tactical weapons from Europe, Bush said, is appropriate

because, "a Soviet invasion into Western Europe, launched with little or no warning, is no longer a realistic threat. The Warsaw Pact has crumbled. In the Soviet Union, the advocates of democracy triumphed over a coup that would have restored the old system of repression."

With some Soviet leaders questioning their need for a large nuclear capability, Bush said, there is "an unparalleled opportunity to change the nuclear posture of both the United States and the Soviet Union."

Dear Editor:

We would like to express our concern over the decision made by the Deaf Smith General Hospital board on Tuesday, Sept. 24, 1991.

The board voted to engage a Lubbock CPA firm to perform the annual audit of the hospital's financial statements for the year ended Sept. 30, 1991. The proposals issued by two local CPA firms were the lowest proposals received by the board. However, based on interim administrator Ron Rives' recommendation, and after considerable controversy, the board was influenced to engage an auditor from an out-of-town firm.

We are concerned that two local firms, who are both competent to perform the engagement, were denied the opportunity to keep Hereford dollars at work in this community. Local CPA firms, in performing audits for local government entities, provide continual support of the accounting functions at no additional cost to the government. Often, out-of-town firms bill travel, consultation time, and out-of-pocket expense for any services they provide outside of the audit function.

Mr. Rives influenced the board to believe that the hospital will be better served by an out-of-town CPA firm rather than one of the local CPA firms. Personally, we believe that the hospital could be better served by local CPA's who take a personal and vital interest in the hospital that they pay taxes to support and utilize the services of.

As Ron Rives has said on numerous occasions, this community needs to support the hospital so it can continue to provide important services to Deaf Smith County and the surrounding area. In turn, the hospital also needs to support the professional services available in this community.

Dear editor,

We commend Mr. Mike Page for his interest in his community and his close scrutiny of the objectives of our organization. Since its first meeting, EnCoRe has welcomed the free exchange of information and opinions about recycling and its effect on our community and our environment.

Certainly, EnCoRe does not endorse a facility that would be a financial burden to the City of Hereford, nor do we want to create a new bureaucracy. We have made no secret of our hopes to see a city-managed recycling center established in Hereford. We have tried to be open and forthright in all our appearances before the city commission and in the media.

City officials were very attentive to our concerns during the Sept. 16th meeting and we appreciate their responsiveness. It was very gratifying to hear Hereford's new city manager, Chester Nolen, address the need for a long-range plan in local waste management. This was a specific part of a proposal which EnCoRe presented to the city commission six months ago. Commissioner Wayne Winget and Mr. Nolen are currently working with the public to prepare a

formal proposal for the commission's consideration.

Perhaps some misconceptions have developed regarding the actual expenses a city-wide recycling center incurs. The City of Dumas, which is comparable to the size of Hereford, operates a staffed recycling center at an annual cost of \$15,000. This center is located in an old lumber yard leased by the city. The facility is open parttime and Dumas sells the materials to recycling dealers in Amarillo.

Why did the City of Dumas open such a facility? They did so because they believed it would lengthen the life of their dwindling landfill, and they were responding to citizens who wished to actively recycle.

The City of Hereford collects \$530,000 annually in garbage fees; a recycling center budget of \$15,000 would reflect less than 3 percent of that amount. Furthermore, the city operates on a total budget exceeding \$6 million. We do not see that a \$15,000 budget item would cause an increase in taxes.

What we do see is that recycling will extend, perhaps double, the life of our landfill. With much of the city's operating capital invested in the landfill business, it seems prudent to keep the landfill open for as many years as possible. One way to do that is to keep recyclable materials from taking up valuable landfill space.

Once the landfill has met its capacity, Hereford will be facing a major challenge in its waste disposal. The options include hauling all of our community's solid waste to a regional landfill or opening a new landfill. These are significant and expensive issues which should concern all local taxpayers, including EnCoRe members.

EnCoRe is happy to make our financial records public, although we are not an elected entity and have no legal obligation to do so. We currently have \$84 in a savings account at the Hereford Texas Federal Credit Union (we did have \$113, but we bought postage stamps). The only other items purchased with EnCoRe funds have been safety goggles, plastic bags and two trees which were planted at Hereford Junior High.

Our sole revenue source has been from the sale of a few batteries and three loads of used magazines. All other recyclable materials have been donated to the dealer on the terms that the dealer would be responsible for transporting the items to Amarillo.

No EnCoRe member has ever been reimbursed for any item or service, including their donations of gasoline, advertising funds, postage, office supplies, machinery, time or labor. Our remaining funds are earmarked for public education efforts which we have volunteered to the city.

Our organization is constantly seeking input and information assistance from outside sources to stay abreast of this issue. We have attended several seminars in Lubbock and are frequently in contact with state agencies.

Recycling is far beyond a "social experiment." It has been a common, world-wide industry for decades. EnCoRe gets a lot of support from local senior citizens, who first practice recycling on the home front during World War II. Japan and many European nations are way ahead of the United States in their recycling efforts, but Americans are catching up fast with expanding technology and a public that is increasingly concerned about the national glut of garbage.

Recycling programs are already being funded with public money on

every level of government. In June, the state legislature pass Senate Bill 1340, requiring local governments to begin recycling. Last month, the Hereford school board and the county resolved to organize an in-house recycling program.

The educated response of Hereford's recycling families show us that there will not be a need for regulations or a "new bureaucracy." We are blessed to live in a community of caring and valuable people who want to do what they can for the environment and for economic responsibility in government.

Our community cannot afford to be short-sighted in its waste disposal program. The problem of waste management is not going to magically disappear. We believe that recycling is going to be part of the solution for rural and urban areas alike.

Thank you for the opportunity to share our viewpoint.

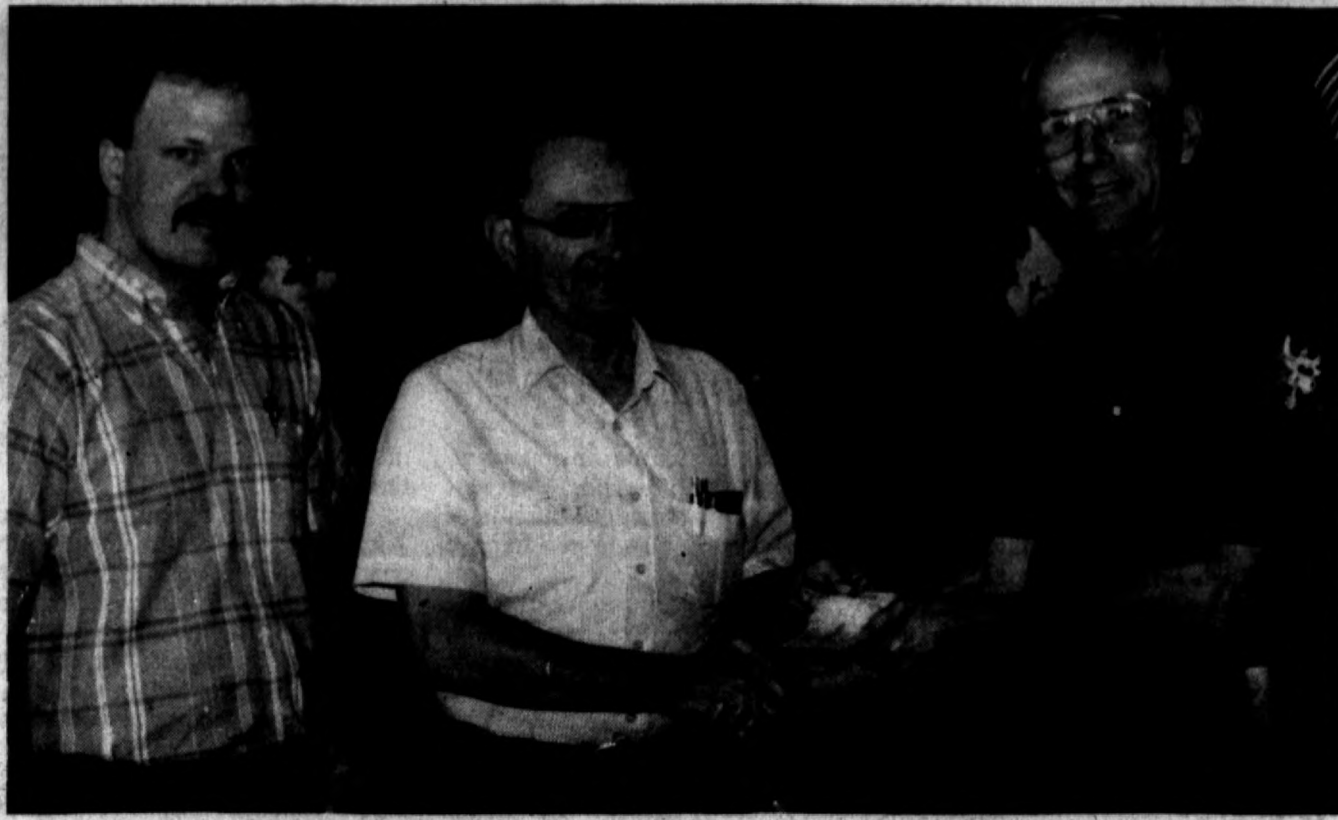

FOOD SAFETY FOR
TAILGATE PARTIES

Tailgating becomes a favorite activity with fall weather and football games. These events can be lots of fun with good food and good friends. But don't let the later onset of foodborne illness sour the remembrance of a good time.

Foodborne illness, with its stomach cramps, diarrhea, nausea, headaches and maybe even vomiting, can be caused by improper handling of foods. The bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow at temperatures between 40 degrees Fahrenheit and 140 degrees F. This is called the "danger zone." So even though the weather may be cooler in the fall, this won't totally eliminate the problem.

So what foods present a problem? Almost any food can be a vehicle for foodborne illness, but the most perishable foods are moist, protein-containing foods such as meats, poultry, fish, seafood, eggs and dairy products. This list even includes items such as cream pies, custards and pastries that include cream fillings. These foods should not stay in "danger zone" temperatures for more than two hours. Dishes containing these perishable foods should be kept either hot (above 140 degrees F.) or cold (below 40 degrees F.)

Popular hot menu items such as chili, soups, stews and even hot dips can be safely transported in a thermos, if the thermos is working properly and proper precautions are taken. Check the seal of the thermos to be sure it fits tightly. Be sure the thermos is clean; and rinse it with boiling water right before using it. Bring the food to as high a temperature as you can before pouring it into the thermos.

Try to prepare just enough food to serve your guest without leftovers. Any leftovers probably should be discarded.

Hot casseroles should probably be served immediately upon arriving.

Wrap them in several layers of aluminum foil, followed by newspapers and a towel. Observe the two hour limit with these.

Cold foods can be transported in an ice chest with ice, dry ice or cold packs to keep the foods below 40 degrees F. Pack the foods in shallow containers and be sure the foods are cold when they are put in the ice chest.

If sandwiches are on the menu, they should be kept cold or else eaten

within the two-hour limit. Foods such as deviled eggs and dips with dairy products in them also fall into the two-hour category.

If fast foods such as fried chicken or deli foods are on the menu, either pick them up immediately before the event and eat within two hours, or purchase them ahead of time. Keep these foods refrigerated and reheat them if they are to be eaten hot.

If you don't want to bother with perishable foods, there are other options. Foods such as canned meats, some specially-prepared dried or cured meats, some hard cheeses, peanut butter, fruits and vegetables, breads and cereal mixes, nuts and popcorn all fit into this category.

At the site, follow through with safe food handling practices. This means clean hands, utensils and dinnerware. Disposable items are probably a good idea. Spread a clean tablecloth on the tailgate or table and enjoy.

In short, to enjoy a tailgating adventure without later distress:

*Plan the menu to fit the situation.
*For perishable foods, keep "hot foods hot" and "cold foods cold."

*Don't let perishable foods stay in the "danger zone" for more than two hours.

*Keep everything clean to avoid contamination.

*Either take proper care of leftovers, or throw them away.

TTU gains accreditation

Tech-Amarillo's Department of Family Medicine received word Thursday (Sept. 19) that it has been accredited by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) effective Sept. 1, 1991. The accreditation is through 1994.

The recommendation for accreditation to the ACGME is made by a committee composed of representatives of the American Board of Medical Specialties, the American Hospital Association, the American Medical Association, the Association of American Medical Colleges, and the Council of Medical Specialty Societies.

"This accreditation means Tech's training program meets the requirements of the national review committee for specialty training of resident physicians in family medicine," said Dr. Lee Taylor, associate dean at Tech's Amarillo campus. "This approval by the review committee is a credit to the energies of the entire department faculty and staff."

Dr. Charles V. Wright, who heads

the Department of Family Medicine in Amarillo, said this meant they will begin immediately recruiting resident to begin July 1, 1992 -- the first day of the next resident's year.

Family Medicine was the 20th specialty approved, in 1969, by the American Board of Specialties. Medical school graduates selecting family medicine go through three

years of specialty training in designated areas.

Tech-Amarillo's Family Medicine program has its primary teaching clinics at St. Anthony's Hospital. Residents also will rotate at Northwest Texas Hospital for their obstetrical, gynecological, and pediatric training.

WHEATON, Ill. (AP) - Patrick Lilley, who played Eddie Munster in the 1960s television series "The Munsters," was sentenced to two years probation and 200 hours public service for beating up a limousine driver.

Judge Peter Dockery on Tuesday also fined Lilley \$200 and ordered him to pay his victim \$850 in restitution. Prosecutors had sought a two-year prison term.

Lilley, 38, of Austin, Texas, was convicted of aggravated battery in the

Nov. 2, 1990, attack. He was acquitted of an armed robbery charge.

Lilley, who was known as Butch Patrick when he appeared on "The Munsters" from 1964 to 1966, said the sentence was fair. He told Dockery he regretted the incident.

"No one should be beat up," said Lilley, who earns a living making personal appearances as Eddie Munster.

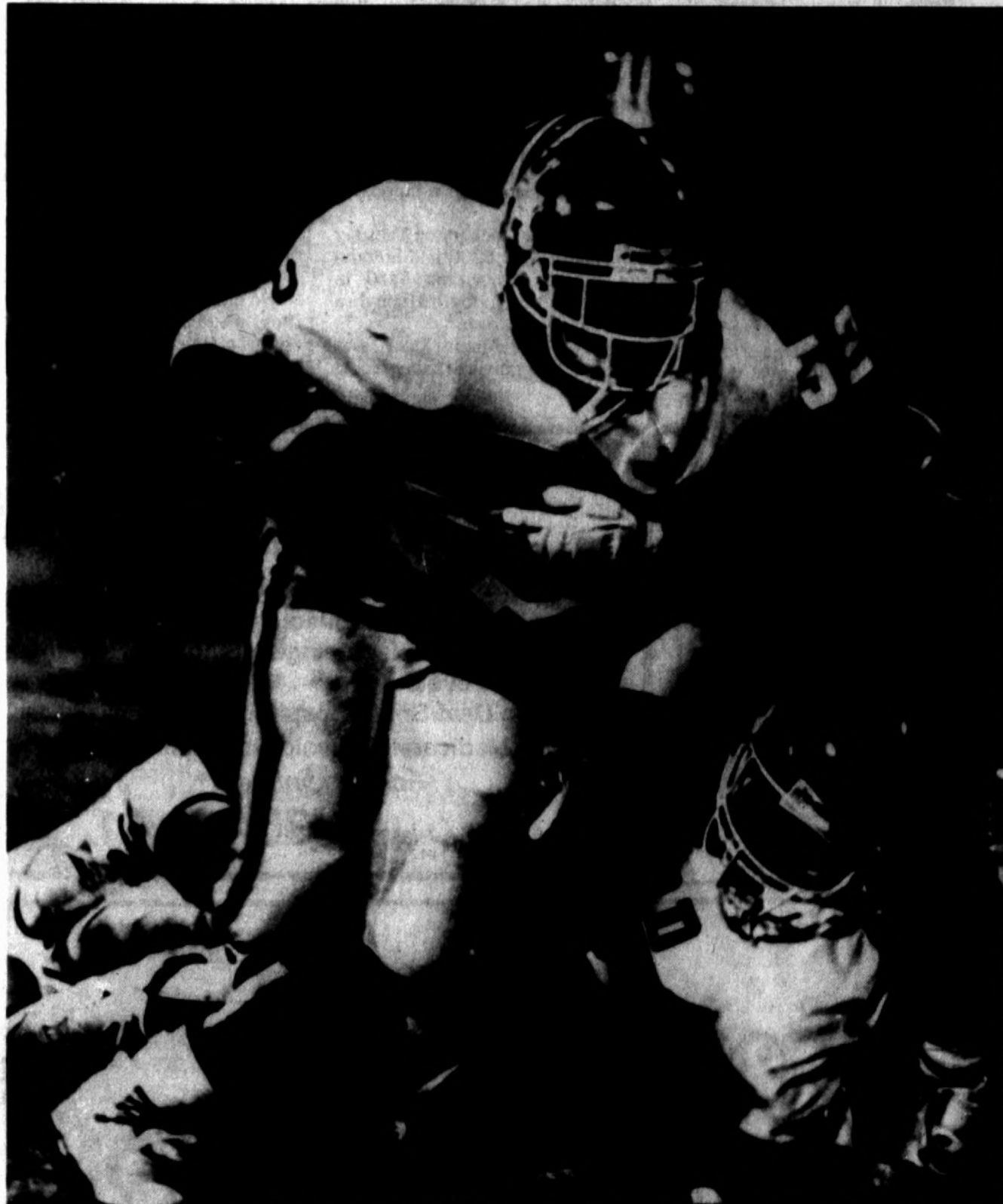

Herd rallies to break Frenship, 15-14

Hereford tailback Leo Brown rushed for 219 yards Friday against Frenship in Wolforth. Three of those yards were the difference between a win and a loss.

With 6:26 left in the game and the Whitefaces down by a point after Brown's 9-yard touchdown, the Herd went back to Brown for a two-point conversion to give the Whitefaces a 15-14 win.

The Herd improved its record to 4-0. The last time the Herd started that well was in 1986 when they started 8-0 before losing to Lubbock Estacado. The '86 Herd eventually fell to McKinney in the state semi-finals.

Frenship's record is now 0-4. The Herd moved the ball all night, accumulating 479 yards of total offense, but four turnovers hurt. Brown lost a fumble at the Frenship 44-yard line to end the Herd's first possession, but interceptions especially hurt the Herd.

Richard Sanderson, who started the game at quarterback, threw two, and Chad Sandoval threw one. Each Hereford QB had a pass picked off inside the Frenship 30-yard line in the first half.

Between those interceptions, the Herd managed a touchdown drive. Brown had 24 of the 70 yards in small chunks. The big play was a 16-yard pass from Sandoval to Kevin Kelso--his first catch of the season--to the Frenship 45.

"It was so sweet," Kelso said. "I turned (toward the end zone) and thought I had it all the way, but I turned around and saw this guy on my hip."

Kelso was tackled, but Frenship was called for a personal foul on the play. Kelso said the Frenship player tried to wrestle the ball away from him well after the whistle had blown. The penalty moved the ball to the Frenship 30, and three plays later fullback Kyle Hansen broke several tackles on a 20-yard scoring run.

"I owe it all to my line," Hansen said. "That touchdown belongs to (lineman) T.J. Samples right there." Samples denied doing anything spectacular. "I didn't do anything but

do my job and give him an opportunity to run," Samples said. "That was our touchdown; I can't take credit for it. We did our job and ran it like we were supposed to."

Ben Perry's extra point kick made the score 7-0.

Next, the Herd got a break but gave it right back. Herd defensive end Mark Kreigshauser recovered a fumble at the Frenship 40-yard line, but three plays later Sandoval was intercepted at the 22 by Jamar Whitfield.

Then the Herd got a taste of the talents of Frenship receiver Chris Matthews. The Tigers scored on their next two possessions--the last of the first half and the first of the second half--and Matthews basically was the offense. The Tigers got 148 yards of offense on the two drives, and 145 of them were on Matthews' receptions.

Whitfield's pick-off came with barely more than a minute left in the first half. Matthews caught a 23-yard pass from Tiger quarterback Kendrick Hollie. As Matthews was pushed out of bounds at the Frenship 48-yard line and into the bench, Hereford was flagged for a personal foul. The ball was moved up to the Hereford 37.

On the next play, Matthews turned a short pass from Hollie into a touchdown. Chris Addington's boot tied the score at 7.

Frenship went back to the Hollie-Matthews combination at the start of the second half. The Tiger running game was getting nowhere, forcing them to face third-and-10 situations twice. Both times Matthews got a step on Herd cornerback Petey Colvin. Both times he was covered well enough to require a perfect pass. Both times Hollie delivered.

"He's a good receiver," Colvin said of Matthews. "I have the utmost respect for him, but I had the worst game."

The first pass went for 48 yards to the Hereford 37. After two running plays netted no gain, the second pass went for the score. Addington added the kick for a 14-7 lead.

After the touchdown, Hereford adjusted by putting rover Alvaro Avila and Colvin into double coverage on Matthews, and Matthews

didn't catch another ball the rest of the game.

"(Defensive coordinator Mike) Purcell and I talked about it," Herd coach Danny Haney said. "They were going to go to 12 (Matthews). We went ahead and made the adjustment."

The adjustment took away the only thing that had worked for the Tigers offense, and nothing else worked the rest of the game. Hollie's last seven pass attempts fell incomplete, and the Tigers rushed for only 49 more yards.

The Herd had figured out how to keep the Tigers from scoring, but Hereford still needed to score.

They came close as the first half ended. Brown caught a short pass from Sanderson and ran with it 45 yards to the Frenship 10-yard line, but time ran out during the play.

They also got close near the end of the third quarter. Runs of 14 and 17 yards by Sandoval and a 13-yard run by Brown put the ball as close as the 11-yard line. The drive stalled, however, and Perry's 23-yard field goal try was wide right.

The Herd defense got a break on Frenship's next series when, on fourth-and-1 at the Hereford 43, Frenship busted a play. Hollie turned to hand off, found no running backs behind him, and was mobbed by Herd defenders.

Hereford took over, but Sanderson was intercepted after three plays. The Herd defense held and Frenship punted.

Sanderson returned the punt 21 yards to the Frenship 41. From there, the Herd stayed strictly on the ground. On third-and-1, Brown ran 9 yards to the 23. Hansen plowed 14 yards up the middle, and Brown ran the final 9 for the score.

That made it 14-13 in favor of the Tigers. On the two-point conversion try, Brown appeared to have crossed the goal line, but the officials hesitated before calling it good.

"I reached the ball across the goal line and they hit my hand and knocked it out," Brown explained the confusion. "Clay Wallace fell on it, but my arm was already over."

Frenship still had six minutes to try to score, but Perry's deep kickoff pinned the Tigers on their own 10-yard line, and they couldn't dig out of the hole. They punted, and Brown, Hansen and the big Herd line ran the clock out.

Herd survives tough game

It was, as Hereford quarterback-safety Richard Sanderson said, "smash-mouth football" Friday night as the Herd rallied to defeat Frenship, 15-14, at Wolforth.

The game was not supposed to be that close: the Harris Rating System had the Herd posted as a 17-point favorite. Frenship had been unimpressive, or worse, during its first three games, but unleashed enough offense to put the Herd in a 14-7 hole for much of the second half.

"We finally looked up at the scoreboard and realized that adversity was on its way," said defensive tackle Monroe Timberlake. "We got it done. It feels awesome to be 4-0. Last year at this time we were 1-3 and hadn't pulled together yet. Tonight I think we pulled together and became a team."

"I knew they could play as well as they did offensively," said Hereford Coach Danny Haney. "I didn't know if they would or not, but I knew they could. They made a few plays with their running backs, but those passes had to be perfect. They dropped them right in there, but they couldn't do it late."

The passing attack faded as the Herd changed up its coverage of the receivers and put more pressure on the quarterback.

"We just had to do our job up

front, and we knew that if we did our job then the secondary would have a better chance to do its job," said defensive end Mark Kreigshauser. "They went to a two-step drop (the quarterback took two steps back and threw) and that was hard on the forcing unit. He just got the ball off so quick several times that it was hard to get a rush on him."

"They really had two pretty good backs and a pretty good line," said Timberlake. "We had to overcome a little adversity there and then just come on."

"They got a couple on us to (Chris Matthews), but as soon as we took that away from them they had to resort to try to run or pass to somebody else."

"We played well up front," Haney said of his defense. "They broke a couple on us, but we held them."

The Herd racked up 479 yards and 24 first downs against the Tigers, but was stymied by four turnovers.

"I may have put a little more pressure on myself, being a captain and all, because we had to win," said offensive guard T.J. Samples. "We had to do it and we got it done."

Samples, a 6-5, 270-lb. guard, has recovered from a pre-season knee injury. He was glad to finally be at 100 percent for the first time this season.

"I taped up quite a bit, but I played

without the brace. I got a lot quicker without that brace."

Aldine ties with Kingwood

Two weeks after watching its 16-game winning streak come to a halt, the defending regular Class 5A champion Aldine Mustangs saw their luck run out against district foe Humble Kingwood.

It took a 27-yard field goal with 13 seconds remaining Friday night by Eric Clayton for Aldine (2-1-1), the 1990 mythical national champions, to salvage a 23-23 tie with the unranked Kingwood Mustangs in their District 21-5A opener.

Aldine kept Kingwood at bay during last year's 15-0 season with a late drive for a 24-21 victory over the Big School 5A state semifinalists.

This time, however, the Mustangs could get no closer than the Kingwood 11. Eric Gray threw three

passes off receivers' fingertips in the final minute before Aldine settled for the field goal.

Also Friday night, Odessa Permian ran its winning streak over crosstown rival Odessa to 27 games with a 44-0 romp in front of 20,000 fans at Ratliff Stadium. Last year's fears and frustrations over allegations of cheating and a scathing best-seller were replaced by hard-nosed football, and Permian, fifth-ranked in 5A, improved to 4-0.

All the top-ranked teams won big over unranked opponents. Arlington Lamar, No. 1 in Class 5A, whipped Weatherford 31-15; Class 4A leader Bastrop beat Austin Johnston 20-7; and Cuero beat LaGrange 27-7 in 3A.

In 2A, Schulenburg routed Flatonia 52-7 and 1A's Garden City shut out Wink 56-0.

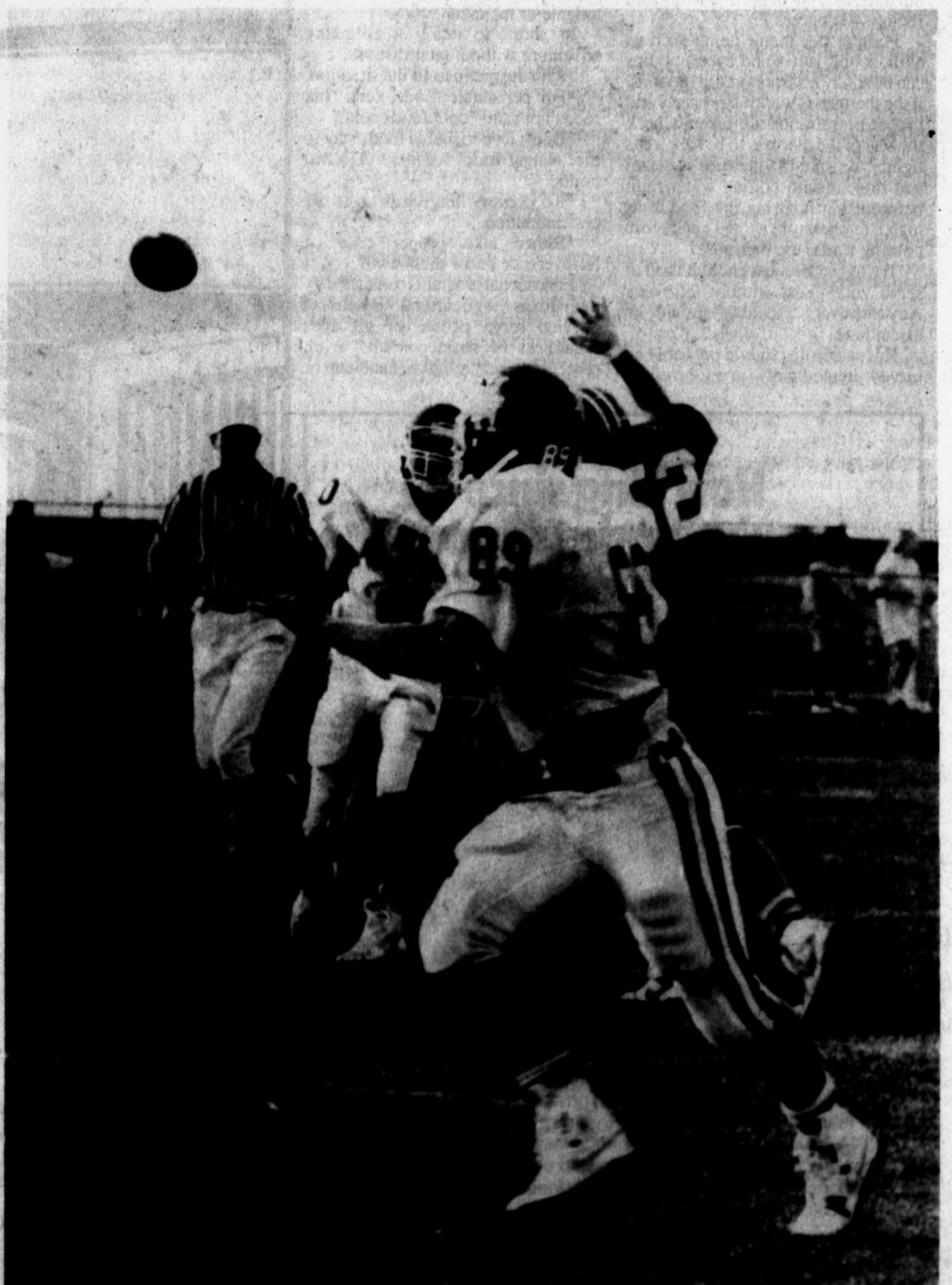
All the ranked teams played Friday night except for three in Class 5A. Third-ranked Fort Bend Willowridge, which beat Aldine 28-22 two weeks ago, was to face Fort Bend Clements Saturday night. No. 5 Huntsville faces Klein and No. 8 San Antonio Marshall plays San Antonio Lee.

In Houston, Kingwood led 14-13 at the half and went up 16-13 when Aldine lost a pichout in the end zone and fell on the ball.

In the fourth quarter, Aldine went back on top with an eight-play, 81-yard drive capped by Gray's 4-yard keeper for a 20-16 advantage. Elmer Brown, who ran for 119 yards, set up the score with runs of 29 and 16 yards.

Kingwood's Brian Sallee hit Buddy Sexton with a 6-yard pass with

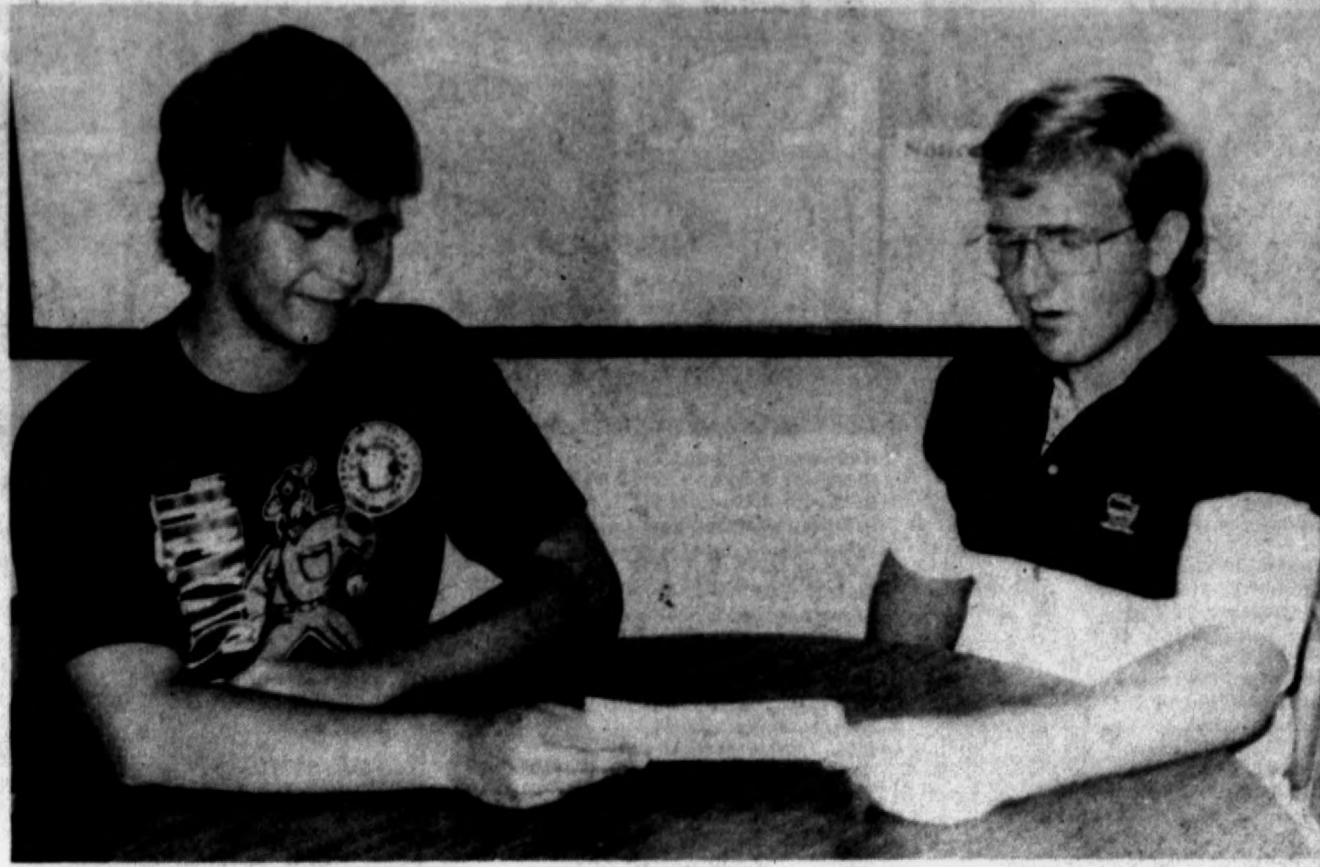

Jays beat Twins; lead by 3 1/2

Just when the Toronto Blue Jays might flop, they did a flip-flop.

The Blue Jays, showing more poise under pressure than most people thought possible, won again Friday night. They beat the Minnesota Twins 7-2 in a matchup of division leaders and extended their edge in the AL East to 3 1/2 games over Boston, which lost in Milwaukee 7-5.

Juan Guzman (9-2) outpitched Kevin Tapani and helped Toronto win its third in a row. The latest victory came in manager Cito Gaston's return after missing 33 games because of a back problem.

"I feel great, real happy. It seemed everything went my way," Guzman said. "It's very exciting to be in the pennant race and I'm glad to be here and do my job."

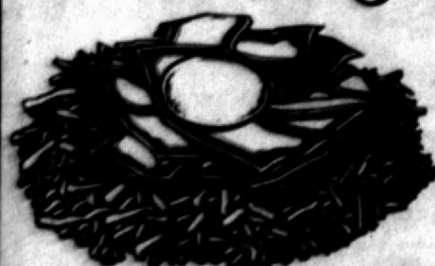

Koy Detmer mirrors older brother Ty

 The San Antonio Light MISSION, Texas (AP) - The hundreds of passes have blurred together for Koy Detmer. Ask him to recall his first varsity completion. Not a chance. Ask him if the six touchdowns he threw in Mission High School's 52-0 season-opening romp over Laredo Nixon was a career high. He honestly isn't sure. It's as if Detmer's system has been silenced by a shot of football-slinging novocaine. He gauges his success as the Eagles' quarterback with mechanical simplicity and childlike modesty. "I consider a bad throw one that goes incomplete," Detmer told the San Antonio Light this week. "I do throw some dunks, though." But not enough for anyone to notice. In just three games this season, Detmer has already fashioned the kind of season other high school quarterbacks dream about.

With 1,068 yards and nine touchdowns, Detmer is the state's leading Class 5A passer, ahead of Huntville's Chuck Clements (873). Only Glenn Winship of 4A Alamo Heights has thrown for more yards (1,184). So far, Detmer has completed 68.3 percent of his passes (69 of 101) with only two interceptions. If such uncanny accuracy for a high school player sounds familiar, it should. For years, Koy watched his older brother, 1990 Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer of Brigham Young, shred defenses like a pro at Southwest High School and become one of the state's all-time passing leaders. But Koy, a ball boy at Southwest for his father, coach Sonny Detmer, is finally emerging from behind his famous brother's shadow. "(The media) all want to talk about Ty's little brother," said Sonny, who is Koy's head coach at Mission. "Koy's getting write-ups in Los

Angeles and New York mainly because of what Ty's done. The good part is that Koy can stand on his own. His numbers speak for themselves." Indeed, nothing has changed from one Detmer sibling to the next. In 1986, Ty finished his high school career as Texas' all-time leading passer with 8,005 career yards. Since Sonny and Koy arrived at Mission after a one-year stay in Round Valley, Ariz., in 1988, Koy has thrown for 5,346 yards in three seasons. "I take it as an honor to be compared to him and be mentioned with (Ty) all the time," Koy said. "It was exciting watching him play. I think I learned a lot from him." As a sophomore seeing only limited action, Koy threw for 593 yards and four touchdowns. Last year, Koy guided the Eagles to a 12-2 record and a berth in the Regular 5A state semifinals, a first for a Rio Grande Valley school since the creation of 5A in 1980. Detmer

finished with a 5A season-high 3,685 yards and 43 touchdowns. But the similarities between Koy and Ty don't end with statistics. At 6-foot-1, 150 pounds, Koy is almost a mirror-image of Ty during his high school days. In uniform, it's even more difficult to tell them apart. They walk alike. They talk alike. They even drop back and scramble out of the pocket alike. "Just coming out of the huddle, it's close, isn't it?" Sonny said. "I'm telling you the truth when I say I can't tell which one is better. They have exactly the same strengths." And off the field, the brotherly loves are the same. Koy is the No. 1 player on Mission's varsity golf team, shooting 74-80 at last year's district tournament. He also comes off the bench as a guard-forward on the basketball team. "We pretty much keep all our football talk to the field house," Koy said. "When football's on (TV), I usually watch it. When I don't watch it, I go hunting, fishing or golfing. I like athletic-type activities. I don't like to read much." Except when it comes to defenses. Surprisingly, Koy has only been intercepted 15 times in his career. When compared to his 56 career touchdown passes, it becomes an even more impressive accomplishment for a high school quarterback.

Koy operates out of the same Pro-Set offense at Mission that Sonny installed at Southwest for Ty. It is similar to the multiple offenses being used at BYU and Miami. It is designed for a quarterback who can think on his feet. "There aren't a lot of kids that could come in and run our system and run it the way he does it," Sonny said. "We've played three games and I can think of only two mistakes he's made, where he threw the ball to the wrong place. And that's in over 100 passes. "Our system is perfect for (Koy) and Ty both because they understand it. You've got to be able to see the field and know what you're looking for. Those guys are as good as the system is good." Koy is a total believer in his dad's offensive scheme. The Eagles (3-0) lead the state in total offense, averaging 530 yards per game, and have outscored their opponents 127-25. "I guess my success is a combination of my dad's teaching, and the team that I play on," Koy said. "One person can't win the game or anything. The team has to play hard for anybody on that team to be successful." According to teammates, Koy is the epitome of the team player. Even though an injury to his frail frame could cost him a Division I scholarship, he apparently doesn't mind sacrificing his body. "We try to protect him," said senior center Silvestre Reyes of Koy. "We joke around with him and say he might get broken in two if we miss a block. At first when I saw him, I couldn't tell he played football." But Detmer most certainly does.

In Mission's first game against Nixon, Koy equaled his career-best with six touchdown passes. In last year's playoffs, he threw six in an area-round victory over Madison. "I never really look at the stats," Koy said. "I just look at the mistakes I made, and whether we won or not." Koy's skeptics, just like in Ty's day, argue that because of the weak caliber of competition Mission faces in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, his passing stats are inflated. In the 5A semifinals last year, Mission was drilled by eventual state champion Aldine 54-21. Koy was sacked five times and threw four of his 10 interceptions. Ty once threw for a city-record seven touchdown passes, but it came against former 4A doormat Memorial. Sonny merely scoffs at such critical talk. "Madison wasn't a Valley team and (Koy) had 396 yards, and didn't even play the fourth quarter," Sonny said. "Who has put over 400 yards of offense on Aldine except us? They told us that had never happened before." But Aldine had never faced a Detmer before.

Cowboys to find out how far they've come against Giants

 AP Sports Writer IRVING, Texas (AP) - Jimmy Johnson finds out this Sunday how much progress he has made in three years of trying to make the transition from college to professional football. It's like playing Oklahoma when he coached at Oklahoma State. Or like playing Notre Dame when he coached at Miami. The best determine how far you've come. On Sunday, Johnson sends another Dallas Cowboys team against the world champion New York Giants. It's yet another test of the program he has built. "Without question a victory would put us ahead of schedule of where

people might expect for our program," Johnson said. In his first two years, the Cowboys are 0-4 against the Giants and have been outscored 104-37. "I've learned you have to be tough against the run to win the NFC East," Johnson said. "We couldn't stop the run against the Giants. Hopefully, we'll be better now." Dallas is holding the opposition to 3.1 yards per run while Emmitt Smith of the Cowboys leads the NFL with 450 yards rushing on an average of 5.7 yards every time he touches the ball. "We're a better football team than what we've been the last two years," Johnson said. "We've been playing NFC East football. We've got people who can run it and we've been able to stop it."

"Jimmie was just uncomfortable out there and you want a player to be comfortable so we put him back at tackle," said Johnson. Jones replaces Danny Noonan as the starter at right tackle. The Cowboys tried and failed to put Jim Jeffcoat on the bench but he's back at his right defensive end spot and playing reasonably well. Tony Tolbert at left end and Casillas at left tackle round out the front four that will try to slow down the Giants patented running game. "We'll be rotating our defensive front because when you have 320 pounders blocking on you all the game you can wear down fast," Johnson said. "We want to be effective the whole game against the Giants." The noon game in Texas Stadium will be the biggest test yet of Johnson's most critical offseason moves, shoring up the defense against the run. "The Giants are very physical and will try to eat the clock and we'll try to stop 'em from doing that," Johnson said. "We have confidence in what we are doing." Oddsmakers installed the Giants (2-2) as two-point favorites over the Cowboys (2-2).

In Arlington, Shawn Walters scored three touchdowns and carried 30 times for 159 yards as Lamar downed Weatherford 31-15. Quarterback Tony Kennedy also scored for the Vikings (4-0) and ran for 103 yards on 18 carries against the Kangaroos (3-1). In 4A, fifth-ranked A&M Consolidated and eighth-ranked Corsicana each fell to 5A foes. A&M lost to Lufkin 21-7 and Corsicana was shut out 7-0 by Tyler John Tyler.

Ray Handley, who took over for Bill Parcells, said the Cowboys have definitely improved. "The Cowboys have one of the most explosive offenses in the league," said Handley, but it was the defense that caught his eye. "Dallas has a solid run defense," Handley said. "With that you can expect them to be in the division fight all the way." Johnson has been juggling the

Spurs' Mr. Robinson finds Christianity

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - It isn't as though anyone disapproved before. Not David Robinson's teammates. Not his coach. Not San Antonio. Not even his mother.

Why quibble? Changing this guy made as much sense as redesigning the American flag. He already embodied everything anyone could want: franchise savior, All-Star, olympian, officer, role model, loving son, responsible brother, TV celebrity, pianist, math whiz and multimillionaire.

But this summer, June 8 to be exact, Robinson realized something crucial was missing. It was God. Conviction. Priorities. Today the difference in Robinson, by everyone's account, is dramatic.

"This is a powerful, powerful thing, finding out about your life and finding out about how to lift other people up," Robinson told The San Antonio Light in an exclusive interview last week. "Now I really have a purpose."

He is so committed that he routinely includes Bible scriptures when signing autographs. He says his transformation led to his recent (brace yourselves, ladies) engagement to his longtime girlfriend, Valerie.

But what about basketball? Spurs training camp begins in less than two weeks, and many in the organization are curious what the new Robinson will be like on the court. And in the locker room.

And what effect, if any, the change will have on Robinson's teammates and the Spurs' season.

"The only thing I'd like to think about is it's for him, it's for David Robinson," Spurs coach Larry Brown says. "He's so excited about it, and that's the important thing. Sure, if David becomes better, becomes a better leader, it's going to help us. But it doesn't have to be religion that does that."

To Robinson's parents, Brown and the Spurs who have been around Robinson this summer, the change clearly has been for the better - even though many would wonder if that was possible.

The old Robinson often seemed more introspective. He could captivate listeners when he wanted, but often seemed more content

keeping to himself. The new Robinson is exuberant, smiling and chatty.

"From what I see it seems like he's a lot more happy," says Spurs guard Willie Anderson. "Always smiling. Enjoying life. You can tell he's a lot more at ease than before. I guess he didn't have a feel for how he should act, what he should say or do around people because of who he is."

As much as Robinson had going for him before, there was one thing he didn't understand: Why wasn't he enjoying himself?

The realization hit Robinson a month after the Spurs were jolted from the first round of the playoffs by Golden State.

The answer came from a friend, a man Robinson describes as "a minister from Austin."

"He came up and basically got in my face and said, 'Hey, you need to get real about your life because you're just waiting for a big fall,'" Robinson says. "Right now everything may be going great, but you can't keep living the way you're living."

Robinson always had believed in God, and there were times last season when he tried to study the Bible more closely.

But suddenly it was summer, and for the first time in a long time Robinson didn't have a steady girlfriend. He and Valerie - "The one girl I had really enjoyed," Robinson says - had gone separate ways.

Robinson says he couldn't help but think back five years to his days at the Naval Academy. "When all I wanted was that one girlfriend, and spend the rest of my life with her."

He sought the Bible again, and there were his answers. One proverb in particular seemed to apply:

If you build your house on sand, as soon as the wind blows your house is going to fall down. You have to build it on a solid foundation.

"My house fell down," Robinson

says. "All of a sudden I wake up and I've got different opinions about everything, the way I looked at life. I really liked myself (five years ago) a lot more than I liked myself last year."

"I had to take a strong look at myself and say, 'You know what? This lifestyle, people saying this and saying that to me, really made me arrogant. It's really made me think the world revolves around me.' I didn't like looking at myself and saying that, but I had to."

His mother Freda says the results have been dramatic.

"It's a real blessing," Freda says. "David was never a bad person, but everyone needs a purpose. I'm so happy for him. It's made a big difference."

But will it mean a different Robinson on the court? Robinson would like to think so. Will it make him more assertive, become the kind of leader Brown always has wanted him to be? Robinson would like to think so.

A year ago the Spurs were a fragmented team, careening into the playoffs with assorted off-court distractions.

There were jealousies. Rod Strickland and David Wingate broke crew at playoff time. What bothered Robinson more than anything was the helplessness he felt after the season.

As a Christian, Robinson now feels a strong obligation to help others see right from wrong, and that includes teammates.

"I can't sit here and deal with a man's game because that's not where the problem lies," Robinson says. "The problem lies in the man's life, his mentality. And it's not about preaching the Bible to him, it's about straightening him out. It's about getting the man to act right and respect other things in his life."

"When he learns to respect other things in his life and people in his life, he'll respect you as a player. He'll realize, 'I'm not just letting myself down if I don't do my job; I'm letting everyone down.'"

At the Naval Academy Robinson learned how to be an officer, a leader.

But this summer he may have learned more about leadership than he ever knew. He says he believes God put him on earth for two reasons: To teach, and to play basketball.

Robinson says he realizes you can't push religion on others because it can turn them off. But he says the Spurs are fortunate to have four strong Christians: himself, Terry Cummings, Paul Pressey and Avery Johnson.

He relates the Spurs' problems to a growing trend in society: An absence of strong leadership in the home.

"I think on our team we have to have men who will take responsibility spiritually for the kids," he says. "That's kind of a harsh way to put it, but that's exactly what's happening on our team."

"We've got a bunch of kids, spiritually. Guys that don't take responsibility for anything they do. They make excuses. They don't have respect for things and they just don't want to be a man about what's happening out there."

Not that sports and religion have always been a blissful mix. In 1988, a year after the Minnesota Twins won the World Series, third baseman Gary Gaetti announced he was born-again. Gaetti's stats and his hard-nosed on field habits went awry. And so did the Twins, some of whom blamed the "soft" atmosphere in the clubhouse.

And when Darryl Strawberry of the Dodgers became born-again this season, team officials complained that he spent too much time talking about it rather than playing.

When Robinson's life changed directions, it caused some wondering.

"One of the chief-ranking Spurs officials was scared to death when he heard that this summer," Brown says,

smiling. "That's the first thing he thought of. But I don't believe that. If it happens, it happens. But whatever makes the kid happy and fulfilled in his life is fine by me."

As for the effect it may have on an athlete's performance, it never seemed to hurt Roger Staubach. And Cummings, an ordained Pentecostal ministerevangelist, could hardly be called soft.

"God doesn't want wimps," Robinson says. "He doesn't want people who are laid-back and all. He wants men. He wants warriors. Because this is not a joke. It's a war out there. It's a war between your soul and the devil."

Don't try to tell Robinson that total conviction can trivialize basketball, which, after all, is merely a game. Or that religion allows athletes to rationalize failures ("It wasn't God's will.")

In recent talks with Robinson, Brown has noticed that basketball seems to have moved up on Robinson's ladder of importance. In

the same breath as religion and family.

"You never trivialize anything that God has given you," Robinson says. "One of my gifts, obviously, is playing basketball. That is a powerful way to reach people and to talk to people."

"A lot of times I go places and people listen to me just because I'm David Robinson, which, in reality, should mean nothing to them. But it does, for some crazy reason. It's super. It's a great way to reach people."

Some of Robinson's more inspiring talks this summer have been with Cummings, who, after all, has been down the same path as Robinson.


"I think what Dave has done is make himself a better person," Cummings says. "What makes a person a whole person is dealing with mind and body and soul. Dave's always been strong-minded and strong-bodied. He's whole now because he has that equilibrium."

"In 1990, I made 300 pillows for Good Shepherd," said Cora. "A plain pillow (one without patch work) takes about 30 minutes to make."

The pillows and quilt tops, which with the help of a few others at Good Shepherd are made into quilts, are sold at the clothes closet.

Good Shepherd is a clothes closet for low income families. Prices range from free to \$1. Clothes and shoes for all ages, magazines and home items are available. Good Shepherd is

staffed by volunteers and stocked by the people of Hereford who donate items.

"We couldn't do it without help from the people of Hereford," Cora said of the their donations. "Hereford is a good place to be."

Cora is accustomed to hard work. When she was young she helped her family by working at whatever job was available.

To see her work and go about town, one would never guess she was 81. Cora is in tip-top shape. She views her not seeing a doctor in 35 years as a major accomplishment in life. Few people could say the same.

"I don't have much money, but I have my health and that's good enough for me."

Working with and helping people gives Cora a good feeling.

"I enjoy my job," Cora said. "I enjoy helping people. I love the kids the most. I really enjoy the young ones."

Cora is at work every Tuesday and Friday and whenever she is needed in between.

"I don't drive so I don't get out much, but I try to go whenever I am needed."

Cora came to Hereford six years ago from Arizona. She is originally from Missouri. Her daughter, Wanda Aleshire, lives in Hereford.

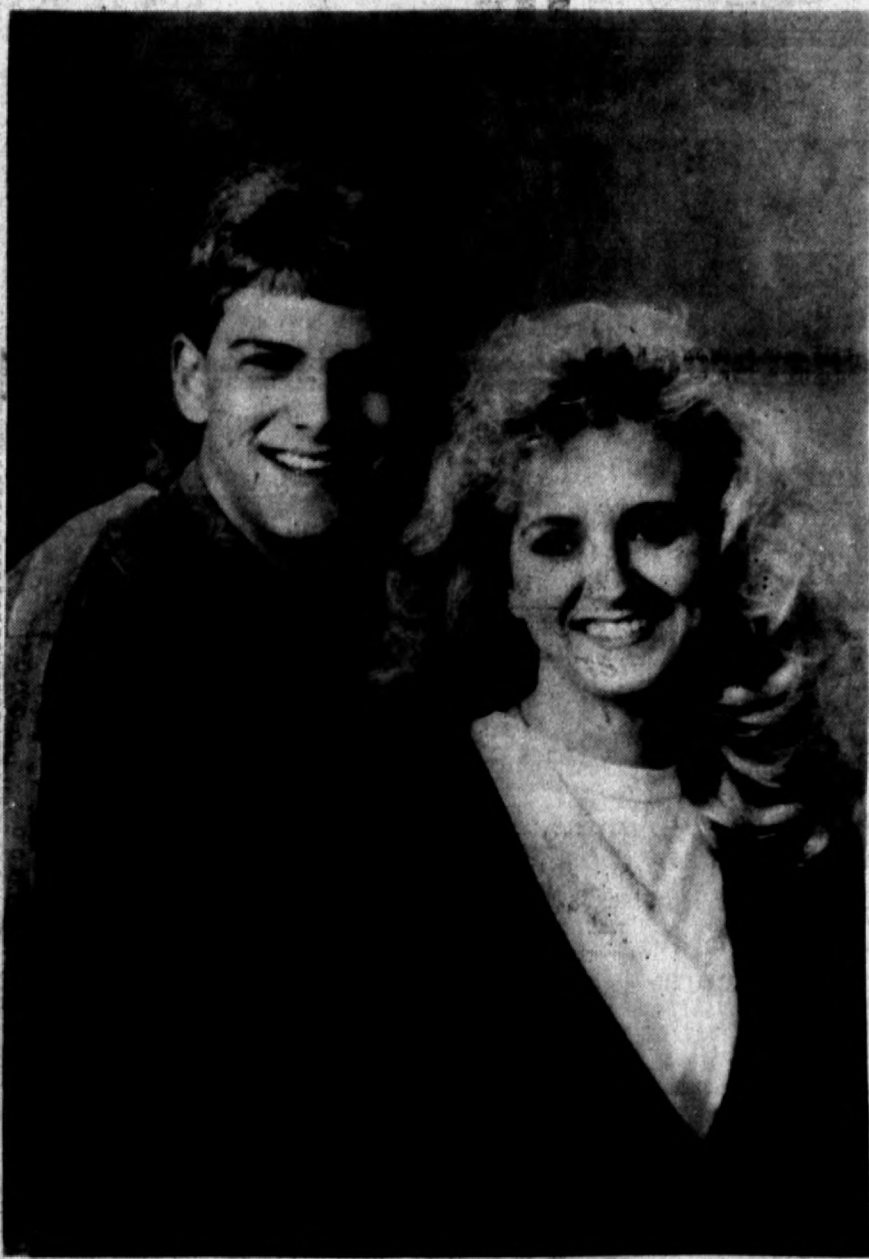

Hospice care is special care for terminally ill people and their families. Medicare hospice benefits are available to those who have Medicare hospital insurance. This program covers a full range of benefits including physician services, nursing care, symptom management, and pain relief.

When a patient receives these services from a medicare certified hospice, Medicare hospital insurance

pays almost the entire cost of care. The only cost to the beneficiary is 5 percent--up to a maximum of \$5.00--for each prescription for outpatient pain relief or symptom management, and a little above \$4.00 per day for respite care. (Respite care is inpatient care for the patient to give temporary relief to the person who provides care in the home.)

A patient can receive Medicare-covered hospice care as long as a physician certifies that the patient is terminally ill. In addition, the person

must sign a statement choosing hospice care for the terminal illness, and must receive the care from a Medicare-certified hospice.

For more information, about hospice benefits, contact Social Security and ask for the leaflet, **Medicare Hospice Benefits**.

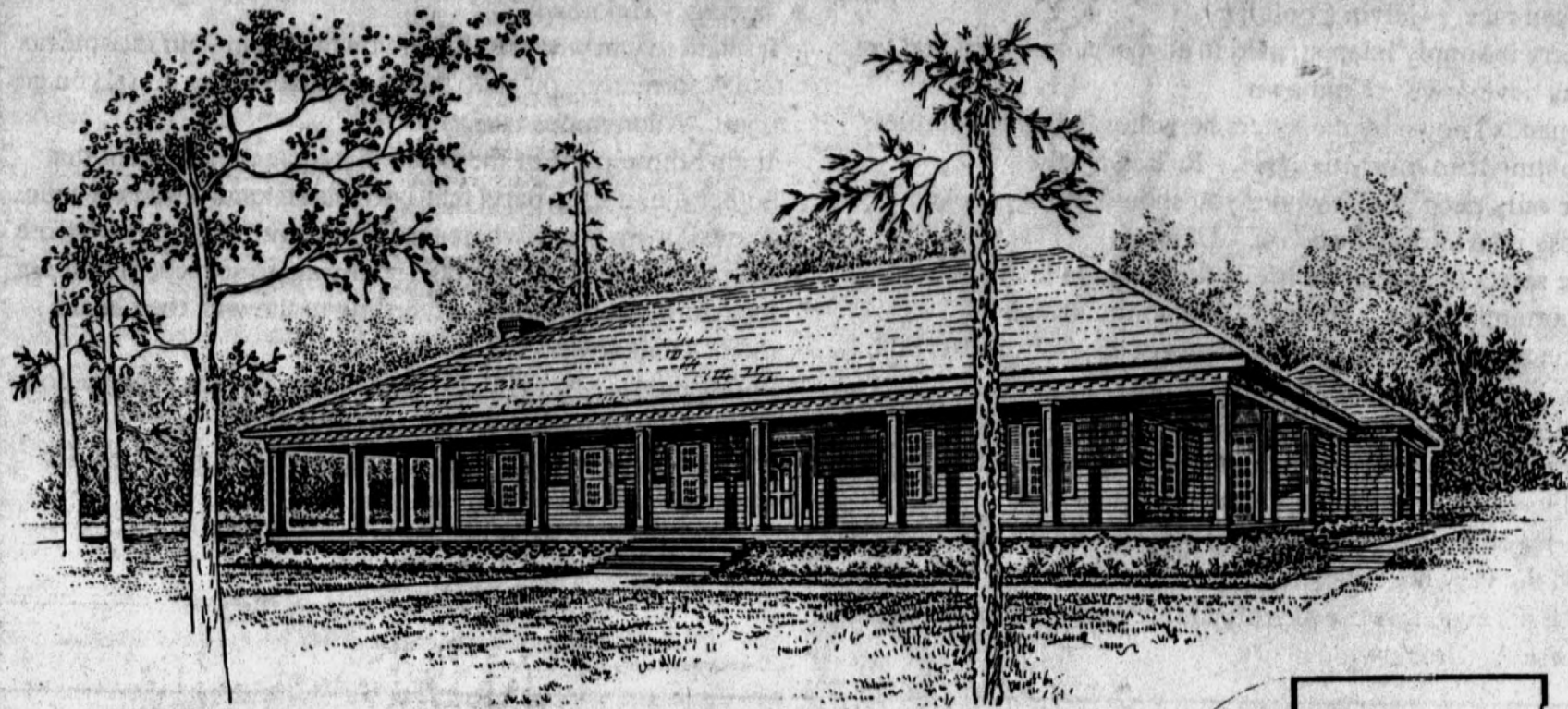

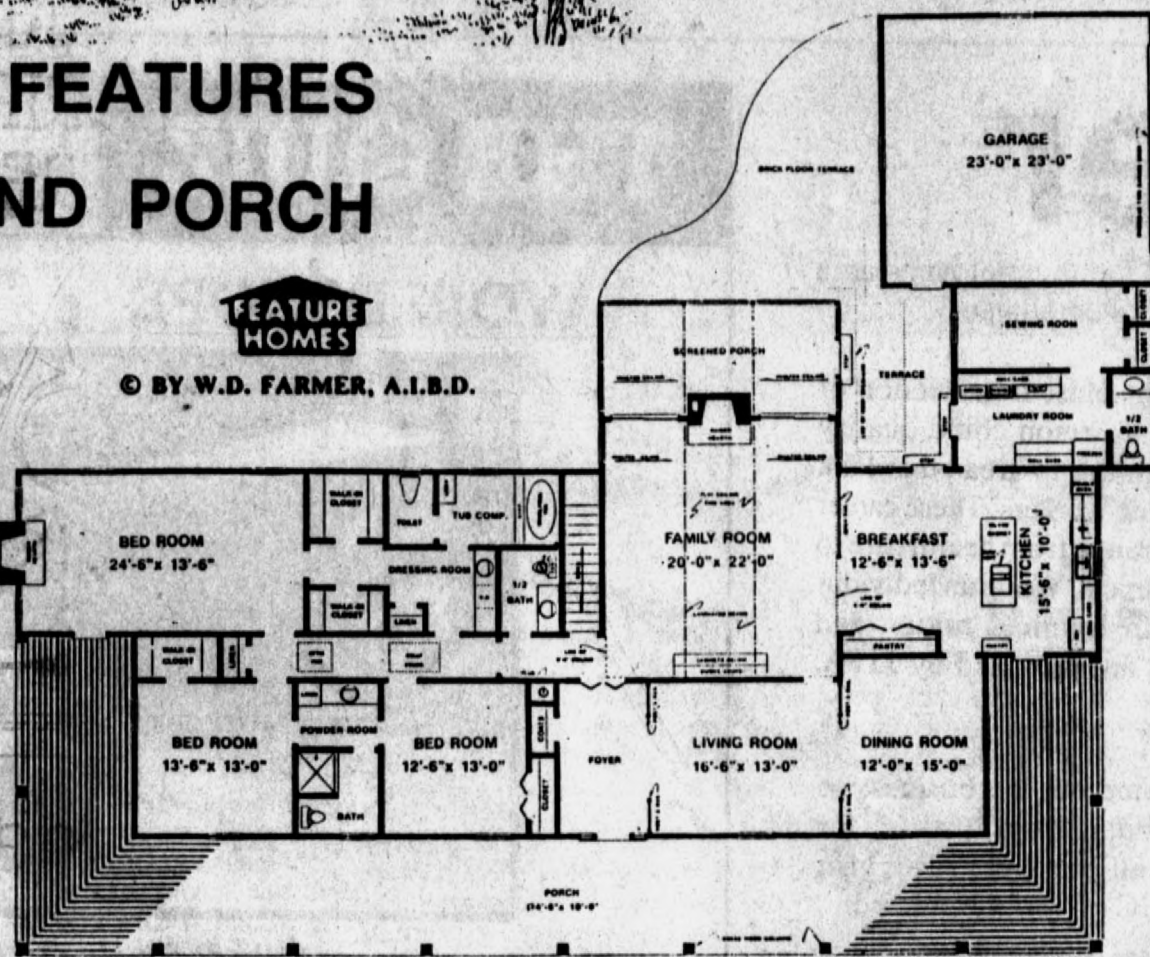
HOME PLAN FEATURES WRAP AROUND PORCH

Question & Answer

Q. - My foundation is made of 10-inch concrete block up to ground level and then 6-inch block above that point with a 4-inch stone facing. The inside surfaces of the outer wall are plastered directly onto the block. These walls feel cold to the touch. I recently visited Florida and saw several similarly constructed houses, but their block walls were covered with sheets of insulating material, furring strips and plastic vapor barrier. Would adding insulation and a vapor barrier solve my cold wall problem?

A. - It sure would, especially if you install drywall over the insulation and vapor barrier. First, check the type of polystyrene you use. Some are effective water barriers in themselves. The ability to deter the passage of

moisture is measured in perms. Any material having a rate of less than 1.0 is considered an effective vapor barrier. Styrofoam brand insulation has a perm value of 0.6 for each inch of thickness. Since polyethylene (plastic vapor barrier) film is inexpensive, you should use it to ensure a continuous vapor barrier over gaps and joints in the insulation.

TEC Corner

The Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) is a partnership between business and labor. JTPA allows an employer to hire individuals that require training and be reimbursed for training costs. The partnership also allows for classroom training in occupations that need qualified workers. JTPA is a federally-initiated program that meets many needs. The changing economy, coupled with changing required work skills, were leaving employers without skilled workers, and without the necessary skills to meet the demand. An employer using JTPA can vary in size from a small business to a major employer. The key is a willingness to retrain the current work force to match the needs of the employer. This is done by a placement interviewer evaluating the employer's requirements. A training plan is developed for on-the-job training (OJT). It is during OJT that the employer can be reimbursed for up to 50 percent of the employee's salary. After the OJT, the employer has a qualified employee.

In the classroom section of JTPA, a person could qualify for training in areas that lack qualified workers. These career fields range from health care to mechanical. While an individual is in training, tuition and books are provided by JTPA.

To find out if a business or individual may qualify for JTPA, all you have to do is visit the TEC office in Hereford.

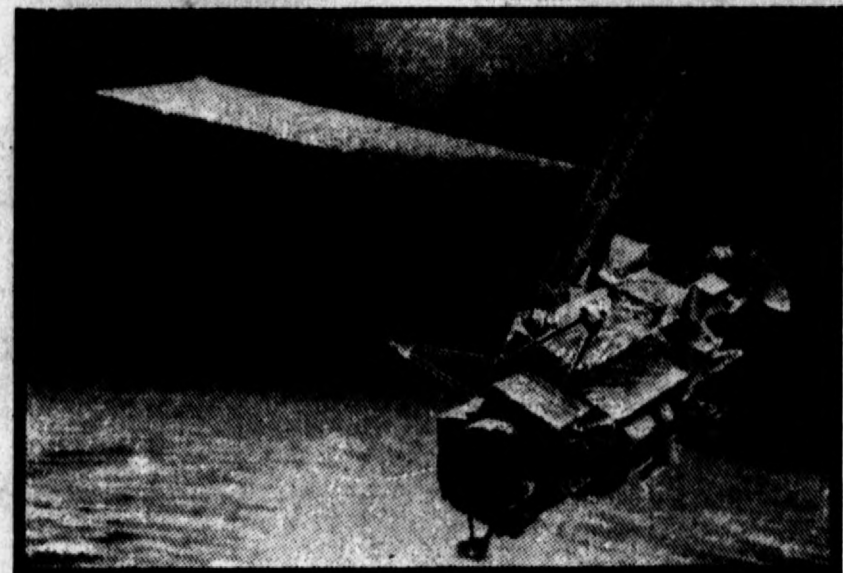

DEAR ANN LANDERS: We have forked over \$20,000 a year per child for higher education, yet we have nothing to say about how colleges are run.

We do not feel that students should be sleeping with members of the opposite sex anywhere on campus. Motels are available for this kind of activity.

Our daughter is disgusted with her roommate's behavior but her sense of loyalty will not permit her to snitch. Isn't it dangerous to be in the same bedroom with your roommate's drunken boyfriend? Please express your views.—parents in Massachusetts

DEAR PARENTS: When I don't know the answer, I turn to someone who does. In this case, I've turned to four of this country's leading educators:

Derek Bok, president emeritus of Harvard University: "If a student invites her boyfriend to sleep in her room, that student's roommate cannot remain silent and expect the university to take care of the problem. Unless the university is prepared to resort to midnight bed checks or electronic surveillance, it is impossible for the staff to know who is sleeping where. The aggrieved student must notify the administration. The staff can then require the student to ask her boyfriend to move out, and, if need be, arrange for the student or the roommate to move to another room. If the roommate cannot muster the strength to take even this much responsibility for her own welfare, I fear that she may be poorly prepared to cope with the problems of life."

Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, president emeritus of the University of Notre Dame: "The solution is simple, but very unpopular with some students, especially the randy men. It is called parietal hours. This means men and women are free to visit each other's rooms from noon until midnight during the week and from noon to 2:00 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays. Anyone violating these rules faces serious penalties. There are few secrets in dorms. Offenders are identified and punished. A perfect solution? Not really, but better than making the innocent suffer while the boorish are protected. Is this what our society wants young people to learn. I think not."

Benno C. Schmidt Jr., president of Yale University: "If the situation is as the parents described, their daughter is facing not only discomfort, but fear of the consequences of her roommate's behavior. It is then essential that she discuss the matter with her roommate. There are steps that could be taken if they do not agree. At Yale such matters are addressed by counselors, deans and faculty disciplinary committees. Yale assumes that its students are adults and able to act responsibly. We try to educate our students about a broad range of matters, including sexual issues. Informational booklets are distributed to freshmen. Counselors, student volunteers and professionals are available at all hours to discuss problems and pursue appropriate alternatives."

George Roche, president of Hillside College, Hillsdale, Mich.: "The behavior you describe generally does not occur on our campus. We know this because of visitation hours and because adult house mothers are present to ensure the safety and welfare of our students. If an errant student is caught, that student is fined. If the activity continues, the fine is increased. The next step is probation, and ultimately dismissal. The girl whose parents wrote should transfer to Hillside College where traditional values are practices."

YOUR EYES TOGETHERNESS

Good vision depends on both eyes working together as a team. Each one must see clearly, of course, but it's equally necessary that both eyes be able to focus on the same object at the same time. For most of us, this togetherness is automatic. It happens quickly and easily. But if the eyes are not working well together, the result may be double vision. Sometimes the individual must overwork muscles trying to get the eyes to aim at the same object simultaneously, or consciously or unconsciously block out the image seen by one eye. When the eyes don't work together, the brain gets confused about what it sees. Corrective lenses and vision training can bring success in correcting this problem. Your optometrist may use either or both. After careful examination, lenses to correct nearsightedness or farsightedness may be prescribed. 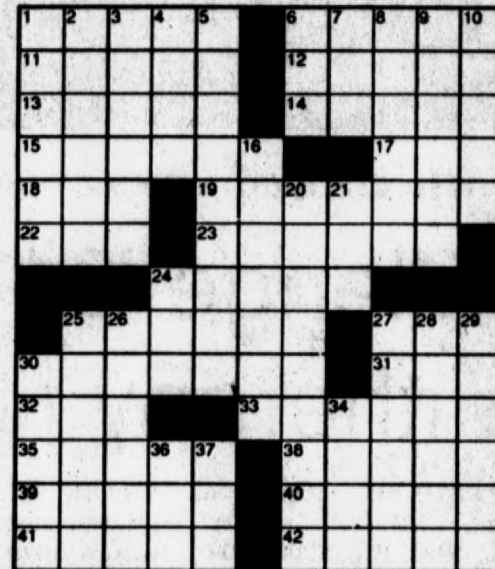

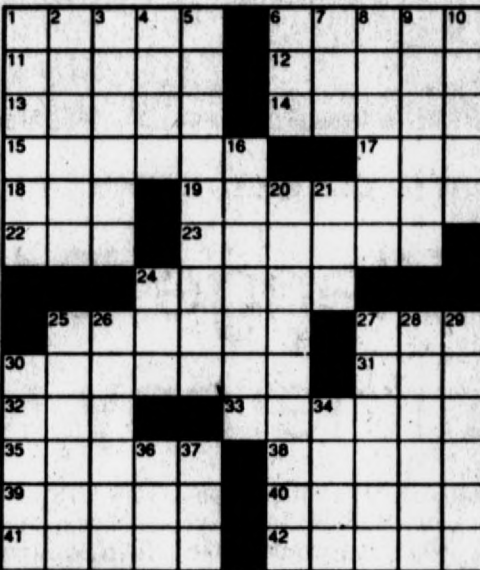

Real-life drama still packs punch

It seems the networks have deemed this crooked government week. TNT, determined to ignite tensions over the alleged "October Surprise" plot to influence the 1980 presidential election, blasts off with the four-hour miniseries *Iran: Days of Crisis*. PBS, meanwhile, throws its own brand of White House vice into the ring with a multihour retrospective on President Lyndon Johnson.

CBS leaps onto the bandwagon, or perhaps we should say bandboat, with *Mission of the Shark*, chronicling one of the greatest disasters in U.S. naval history. Sunday, Sept. 29, Stacy Keach (*Mike Hammer*) stars as the World War II captain in command of the ill-fated U.S.S. Indianapolis.

In July of 1945, the Indianapolis set sail on a crucial, top-secret mission: to deliver vital components of the atomic bomb to the tiny island of Tinian in the Pacific.

Smooth sailing characterized the trip to Tinian, but the return journey came to a halt midocean when the cruiser was abruptly struck — and sunk — by torpedoes launched from a Japanese sub.

Abandoning ship, nearly 850 survivors lay in oil-polluted, shark-infested waters. Suffering from dehydration, exposure and salt-water poisoning, they prayed, literally, for a Navy rescue. But the Navy never came. Policy dictated secret missions proceed without tracking, and a rescue team was never dispatched.

The Army came instead, a nightmarish five days later, happening by chance upon the floating corps. Only 317 men survived. Capt. McVay (Keach), an easy scapegoat for the fiasco, was court-martialed.

Supporting Keach in *Mission of the Shark* are Richard Thomas, Carrie Snodgrass, Steve Landesberg and Keach's real-life dad, Stacy Keach Sr.

A number of books have been written about the catastrophe of the Indianapolis, *Man Overboard* and *Fatal Voyage* among them. CBS puts forth a valiant effort with its version of the story, but from a movie-making standpoint falls short.

Too many characters are presented with too little development, making it difficult to keep up with who's who; Keach's bland lines lead one to believe McVay was a sap who deserved to be court-martialed; one of the drama's most compelling issues, the government's culpability, is skirted; and a confounding, Philippines-set subplot of the rescue goes nowhere, instead favoring agonizingly long scenes of bodies adrift in the ocean.

In real life, however, the ordeal was horrifically long. *Mission of the Shark* captures the tortured trial well, with many fine dramatic moments. The viewer cannot help but be compelled by the sight of sailors salvaging shirts from the backs of their dead shipmates and dumping them overboard to pacify the circling sharks, or a commander threatening to take the lifejacket from any thirsty sailor who succumbs to drinking salt water.

Mission of the Shark was filmed in Mobile, Ala., and in the Bahamas. Divers were hired to check the waters for predators. Unfortunately, there were no divers in 1945.

In this sense, *Mission of the Shark* cannot be entirely condemned, because it represents a piece of our history, lived by real men.

SOAP TALK

Soaps meet the ear as well as the eye

Lights! Camera! Music? Have you ever stopped to think why you feel a certain way while watching a soap? "We get a script, and it is like choreography," says music supervisor Sue Beth Markowitz of *Another World*. "I determine what emotion should be enhanced, and I select music cues that will enhance that emotion and the coloring it will give a particular scene."

"We produce most of the music utilized on the show ourselves from our own library, except for some outside music we select. We have about 3200 music cues in our library that we can use, running the gamut of emotions, in time frames anywhere from 20 seconds to four minutes."

The fact most of us don't realize music is even playing means Markowitz is successful at her job. The music's sole purpose is to help us feel more intense about what's happening on the screen. "There are special moments like montages and love scenes, in which case the music should be more dominant," says Markowitz.

A music supervisor's job is never done. The week I spoke with Markowitz, she was working on Dean's music video (a full-time job in itself) to air on the soap and laying the tracks for the song "I'll Do Anything for You" from *Robin Hood*, the summer film release. *Another World* was given the rights to use the music as the love song for the characters Frankie and Cass.

"I heard that song, and it was so perfect for Frankie (Alice Barrett) and Cass (Stephen Schnetzer) and all they have been going through. They have truly risked their lives for each other," says Markowitz.

Purchasing of the rights to "I'll Do Anything for You" and other songs is a long, expensive process. Consequently, most of the music used on the show is expressly written for it by staff artists.

The song used in Dean's (Ricky Paul Goldin) video, "Lady Killer," was specifically written for the show by John Laffer and John Siegler. "We don't have the time to do a music video the way it is really done, but considering the time element that we have, I think they are really doing a super job on it," says Markowitz.

Viewers, I would like to know what you thought of the "Lady Killer" video and if you would like to see more of this kind of thing.

'Longtime Companion' powerful viewing

Bruce Davison shines amid strong ensemble

"It's inconceivable that there was ever a time before this ... that we didn't wake up wondering, 'Who's sick now, who else is gone?'"

So mutes Willy, one of the saddened, yet undefeated survivors at the end of Norman Rene's moving *Longtime Companion*, an acclaimed 1990 film that opens the 11th season of PBS' *American Playhouse* series. Airing on most affiliates Sunday, Sept. 29, the film is the first major theatrical release dealing with AIDS (following ground-

breaking television fare like *An Early Frost* and *Andre's Mother*). Besides its undeniable historical and social significance, *Longtime Companion* is a forceful work of art, at once a document of real tragedy and a quiet tribute to human resiliency.

Craig Lucas' script, understated and often very funny, is deceptively simple in its structure. The film follows the intertwining lives of several gay men (some couples, some not) in New York City in the early '80s. At first, a newspaper article alerts the characters to a mysterious, multisymptomed disease afflicting gay males and

intravenous-drug users. Frightening as it is, it seems very far away.

Then Lucas' script begins to move forward, a year at a time. One character dies. Another falls ill and, suddenly, no one feels safe. The film moves deftly from one face of tragedy to another; the demoralizing loss of independence, the numbing burden of the caregiver, the stigma and unemployment; all are depicted with force and honesty. Lucas also decries the appalling slowness with which government officials met the situation in the deadly disease's early days. The movie avoids, however, a dry, documentary-like feel or an overly depressing tone. It simply tells the truth.

Longtime Companion boasts a powerful ensemble cast, including Campbell Scott (*Dying Young*), Dermot Mulroney (*Bright Angel*), Mary-Louise Parker, Michael Schoeffling and, of course, Bruce Davison. Davison was recognized with both a Golden Globe award and an Oscar nomination.

Elayne Boosler's naked underneath

Comedian Elayne Boosler's fourth Showtime special, *Elayne Boosler: Live Nude Girls*, debuts Friday, Oct. 4, on the premium cable network.

"It's bait and switch," she says coyly of the provocative title, "but it is a major piece of material on the show."

In fact, Boosler's act is more mainstream than most. She eschews elaborate props and set dressing and dismisses profanity as "just a bunch of junk." Neither a shy violet nor an in-your-face bombast, Boosler uses normalcy to her advantage.

"My job is to entertain first," Boosler says, adding that she works hard to be original. But she wants her audiences to go home with something to think about, too. "That is the cutting edge. The cutting edge isn't jumping around on your head and saying nothing."

Recently named (along with Linda Ellerbee, Murphy Brown, Kitty Kelley and Madonna) to a bad-girls-of-the-'90s list by *The New York Times*, Boosler says, "It's a good list (to be on). It means that we shake up what people expect."

SOAP TALK

Soaps meet the ear as well as the eye

Lights! Camera! Music? Have you ever stopped to think why you feel a certain way while watching a soap? "We get a script, and it is like choreography," says music supervisor Sue Beth Markowitz of *Another World*. "I determine what emotion should be enhanced, and I select music cues that will enhance that emotion and the coloring it will give a particular scene.

"We produce most of the music utilized on the show ourselves from our own library, except for some outside music we select. We have about 3200 music cues in our library that we can use, running the gamut of emotions, in time frames anywhere from 20 seconds to four minutes."

The fact most of us don't realize music is even playing means Markowitz is successful at her job. The music's sole purpose is to help us feel more intense about what's happening on the screen. "There are special moments like montages and love scenes, in which case the music should be more dominant," says Markowitz.

A music supervisor's job is never done. The week I spoke with Markowitz, she was working on Dean's music video (a full-time job in itself) to air on the soap and laying the tracks for the song "I'll Do Anything for You" from *Robin Hood*, the summer film release. *Another World* was given the rights to use the music as the love song for the characters Frankie and Cass.

"I heard that song, and it was so perfect for Frankie (Alice Barrett) and Cass (Stephen Schnetzer) and all they have been going through. They have truly risked their lives for each other," says Markowitz.

Purchasing of the rights to "I'll Do Anything for You" and other songs is a long, expensive process. Consequently, most of the music used on the show is expressly written for it by staff artists.

The song used in Dean's (Ricky Paul Goldin) video, "Lady Killer," was specifically written for the show by John Leffler and John Siegler. "We don't have the time to do a music video the way it is really done, but considering the time element that we have, I think they are really doing a super job on it," says Markowitz.

Viewers, I would like to know what you thought of the "Lady Killer" video and if you would like to see more of this kind of thing.

'Longtime Companion' powerful viewing

Bruce Davison shines amid strong ensemble

"It's inconceivable that there was ever a time before this... that we didn't wake up wondering, 'Who's sick now, who else is gone?'"

So mopes Willy, one of the saddened, yet undefeated survivors at the end of Norman Rene's moving *Longtime Companion*, an acclaimed 1990 film that opens the 11th season of PBS' *American Playhouse* series. Airing on most affiliates Sunday, Sept. 29, the film is the first major theatrical release dealing with AIDS (following ground-

breaking television fare like *An Early Frost* and *Andre's Mother*). Besides its undeniable historical and social significance, *Longtime Companion* is a forceful work of art, at once a document of real tragedy and a quiet tribute to human resiliency.

Craig Lucas' script, understated and often very funny, is deceptively simple in its structure. The film follows the intertwining lives of several gay men (some couples, some not) in New York City in the early '80s. At first, a newspaper article alerts the characters to a mysterious, multisymptomed disease afflicting gay males and

intravenous-drug users. Frightening as it is, it seems very far away.

Then Lucas' script begins to move forward, a year at a time. One character dies. Another falls ill and, suddenly, no one feels safe. The film moves deftly from one face of tragedy to another; the demoralizing loss of independence, the numbing burden of the caregiver, the stigma and unemployment; all are depicted with force and honesty. Lucas also decries the appalling slowness with which government officials met the situation in the deadly disease's early days. The movie avoids, however, a dry, documentary-like feel or an overly depressing tone. It simply tells the truth.

Longtime Companion boasts a powerful ensemble cast, including Campbell Scott (*Dying Young*), Dermot Mulroney (*Bright Angel*), Mary-Louise Parker, Michael Schoeffling and, of course, Bruce Davison. Davison was recognized with both a Golden Globe award and an Oscar nomination.

Elayne Boosler's naked underneath

Comedian Elayne Boosler's fourth Showtime special, *Elayne Boosler: Live Nude Girls*, debuts Friday, Oct. 4, on the premium cable network.

"It's bait and switch," she says coyly of the provocative title, "but it is a major piece of material on the show."

In fact, Boosler's act is more mainstream than most. She eschews elaborate props and set dressing and dismisses profanity as "just a bunch of junk." Neither a shy violet nor an in-your-face bombast, Boosler uses normalcy to her advantage.

"My job is to entertain first," Boosler says, adding that she works hard to be original. But she wants her audiences to go home with something to think about, too. "That is the cutting edge. The cutting edge isn't jumping around on your head and saying nothing."

Recently named (along with Linda Ellerbee, Murphy Brown, Kitty Kelley and Madonna) to a bad-girls-of-the-'90s list by *The New York Times*, Boosler says, "It's a good list (to be on). It means that we shake up what people expect."

'Newton's Apple' looks at Olympic training

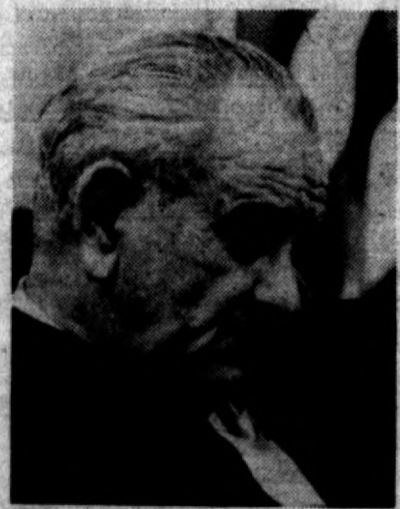

Newton's Apple, the Emmy Award-winning PBS family science series, begins its ninth season this week with an informative and entertaining half-hour special, "The Science of Olympic Sports." The episode airs Saturday, Oct. 5, on most PBS affiliates.

Host David Heil and field reporter Peggy Knapp take viewers to the United States Olympic Training Centers in Colorado Springs, Colo., and Lake Placid, N.Y., where each year between six and eight thousand athletes combine training and technology in pursuit of the single-minded goal of representing the United States in the Olympic Games.

In the opening segment, Knapp lingers around a running track while physiologist Jay T. Kearney explains how a volume-of-oxygen mask measures the chemical efficiency of a runner's lungs. Then, Heil takes a turn in a swimming flume to demonstrate various ways cameras and computers are used to dissect and analyze a swimmer's technique. In quick succession, the show touches on training advances in weightlifting, racewalking, softball and the luge.

J. Edgar Hoover: Hollywood snoop

When busybodies are laid to rest, skeletons are safe in their closets. On Friday, Oct. 4, A&E's *Time Machine With Jack Perkins* sheds new light on old dirt. "The Secret Files of J. Edgar Hoover" features star dossiers on John Wayne, Marilyn Monroe and the Kennedy brothers, made accessible by the Freedom of Information Act. The FBI chief's obsessive curiosity about famous Americans called for the use of illegal wiretaps and blackmail to gather incriminating information.

Continuing the themes of megalomania, power-lust and back-door politics, the overdue miniseries *Iran: Days of Crisis* tells the story of the 1979 U.S. Embassy takeover and the suspiciously drawn-out negotiations for the hostages' release. The TNT original movie premieres in two parts, Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 30 and Oct. 1.

Sunday, Sept. 29, is opening night for The Discovery Channel, with previews of five of 15 new series beginning this fall: *The Nature of Things: Green Quiz* tests viewers' knowledge of environmental hazards; *Wildlife Tales: Perfect Predators* shows us what sensitive types sharks really are; *The Adventurers* highlights people charged with adrenalin; *Hollywood Stunt-makers: The Great Chases* picks the best hot pursuits on film; and *Moments of Courage* re-enacts disasters such as toddler Jessica McClure's tumble into a well.

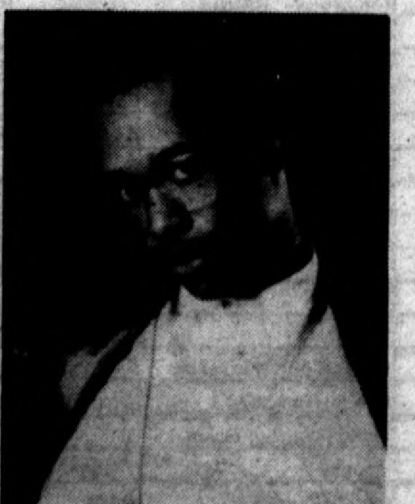

Musical diversion, as well as the show's addictive main theme, is supplied by Rockapella, a talented quartet also seen in recent Taco Bell commercials. And yes, there are prizes.
 If all this sounds pretty commercial for a non-profit corporation that has built its reputation on presenting the facts, just the facts, it is.
Carmen Sandiego signals a change of emphasis at PBS that may be either the beginning of a hip new era in educational programming or the first swirls of complete homogeneity in broadcast television. After all, if PBS won't — or can't afford — to do E-TV anymore, who will?
