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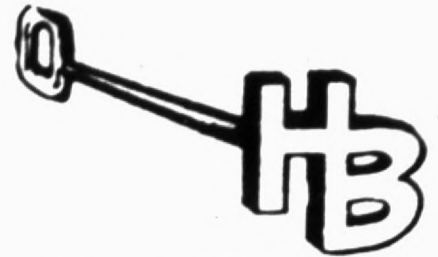

## Band in Austin for state meet

Hereford High School's Mighty Maroon Band faces a tough field Monday in the State Marching Band Contest in Austin.

The band was scheduled to leave Saturday at 9 a.m. They were to arrive in Austin at 11:30 p.m. Saturday.

"We're tickled to death we're going," said Hereford Superintendent Charles Greenawalt. "It's expensive, sure, but we believe it's well worth the cost for our students to get this opportunity to participate in the state contest. We don't care if it's a one- or two-person contest or something

like the band where 250 people are involved. It's worth the cost."

The band earned a first-division rating two weeks ago at the District Band Contest at Borger, qualifying for the Area A Marching Contest last Saturday at Jones Stadium. There, the band placed second behind Snyder, earning the trip to Austin.

While the weather forecast for Austin is calling for temperatures in the 50s and a chance for rain on Monday, that will be warmer than anything the band has faced the last two weeks. The band has been hampered some by the weather, not getting to march as often as directors

would like because of the snow, ice and cold temperatures.

Despite not having marched in four days, while other bands were able to perform, the band pulled off a second-place performance at the Lubbock contest.

The tough field in the 4A preliminaries (they begin at 11 a.m. at Nelson Field in northeast Austin) includes state-contest veterans like Dickinson, Mesquite Poteet, The Colony, Georgetown, Crowley, Allen, Gregory-Portland and Port Neches-Groves, who were all at the contest last year. The Class 4A contest will begin with New Caney at 11 a.m. Hereford will be the 12th of 14 bands

to march, and will perform at 1:45 p.m. The announcement of the five bands that will qualify for the finals, at 8:35 p.m. Monday at Memorial Stadium, will be made at 3 p.m.

The band will perform its contest show, "The Magic of Andrew Lloyd Webber." The show first came to the minds of Hereford director James Maclasky and his assistants last winter. The band began working on the show music after concert and sightreading contests last spring. The band began working on marching drills for the show in August.

The show's tunes include "Superstar," "Memories," "Don't Cry" (See BAND, Page 2A)

## Cowgirl HOF plans benefit, makes Macy's plans

East meets West in New York City when the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center of Hereford makes its flashy appearance in the 65th Annual Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City.

Entry in the parade, which is viewed by 2 million to 3 million people along the parade route and millions more on NBC television, is

by invitation only. Macy's invited the CHOF to submit a proposal for a parade entry last June. The CHOF's entry was accepted by Macy's officials in late September.

CHOF directors see the venture as a unique opportunity to gain national media attention for the Hall of Fame and the local area.

"This is Hereford's entry, not just the Cowgirl Hall of Fame," said

Margaret Formby, executive director of the CHOF. "This isn't the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame in Lincoln, Nebraska or somewhere; it's the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame in Hereford, Texas."

The CHOF's entry will include a horse-drawn wagon decked out in Christmas greenery and glitter. Five of the hall's honorees will appear on the unit, including two performing

trick ropers. Gracing the wagon's perimeter will be five mounted honorees and Formby.

Except for trick ropers Nancy Kelley Sheppard of Globe, Arizona, and Joan Wells of Lincoln, Nebraska, all of the women will be wearing fringed leather jackets and gauntlets with their individualized chaps, boots and colorful blouses. Brilliant red

hats and wild rags will top off their Western outfits.

Sheppard, inducted into the CHOF this year, was a glamour cowgirl whose career was most prevalent in the 1940s and 1950s. Wells, inducted three years ago, was a 1979 world champion roper who is still a frequent entertainer, dazzling crowds with her black light performances.

Also appearing will be Shelly Burmeister of Aledo, an established cutting horse competitor and professional rodeo announcer; Patsy Montana of San Jacinto, Calif., well-known artist whose career skyrocketed in 1935 with her recording of "I Want to Be a Cowboy's Sweetheart"; and Jonnie Jonckowski of Billings,

## Umbarger ready for sausage-hungry crowd

All roads lead to Umbarger on Sunday, at least for Panhandle-area folks who enjoy a good German sausage dinner.

For months, the members of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Umbarger have focused on the day for their annual Fall Festival.

Though originated in 1952 by members of St. Mary's Church, the event's activities are not limited to Catholics, said the parish priest, the Rev. Jim Hutzler, who is experiencing his third Fall Festival.

"There aren't many non-Catholics in the community," he said, "but those who live here help, too."

The only church in the community at the west edge of Randall County is St. Mary's.

Last Wednesday, volunteers gathered in the parish hall to make the sausage that will be served Sunday.

They had about 3,700 pounds of ground pork and beef, with appropriate seasonings, to run through presses into casings that stretch several feet.

There's a knack to knotting the sausage into lengths of about six inches, a size deemed best for cooking purposes. Half a dozen presses were in use with 40 or more men and women turning the handles, knotting the casings or performing other chores.

Actually, food preparations for the festival got serious about six weeks

ago when members gathered at the parish hall to prepare the sauerkraut.

Cabbage -- 1,700 pounds -- was shredded and packed into 30-gallon plastic containers to ferment until serving day.

"It's all shredded by hand -- we don't use any food processors," said Kristi Batenhorst. She serves as a festival co-chairman with her husband, Roger Batenhorst, and another couple, Marvin and Lesann Hartman.

Church members used to grind the meat, but in recent years they've opted to have the meat processing company do that chore. Animals are delivered to the processor who sends back the ground pork and beef.

The recipe is an authentic German sausage, handed down from generation to generation.

Another job that requires hours of work is preparing potatoes, this year about 1,100 pounds that have been donated. The Idaho spuds were peeled by hand and cooked on stoves before being mashed for serving.

Bread-making was a reason for gathering at the parish hall another day, too. Ingredients, including more than 350 pounds of flour, went into the loaves of bread to be served Sunday.

"They start about 7 a.m. and don't finish until about 7 p.m. when they make bread," said Roger Batenhorst.

For Me, Argentina," "Music of the Night" and "Phantom of the Opera." They are from musicals composed by Webber over the past 25 years.

Complimenting the band will be the twirlers and drill team members, all of whom have also worked on their various routines since August. Music, marching and general effect (which includes drill team and twirlers) all go into the judge's rankings for the state contest.

Judges give from 0-500 points for music competencies. They include the selection of music, tone quality and effective use for woodwinds, brass and percussion, and the general performance of the music.

Marching competencies received from 0-350 points. Judges look for uniformity while marching, including stride, mark time, posture and carriage (head, body, instrument) and the execution and precision of marching.

Judges also give from 0-150 points for the format of presentation, including appropriate use of stand fast time, drill design including coordination with the music, attention to detail and appearance of uniform.

After the points are added together, the bands are ranked according to their total score. The higher the score, the better the ranking. After all of the bands are ranked, the high rank and low rank are thrown out, and the remaining three rankings are added together. The schools with the lowest total are then advanced to the finals, where everyone begins with a clean slate.

Also performing in Austin will be the top bands from conferences A and 2A. The Class A semifinals begin at 9 a.m. at Memorial Stadium, with the

2A semifinals at noon, also at Memorial Stadium.

This will be the last opportunity at state for HHS juniors and seniors. The juniors won't get to go next year because the University Interscholastic League changed the setup for the contest after last year's state contest.

To save on travel expenses because so many bands were making the state contest each year, Conferences A, 2A and 4A go to Austin in odd-numbered years, while 3A and 5A bands go in even-numbered years. In 1992, the HHS band will go no further than the district contest, probably to be held in Borger.

The band planned to have lunch in Lubbock, rehearse in Abilene, have supper in Brownwood and arrive in Austin at 11:30 p.m. Saturday.

On Sunday, the band will have a voluntary devotional at 10 a.m., have lunch at 11:30 a.m., then hold a mini-golf tournament at 12:30 p.m. The band will rehearse at 3 p.m. Sunday at Westlake High School, then enjoy supper and a movie before going to bed.

On Monday, the band will load buses and travel to Highland Mall in north Austin, not far from Nelson Field. They will have lunch at the mall before leaving for Nelson Field at noon. The band is scheduled to begin its warm-up at 1 p.m. Monday before taking the field at 1:45 p.m.

The band will attend Monday's finals at Memorial Stadium (hoping to be performing late in the evening), beginning with Class A finals at 6:30 p.m.

The band will leave Austin at 9 a.m. Tuesday, having lunch in Brownwood and supper in Lubbock before arriving home at about 9 p.m. Tuesday.

Fisher recently completed eight years service as mayor of Hereford and served four years as a city commissioner. He also served 11 years on the D.S. County Juvenile Board. Fisher was instrumental in

A kinsman of the co-chairman is Sylvester Batenhorst, who remembers when the Fall Festival began in 1952.

"The priest here then thought we should have some kind of celebration after the harvest," said Sylvester Batenhorst. "We had just built the parish hall and we decided to use it and earn money to pay it off."

Once they started, it was like they couldn't stop, and they just kept on, year after year. Sylvester Batenhorst admits that the crowd comes, mostly, from Amarillo, but there is a sizeable

sprinkling of residents of many area towns.

St. Mary's Parish boasts some 80 families, said Father Hutzler, who went to Umbarger 2 1/2 years ago.

There is a certain camaraderie in the community effort. The Fall Festival often draws former residents back to help, said Charles Batenhorst, nephew of Sylvester Batenhorst.

Workers will gather about 5 a.m. Sunday to put the finishing touches on the food preparations.

All the sausages will be taken from

the basement cooler, placed in electric roasters and cooked, reaching the prescribed doneness by the time serving lines open at 11 a.m.

For four hours, sausage, mashed potatoes, sauerkraut, green beans, applesauce and fresh-baked bread will be dispensed to hungry guests.

The largest crowd that has descended on Umbarger was about 3,500 persons. St. Mary's Catholic Parish members are ready for a return engagement.

## Pearl Harbor 1941-1991

### Japanese fear bashing on anniversary

**EDITOR'S NOTE** - Next month's observance of the 50th anniversary of the Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor has raised worries in Hawaii's large Japanese American community. Coupled with a growing sentiment that Japanese investments in the islands are causing real estate prices to skyrocket, many fear the anniversary will occasion a new round of "Japanese bashing."

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (AP)—For Japanese Americans living in Hawaii, as well as thousands of Japanese visitors, this December will be the cruellest month: mingling memories of Pearl Harbor with a desire for Japan to be recognized as a peaceful ally worthy of reconciliation.

With the approach of the 50th anniversary of the Day of Infamy, Dec. 7, 1941, strong emotional currents tug at them from different historical directions.

Japanese Americans comprise nearly 23 percent of Hawaii's 1.2 million population, the second largest ethnic group after the Caucasians in the only state where all races are minorities. They remember with pride the all-Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team that went off to become the most decorated U.S. unit in the war in Europe - and suffered the highest casualty rate - while their fathers and uncles were put in internment camps as enemy aliens.

Many of the old vets now have become interested in discovering their Japanese roots. They share the new wave of national pride sweeping their ancestral homeland at Japan's economic accomplishments in the last half century.

But many of the younger ones wonder if they should venture out on the streets or send their children to school during the four-day observance of the air attack that claimed 2,403 American lives, sank or severely damaged 21 ships in the U.S. Pacific Fleet and destroyed 188 U.S. aircraft.

Japanese tourists and business travelers, who numbered 1.4 million last year and contributed \$4 billion to the state's economy, hope the Pearl Harbor anniversary will not be an occasion for "Japanese bashing" or add to the widespread resentment at Japan's \$35 billion investment in the islands, which many locals blame for skyrocketing land prices.

They show up in group tours at the Arizona Memorial, where nearly half of the American dead lie entombed in the wreckage, but they seem to have read little about Pearl Harbor in their history books. They are better versed in the bombing of Hiroshima, which they regard as World War II's immoral equivalent to Pearl Harbor,

but many times worse in death and destruction.

The visitors from Japan genuinely love Hawaii as America's most Asia-oriented outpost: a great place to invest, do business, honeymoon (by the thousands) and play golf (by the chartered plane).

Not only does Hawaii offer genuine sushi bars, hibachi houses, and hotels featuring tatami mats and futons, but hurdles the language barrier with several Japanese language newspapers, two radio stations and a TV channel. Even the parking and restroom signs at the Arizona Memorial are bilingual.

Under pressure from veterans groups, President Bush backed away from sharing the deck of the battleship Missouri with Japanese dignitaries at the forthcoming Dec. 7 observance of the air attack on Pearl Harbor that will be attended by thousands of survivors.

"If your neighbor raped your mother 50 years ago would you be inviting him to observe that anniversary?" asks Ray Emory, historian of the 12,000-strong Pearl Harbor Survivors Association.

When Emperor Hirohito visited here in October, 1975, his royal aircraft landed at Honolulu airport on a southeasterly approach to spare His Highness any sensitivity, personal or political, that might have resulted from flying over Pearl Harbor.

Such sensitivity hardly applies these days. Capt. Frank Coughlin of Pittsfield, Mass., commander of the submarine base, gazes out the same wide picture window from which Adm. Husband

Kimmel watched his career and his Pacific fleet sink from sight. Now the view often is of Japanese naval ships and submarines tying up. They regularly participate in combined maneuvers with U.S., Australian, Korean and Canadian warships.

Most mornings, Japanese tourists, arriving on the overnight flights, are the first to board the launches out to the Arizona Memorial. Often wearing souvenir gold-braided U.S. Arizona baseball caps, they listen in enigmatic silence to the Park Service ranger's recital of how the great ship seemed to leap from the water before she settled on the muddy bottom in seven and a half minutes and became the gravestone for the nearly 1,000 seamen still entombed there.

Occasionally a bride will toss her bouquet on the water, still purple streaked with the gallon of oil that seeps daily from the wreckage. Others sprinkle confetti or saki in silent tribute to warriors on both sides who died that day.

In recent years visitors to the memorial have included the Japanese Zero Pilots Association, respectfully reviewing their handiwork, and Lt. Cmdr. Mochitsura Hashimoto, skipper of the submarine that sank the cruiser Indianapolis near the end of the war with a loss of 883 lives. He was escorted aboard by Kimo McVay, the daughter of Capt. Charles McVay III, who lost his ship shortly after it delivered key parts of the atom bomb. Just a few weeks ago, Takashi Hiraoka, the Mayor of Hiroshima, laid a wreath at the Memorial.

The Japan-America Society of Honolulu, whose more than 1,000

members include Americans doing business in Japan and Japanese bankers and corporate executives based in the islands, has devoted a number of seminars to ways of coping with the Pearl Harbor semi-centennial. So has the Honolulu Japanese Chamber of Commerce, which at a recent luncheon meeting heard public relations consultant Barbara Tanabe warn of rising anti-Japanese sentiment as the anniversary nears.

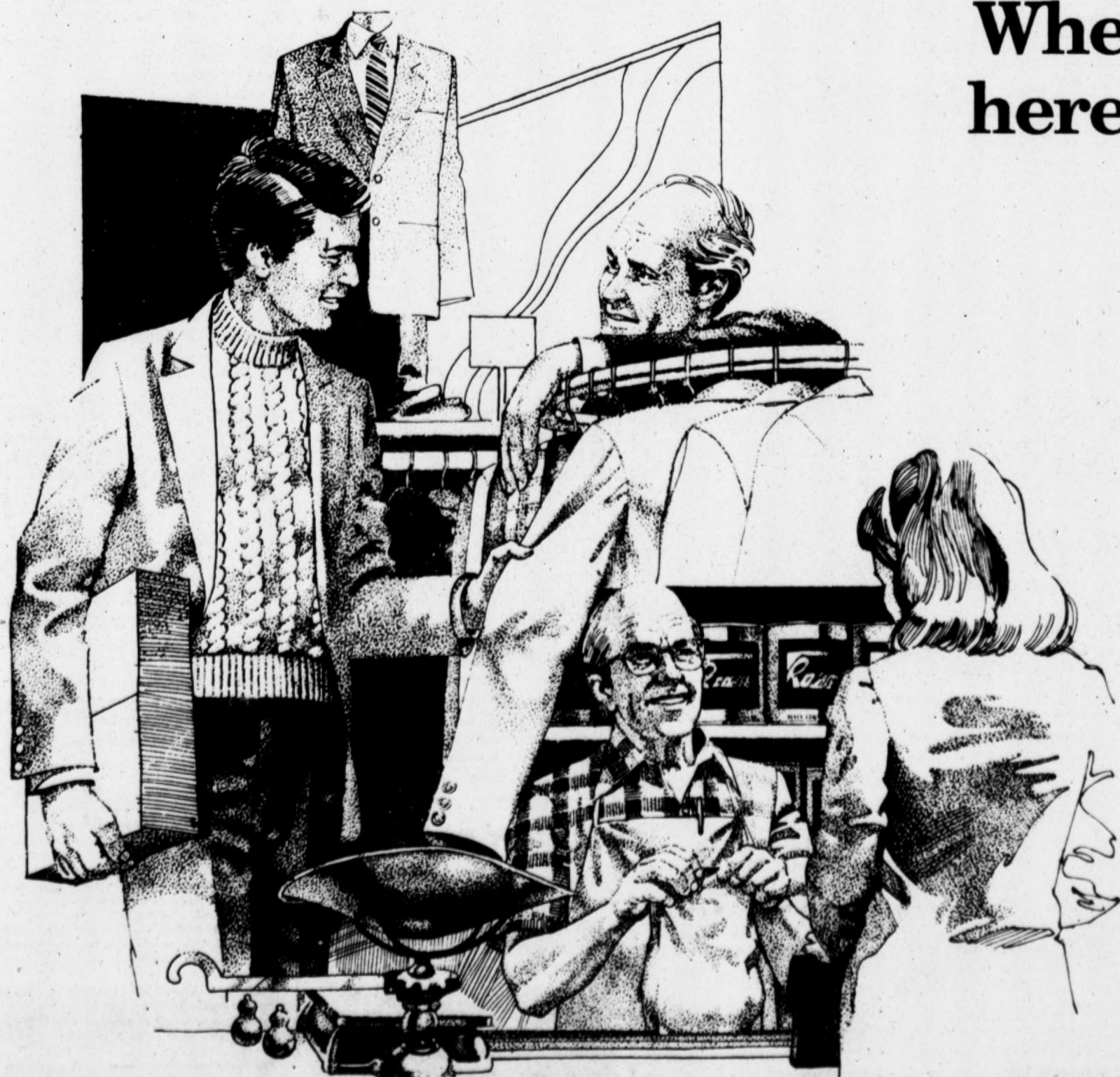

The U.S. Congress has lost the confidence of the majority of Americans. Politicians across the country are slowly realizing that voters are mad, and they are not buying the pat political answers of the past. An editorial in a recent U.S. News & World Report calls on Congress to start regaining public confidence by cutting out the perks, cutting the staff, cutting their terms, and cutting out their arrogance.

The House acted recently to close its private bank, which the news media revealed was being mis-used, but there are other perks which should be eliminated. The world has grown more complex and congressmen need more help than in 1960. But the legislative staff waiting on 535 lawmakers has jumped from 6,700 to 30,000 in that time. Taxpayers now shell out \$2.3 billion a year to support Congress and its agencies.

In an attempt to regain control of their elected representatives, a number of ballot initiatives have been proposed by citizens. Probably the most popular is the idea of limiting the terms that can be served. There is a petition drive in Texas to have the limited terms proposition placed on the primary election ballot. Though this would be a non-binding referendum, the result could influence the Legislature to offer an amendment to the Texas Constitution.

Driving the petition effort is a group called Texans for Term Limitations. Statewide the organization will need 400,000 signatures for the referendum to appear on the Republican ballot and 600,000 for it to be on the Democratic party ballot. The Republican Party has endorsed the effort, so there has been no problem with the qualifications of the petitioners. The Democratic Party has not been so helpful, throwing a number of procedural obstacles in the way of a limited term measure being on the ballot.

If the Demo ballot doesn't carry the referendum, the only place Texans will be able to have their say on limited terms will be on the Republican ballot. Only time and possible court action will tell if the measure ever comes to a vote of the people.

# Congress' privileges are target

 WASHINGTON (AP) - Whittling at privileges that are part of the congressional image problem, a jittery Senate has accepted a separate-but-equal job discrimination law to let its own employees sue the boss.

But there are plenty of targets left for 1992 challengers, and for President Bush. Bush clearly intends to target Congress, the Democratic branch of government, in his re-election campaign.

Presidents who have done that before usually have dealt with congressional action or inaction - Harry S. Truman in 1948 against a do-nothing Republican Congress, for example, or Gerald R. Ford in 1976 against Democratic spending measures he said were wrecking the economy.

The Bush offensive concentrates on Congress itself, on the legislature he has called "a privileged class of rulers who stand above the law," and answer to no one about their spending, staff and perks.

That was part of an Oct. 24 speech in which he demanded that Congress "submit to the laws it imposes on others" by the end of the year, waiving its exemptions from a dozen measures on discrimination, overtime, sexual harassment and other workplace legislation that covers private employees.

Six days later, the Senate passed a civil rights bill after voting to make its own employees and those in the executive branch subject to job protections in that law and four others.

There's a special system for Senate employees, but it includes an option to appeal to a federal judge, a last step Congress always has resisted on grounds that it violates the constitutional separation of powers.

Sen. Warren B. Rudman, R-N.H., led opponents who argue that this bill is unconstitutional, too. Unable to beat it, they toughened it with an amendment to require that senators and presidents pay any unfair employment damages with their own money, not tax dollars.

That's a threat few bosses face, but in a Senate embarrassed by the Clarence Thomas case, prodded by the president, and worried about attitudes toward Congress, it was the safer side politically, and it passed 74 to 23.

The night before, Sen. Don Nickles, R-Okla., had proposed an amendment to end all the exemptions that apply to Congress in more than a dozen laws. "Congress must no longer tell the American people that we are above the laws which we pass," said Nickles, who is up for re-election next year.

That one was blocked; Sen. George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, the majority leader, said it was flagrantly

unconstitutional and an attempt to exploit cynicism about Congress for short-term political gain.

Mitchell then joined the support for a more limited Republican proposal the Senate finally approved. Sen. Charles E. Grassley, R-Iowa, had tried to get it done before, to no avail, but timing and politics were right for a step he said would deal with an elitist double standard.

The House already has a system for handling job discrimination complaints, and the Senate bill wouldn't cover employees there.

Bush also urged more sweeping congressional reform, saying it is increasingly difficult to get anything done in a legislature with more than 300 committees and subcommittees - the actual count is 301 - and thousands of employees. There are about 31,000 on House, Senate and associated government payrolls.

The president called it a labyrinth only special interests and lobbyists can find the way through. He'd ridiculed Congress before as a bottleneck of complexities, bickering and inaction. "I wasn't asking the

Congress to deliver a hot pizza in 30 minutes," he said in June, complaining that he couldn't get his bills passed. "That would be revolutionary..."

Then as now, Democratic leaders called it counterproductive Congress bashing. Speaker of the House Thomas S. Foley said it was a bad rap against members of congress who work 80 hour weeks.

Whatever the hours, there's no denying the political problem. It impels a term limit movement that will be tested on Tuesday in Washington state balloting and, if it passes and stands up in court, will force Foley out of Congress after 1994.

"Congress is an institution in trouble," said Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., urging an overhaul by a special, bipartisan committee, a plan with sponsors in both parties in both branches. "No one doubts it."

Nor is there any doubt that it will be an issue in the coming campaign.

## THE VOICE OF BUSINESS

### TWENTY YEARS LATER

WASHINGTON—Twenty years ago, scarcely two months before he was nominated to the Supreme Court, a Virginia attorney named Lewis Powell, Jr., took pen in hand to compose a memorandum that was to have profound consequences far beyond its author's imagination.

Like most Americans of that era, Powell was greatly concerned about the whirlwind of dramatic events taking place around him. The Civil Rights movement was forcing our country to confront its legacy of racial injustice. The Vietnam conflict was provoking increasing opposition, aggravating the general discontent. Discordant voices in the increasingly pervasive media seemed to celebrate immoral behavior. Noisy street demonstrations erupted frequently. Riots and violence were commonplace.

It was a time of great anxiety and stress in which many prominent voices—especially in academia and the news media—actively questioned the validity of our political and economic systems.

Powell sensed in this crisis an intellectual challenge that needed to be answered. He addressed his memorandum to his neighbor and friend, Eugene B. Sydnor, Jr., who was chairman of the Education Committee of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. In it, Powell analyzed what was going on and defined a clear need for an established organization to aggressively defend and promote

the legitimacy of our traditional values, particularly in the economic sphere.

Sydnor was struck by the force of Powell's text, and took it to the U.S. Chamber board of directors, where it fell on fertile ground. The U.S. Chamber launched a multi-faceted campaign to promote and defend free enterprise, answering the champions of statism wherever they offer intellectual combat—in the media, policy journals, schools and public forums of every kind.

To reach the general public, we created "It's Your Business," a televised debate of public issues now reaching 80 percent of the U.S. audience, and a variety of other television and radio programming. We upgraded the quality and scope of our monthly publication, "Nation's Business," which today reaches 2.5 million readers. We created a specially bimonthly "Business Advocate" which reaches 400,000 readers. Our National Chamber Litigation Center became an ever-present and articulate advocate for business in the courts, the only group of its kind in the country.

Our message is at once simple and compelling—that political freedom and economic freedom are two sides of the same coin, and that both are essential to human progress. Today, the world is acknowledging the superiority of that vision, as one nation after another abandons communism in favor of free markets and democracy. The presence of Powell's memorandum as been vindicated, as has our aggressive response to it.

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## BASHING

"Many will not forget and some will not forgive the Japanese for the attack on Pearl Harbor that claimed more than 2,000 American lives and plunged the country into a devastating war," she warned. "They will be the catalysts for a new round of Japanese bashing, stimulating the perception of Japan as an unfair trading partner, an unwilling supporter of the U.S. military effort in the Gulf War, and an economic power that has taken over some prime American companies and properties."

Herself a Japanese-American, she raised the specter of "old American war movies being re-run on TV, reinforcing the view of Japan as a sneaky enemy not to be trusted. These negative perceptions might cause some Americans to stop buying Japanese products, avoid Japanese stores and brand names and even lead to violence against anyone who looks Japanese and perhaps vandalism against Japanese-owned businesses."

There is growing fear that Japanese visitors will stay away in droves in December, just as the state is beginning to recover from the nearly 25 percent drop in tourism caused by the Gulf War.

The first view the approaching Japanese submariners had of Hawaii through their periscopes before dawn broke on that never-to-be-forgotten Sunday was of the illuminated twin pink towers of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel. Task force commander Adm. Isoroku Yamamoto had promised himself a sumptuous dinner there someday to celebrate the final victory.

The admiral was born 50 years too soon. The hotel is now Japanese-owned. It retains some of its prewar charm but is dwarfed on Honolulu's crowded skyline by the Sheraton Waikiki, the Halekulani, the Ilikai, the Hyatt, Hilton's Hawaiian Village, the Ramada Renaissance, and a pair of Outrigger Hotel skyscrapers, all also under Japanese ownership.

In the past decade, Japanese investors have acquired a number of apartment towers, banks, shopping centers, a couple of dozen golf resorts like Hilton's Turtle Bay, all the 7-Eleven convenience stores and several office buildings in the downtown business section that keeps encroaching on the old red light district at the end of Hotel Street known to thousands of World War II servicemen.

Among the key players in Hawaiian real estate is Mitsubishi, which rolled the speedy World War II Zero-zen fighter off its assembly lines.

"When you think about it," says Ray Emory of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, "the Japanese have been a lot more successful buying Hawaii than bombing it. If they had let history take its economic course a lot of ordinary guys would NOT be buried up there in the Punch Bowl or down under the Arizona."

Japanese in large numbers came to work the sugar plantations at the invitation of King Kalakaua, Hawaii's "merry monarch," who made a world tour in 1881. After visiting Queen Victoria and Pope Leo XIII, he dropped in on Emperor Matsuho and offered the hand of his 6-year-old niece, Princess Kaiulani, to Prince Hatsu. The royal match was declined, but Japan's ties with Hawaii strengthened over the years. When Pearl Harbor was attacked, 157,905 Hawaiians of Japanese blood were caught up in a hysteria of suspicion and racial taunts.

Lawrence Nakatsuka, former press secretary to Gov. John King and Sen. Hiram Fong, was a cub reporter on the Honolulu Star-Bulletin when rumors began pouring into the newsroom telephones shortly after the attack.

"Those of Japanese blood were accused of poisoning the city's water supply, plowing arrows in the cane fields to direct the bombers, paddling out in sampans to lead submarines

through Pearl Harbor's steel defense net," he recalls. "Japanese maids were reportedly murdering their employers in the beach-front mansions."

One rumor told of a milk truck driven by a Japanese sympathizer racing down the flight line at Hickam Field, lopping off the tails of fighter planes. There were persistent rumors that enemy paratroopers had landed and were being hidden out by Japanese families.

Seven separate investigations failed to turn up a single instance of sabotage in Hawaii's Japanese community, which responded stoically to the wartime hysteria of verbal and sometimes physical abuse. On the afternoon of the Pearl Harbor attack three fishermen who didn't know there was a war on were killed when their sampans were attacked by Navy seaplanes. Their families were told they died from "enemy bullets."

The Monday after Pearl Harbor, Japanese Americans lined up by the hundreds at Queens Hospital to donate blood, but they no longer went out in kimonos and obis. To be as American as possible, they avoided speaking Japanese in the streets, stayed away from their Shinto shrines and temples, toned down wedding and funeral ceremonies and buried Japanese passports, flags and samurai swords in the back yard. Many adopted Hawaiian or Portuguese names. Historian John Toland remembers one who "changed his name from Akirisa Aoki to Angus McDonald."

For many Japanese Americans the war hit home on both sides of the Pacific.

Nakatsuka's father was "put in an internment camp on the West Coast and didn't get out until 1946." His uncle died in the atomic attack on Hiroshima. His wife Minnie's brother served in Europe with the all-Nisei 442nd Regimental Combat team, "while her father, an air raid warden in Honolulu when the war began, suddenly became the enemy." Immigration laws excluding Asians denied him citizenship.

The loyalty of the Japanese community was underscored the morning after the Dec. 7 attack when Master Sgt. David Akui, on beach patrol with the Territorial Guard, bagged Uncle Sam's first prisoner of war: Ensign Kazuo Sakamaki of the Imperial Navy. Half drowned, Sakamaki staggered ashore from a

mini-submarine that had lost power and got hung up on a coral reef after being depth-bombed by destroyers at the entrance to Pearl Harbor.

A few weeks after Akui led POW No. 1 off to the stockade at Fort Shafter, a strange thing happened to the Territorial Guard. The Selective Service System reclassified all Japanese Americans 4C: enemy aliens.

"That decimated the Guard: nearly 80 percent were of Japanese ancestry like me," recalls Honolulu labor arbitrator Ted Tsukiyama, who was then a 20-year-old top sergeant. "The released Guardsmen swallowed their pride and formed the Varsity Victory Volunteers, swinging 16-pound sledgehammers in the rock quarry to build harbor defenses and gun emplacements.

Their dedication to America's war effort impressed a couple of congressmen and led to the creation of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. Fighting through Italy and France, the "Go For Broke" Nisei regiment won seven presidential unit citations and more than 6,000 individual awards. Their casualty rate of 650 killed and 4,500 wounded was triple the combat average in World

War II. U.S. Sen. Daniel Inouye, who lost his right arm in the fighting in Italy, is willing to let the past bury the past.

"Fifty years of pain and hatred is long enough," he told a Japan-America Society banquet a few weeks ago. "The time has come for reconciliation."

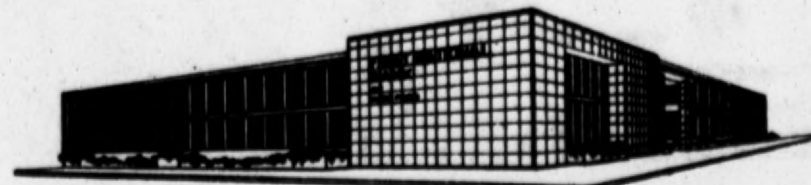

## Herd finishes with offensive show of force

Hereford closed the 1991 football season with an awesome offensive display, rolling up 639 yards and kicking the Borger Bulldogs 43-13 Friday at Whiteface Stadium.

The Herd finished coach Danny Haney's first season at the helm with a 7-3 record. They are 3-2 in District 1-4A, tying for second with Randall and Dumas behind champion Pampa (4-1). However, Randall gets the second playoff spot by virtue of wins over both Hereford and Dumas.

Borger finished at 3-7 and 2-3. Hereford scored on virtually every one of its possessions: they failed only when time ran out in the first half, when time ran out in the game, and on two others near the end of the game.

The 639 yards was the most for a Hereford offense at least since Haney came here as an assistant in 1975, he said. Of that total, 519 was gained on the ground by 11 ball-carriers, and the Herd's 120 yards through the air was almost as much as Borger's total yardage (128).

Herd tailback Leo Brown led the offensive barrage with four touchdowns and 229 yards rushing on 30 carries. The yardage gives him 1,577 yards for the year and breaks the school single-season rushing record of 1,550 set by Matt Bromlow in 1989.

"It feels great," Brown said. "I've got to hand it to the offensive line. I couldn't have done it without them—and the coaching staff. There isn't a greater bunch of guys than the offensive line."

Another Hereford back, Petey Colvin, ran for 122 yards on 12 carries. It was his first 100-yard game.

"It feels great," he said. "It's the last game of the season. This is the way to end it."

Colvin is a junior and can think of Friday as the last game of the season—not of a career. For more than 30 seniors, though, it was the last game they'll ever play as Whitefaces.

"It's pretty sad, but we all wanted to go out with a win," said senior receiver Sean Smith, who caught two passes for 38 yards.

"It's a sadness you can't really describe," senior defensive tackle Monroe Timberlake said. "It's a time in your life that you knew was coming, but you didn't want to come. It's good to go out on a win...It's a shame the best team in the district isn't going to the playoffs."

Haney said it was a "credit to these players" that they played so well Friday and worked hard in practice despite having no chance at a playoff spot.

"We needed people to understand that we're the best team regardless of the playoffs," he said.

The team concentrated on other goals besides the playoffs—such as Brown's shot at Bromlow's record. Haney was aware of the record, and he sent to the press box at halftime to find out exactly how much more yardage Brown needed.

"That was one of our rallying

points," Haney said. "We didn't have a lot to play for. All the kids wanted it for Leo."

The Herd offense had the stellar numbers, but the defense also played well, shutting down the Borger offense most of the night. In the third quarter, Borger's offense netted minus-3 yards, with Hereford's big play coming when end Derek Mason sacked 'Dog quarterback Leroy Jones for a 9-yard loss. Borger gained 4 yards in the fourth quarter.

While the Herd was mounting long drives on every possession, Borger's punter was getting a workout. Of Borger's eight possessions, five went 1-2-3-punt. Another drive was extended after three plays when a running into the punter penalty gave the Bulldogs a first down. They punted again after three more plays.

Borger's punter, Michael Davis, had a good night, with six kicks for a 40.5-yard average. Unfortunately for the Bulldogs, Davis' efforts only gave Brown and company more yardage to gain. For example, Davis' best punt was a 53-yarder which rolled to the Hereford 1-foot line. The Herd then drove 99 yards for a touchdown.

Hereford kicked off to start the game and got the ball back after three plays and a 50-yard punt. The Herd went 77 yards in 10 plays. The first was a 12-yard pass from starting quarterback Richard Sanderson to tight end Mason in the flat. A key play later was an 8-yard run by Brown on fourth down and a foot. The last play was a perfectly timed lob from Sanderson to Tempie Abney for a 25-yard touchdown.

"It felt good," Abney said. "I waited six years for it." He explained that it was his first touchdown in six years of organized football. "I'm a good blocker, I guess."

Sanderson kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead with 7:31 left in the first quarter.

Stephen Blea kicked off, and three plays later, Borger punted. Four plays later Hereford scored. Brown had a 10-yard run and an 8-yard TD run. Between those, Colvin and Sanderson each ran for 33 yards, with Colvin almost breaking it all the way. Sanderson's kick made it 14-0 with 4:53 left.

This time, Borger moved the ball. First, they got a first down. Then on third-and-6 at the Hereford 49, Ronald Knighton took a pitch and went left. He appeared stuffed by the pursuit, but suddenly streaked up the sideline for the score. Valdemar Martinez' kick cut it to 14-7 with 2:43 left in the quarter.

Hereford got the score back on a 13-play, 77-yard drive. Brown ripped off runs of 15, 14 and 14 yards in succession to get the ball into Borger territory, and he also ran the final 6 yards. Sanderson's kick was good again, and Hereford led 21-7 with 10:44 left in the half.

Hereford's next drive was the 99-yarder. The 14 plays were mostly runs, including a 12-yarder by fullback Kyle Hansen, but there were also three passes. Sanderson connected with Smith for 6 yards and Kevin Kelso for 5, then

hit Brown with a screen pass which went for a 21-yard score. Sanderson fourth consecutive extra-point conversion made it 28-7 with 2:06 left in the half.

Borger's Alden Wilson, an upback, returned Blea's short kickoff 25 yards to the Hereford 43-yard line. That set up a 7-play drive which ended when QB Jones ran for a 3-yard score, beating the Hereford defenders to the left pylon. The play before that, Joey Stuebgen caught a 14-yard pass from Jones despite being drilled by Hereford rover Alvaro Avila as he caught ball.

Another kick by Martinez made it 28-14 at the half.

The second half began with Hereford with the ball, and Brown passed Bromlow's mark at the Borger 31-yard line in the middle of a 14-yard run.

Hereford had a 25-yard touchdown pass from Sanderson to Clay Wallace wiped out because of an ineligible receiver downfield penalty. Four plays later, Sanderson scored on a 15-yard scramble to the left. This time his extra point kick was blocked, and the lead was 34-13 for Hereford with 7:38 left.

Hereford's last touchdown was set up by a 40-yard run by Colvin. He got loose on the left sideline and appeared to score, but was ruled out of bounds at the Borger 6-yard line. On fourth-and-goal at the three, Brown carried and scored after he was initially stopped at the line of scrimmage.

Brown continued through the end zone and, to celebrate his fourth TD of the game and last of a high school career, he "dunked" the football over the crossbar.

"I had to do a little something to excite the crowd," Brown said, apparently thinking four TDs and a school record was not enough. "I had told everybody on the team I was going to do it, but nobody believed me. I had to do it."

Another Sanderson kick made the score 41-13 in favor of the Herd with 2:39 left in the third quarter.

The last 15 minutes of the game was like a football circus: one tailback had a slam-dunk, another tailback threw an interception which turned into a safety, and players from every position got to carry the ball.

"That was in the game plan," Haney said. "If we got up by 20 points, Michael Campos (normally an offensive lineman) would carry the ball and Petey Colvin would get to pass it."

Campos' chance at fame worked well; he went up the middle for three yards. Colvin's pass also worked out well, but not the way it was drawn up.

After taking the snap from under center, Colvin rolled out to his left and lofted the ball in the vicinity of the goal line, where Borger's Stacy Bruce caught it. Bruce was in the end zone, stepped one foot out, then went back in. He was tackled for a Hereford safety by Clay Wallace for the final score of the game.

## Three Hereford players miss lost fathers, uncle

The post-game ritual is over for the Hereford Whitefaces.

Win or lose, the ritual is almost always the same. Then, the doors are opened and well-wishers are welcomed into the dressing room to congratulate or cheer up or console the players.

Many times, the players' fathers or uncles or other family members come in to give an extra-special hug or "good game" to their son or nephew.

For some Hereford players this year, dad was only there in their hearts and minds.

Michael Campos lost his dad, David, over two years ago. In his father's memory, he wore No. 68 last year and this year. It was the same number his father wore in high school.

"This whole year was for my dad," said Michael after Friday's 43-13 win over Borger, the last game of the year for the 7-3 Herd. As the tears welled in his eyes, he related how his father always told him he couldn't wait to see Michael play in high school.

"I just wish he could see me play football now," Michael said.

Michael's mother, Virginia "Corky" Campos (Hereford's first Hispanic cheerleader 20 years ago), has been to all of Michael's games.

"There was one game where she

had some problems and only got to see the last four seconds of the game, but she's always there," Michael said. "Mom made up for it."

The tough part is seeing all my friends with their dads here, telling their sons they played a good game. I just wish I could see my dad walk through that (dressing room) door one time."

Michael got an opportunity to do more than just block from his tackle position Friday night. No. 68 ran one play at fullback, gaining three yards for the Herd.

Junior running back-defensive back Petey Colvin lost his dad, William, to a heart attack last year.

"We were real close, more than father-son," said Colvin. "We were basic friends, best friends."

The speedy back has scored several touchdowns this year. After each one, he has held the ball up high. Earlier in the season he explained his actions: "I'm holding the ball up for my dad to touch it."

"I know that up in heaven he has the ultimate view of what I do, and I know deep down inside he's proud of me. I try to do for my dad what I excel in. I have a natural love for football, so what I do I am giving back to him."

"My dad told me to always strive to be the best and what I am. If I'm a street cleaner, he told me, be the

best street cleaner there is. That was his motto. That's what I try to do."

Petey got to do something special, and different, as well Friday: he took a snap at quarterback. He threw a pass into the end zone. It was picked off by a Borger defender, but the Herd earned a safety on the play. The pass, in a way, was good for two points.

For Leo Brown, Hereford's single-season rushing record holder who gained 229 yards and scored four touchdowns Friday, it was a shining moment in a bitter week. He lost his uncle Norman Brown, 30, on Monday.

Norman, a former Hereford and Wayland Baptist University track star ("He could get up and go," Leo said), and his nephew were close.

"We were very close," said Leo. "He was more than an uncle. He was just like an older brother."

"I really have tried not to think about it too much. I've tried to look over it and not let it effect me. If you start dwelling on it it's hard to get over it."

Leo did something special, too, Friday. He put an exclamation point on his last touchdown for the Herd, a three-yard run, by running to the goalpost, jumping in the air and dunking the ball over the crossbar.

It cost the Herd 15 yards on the kickoff.

Leo, you're forgiven.

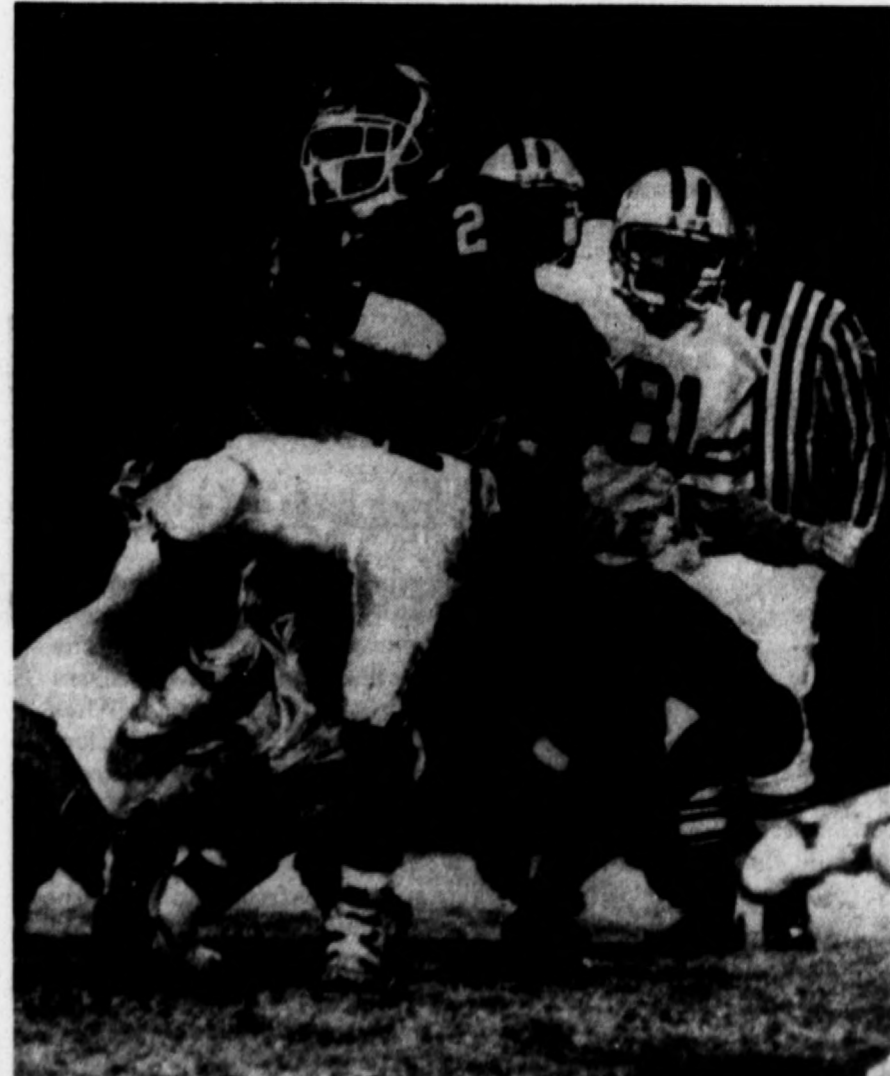

# Time-worn Houston table could tell many tales

HOUSTON (AP) - If only the resilient, time-worn little table could talk.

If only the table could tell how it was way back when at Ye Olde College Inn, where some of the biggest, the brightest, the boldest, the best in the history of college football sat a spell, kicked back, ate, drank, spun stories or cut deals.

If only the table could tell what it was like, rubbing against the elbows of John W. Heisman, Jim Thorpe, Jess Neely, Paul "Bear" Bryant and so many other trailblazers. If only the table could do more than hint at the splendor of yesteryear - days when being in the Southwest Conference didn't mean having to say you are sorry. Or have a sorry football team.

Alas, what came to be known over the years as The Coaches Table stands weary-legged and mute. All the table can do is serve as a 36-by-65 inch reminder of what once was - and perhaps, if enough people wish hard enough, what could be again at Rice University.

"They say you can't touch tradition," says Bill Cousins, the Rice assistant athletic director. "You can touch tradition."

You can touch it in the Rice athletic building. The table stands as a memorial to Joe Davis, a former Owls football assistant and head basketball coach. Davis and 175 others had their signatures engraved into the table that once was the place of honor at Ye Olde College Inn. He and the rest of the coaching staff from the best years of Rice's life assembled at the table five days a week for a brief lunch break from the business of beating up on the likes of Texas and Texas A&M.

"It's priceless to Rice," May says of the table. "It's part of our history. I think it's one of the crown jewels of this university. We're thrilled to have it. I would have given far more than we gave for it."

If only the table could tell about how a Greek immigrant started small with a small hamburger stand just off the Rice campus in 1914 and made it big. By 1919, business had boomed enough that George Martin and his German wife, Lottie, moved up the

street, across from the old Rice Fieldhouse, and opened the College Inn.

George Martin was so grateful to the campus crowd that helped make his place a success, he put heart and soul into Rice.

Nobody dared sit at the six-setting coaches' table without the go-ahead from George or Lottie. Somewhere along the way, Martin struck on the idea of having special guests engrave their names into the table for prosperity. So they did - Rice athletic fixtures and visiting dignitaries alike:

Thorpe. Neely. Heisman, who made it to the Hall of Fame despite a losing record at Rice. Bryant, who won six national championships. Darrell Royal, who danced over the SWC for 11 titles with the Texas Longhorns. Earl "Red" Blaik, the only man to coach consecutive Heisman Trophy winners (Doc Blanchard in '45, Glenn Davis in '46 at Army). Dutch Meyer, who coached two once-in-a-lifetime players at TCU (Sammy Baugh, Davey O'Brien).

D.X. Bible. Moanin' Matty Bell. Blair Cherry. Weldon Humble, the All-America guard on the 1946 Rice team that knocked off Bob Neyland's Tennessee team, 8-0, in the Orange Bowl. James "Froggy" Williams, the All-America end who helped Rice polish off a 10-1 season and No. 5 ranking with a 27-13 waxing of Charlie "Choo Choo" Justice and the North Carolina Tar Heels in the 1950 Cotton Bowl. So many others ...

If only the table could get to the bottom of what happened with Dicky Maegle. Or "Dickie Maegle," as the signature on the table reads.

"I never did actually carve my name into the table myself," Maegle says. Who did? Who, besides the table, really knows?

Maegle made All-Pro during a seven-year National Football League career, but what people remember him for is his 265-yard, three-touchdown performance against Alabama during a 28-6 victory in the 1954 Cotton Bowl. To be more precise, they remember one of his 11 carries. With Maegle on the way to his second touchdown, a 95-yarder, Alabama's Tommy Lewis came off the sideline on to the field to make a blind-side hit. Maegle went down at the Alabama 40, but referee Cliff Shaw awarded the touchdown run anyway.

The Ed Sullivan Show whisked Maegle and Lewis to New York to tell all about it. Sullivan's focus on Lewis at Maegle's expense prompted thousands of viewers to send angry letters of protest. Sullivan called Maegle to apologize and invited him back, but Maegle declined.

No hard feelings, though. Maegle considers Sullivan "a good guy" who "just made a big mistake."

If only the table could tell what it was like having regular visits from John Heisman. Father of the Forward Pass. The man who would become president of New York's Downtown Athletic Club, which in 1935 began giving a trophy to the college player deemed to be the best in the nation.

Heisman in 1924 became the second head football coach in Rice history. It wasn't quite like coaching Tech, where he once won once a game, 220-0. Heisman created Rice's first athletic dorm, but couldn't build a winner. Records of 4-4, 4-4-1, 4-4-1 and 2-6-1 were the cue for Heisman to leave coaching.

Heisman had a melodramatic, exaggeratedly formal manner befitting someone who dabbled in Shakespearean acting. Before each season, he would assemble the team for one of his patented soliloquies. "What is this?" he would ask, holding up a ball. Then Heisman would furnish the answer: "A football. It is a prolate spheroid, an elongated sphere - in which the outer leather casing is drawn tightly over a somewhat smaller rubber tubing." Pause. "Better to have died as a small boy than to fumble this."

Then there was his SWC rival Matty Bell. Texas A&M fired Bell, who coached at TCU from 1923-28, for the offense of going 6-3-1 in 1933. Bell was on top of the college football world two years later at SMU: 12-0 in the regular season, with the Knute Rockne national championship trophy in hand.

The decisive game came in November against TCU. A standing-room-only crowd of 40,000 flocked to Amon Carter Stadium to see two 10-0 teams play for keeps. TCU had Baugh; SMU had a defense that shut out seven opponents. SMU took a 14-7 halftime lead in the first Southwest game ever broadcast on network radio, prompting Bell to tell his team, "You have 30 minutes to play and a lifetime to think about it."

With 10 minutes left and the score tied at 14, SMU faced fourth-and-4 at the TCU 36. Unbeknownst to Bell, SMU's Jack Rabbit Smith called for a fake punt in the huddle. Bob Finley hit Bobby Wilson for a touchdown, handing Baugh and Dutch Meyer a bitter defeat.

Meyer was a former TCU water boy known, depending on the audience, as "The Saturday Fox" or "Old Ironpants." He chain-smoked on the sidelines, often sticking the lit side of the cigarette into his mouth. When cigarettes weren't handy, he plucked grass out of the ground and chewed on that. Even with his mouth full, he felt obliged to provide a running commentary on the action. "Judas H. Priest, we can't hit nobody," he was fond of saying.

The Frogs hit enough people to go 138-82-15 under Meyer, winning a national championship in 1938 with Davey O'Brien at quarterback.

If only the table could tell just what it was like during the reign of Jess Neely, who built a Hall of Fame resume around 27 years at Rice. The Owls won 144 games and four SWC titles from 1940 to '66 under Neely. Why, the Owls were flying so high

at one point, they actually turned down a bowl invitation one year.

That's how many times have changed.

"To play under Jess Neely was very, very difficult," Maegle says. "He worked us like dogs. If there's one thing I'll never forgive him for, it's that he would never give us water or ice during a three-hour practice. I would wear a mouthpiece, and it would be so caked, it would be stuck in my mouth. He acted like it was a mortal sin to give you water."

Neely had a thick Tennessee drawl, but he was not one for much give-and-take with the players. His way or ... his way. Attend class. Do the homework. Be at study hall every Tuesday night. Neely's right-hand man was his cousin and fellow Smyrna, Tenn., native, Joe Davis. Bloody Joe to his players.

Maegle points to the 1954 season. The defending Cotton Bowl champs took a 2-0 record into a road game against a Wisconsin team led by Heisman-winner-to-be Alan Ameche. Wisconsin won, 13-7, prompting Neely to put his team harder to work than ever. Maegle remembers scrimmaging the next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Neely was about to put the Owls through more contact work on Friday, but the players balked.

The dead-legged Owls fell to SMU the next day, 20-6, on the way to a 7-3 record. Maegle's punt return for a touchdown in the season finale gave Rice a 20-14 victory and an invitation to the Gator Bowl.

"We put it up to a team vote," Maegle says. "Those were the days everyone went both ways. All of us starters looked at each other. We had been playing all those minutes. Coach Neely assumed we would vote to go. We voted not to go, and he was stunned. He said, 'I'm not sure this vote is right. Let's vote again to be sure.' We voted again and decided not to go. We were flat worn out."

If only the table could repeat some of the long-lost conversations it was privy to all those years. Did Bear Bryant have that mumble when he signed the table as head coach of Kentucky, where he worked in Adolph Rupp's shadow in the late '40s and early '50s? Did Jim Thorpe tell about the thrill of victory gold in the decathlon and pentathlon at the 1912 Olympics and the agony of defeat (being stripped of his medals a year later for having earned money playing baseball)?

Did D.X. Bible repeat the story of how he summoned E. King Gill from the stands to suit up midway through the 1922 Dixie Classic, spawning A&M's 12th Man tradition? Would Blair Cherry have spoken of all the pressures that drove him to resign during the middle of a 1950 SWC championship season at Texas? How many game war stories could Jess Neely and Joe Davis have swapped all those years at their favorite table?

As it turns out, things were never quite the same after Jan. 1, 1954, the day Rice won its third New Year's Day bowl in eight years.

Rice's last Cotton Bowl was a 20-7 defeat to Navy on New Year's Day of 1958. There would be bowl losses at the end of the '60 and '61 seasons, plus a last winning gasp in '63, but then darkness fell. Neely retired in 1966 and died in 1983. Twenty-seven autumns and counting since the last winning season.

The College Inn had several owners after George Martin sold out in the late 1940s, finally disappearing from the Houston city directory in 1974. The Coaches Table, likewise, fell out of sight until Houston restaurateur and sports memorabilia collector Pete Tomack rescued it from the garage of the College Inn's final owner.

Bobby May learned the table's whereabouts last winter and started working on ways to bring it back to Rice.

Joe Davis' daughters, Harriet Darling and Martha Stewart, were looking for a memorial for their father, who died in January 1990. They quickly warmed to the idea of buying the table. The deed was done for \$10,000.

"It's priceless," Harriet Darling says. "There is no worth you can put on something like that. It's history. It's all of that something inside you that brings tears to your eyes."

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## Chaos rules

A turbulent regular season for the state's top-ranked Class 4A teams ended true to form Friday night with No. 1 Houston C.E. King and No. 8 Wilmer-Hutchins losing and No. 2 Bastrop, despite winning all its games, missing the playoffs.

No. 6 LaMarque overcame a 13-10 halftime deficit to knock off top-ranked King and win the District 24-4A championship.

"This is wonderful," said LaMarque coach Alan Weddell. "They (King) were well-deserving of the No. 1 ranking they had. We were just ready to turn it up a notch in the second half. That's what our kids have done all year when they had to."

LaMarque took the lead for good with a 77-yard, 11-play scoring drive in the third quarter. Dwight Smith capped the drive with a 16-yard run that put LaMarque ahead 17-13. The Cougars made it 23-13 with Tremayne Harris' 4-yard scoring run. The LaMarque defense helped by shutting King down in the second half.

"We made some defensive adjustments and the offense got together and determined that this was going to be their half," Weddell said. "We made the plays when we had to."

Bastrop remained perfect on the field with a 21-0 whipping of New Braunfels Canyon, but missed the playoffs because of its use of an ineligible player. The Texas Education Agency ruled that a backup running back had failed an algebra class.

## 1 of country's best coaches is available

DALLAS (AP) - Gerald Myers seemed lost on the other end of the telephone line.

"Yeah, I'm getting some twinges," he said. "I guess it's just a natural feeling that way when you've been involved with basketball for 44 years. The first day of practice was a strange day for me."

Myers, whom Bobby Knight called "one of the best basketball coaches in the country," was "reassigned" last year by Texas Tech University after his third consecutive losing season. James Dickey was hired to replace him.

Myers had coached for 21 years at Tech, his alma mater where he was a star guard.

Myers still has this year and three more left on his contract. But he's not doing what he loves the most, coach basketball.

"I do a little PR work and attend alumni functions and do whatever comes up," Myers said. "I've played more golf this year than I have in the last 20. My handicap is still 16. I practice, but you know my game. I just practice bad habits."

Myers also works out to overcome the frustrations of his basketball exile. He runs. He lifts weights. He rides bikes. He attacks a climbing-step machine. Anything to try to forget basketball.

He's dropped 25 pounds. "I'm in the best shape I've been in years," he said. "I was getting pretty big. The more stress I got from trying to win, the more I ate."

Myers does everything but go to the gymnasium and watch the Red Raiders practice. He went one day but decided he didn't want Dickey to think he was looking over his shoulder. Also, there was the ache of seeing players he recruited on the floor.

"I really enjoyed coaching and practice, developing a team, the competition of it," Myers said.

"Right now I'm like an 'ole horse who wants to go. But I can't leave the barn."

Myers isn't bitter. He doesn't complain and whine about the fates of the basketball gods. But you can hear the sadness in his voice.

"Everybody says you'll get over it," Myers said. "I've had some coaches call me, a couple of guys in the business. I wonder if I will?"

Myers has yet to receive any solid coaching offers.

"I guess they think I'm getting too old. I'm double-nickel (55)," Myers said.

It's not that Myers wouldn't be a big help to any college program in the country, or the NBA, for that matter.

Myers had some great teams at Tech and developed some great players. His teams played the toughest man-for-man defense in the country and when he had the talent, his disciplined, passing offense was tough to stop.

Whoever went after Myers would have to pay.

He's comfortable right now on his contract and this family man wouldn't taken a coaching fling unless the dollars were right.

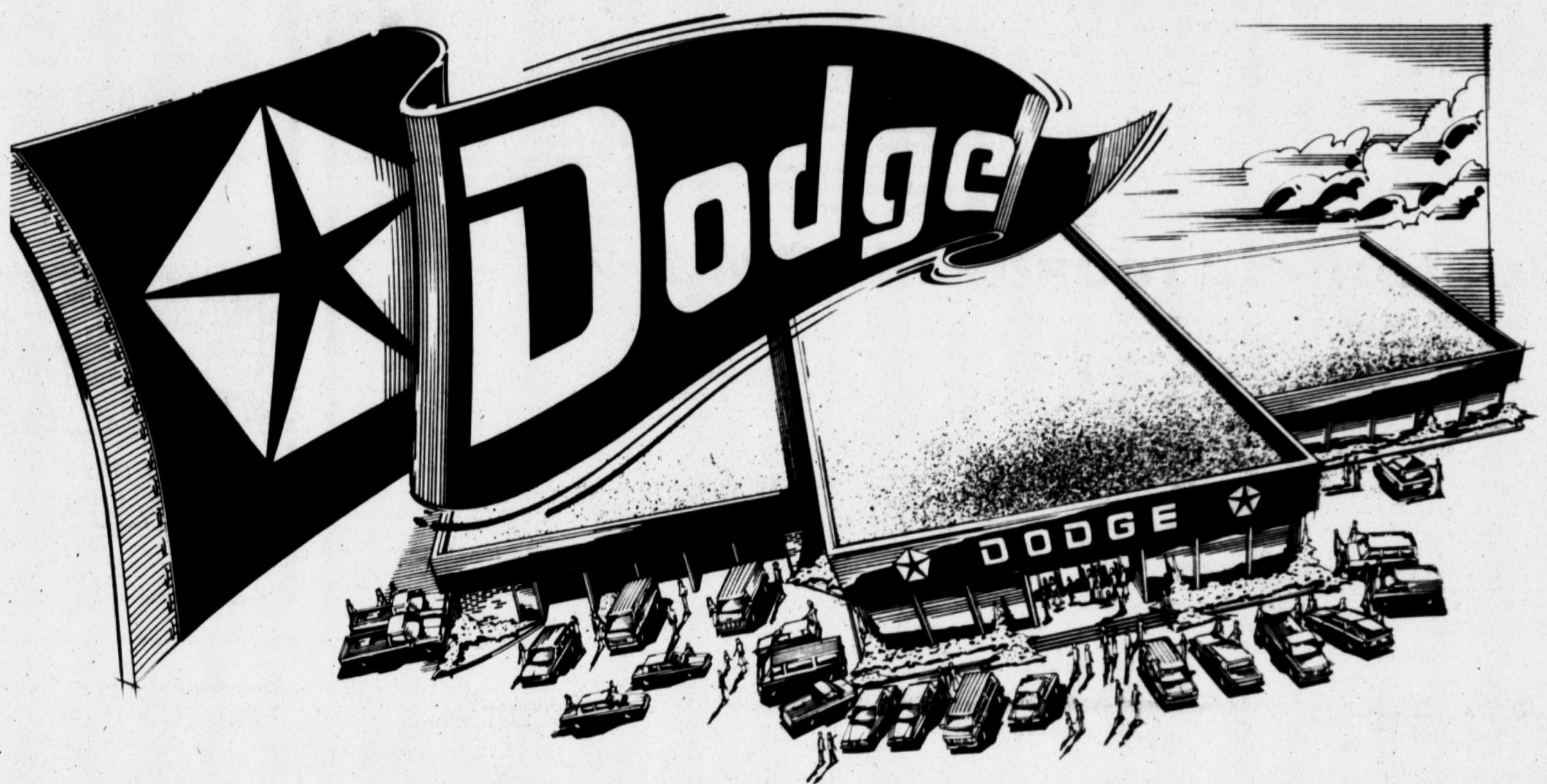
So, the stagnation, the stalemate exists in Myers career.

Doesn't the school at least owe him that much?



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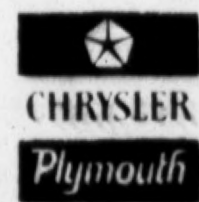
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# Longhorns of '41 started winning tradition

AUSTIN (AP) - A world war was brewing. The Great Depression had robbed America of its innocence. Yet to a group of young men who played football for the University of Texas in the fall of 1941, times were so simple.

So easy. No one had a car. No one had money. A movie date might have cost a quarter. A beer was a dime.

"Back then, we had to play thump poker," said Joe Parker, a sophomore on the team who went on to become an All-American in 1943. "Do you know what thump poker is? We didn't have any money to play, so if we won, we'd thump everybody on the head."

And no one felt pressure to win from a student body of 9,000, or a town only one-fifth as big as it is today.

"We played old-time football. We played it for fun," said Noble Doss, a spy end in 1941, who now makes a living here operating an insurance company.

Fun, indeed. The Longhorns won 50 years ago because they were young and talented. They won because they simply enjoyed the game.

Most of all, the team won because the players respected their coach, so much so that they attacked a mister - as in Mr. Dana X. Bible - to his name.

It seems so odd to think about what this team has done for the university in the 50 years since. The 1941 team,

which achieved a No. 1 national ranking for the first time in the school's history, inspired Texas' winning tradition and left a legacy that's entrenched with students and fans.

That particular fall gave the student body a reason to burn red candles to hex Texas A&M. That year was the first time Texas and Oklahoma played for the Golden Hat Trophy. That year the students met the Longhorns at the train station after a bitter tie with Baylor and escorted them down Congress Avenue to the school with a torchlight parade.

Most important, it provided the foundation for the big-time football played here today.

The surviving members of the 1941 team, who gathered in Austin last weekend to celebrate their 50-year reunion, probably didn't stop to think about the significance of what they did so many years ago. They didn't need to account for a tie to Baylor or a last-second loss to TCU. Those memories, thankfully, have faded through the years.

Rather, they have whiled away most of the hours sharing memories of the good times. They probably passed around the Nov. 17, 1941 issue of Life magazine, which featured 14 of their faces on the cover. They also likely recalled those who have died, especially the teammates who were killed in World War II. The attack on Pearl Harbor happened less than 24 hours after the team finished its season.

The widows were invited to the celebration; their husbands were there in spirit.

Even five decades ago in the purer days of college football, people still wanted to win. The UT Board of Regents, hoping to straighten out a program that seemed to have no direction, lured Bible from Nebraska in 1936 with a salary offer of \$15,000, believed to be the most ever paid a coach at the time.

The salary also was about twice what the school's president earned and three times the salary of the highest-paid professor. But by the time Bible righted the program, nobody was arguing about his salary, least of all his players, who were so inspired by the slight coach from Jefferson City, Tenn.

"He was such a character builder," said Malcolm Kutner, a senior on the 1941 team and Texas' first consensus All-American. "He was very much a gentleman who never even had to use a curse word."

Wally Scott, an Austin attorney who was a junior on the '41 team, said, "Mr. Bible was such a dominant person. He was a great motivator. He was famous for being a motivator. He was such a famous coach, just like Knute Rockne."

Bible organized Texas' recruiting and hired some of the best coaches from the high schools and junior colleges. He lured Blair Cherry from Amarillo High School and Bully Gilstrap from Schreiner Institute.

His recruiting enticed much of the top talent in the state to the Longhorns. The success of the '41 team was

set up in part by two victories. In 1939, Texas beat Arkansas 14-13 in a thrilling game in which sophomore sensation Jack Crain turned a short pass into a 67-yard touchdown in the final 30 seconds.

"That was a turning point for Texas football," Kutner said. "Usually we would get beat every week and the student body didn't pay any attention to you. In that 1939 game, they said, 'Gosh, maybe we do have a football team.'"

In 1940, Bible read a poem entitled "It Can Be Done" to motivate his team to play defending national champion Texas A&M. The Aggies had a 19-game winning streak and appeared to be on their way to the Rose Bowl. But Texas, using just 13 players the entire game, upset them 7-0. The Longhorns scored the only touchdown in the opening minute thanks in part to a famous catch by Doss, who gave Texas a first-and-goal from the 1.

Nine of the "Immortal 13," who beat the Aggies returned for the 1941 campaign. In all, 18 lettermen returned, including Crain, Kutner, Doss and triple threat Pete Layden. Not everyone, though, believed the Longhorns were the best team in the Southwest Conference.

"In some ways," wrote college football legend Red Grange in a column appearing in the Austin American, "the Mustangs are superior to the Longhorns."

No, the SMU Mustangs were not. They lost 34-0. It was the first time the Longhorns had beaten perennial power SMU in eight years. Until 1941, Texas hadn't even scored a touchdown in Dallas.

But SMU wasn't the only team to feel Texas' sting. Colorado fell 34-6. LSU was shut out 34-0. Oklahoma lost 40-7, Arkansas 48-14 and Rice 40-0. By the time Texas beat SMU, the Longhorns were the No. 1 team in the country for the first time ever.

The top ranking didn't last long. Baylor Coach Frank Kimbrough, older brother of Aggie star John Kimbrough, borrowed the "It Can Be Done" motivating trick from Bible. His Bears tied Texas 7-7 when Kit Kittrell heaved a pass to Bill Coleman, who fell to his knees in the end zone to catch the ball.

Another last-second loss to TCU hurt Texas' season, although it was righted somewhat by a 23-0 Thanksgiving Day thrashing of the

Aggies, the first time Texas had beaten A&M in College Station in almost two decades.

The Rose Bowl, then the biggest postseason classic of them all, still wanted Texas in a matchup with Oregon State. The Orange Bowl was courting the Horns, as was the Sugar Bowl.

The Rose Bowl, however, wanted Texas to cancel its last game with Oregon because the Ducks the week before almost had beaten Oregon State. The Rose committee didn't want Oregon to succeed against Texas and spoil its matchup.

Bible refused. And Texas stayed home.

The Longhorns mauled Oregon 71-7 Dec. 6. Before anyone could celebrate the remarkable season, though, America was at war. Most of the 16 seniors, swept up with the patriotic fever, joined some branch of the military. Two of them died, including consensus All-American Chal Daniels.

These days, the Longhorns are trying to regain championship form. Perhaps these young men could take a lesson from the bunch who started the tradition 50 years ago.

## Westerfield recalls old SMU

DALLAS (AP) - Butler Westerfield caught the Interurban from Waco to Dallas. He rode a streetcar from the train station to Highland Park, where a shuttle took him to the Hilltop. Nothing but prairie to the north. He didn't really want to go to this new university on the rim of nowhere because he knew his father couldn't afford it.

But his father was a proud and a staunch Methodist. So Butler, named after a Yankee general, dutifully took his place in Southern Methodist University's first classes.

"I flunked the first English course ever offered there," he said, chuckling. "That's one of the many honors I've won."

The self-deprecating humor proved to be typical in an hour-long conversation. He is not one to boast, though he probably should. Scott Terry, one of six grandchildren, said Butler's home in Waco bears few trappings of his 94 years.

The only reminder he even lettered at SMU is a small football bearing the date 1916 and a score: Rice 146, SMU 3.

A reporter, astounded, said he never had heard of the game. Butler said he understood. "We don't like to talk about it," he said evenly.

No one could talk about it, actually, but Butler. As far as SMU officials can determine, he is the university's oldest letterman. He was a freshman on SMU's first team, in 1915, and, thus, ineligible. But he lettered at halfback and defensive end the next season. In 1917, he lettered in World War I.

He will be honored in a parade highlighting SMU's homecoming festivities Saturday before the team plays Rice. The university is celebrating its 75th football season, a period in which it apparently has come full cycle.

SMU's varsity went 2-5 in 1915, beating tiny Hendrix College of Arkansas and Dallas University. It was an auspicious debut compared to the next season, Butler's first on the varsity.

They went 0-8-2 in 1916 and were outscored, 455-27. They lost to Baylor 61-0 and Texas A&M 62-0. They were shut out in 1916 for the second consecutive season by Daniel Baker, a considerable feat in that Daniel Baker, a small independent, set records all over the Southwest Conference for biggest patsy.

All except at Rice, of course, where the distinction belongs to SMU.

"They came right down the field and scored on their first possession," Butler said, "and it just sorta rolled up after that."

"I've still got a shin wound from a Rice cleat."

A 143-point defeat could have left scars of a deeper nature, too. Butler never took college football that seriously, though. He wasn't at SMU on an athletic scholarship. He played for the joy and camaraderie, as did his teammates.

They took up a collection when Butler's father died after the 1916 season. Butler went home on the money and tried to decide whether he should return to school or get a job. He managed both, waiting on tables in a small cafe off campus. He slept on a cot in the back.

He left SMU for the war and a series of career turns. He was a teacher and coach and publisher and eventually wound up as a professor at Baylor.

He taught until 1971, when he retired - too soon, it seems - at 74. He has not wasted the last 20 years. He

weighs 164, four pounds over his playing weight. Twice he shot his age in golf. He still drives a car. A few brushes with cancer aside, he has no health problems. His voice is as firm as his grasp on life. "He's in better shape than I am," said Terry, who is 34.

Butler travels at least twice a year, to Australia or China or maybe just the Pacific Northwest. He doesn't make it to the Hilltop too often, though, an admission that seemed to embarrass him.

College football has changed considerably since he played it. He did not expect it to remain the same. But he is dismayed by the commercialism, by the greed and what it makes of young men.

"A boy could play it in my day," he said.

Looking back now, three-quarters of a century later, he must have seemed so very young. He didn't go by Butler back then. Snip, they called him.

No one has called him Snip in a long, long time.

"They don't know about it," he said lightly, not in the least offended.

Case in point: the American Girls have taken this country, or at least the female half of it, by storm. Kirsten - the Swedish immigrant of 1854, Samantha - the spirited New York socialite of 1904, and Molly - holding down the home front of 1944, have recently been joined by Felicity - a Colonial lass of 1774. Each book (six for each girl) is not only entertaining, but historically informative. The back contains accurate information about "how it was" in the time period involved. Due to the overwhelming popularity of this series (and all the attendant paraphernalia), the "Felicity" books have been very difficult to get. Felicity Learns A Lesson is our first Felicity book, but it is really the second one. I mean, this is Felicity's second book, but our first...that is...well, you know what I mean.

Joan Lowery Nixon is another author who deserves recognition. She has most recently been known for her "Orphan Train Quartet," but I first became aware of this author's ability through the "Claude and Shirley" series. Her works range from easy readers to those more suitable for 5th-8th graders. All make delightful and fascinating reading. (And you don't have to be a kid to enjoy them!)

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hundreds, of modern writers of children's books. John Erickson and Betsy Byars are a couple of the more recognized names, but that doesn't mean the more obscure ones are less qualified. And don't forget the "Old Faithfuls"...those books and authors you loved as a kid: Make Way for Ducklings by Robert McCloskey...Fred Gipson's dog stories (Old Yeller, Savage Sam)...and everything Beverly Cleary ever wrote - especially the "Ramona" books with Beezus, Henry Huggins, and the mutt Ribsy.

BY THE WAY...if you think you know the story of The Wizard Of Oz because you've seen the Judy Garland version eleven billion times, you've got another thing coming. The resident literary critics at my house (by the names of Anne and Betsy) inform me that (1) M-G-M took great liberties with L. Frank Baum's 1900 classic, (2) the book is a thousand times better,

AND (3) that there are 38 additional Oz stories besides the original!!! (And speaking of movie rip-offs--read the original Spyri version of Heidi and you'll know that Hollywood has cheated you again!)

Well, I'm just getting warmed up and it's time to stop. I just barely have space to mention the "perennial" - Laura Ingalls Wilder, R.L. Stevenson, Louisa May Alcott and the man everybody either loves or hates - Dr. Seuss.

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# Gov. Ann likes her job after first anniversary

AUSTIN (AP) - When the editors of American Photo magazine devoted an issue to pictures of 100 famous Americans, they chose Madonna, Cher, Desert Storm Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf and ... Texas Gov. Ann Richards.

She's been profiled in Vogue magazine and on "60 Minutes." Glamour named her a "woman of the year." A Democratic Party fundraiser group even suggested she was presidential timber.

But in an interview on the first anniversary of her election, Richards says she likes her job and the Governor's Mansion, while professing to lack either time or interest in national politics.

"I told (presidential hopeful) Bill Clinton, and I apply this to myself: When you make a decision to run for office, you have to decide do you want to be that and do you want the experience of running for it?"

"I don't want to be vice president. I don't want to be president. And I don't want to run for it," she said.

"I don't know of another job in the world that would equal being governor of Texas."

It's a job she won in November 1990, assumed in January and takes great delight in after 10 months.

During those months, she presided over one regular session of the Legislature and two special sessions, hosted visits from the queen of England and president of Mexico, appointed record numbers of minorities and women to state posts, and reaped more national publicity than most first-year governors could imagine.

Her rise to political stardom dates to the 1988 Democratic National Convention, where the then-little known state treasurer delivered the keynote address.

She went on to win a bruising Democratic primary over six men and defeated Republican oilman Clayton Williams in the most expensive gubernatorial election in Texas history.

Today, the 58-year-old Richards says she's surpassed her own dreams.

"I have really reached a level I never expected in my life. And I'm in a position where I can really get things done," she said.

Being governor of a major state, she says, is where the action is.

"You ask (Gov.) Pete Wilson in California. He will tell you that being in the U.S. Senate is the most miserable thing in the world. That's why he went home and ran for governor."

"The states are where it is today. It isn't in Washington. I think all those people kind of take leave of their senses when they get inside the Beltway. It's unreal. Perfectly sane, nice people go up there and go nuts."

As for her suddenly very high profile, Richards shrugs it off except for what she says it brings to Texas.

"All of the hype and the publicity stuff, you know the only value of that? It makes people think about us. And if it makes people think Texas is a good or interesting or profitable place to be, then that's great."

Richards said she is pleased with the results of the 1991 legislative sessions, although she admits some frustration in not getting everything she wanted.

Her list of successes includes a state lottery, insurance reform, a new education funding bill, some streamlining of state agencies, creation of a new environmental department and formation of a state Ethics Commission.

"I got most of what I wanted, but I only got a little bit of each," she said.

"I've learned to try to be patient and know that I'm not going to get it all the first time I ask. I think there are a lot of things that need to be done that we did not get done last time."

High on that second list is health insurance reform and making sure money spent on education gets to teaching.

"It's not just a matter of a (teacher) pay increase, but the way the money is spent once it gets to the local school districts. How much of the increased funding that came from the Legislature and this (school finance) court ruling actually went to teaching personnel? I think that the school districts squirreled away a lot of that money to invest in Astro Turf. But we'll see."

Not everyone is happy, of course. A recent Texas Poll showed Richards' approval rating at 49 percent,

down from 61 percent when she took office. Those rating her performance as "only fair" or "poor" rose to 44 percent, up from 36 percent in August.

Texas Republican Party Chairman Fred Meyer said the numbers reflect public unhappiness with the \$2.7 billion tax increase Richards signed into law, rising unemployment and other economic problems.

"Texans are waking to the reality that Ann Richards' 'New Texas' meant new taxes and no new jobs," Meyer said.

National office: "I don't want to be vice president. I don't want to be president. And I don't want to run for it ... I don't know of another job in the world that would equal being governor of Texas."

Ambition:

"I have really reached a level I never expected in my life. And I'm in a position where I can really get things done."

"Since Ann Richards was elected governor, our state budget has increased to a record-breaking \$60 billion. Local property taxes are skyrocketing yet our schools aren't any better," he said.

The governor says the tax increase was far less than the projected deficit she inherited when taking office. Some legislative estimates had forecast more than \$5 billion in red ink.

As for the poll, Richards said legislative fights over insurance, hazardous waste disposal and education may have angered some. "But I believe the majority of Texans are with us in our fight to make government more accountable to taxpayers and their families."

Richards also heard complaints from longtime allies. Some groups see weaknesses in environmental legislation, and good government organizations complained about

loopholes in the new Ethics Commission.

"That's their job," Richards said. "As one who's been an advocate, I can tell you that you never declare victory and say how great things are because once you do that, you're finished."

The governor says she has her own gauge for achievement, and it's not an opinion poll.

"Have I done everything in this year that I wanted to do? No, I haven't," she said. "But I'm my own worst critic. I can tell you my failures and shortcomings. My greatest one is impatience. I always want things faster than they occur."

"The measure of what I do in the long run is going to be economically. Where is Texas when I've been here for a term? And if I've made a difference, then that's good."

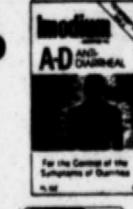

## Hispanic family living 'dream'

SAN DIEGO (AP) - The American dream has come true for Jesse and Aida Diaz. After 19 years of marriage, two children and years of struggle, they have a four-bedroom home, two cars and hope for the future.

"We feel we have made it happen for us," Aida Diaz said Thursday.

The family is typical of the success stories in a U.S. Census Bureau study which found that Hispanics in the United States have risen to new heights of wealth and education since 1982.

However, the study released Thursday also found that Hispanics still are less prosperous than the U.S. population as a whole.

The diversity shows "that Hispanics are not one homogeneous glob," said Jesus Garcia, the Census Bureau demographer who, with Patricia Montgomery, wrote the report.

"We have people that are very wealthy, and I think people that are not doing as well. I think Hispanics mirror America in general."

Hispanic buying power increased by 70 percent from the start of the boom in 1982 until its end in 1990, nearly three times the increase for other Americans. That's after adjusting for inflation.

But Hispanics were twice as likely as other Americans to be poor, and Hispanic children were three times as likely to live in poverty.

One in three Hispanic men worked as a laborer, helper, machine operator or similar job, compared with one in five among other men.

And only half of Hispanics had four years of high school, compared to three-fourths of other Americans.

"When you're not an Anglo male, there tend to be barriers," said Raymond R. Uzeta, executive director of the Chicano Federation, a social services and agency in San Diego.

"For those who have assimilated into the culture, and have had some opportunities in education, they may have done better," Uzeta said.

The study compared Hispanics to non-Hispanics, without taking race into account. Hispanics are an ethnic and language group that can include people of any race.

In the 1980s, the Diazes gained many of the material things by which many Americans measure success.

Aida Diaz, 39, was born in Tijuana, Mexico, to a Mexican mother and American father. She studies office information systems at Southwestern Community College while working as a high school

teacher.

Jesse Diaz, 41, whose father is Mexican and mother is American, has a junior college degree and works as a lineman for a utility company.

Together, they earn about \$96,000. In 1990, according to the government survey, one in seven Hispanic households earned \$50,000 or more a year. Eight years earlier, only one in nine took in that much money.

"We have worked hard, and we continue to work hard," said Aida Diaz, adding that she stresses the importance of education to their 13-year-old daughter Jessica and 7-year-old son Robert.

The study said Hispanic-Americans chances of going to college improved in the 1980s. One in 10 had four years of college education in 1990. In 1982, it was one in 13.

Said Uzeta, "I think it's true in this society that the path to a better life is education."

"The high school drop out rate among Hispanics is as much as 50 percent in some areas of the country. In this country, we really need to address this."

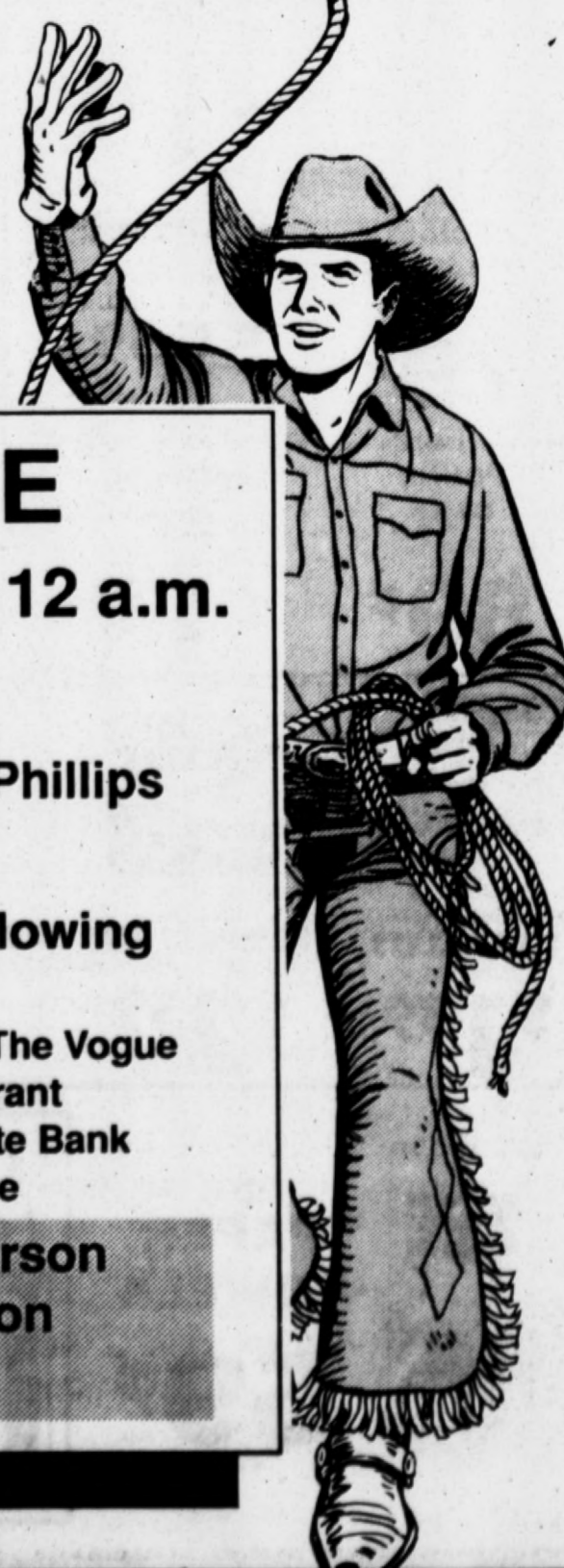

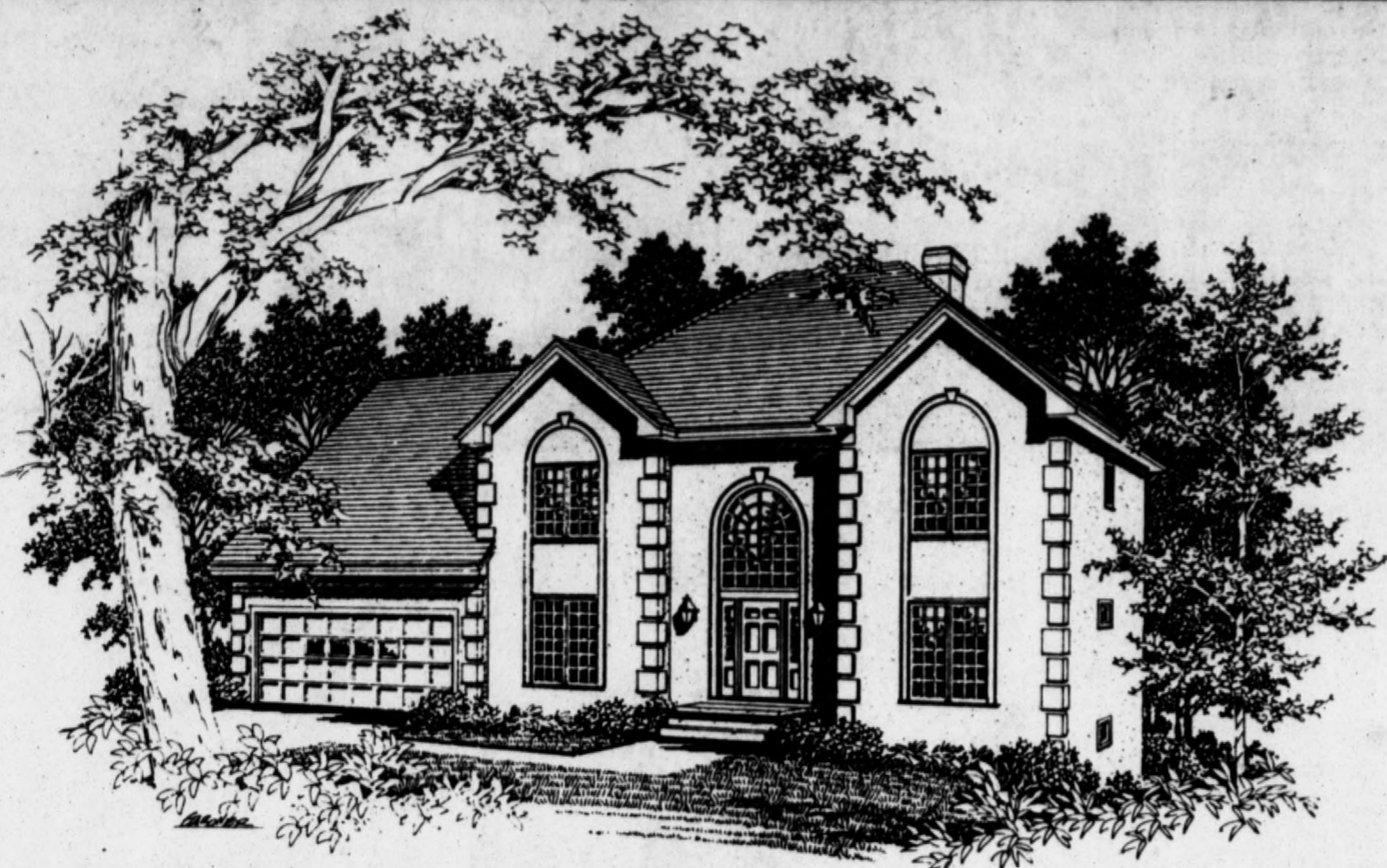

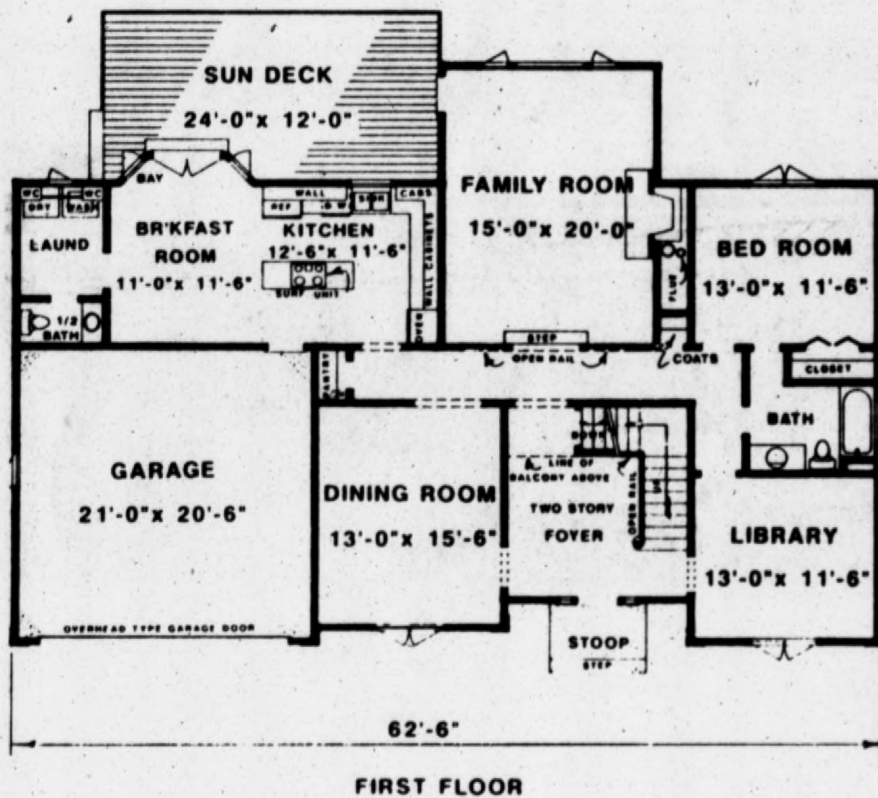
laundry and half bath are in a room to themselves.

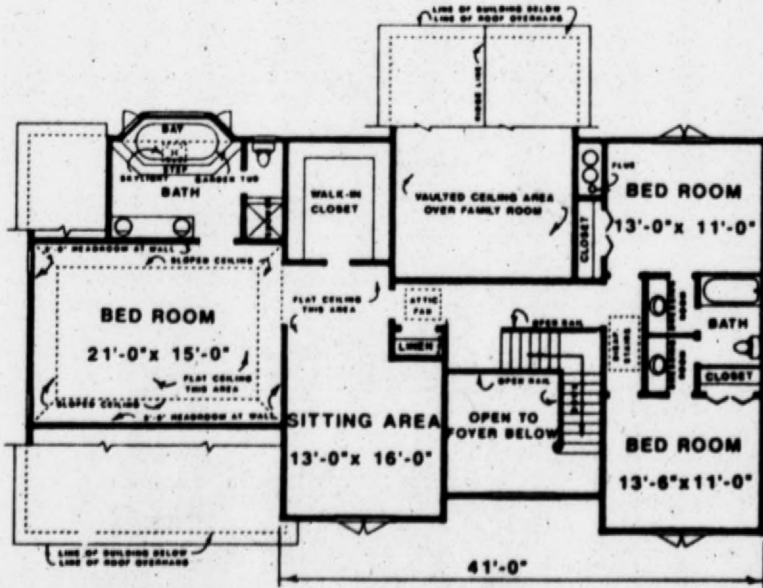

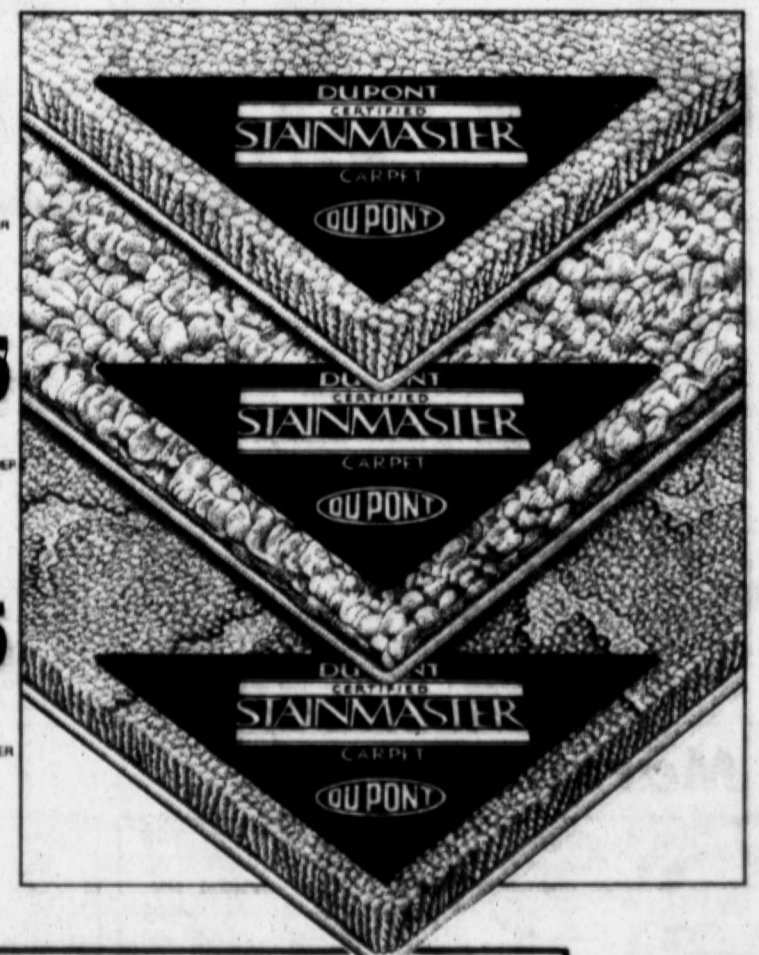
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## MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

BE PREPARED

The big flocks of geese are winging their way south. The leaves are turning brown, yellow, red and loose. The days are growing shorter and the evenings are getting frosty. Early in the morning, it's downright chilly. Winter is coming. Millions of Americans dread the onslaught of Old Man Winter. Most of us abhor the cold, dislike the short days and long nights and detest driving on snow or ice-slickened roads. Every year, many business owners put off preparing for winter. A frequent area of neglect is our motor vehicles. We put off having our cars, vans, delivery trucks and other machinery winterized. This procrastination can be a major cause of unnecessary delay and expense. It is also a violation of the Boy Scout motto--"Be Prepared."

**Expect The Unexpected**  
No one really expects to end up in a snow drift or to be

stranded in the cold. However, it happens millions of times every year. The American Automobile Association (AAA) alone provides assistance to more than 10 million motorists each year.

Many of these incidents could be prevented or the discomfort lessened with just a small amount of preparation. Here are some winter safety tips from the AAA and highway traffic safety experts.

First, make certain your vehicle is properly maintained and prepared for winter. Now is the time to get prepared. If you wait until the really cold weather in January and February, you may have procrastinated too long.

Begin with a complete servicing of your car or truck. Change the oil to the manufacturer's winter specification and have the cooling system serviced. Antifreeze is required if temperatures drop below freezing in your area. A complete cooling system check should include an inspection of all belts and hoses. Replace any hard, brittle or cracked components.

Winter is tough on fuel systems. Replace dirty air cleaners and old fuel filters. Keep your gas tank full. This reduces the danger of condensation in the tank and may prevent your fuel line from freezing.

Cold temperatures also stress an engine's electrical components. Pay special attention to your battery and cables. Have a mechanic check the electrical system as part of your pre-winter tuneup.

Now is a good time to replace your windshield wiper blades and add solvent to the washer fluid reservoir. Remember

to check your tires. Tires that have adequate tread may help you reach your destination safely. If you live in an area where there is a high level of annual snowfall, snow tires for your drive wheels may be necessary. Remember to keep the tires inflated properly. Proper inflation benefits traction and also helps save fuel year round.

### EMERGENCY PROVISIONS

If you must travel in winter, take along emergency equipment and provisions. Items that winter driving experts highly recommend are a folding shovel, tire chains, a flash light with new batteries, an old blanket (wool preferred) and a good set of jumper cables. They also suggest road flares, gloves and paper towels. Other good ideas include a sleeping bag, insulated coveralls, an empty gas can and some small bags of kitty litter or sand for traction. Personally, I carry a heavy winter coat and a comfortable pair of boots. If I have to walk, I want to be as warm and dry as possible.

Another good recommendation is to carry a small packet of high-energy foods such as peanut butter and crackers, chocolate bars, honey and dried fruit. Renew these items frequently to keep them fresh and edible.

By taking time to have your vehicle prepared for winter, you may avoid significant delays that are neither good for business nor your blood pressure. So, get prepared and then relax. Winter will come but you will be ready.

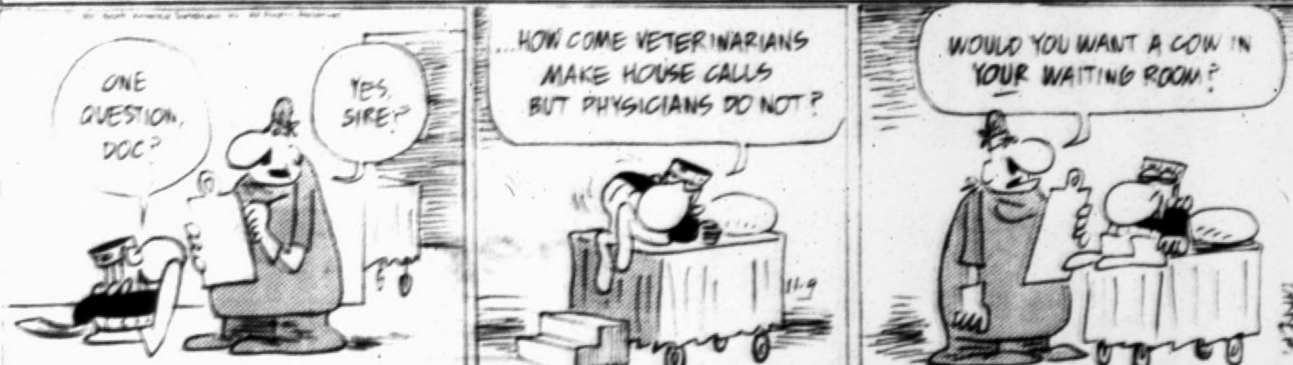

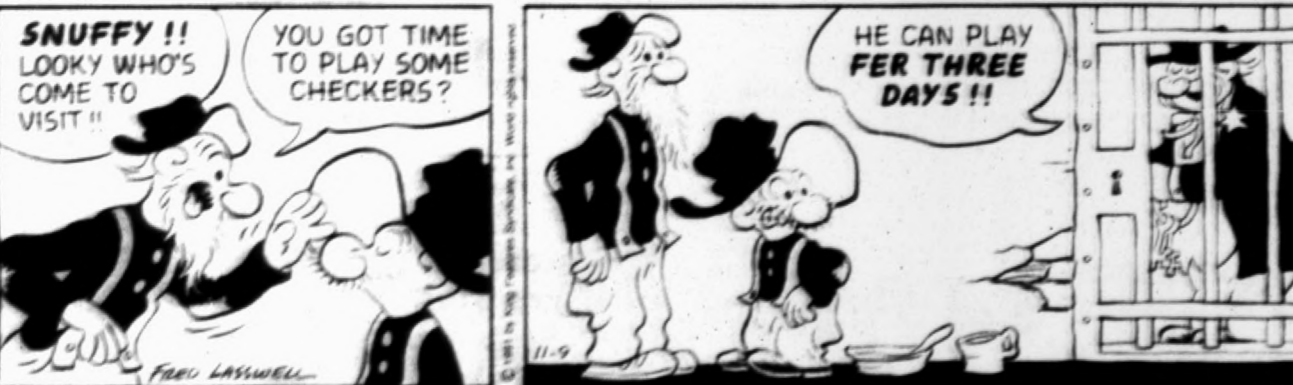

## Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have a ringing in my head or ears. I am 70 years old and this started about four months ago.

I saw two ear specialists. One told me my problem was sensorineural and the second said tinnitus. They both said they could not help me, and they both said I was on the verge of needing hearing aids, but the hearing aids would not help the ringing. Do you know what I can do to stop this ringing? I would do nearly anything to get this ringing stopped.

DEAR READER: You did the right thing to see an ear specialist, but from your letter alone, I would suspect that you could get some help.

The two specialists you saw really were not in disagreement. "Sensorineural" means the type of hearing loss you have, which is common in your age group. So both doctors know you have that form of hearing loss and both know you have ear noises called tinnitus.

Many specialists in tinnitus believe that one reason people get ear noises is because they have a loss of hearing. The hearing loss allows the brain to perceive sounds that are otherwise masked by hearing normal sounds. If the hearing can be improved, the tinnitus may disappear, or at least be significantly diminished.

There are many causes for tinnitus, but if you have no cause other than the hearing loss, I believe you should try a hearing aid to improve your hearing. Perhaps you will need a hearing aid for both ears. See an ear, nose and throat specialist who has a clinically certified audiologist who can do modern testing to determine your span of hearing loss and then match a proper hearing aid to your hearing loss. Considering how much the ringing is bothering you, it is certainly worth trying.

I have discussed the various causes of tinnitus and the things that can be done for the problem in my new Special Report 112, Ear Noises (Tinnitus). I'm sending you a free

There is also a tinnitus masker that can be helpful and is sometimes used in conjunction with a hearing aid.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My husband had a polyp removed 18 months ago and was told to go on a high-fiber diet. Recently, he went to the doctor because he had lost weight, which he should have. He is now 175 pounds, 5 feet 10 inches and stocky built. If he loses more weight, he won't look well. He has had no appetite for a long time. He had X-rays of the colon and also the one where they put a camera up in the rectum. Everything was fine, and his blood test was fine too. Could his gas cause him to have a bad appetite?

DEAR READER: Unless he is very muscular, he is still on the heavy side. Nature has a habit of adjusting a person's weight to what it should be if a person eats properly and maintains a reasonable level of physical activity. One way this is done is by decreasing a person's appetite.

Appetite is affected by bulk. When your husband shifted from high-calorie foods to those with more bulk, he probably significantly decreased his calorie intake. Having had a polyp removed does not mean he has colon cancer, and it should not have had an effect on his appetite. There are many factors that affect appetite, including depression. Yes, fiber will cause gas in some people, and feeling distended may decrease a person's appetite too. But there are a lot of heavy eaters who experience the same problem.

DEAR DR. LAMB: Please help my 16-year-old daughter find a painless way to fly. We have tried over-the-counter medications and prescriptions. The prescription medicine made her eyes scarlet red and did not help her nausea. Her doctor said the patches would not help because they contain the same medications as the above.

We are baffled because she is not afraid to fly. She is able to ride the roller coasters, take long bus trips, and cars never bother her. She does not suffer any motion sickness except on airplanes and a boat trip lasting more than an hour or so.

If she eats anything within 12 hours of flight time, it comes up after 45 minutes on the airplane. Absolutely nothing will stay in her stomach because she becomes very, very sick. I am positive it is not psychological. We fly once or twice a year, and this has been going on since she was 12, on her first flight. She gets better immediately after deplaning and within an hour to two hours is completely recovered.

DEAR READER: Usually individuals who are particularly sensitive to motion will have problems riding in cars and certainly with carnival rides. But the roller coaster may be different from the sensation your daughter gets during flight. Your sensation of balance depends on the input from your balance canals in your ears, the visual input from your eyes and body-position sense from nerves to all parts of your body.

There are many things a person can do to help limit excessive responses to motion which I have discussed in my new Special Report 110, Dizziness, Balance, Vertigo, Motion Sickness, which I am sending you. I don't doubt that your daughter vomits, but usually the stomach empties everything you eat well before 12 hours, unless one has eaten a fatty meal. She might eliminate all fat in the meals before flying. She may be vomiting the acid digestive juices normally formed by the stomach.

Don't discount psychological factors. They are important and can make a tendency to motion sickness worse. There is no better example than "getting sick at your stomach" when under emotional stress.

Unless her red eyes were due to taking scopolamine, I think Transderm Scop skin patches of scopolamine are worth a try. I have discussed various medicines that can be used to help prevent motion sickness in the report I am sending you.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have a small lump and swelling of the parotid gland. The biopsy was benign. I would like to know what caused this condition and should I risk surgery or learn to live with it. It doesn't hurt.

DEAR READER: Like many lumps or tumors, no one can answer exactly why you developed it. The importance of the lump or tumor always depends on what the cells look like when examined under a microscope. A benign lump should mean you don't have a lot to worry about. The decision as to what should be done depends entirely on what your biopsy looked like.

# Local stores offer many unique gifts

There are thousands of great Christmas gifts that can be bought in Hereford, but some are a little stranger than others.

Some stores said they didn't "have anything weird, unique or different," and others mullied the question before answering, but others said that they do have the one-of-a-kind Christmas gift for anyone and everyone this year.

Some of the examples, in a random survey of local businesses, are weird. Some are unique. Some are different. Some are things you can't live without.

**Arrowhead Mills**, just south of U.S. Highway 60 on Lawton, features a "store" where all of their products are featured. The items range from the World's No. 2 peanut butter to strange grains.

"We have amaranth and quinoa (keen-wah)," said an Arrowhead employee. Amaranth is a grain from Ethiopia that is available in grain form or ground into flour. Quinoa, from Peru, is a seed that is boiled into a high-protein food. "It's really chewy," said the Arrowhead employee.

At **Anthony's**, in Sugarland Mall, an employee was going through 12 big boxes of Deerskin slippers that would be great for children and adults.

"And right now I'm pricing teddies," she said. "These would be great for some people, I'm sure. They are really cute."

At **Barrick Furniture**, on West U.S. Highway 60, they have a 40-inch projection television "available today for less than \$3,000. It would be nice for someone, for anyone." Terms, no doubt, are available, but the picture is great. And big.

At **Bob's Hickory Pit**, on S. 25

Mile Ave., they can smoke or cook anything.

"We've cooked wild turkey, whole pigs, possum, raccoon, deer, elk, all kinds of stuff," said Bob Hughes. "You clean 'em, we cook 'em. We don't cook anything that still has the feathers on it. We had somebody today ask me if I could cook a chukker. That's some kind of bird, I think."

BBHV is Blue Bell Homemade Vanilla.

**Brookhart's On Main**, 309 N. Main, is featuring "some very distinctive bathrobes," said Earl Brookhart. "I can't describe 'em to you over the phone, but they are real distinctive, very unique."

The store is also featuring **Ron Lee Clowns**, a worldwide collectible, and hand-knit sweaters, among other things.

"Everybody's got sweaters," said Brookhart, "but many don't have hand-knit sweaters."

At **Caryn's Hallmark**, 236 N. Main, the hot item of the year is the sand dollar music box. They have a variety of songs and (it says right on the front) are ideal for friends, wives, mothers and daughters. The legend of the sand dollar is on the back of the music box, which is on a stand. The music boxes are so hot they can hardly keep them in stock.

**Colortyme**, 310 N. 25 Mile Ave., has a unique accessory for any home: an oriental drum. "It's a very pretty ceramic drum," said manager Lucy Chavez.

**Cowan Jewelers**, 217 N. Main, has some "jewelry pieces that are certainly different. We've got all kinds for all tastes and all price ranges."

At **Foster Electronics**, 407 N. Main, you can get the ultimate mouse for your computer. It's a mouse: looks like a

mouse, feels like a mouse. It's white and furry with pink ears and gold-rimmed glasses.

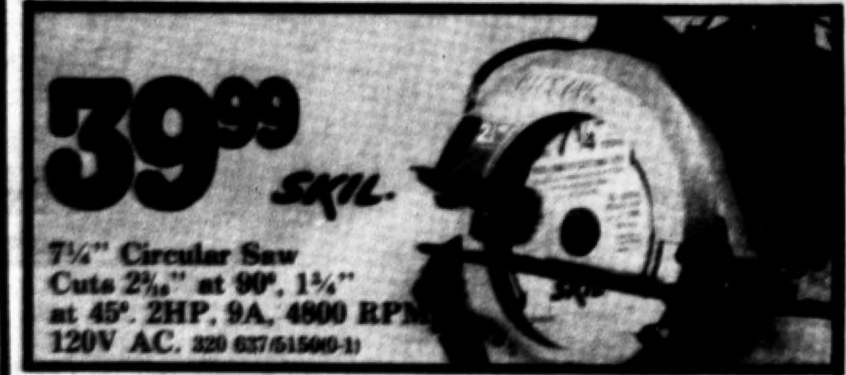

## Holidays can be happy for all children

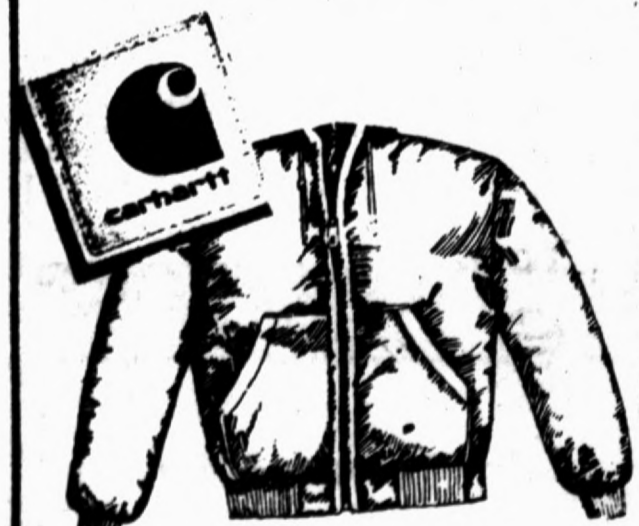

Parental conflict, not the divorce itself, causes problems for children, she says. And avoiding conflict can be especially tough during that time Children often see advantages to the situation, she adds. "Many kids

## Tips on baking perfect turkey

- Always wash and dry your turkey (or poultry of any kind) thoroughly before seasoning.
- When handling raw poultry, use a surface that is non-porous. Use your kitchen counter or a heavy plastic cutting surface instead of a wooden chopping board. The wooden surface will absorb any bacteria from the raw poultry. This bacteria may be transmitted to other food products when using your wooden cutting board for preparing vegetables and other foods.
- Never leave the raw turkey stuffed for any length of time before roasting to avoid possible salmonella contamination.
- Always wash hands and utensils thoroughly after handling raw poultry of any kind.
- Poultry Parts
  - Use two 10- to 12-pound birds instead of one 20- to 22-pound bird. The younger turkey is more tender. More important, there are more "parts" to go around. Also, the meat will not take as long to cook through, so the breast will be less likely to dry out before the dark thigh is finished cooking.
- Chicken "wingettes" or drumsticks may also be purchased separately and roasted to perfection. This is to accommodate families who wish that each turkey was born with 10 wings and legs! Thanksgiving for Two
- Instead of investing in an enormous turkey, buy a capon or a large roasting chicken. You will have fewer leftovers, and to many, chicken is more succulent and flavorful.
- Make two individual sweet potato casseroles instead of one large casserole. Use one potato per person. Once baked and tender, remove the skin and mash with butter, maple syrup and spices. Spoon into individual 1-cup souffle dishes and bake until hot. Top each casserole with some miniature marshmallows and bake until golden.
- Forget the large gelatin mold salad. Combine one can of whole cranberry sauce with one can of drained mandarin oranges, drained pineapple chunks, or cut-up cling peaches. Place in a serving bowl. Decorate the top with a border of mandarin oranges.

**Do I Have to Stuff My Turkey**  
 -When a turkey is stuffed, it takes longer for the correct internal temperature to be achieved. This usually results in breast meat that is on the dry side. Instead of filling the turkey with stuffing, place only a few aromatics such as chopped onion, celery, apples and parsley in the cavity. You won't lose any flavor by baking the stuffing separately in a buttered casserole until piping hot and crusty on the top.

## Dressing tops tasty birds

Dress your holiday turkey with a healthful stuffing of couscous - studded with pear, raisin and celery. Couscous is nothing more than a tiny pasta that needs only 5 minutes to cook. You can usually find it in the pasta section of your local supermarket. This recipe saves about 10 grams of fat or 90 calories per serving compared with traditional stuffing. And because stuffing tends to absorb fat when it cooks in the bird, you can cut even more fat by baking the stuffing in a casserole instead of inside the turkey.

**Fruit and Spice Couscous Stuffing**  
 1 cup thinly sliced celery  
 1 cup sliced green onion

2 tablespoons margarine or butter  
 1 1/2 cups chicken broth  
 1 cup apple cider or apple juice  
 1 teaspoon ground coriander  
 1 teaspoon ground allspice  
 1 teaspoon pepper  
 3 pears, cored and finely chopped (3 and 1-3rd cups)  
 One 8-ounce package corn bread stuffing mix (2 cups)  
 1 cup uncooked couscous  
 1 cup raisins  
 1 cup snipped parsley

In a medium saucepan cook celery and green onion in hot margarine or butter until celery is crisp-tender. Remove from heat. Stir in chicken broth, cider or apple juice, coriander, allspice and pepper.

In a large mixing bowl combine the pears, stuffing mix, couscous, raisins and parsley; add the celery mixture. Toss stuffing gently until mixed. Use to stuff a 14- to 16-pound turkey. (Or, add 1/2 cup more chicken broth to the stuffing; spoon into a greased 3-quart casserole. Bake, covered, in a 325-degree F oven for 40 to 45 minutes or until heated through.) Makes 15 servings.

## Capon: small alternative to turkey

Looking for an alternative to the traditional Thanksgiving turkey? A capon is a meaty bird, larger than a broiler but smaller than a turkey. Two 7-pound capons should easily serve a dozen aunts, uncles and assorted cousins.

Garnish your roasted capon with wedges of baked acorn squash. Serve with cranberry stuffing, mashed potatoes and gravy, hot rolls and pumpkin pie.

### Roasted Capon With Cranberry Stuffing

Two 6- to 8-pound frozen capons, thawed  
 Cranberry Stuffing (recipe follows)  
 Melted butter, margarine or oil  
 Parsley  
 Baked acorn squash slices  
 Remove capons from plastic bag; free legs and tail from tucked position. Remove giblets from body and neck cavities. Rinse capons inside and out under cold water. Pat dry with paper towels. Set aside neck and giblets for gravy.

**Prepare Cranberry Stuffing**  
 Sprinkle capon cavities lightly with salt. Fill loosely with stuffing. Skewer neck skin to back. Return legs and tail to tucked position or cover stuffing with aluminum foil and tie legs and tail together loosely.

Place capons, breast side up, on a rack in a shallow open roasting pan. Do not use water in the pan. Cover loosely with aluminum foil, crimping it to the edges of pan. Foil should not touch capons. Roast in a 325-degree F oven, about 40 minutes per pound. About 30 to 45 minutes before the end of the roasting time, remove foil and brush skin with melted butter. Cut band of skin or string to free legs. Roast until leg joint moves easily and meat is tender. Meat thermometer should register 185 degrees F. Arrange capon on platter and garnish with parsley and baked acorn squash slices as desired. Makes 12 to 16 servings.

**Cranberry Stuffing**  
 One 14-ounce package herb-seasoned stuffing mix (commercially prepared)  
 2 cups hot water

1/2 cup melted butter  
 One 1-pound can whole cranberry sauce.  
 Combine ingredients and toss lightly.

**Giblet Gravy**  
 Simmer giblets in salted water, about 30 minutes for the liver and 2 to 2 1/2 hours for the neck, heart and gizzard. Trim away gristle and dice the meat.

When capons are roasted, remove to warm platter and keep hot. Pour drippings from roasting pan into a 4-cup measure or bowl. Skim off 6 tablespoons fat and return to the pan. Blend in 6 tablespoons flour; cook, stirring, until bubbly. If desired, brown fat and flour slightly to give more color and flavor. Skim remaining fat from drippings. Add giblet broth and water to meat juice drippings to make 4 cups. Blend liquid into flour mixture. Cook, stirring, until thickened. While stirring, scrape brown particles from bottom and sides of the pan and blend into the gravy. Add diced giblets. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Serve hot.

1/3 cup almond liqueur or apple juice

In medium bowl, blend vanilla wafer crumbs, 1 cup ground almonds, powdered sugar, and cinnamon. Stir

in pumpkin pie mix and almond liqueur. Form into 1-inch balls. Roll in remaining 3/4 cup ground almonds. Refrigerate. Makes 4 dozen.

**CHOCOLATE PUMPKIN TRUFFLES**

2 1/2 cup crush vanilla wafers  
1 cup toasted ground almonds  
3/4 cup sifted powdered sugar, divided  
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon  
1 cup (6 ounces) chocolate pieces,

melted  
1/2 cup solid pack pumpkin  
1/3 cup coffee liqueur or apple juice

In medium bowl, combine vanilla wafer crumbs, ground almonds, 1/2 cup powdered sugar, and cinnamon. Blend in melted chocolate, pumpkin, and coffee liqueur. Form into 1-inch balls. Refrigerate. Dust with remaining 1/4 cup powdered sugar just before serving. Makes 4 dozen.

# Children share turkey recipes

If you were a child were would you go to buy your Thanksgiving turkey? Jessica, 8, of Lockport, IN, would pick up her bird from a "A bakery that had meat" while Nate, 6, of Chicago would buy his turkey "at the county fair and then leave it in the basement until Thanksgiving."

The Butterball Turkey Talk-Line recently conducted one-one interviews with more than 200 children between the ages of five and eight at the Research Center of Chicago's Museum of Science and Industry and uncovered a fresh view of Thanksgiving traditions and turkey preparation from eyes unseasoned in turkey tending.

Nearly every boy and girl said their favorite part of Thanksgiving was either the special dishes and roasted turkey prepared only on this holiday, or spending time with family and friends, particularly those not part of their daily lives.

The children surveyed heralded from states across the country from New York to Washington, yet their responses indicated an universal feeling toward this hallowed American tradition: Thanksgiving is a cherished time for every member of the family.

Often unusual but always clever were these young chefs' recommendations for preparing a successful Thanksgiving dinner. To prepare the turkey for roasting, Philip, 8 of Houston, shared his secret of unwrapping the turkey, submerging it in water and leaving it there "because that makes it shrink so it will fit in the oven."

Toby, 7, Of West Lafayette, IN, would spread his turkey with something particularly delectable to him. "I'd put my favorite sauce in the turkey first thing—a tomato sauce—although I don't think many people will like it."

One little girl really went to work preparing her turkey for roasting. "I would peel off all the skin of the turkey, then set the oven at 400 degrees and put the turkey in," said Rachelle, 7, of Dayton, OH.

Roasting times and temperatures were never a doubt as the children answered with precise and confident instructions. The time and methods of roasting the turkey run the gamut from Vickie's six minutes at 21 degrees to Kathryn's 10 hours at 61 degrees.

\*Rebecca, 5, of Stamford, CT: "I'd roast it at medium, for two minutes, then I'll take it out and then I'll squeeze the juice out of it, and then I'll roast it again for probably two more minutes at eight degrees, and then squeeze the juice again. I know it's sort of a pattern, but that's what my dad does."

\*Steve, 6, of Louisville, KY: "I'd put it in the oven for 15 minutes at 1,200 degrees—I make it hot! When the numbers stopped on the microwave and it says 'end,' I would put my finger on real fast to see the temperature."

\*Matthew, 6, of Sacramento, CA: "I'd put it in the stove for about two seconds or so at 30 degrees and when the timer goes off it will be well done."

Knowing when to take the turkey out of the oven was no problem for these aspiring turkey chefs. Jenny, 8, of Northbrook, IL, said, "I would stick a toothpick in it—if it doesn't come out with anything on it, cook it some more I it comes out wit juice, it would be nice nd juicy and I'd take it out."

Yuki, 5, of Edison park, N.J., also had a fool-proof method: "I would cook it at my home at three degrees until 2 o'clock. I would know it's ready because it would be 2 o'clock.

Other thoughts on determining doneness also made sense to these young cooks.

\* Rachel, 8, of Sarasota, FL.: "I'd look at it and could see that it's done because it would have sweat on it."

\* Vanessa, 9, of Ithaca, NY: "I would take one of those things that has a squeezing thing on the top and take some juice and taste it to see if the turkey is done."

The stuffing ingredients stumped

a few of these turkey tots, as well as how to go about stuffing the bird. However, Robbie, 8, of Downers Grove, IL, came up with a stuffing recipe to fool the Tooth Fairy: "I would surprise everyone and put Fannie May candy with stuffing and put mashed potatoes over all of it so they couldn't see it."

Many children came up with stuffing recipes that would put the trendiest New York chefs to shame.

\*Jenny, 6, Los Angeles, Cal.: "I would put vanilla pudding in the stuffing and that's all you use."

\*John, 5, Kalamazoo, MI.: "I will put meat, lemon juice flour, sugar and cholesterol in my stuffing."

\* Wendy, 5, of West Bend, IN.: "I'd put strawberries in the stuffing and grapes and oranges and hot dogs and no more. Then I'd put the turkey to close it."

\*Megan, 5, of Dallas: "I'd need to add meat, chicken, sausage and mayonnaise. Then I'd put in a little butter and maybe strawberry Jell-O."

\*Matthew, 8, of Des Moines, IA: "I'd cut a hole in the turkey and put the stuffing in it—bread and some juices, like salsa."

\*Morgan, 9, of Denver, CO.: "After putting the stuffing in there I would paste it back up with the turkey paste my Mom buys."

\*Tiffany, 6, of Austin: "I'd cut the turkey in half and put a chicken in there."

\*Dan, 7, of Wild Wood, IL.: "Bread, spice like peppers, onions and radishes, meat, cheese and crackers."

While their directions for preparing the meal may vary from the norm, these children all had the right idea; the turkey is roasted in their own kitchens, so that the delicious aroma associated with Thanksgiving fills the air. # New Year traditions changed

In the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, it was New Year's Day, rather than Christmas, which was the primary focus of holiday socializing and gift-giving.

In fact, New Year's Day calling, a custom brought to America by Dutch and French immigrants, was so popular through the latter part of the 1800s that many merchants opened their stores on the afternoon of December 25th so that gifts could be selected for giving during the following week.

**Festive Visits**

On January 1st, children were taken

to visit grandparents and uncles and aunts; friends and relatives were called upon to offer best wishes for health and happiness in the coming year; and young men visited young ladies. In some areas, the streets were crowded with groups of people happily going from home to home.

Gifts such as flower bulbs and candy were presented to the young ladies, and cornucopias filled with sweets were exchanged. Refreshments of sherry, punch and tea - and, in the South, eggnog - were served in every home.

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# Many Christmas traditions come from Scandinavia

OSLO, Norway (AP) - When Scandinavians first saw pictures of Santa Claus more than a century ago, it didn't dawn on them that St. Nick might be a big, jolly old fellow.

Most assumed he was tiny, like their own gnome, the tomte, who seems to have been around since the Vikings' pagan midwinter celebration. It was called Jul, which is now the word for Christmas.

Families often leave a bowl of rice pudding on their doorsteps Christmas Eve. Tradition has it that a tomte deprived of his expected Yuletide treat will punish the household.

Midwinter daylight is so scarce that modern Scandinavians, like the Vikings, look forward to a break in "the dark time," says Olav Boe, a Norwegian folklore expert.

"In essence, a modern Nordic Yule is the same as the Jul celebrated by the Vikings: A family event with food, beer and good companionship," says Boe, a professor emeritus of the University of Oslo.

Nordic countries abound in snow, reindeer and evergreen trees, symbols the world associates with Christmas.

Reindeer have long been a favorite wintertime feast dish among Lapp herders. But as Christmas trappings,

the tiny deer, decorated trees, Santa and greeting cards are relative newcomers to Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark and Iceland.

Some Nordic customs, like gift-giving, stem from the Vikings' Jul and have endured a millennium of Christianity.

The Vikings brewed a strong Jul beer to toast their god Odin. The brew, still called Jul beer, remains popular at Christmas, partly because the Catholic Church - seeking converts 1,000 years ago - encouraged its use in toasting Jesus, Boe says.

Wheat sheaves - called Julenek - left outside for the birds at Christmas may be a leftover from the Viking custom of making Jul offerings to the gods, according to some history texts.

Norway's first German-inspired Christmas tree arrived around 1820. After townspeople carried it through Oslo, then called Christiania, they weren't sure what to do with it. So they set it on fire, says Boe.

American-inspired cards and advertisements featuring reindeer have failed to make Christmas celebrities out of most of the 1 million reindeer which roam Lapland, the northernmost part of Scandinavia.

If anything, 'tis the season to be nervous for Rudolph's Nordic kin. They face hungry herders or tourists demanding sleigh rides, reindeer skins and antlers.

"Of course, we eat reindeer for Christmas," says Jan Amundsen, a herder in Norway's Lapland.

"It's got to be reindeer. It's the best meat," agrees Juhani Magga, a Lapp herder in northern Finland.

Christmas dinner, served Dec. 24 before families open presents, is based on strong regional traditions, some from Viking times. Outside Lapland, favorites include lamb, ham and fish, including lutefisk - cod turned gelatinous with lye.

Santa Claus figures often share tables with traditional decorations: Candles, wreaths, and the tomte.

"St. Nick is the one you see in the street, but you still see more (decorations) of the old Christmas gnome," Boe says.

The traditional tomte, in rough work clothes, a red hat and demanding Christmas gifts, has little in common with the amiable white-bearded man who hands out presents to children, says Agneta Lilja, a folklore researcher at Sweden's Uppsala University.

The tomte supposedly has an old man's face, a child's body, and watches over the farm.

When Scandinavians claim to see tomte, it is usually at dawn or dusk. "They say they see him pottering around in the stable, or just moving about in buildings," says Lilja.

Santa came to be accepted as a strange tomte.

But until the early 20th century, most Lapp herders preferred their ancient winter beliefs, often involving witches and supernatural reindeer.

Lapps now embrace Santa. The old fellow attracts around 400,000 tourists a year to Rovaniemi, the capital of Finnish Lapland, where he and his reindeer are on duty year-round.

The growing Santa Claus industry has the Nordic countries squabbling, even at intergovernmental meetings, over which is the real home of St. Nick.

All the countries get letters to Santa, but most - about 500,000 a year - are mailed to Finland.

Greenland, a Danish protectorate, opened a permanent Santa's Workshop in Nuuk, the capital.

This year, Drobak, Norway, erected a "Santa Crossing" warning sign on the highway outside town. It shows Santa's plump silhouette, pack over his back, scampering across the road.

The Finns call him Joulupukki, the Christmas Goat, recalling the pre-Christian days when Jul celebrants wore goat horns. The ancient Yule Goat, also called the Julebuk, still appears in other Nordic celebrations.

In Norway, masked children depicting the Julebuk go house to house singing carols and expecting treats. "It is as close as we come to Halloween," says Boe.

Another pagan belief was that Lussi, a demon woman with fiery hair,

wandered the earth on the night between Dec. 12 and 13. That was the longest night of the year before the calendar was changed.

Children were especially careful on Lussi night, because evil Lussi would know if they were naughty and might come down the chimney after them. Adults also were afraid, Boe says.

When Christianity came to Sweden, Dec. 13 became Lucia Day, a Roman Catholic tribute to St. Lucia, martyred in Sicily in 304 A.D.

Now golden-haired girls wearing crowns of candles parade through offices, schools and streets, singing the Neapolitan song, "Santa Lucia," and Swedes wear glitter in their hair to brighten up the mid-winter darkness.

"It is dark and cold and windy. You can hear all kinds of strange sounds, like the trees rustling. It could lead you to believe that supernatural beings were afoot," Boe says.

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# Self-made decorations can be satisfying

For some of you, making your own gifts and decorations is the most satisfying part of celebrating the holidays.

Even things made from standard patterns and instructions take on unique characteristics with your choice of materials and details. "There's just something inherently special about an item made by one's own hands," says Pamela Hastings, director of consumer education for Singer Sewing Company.

Some possible projects:  
- There's a Father Christmas figure pattern you could sew using scraps taken from old clothing or other sources. This McCall's pattern (5580) includes the 21-inch figure and four variations of hooded coats and gowns. Patchwork, velvet, tapestry, or brocade with faux fur trim are some of the different ways to interpret the pattern, which includes a gift sack to fill with miniature candies and toys.  
- McCall's also has a quick decorating package (5512) that includes a stuffed Santa star, three-dimensional tree, and a country

heart wreath. Another pattern (5511) includes country Christmas decorations and mob-cap dolls done up in calico patchwork; ornaments include a cinnamon stick holder, fabric ball, heart applique square and miniature stocking on a hanger.

- Or you could deliver a gift in a personalized gift bag made of fabric with holiday greetings stitched in machine block letters or decorative stitches - a suggestion from Singer. This can be reused as a tote or lingerie bag later, depending on size.  
Instructions: Cut a rectangle or square of fabric to desired size. Stitch on the greeting first, when the piece is flat and easy to work with. Then fold in half lengthwise, right sides together, and serge or stitch two open sides. Turn bag right-side out, then fold raw edge 1/2 inch around opening and press. Turn under another 2 inches, press and stitch along lower edge, leaving an opening for a drawstring of satin or velvet ribbon.

- Make Victorian-style lace potpourri ornaments, another Singer suggestion. Instructions: Cut an

8-inch square of lace and finish edges either with a narrow zigzag stitch or rolled hem, using a decorative thread. Place potpourri in the center, then draw up knapsack-style, using velvet or satin ribbon. Hang on the tree with ornament hook.

- If you're not a sewer, try glue. A suggestion from Loctite, which makes Creatively Yours craft glues, is to decorate a whole tree with teddy bears and ribbon, or make a wreath with bears, ribbons, and ornaments.

Instructions for the wreath, using a 14-inch pine wreath: Make a four-inch gold bow (four yards) and wire to bottom of wreath. Wire two 8-inch bears to either side of the wreath (asymmetrically balanced), then loop three yards each of silver and gold ribbons (1 and 1 1/2 inches wide) around and through the pine, pinching and gluing every six to eight inches. Wind six yards of star garland around the other elements, wiring into place. Finish by gluing on six 2-inch holiday boxes, 12 1-inch gold Christmas balls, six 4-inch snowflakes, and six 4-inch poinsettia picks.

- Fragrant garlands or wreaths of braided fabric and potpourri are suggested by Gail Duff in her book, "The Scented Christmas" (Rodale Press).

Instructions: Cut three 18-inch by 3 1/2-inch strips in colorfully coordinated fabrics, closing each with a 1/4-inch seam along the long edges. Center this seam on the resulting tube, and seam across one short end. Turn to right side of fabric. Fill each tube with 2 tablespoons of "Christmas spicery" and close the other end by hand. Pin the three strips together at the top, braid them loosely so they will lie flat, then machine-stitch across both ends. If the garland is to be used straight, tie a 1/4-inch ribbon to each end (a yard will be enough for both ends). If you want to make the braid into a wreath, lay the garland flat in a circle and sew the ends together, covering the join with a floppy bow made from about a yard of 1/2-inch ribbon.

Her recipe for Christmas spicery: 3 ounces lavender, 3 ounces crushed cloves, 1 ounce crushed juniper berries, 1 ounce finely crumbled bay leaves, 1 ounce gum benzoin powder, 2 ounces orris root powder, 6 drops lavender oil, 4 drops clove oil, and 4 drops lemon verbena oil.

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# Variety of new toys on '91 store shelves

Here come the new toys for the 1991 holidays. Let the play begin:

**DOLLS.** An emphasis on dolls of color or of varied nationality this season will give black or ethnic children a greater variety of dolls and toys to identify with. These toys may broaden the world of white children, too.

The cool Hip Hop Kids, for example, represent black, white and Hispanic youngsters in trendy dress, each carrying a different message, such as staying in school and away from drugs.

They are marketed by Olmec, a firm started by former financial editor Yla Eason after she discovered her son didn't have a black super-hero toy for inspiration. Her company was the first to mass-produce dolls and action figures with black and Hispanic characteristics, and now it markets eight lines of ethnically correct toys.

Other doll lines offered in varied ethnic and color variations include the Puffalump Kids from Fisher-Price and My Very Soft Baby from Playskool, all with soft bodies and vinyl faces. The Cabbage Patch Kids from Hasbro continue to be available in a variety of colors and characteristics. New versions include My Own Baby, who coos and giggles when "mother" is near and cries when she's not. Baby Face from Galoob comes in 10 variations, each with a different facial expression.

Tyco's Little Oopie Daisy doll, which crawls, falls down, and cries - comes in both black and white versions, as do the company's miniature Quints sets.

And if your child is a fan of Steve Urkel of television's "Family Matters," a doll version of the character played by Jaleel White may be a hit. This toy from Hasbro talks smart, saying "Got any cheese," "No sweat, my pet," and other Urkel-like utterings.

Hispanic, Caucasian, Oriental and Afro-American soft-body dolls make up the America's Kids Dolls collection, available through the J.C. Penney Christmas catalog. Each comes with two outfits - American dress and a costume typical of the doll's heritage.

International dolls also appear in the Neiman Marcus catalog, with all-fabric kids from the United States, Africa, China, Mexico, and Russia. Each has a tag introducing the owner to basic phrases in the language of origin and facts about how children live in that country. Sales of these dolls benefit UNICEF.

From Sweden comes Nordic competition for Barbie - Petra. This doll, made in Mora, a small rural town northwest of Stockholm, is a leggy Scandinavian with long blonde hair and blue eyes. Lerum Toy Co., which markets the doll, says Petra's wardrobe is interchangeable with Barbie's.

So too, are the clothes of dolls patterned after another icon, Miss America. This line from Kenner includes five "finalists" of different hair and complexion colors, not to mention different goals in life, detailed on the packages. Blair,

Devon, Justine, Raquel, and Tonya are destined for careers in athletics, the arts, science, politics and medicine.

Meanwhile, Barbie herself is still going strong, along with her coterie, which includes Teresa, a Hispanic doll, and Christie, a black doll. Barbie's best friend, Midge, is a bride this year and is the star of one of the most elaborate sets marketed by Mattel - with the groom, Alan, and Barbie and Ken serving as bridesmaid and best man. The group is completed with Kelly, the flower girl, and Todd, the ring bearer.

**WHEELS.** The Big Three in Detroit have some pint-sized competition from Power Wheels by Kransco, a line of battery-powered children's cars that range from classy Porsches to Jeeps. Some of these are big and powerful enough for two children to ride in, and there's a buyer's guide to help consumers choose models and features for the right age groups.

The company maintains a network of service centers around the country.

A monster truck called The Claw comes from Kenner, expanding its wheels to reveal rotary claws when it meets an obstacle like a log or rocks. This all-terrain model is battery powered and rolls with reaction traction at high speed over almost anything in its way.

For pre-schoolers, there is the wide-wheeled 1-2-3 Bike from Playskool, with trainers that can be adjusted or removed as the child masters balancing on two wheels. At the earliest stage, the training wheels are positioned in an outboard position for maximum stability. Next, they can be turned in toward the bike for the intermediate stage, then finally removed.

Traditional model cars, trucks and dumpers still fascinate youngsters. The Sound Machine Water Cannon from Nylint is an authentic copy of a real fire truck, with authentic fire engine sounds. Nylint's Wallbangers are powered racing cars that emit screeching sounds of collisions, including crumpling metal and glass, when they are bumped or jarred.

Model train maker Lionel this year has launched a large-scale line about twice the size of other models and rugged enough for use outdoors. Two featured models are the North Pole Railroad, with Santa at the controls, and the Walt Disney World 20th Anniversary Train Set, copies of the ones that run at the Disney World resort. # Homemade ornaments special

With manufactured Christmas decorations not available in America until the 1870s, the earliest trees were adorned with ribbons, fruit, gilded nuts, homemade paper and tin ornaments, cornucopias holding candies and nuts, and small toys for children.

Then, as now, the enjoyment of holiday decorating came as much from the opportunity to exercise creativity as from the final outcome. The writer of Cassell's Household Guide, published in 1871, asserted that half the pleasure of "decking the halls" lay in "giving scope to one's taste and ingenuity, new ideas springing up and developing themselves as the occasion arises, till the worker finds delight in the work."

In fact, until the turn of the century, the majority of Christmas tree trimmings were homemade. In St. Nicholas, a monthly children's magazine published in America between 1873 and 1940, youngsters were instructed on how to make ornaments ranging from tissue paper snowflakes and gilded popcorn strands, to monkeys made of raisins strung on wire and dressed in cotton hats and shirts.

Whether you opt to string popcorn or cranberries or to undertake a more involved project, homemade trimmings for the tree add a special touch. Even young children can be involved in simple tasks, such as creating the paper chain described below.

### PAPER CHAINS

"These are very useful in giving a light, fairy-light effect to a room, and taking off the somewhat sombre effect

of dark evergreens. The making of them will furnish amusement to the younger members of the family, as they are made very easily. The links are formed of strips of rather thick paper of various colours, about six inches long, and from half an inch to an inch wide. One link being made of red paper, a strip of green is passed through it and the ends pasted together (your children would probably prefer the quicker stapler). The choice of colours will of course be a matter of taste." (Cassell's Household Guide, 1871). Fifteen to twenty feet of chain was considered necessary for a floor to ceiling tree, and by the 1880's, foils and glazed papers were being employed for chains. Specialty paper, such as origami, wrapping paper, or foils from art or craft stores, create a more elegant look than simple construction paper. Gallier House Museum Quarterly Bulletin, Volume XI, Number 3.

The directions below for creating a Cloth Christmas Wreath and Papier mache Christmas Balls are reproduced from The Joy of Christmas (Barron's), by Helen Feingold and Mary Lee Grisanti.

### CLOTH CHRISTMAS WREATH

Use 2 yards each of a solid-color, calico or small print cotton fabric; you will also need heavy-duty sewing thread and 2-inch-wide velvet or grosgrain ribbon. Crush each material lengthwise into a bulky rope. Secure the ends and wrap the sewing thread loosely around and around the rope to keep the fabric in place. Tie the three ropes together and braid. Tie end of

braid and bring ends together, shaping a ring; sew ends. At intervals, clip thread holding fabric in place and remove. Sew back of wreath onto a wire ring or wire coat hanger bent into a ring. Tie a ribbon bow and sew in place over the joining. Dried flowers, small pine cones, artificial berries and other small ornaments can be pushed into the folds of the fabric. Hang wreath on a nail. After the holidays, the wreath can be dismantled and the fabric used for sewing.

### PAPIER-MACHE CHRISTMAS BALLS

Tear newspaper into 1-inch wide strips (tearing rather than cutting allows paper to be molded more smoothly). Prepare wallpaper paste according to package directions and place in a bowl. Run paper strips through paste until wet and well coated. Stroke off excess glue and

place strips over a small orange, rubber ball or plastic foam ball until it is completely covered with a layer 1/4 inch thick. Place on a rack in a warm, dry place (a radiator, hot air register or near the furnace is ideal) and let dry several hours. With a single-edge razor blade, cut through the paper around the center of the ball and twist to remove from mold. (If using plastic foam, omit this step) Put the halves back together, insert a loop for hanging and cover the sash with more strips of wet paper. If you like, paste and apply color pictures from magazines pretty cutouts from old Christmas cards, or other colored papers. Let dry for several hours. Paint as desired with acrylic colors, let dry and then brush with spray or lacquer. Abstract patterns, stripes, polka dots, funny faces, Christmas scenes, glitter, flowers, holly leaves, solid colors, words and sayings, anything goes!



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


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

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## 'My Son Johnny' explores violence between brothers



Michele Lee stars as widow Marianne Cortino in *My Son Johnny*, airing Sunday on CBS. When a longtime pattern of brutal abuse between her sons culminates in tragedy, the distraught mother is forced to face painful truths. Based on a true story, the film also stars Corin Nemec and Rick Schroder.

### Nemec excels as tortured sibling

In 1989, audiences were riveted to the miniseries *I Know My First Name Is Steven*, starring young Corin Nemec. Top-notch writing and direction were important, certainly, but Nemec's heartbreaking portrayal gave the film its emotional center.

Now, Nemec does it again in *My Son Johnny*, a modern Cain-and-Abel story airing Sunday, Nov. 10, on CBS. Admittedly, the film has its flaws, but Nemec's performance, along with fine support from Michele Lee and the always-reliable Rip Torn, make this a work worth watching.

Based on a true story, the film focuses on Marianne Cortino (Lee), a widow struggling to make a living for herself and her younger son, Anthony (Nemec), a quiet, gentle high-school senior. The elder Cortino boy, Johnny (Rick Schroder), is entirely different, a mean-spirited rebel whose youth was punctuated by delinquency, drugs and even brief incarceration.

After a time, Johnny returns home and resumes his brutal physical and emotional abuse of his younger brother. Like her late husband, Marianne dismisses the violence as normal. "You're just boys," she says. "It's in the blood."

This time, however, something stirs in Anthony's blood. When his drunken brother beats and humiliates him in front of his girlfriend, something snaps. Almost as a zombie, Anthony fetches their father's pistol from an upstairs closet and shoots Johnny twice in the chest.

Immediately after his arrest, Anthony remembers nothing. At length, however, the anguished boy recalls the murder, and much, much more. Defense attorney Brian Stansbury (Torn) is appalled to learn of the torture Anthony endured while grow-

ing up and knows what he must do in court — unveil that horror and clarify Anthony's act of simple self-defense.

Still, the film succeeds because of the actors. Lee does a fine job, giving more than the script gave her, while Torn's portrayal is sound and passionate. Schroder is regrettably weak as Johnny, relying on threadbare tough-guy mannerisms and too little real emotion. His often cartoonish behavior (and ludicrous dialect) diminish what could have been a memorable glimpse at real evil.

Ultimately, the film rests on Nemec's young shoulders and he rises to the occasion admirably, showing in his face all the pain and resentment the script fails to voice.

*My Son Johnny* is a laudable effort and an important one, addressing a serious problem that is often ignored. Following the film, CBS will air a telephone number offering help for those suffering from, or engaging in, sibling violence.

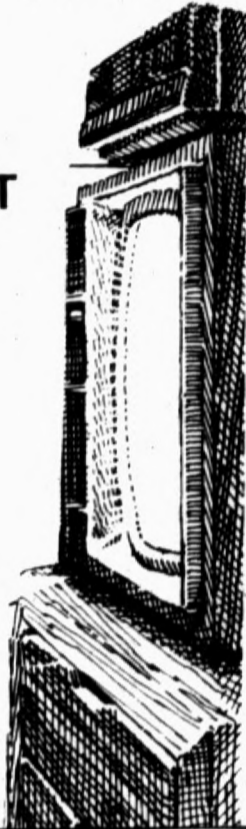

## For Jeremy Brett, Holmes is the mystery

Actor plans to complete  
Conan Doyle's canon

"It's not possible to play him," insists actor Jeremy Brett of Sherlock Holmes, whom he has played in more than two dozen TV mysteries based on the stories of Arthur Conan Doyle. The saga continues Thursday, Nov. 14, on PBS' *Mystery!* with the first of five new Holmes whodunits. "We've now decided to complete the canon (of over 50 Conan Doyle stories)," he adds, without hint of irony.

More than 100 actors have played Holmes in the 104 years since his creation, and Brett says he didn't want the role at first.

"I couldn't think what else I could bring (to the part)." But he soon discovered that none of the famous portrayals—even Basil Rathbone's—stayed really true to Conan Doyle's stories, and many details had been lost: Holmes' habit of smoking a variety of pipes to match his many moods; or even the gentlemanly change of headgear (deerstalker in the country, top hat or bowler in town).

Still, "I couldn't find the center of him. It says in the book, 'Holmes is a mind without a heart.'

"I see him as a marble statue. And I don't see him breathing. I'm still trying to find a way of doing him without breathing."

However cold Holmes may be, Brett has developed a sense of kinship with the character. "I like him because he's a Bohemian, he has no class rubbish. He takes on cases not for money, but for the ones that he wants to do. And he can deduce. He can find one clue, and put an entire history together."

Until this role came along in 1982, he says, "I had been playing heroic parts, and romantic parts," including the lovestruck Freddie in *My Fair Lady*.

There is a gallant, if false, modesty in his repeated insistence that he is "miscast" as Holmes, as though no actor should have so much range. Critics disagree, calling him the best Holmes ever.

This time out, Brett concedes, "I think I'm a little better, and I'm not quite sure why. I'm not saying I'm more relaxed, but I'm not in such pain."

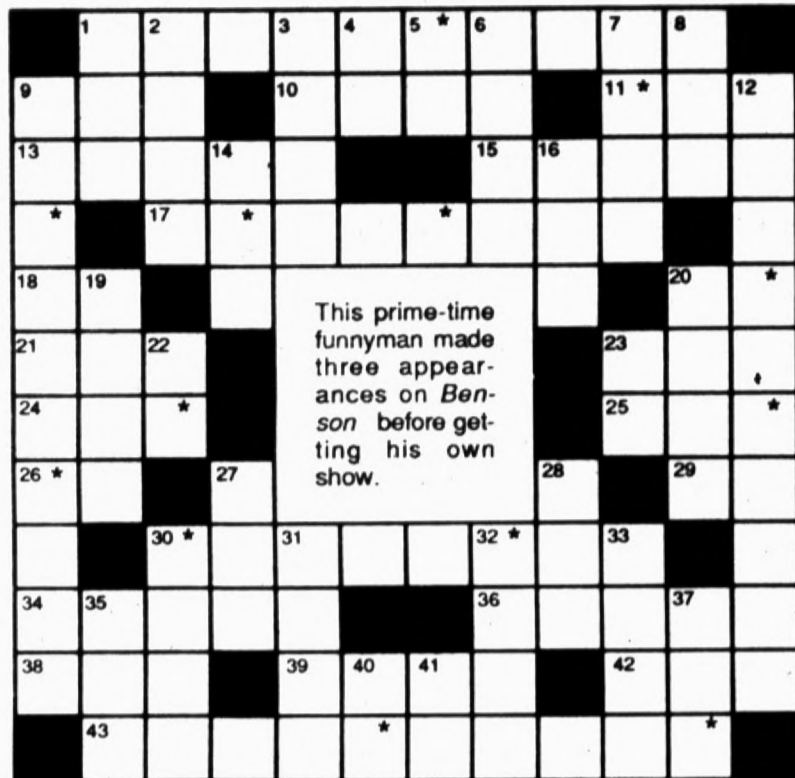

### TLC paints Paris' age of art

Recipe for an explosion of ideas: Gather an assortment of artists into a Parisian cafe, douse with wine, then speak liberally. Like the great cultural crucibles of Greece and Italy in centuries gone by, Paris was the mecca for artists between 1900 and World War II. Beginning Monday, Nov. 11, The Learning Channel presents *The Genius of Paris: Montparnasse Revisited*, a five-part series airing daily. Interviews with more than 150 painters, poets, composers, actors, musicians and photographers who lived in the Montparnasse district during the heyday of Hemingway and pals illuminate the glorious battlefield of "La Revolution Culturelle."

Culture may be forged by the fires of inspiration or blown to dust by the arid winds of change. The nomadic Masai people of Kenya, uprooted from their land, now face the annihilation of their way of life. When she gets involved in Village life she locks horns with a neighbor, an over-analytical psychiatrist played by Jeff Daniel. By setting the story in lower Manhattan's Greenwich Village (still one of the most charming and eclectic areas of the city), the

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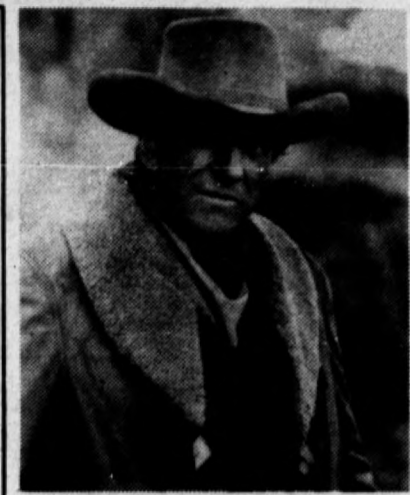
