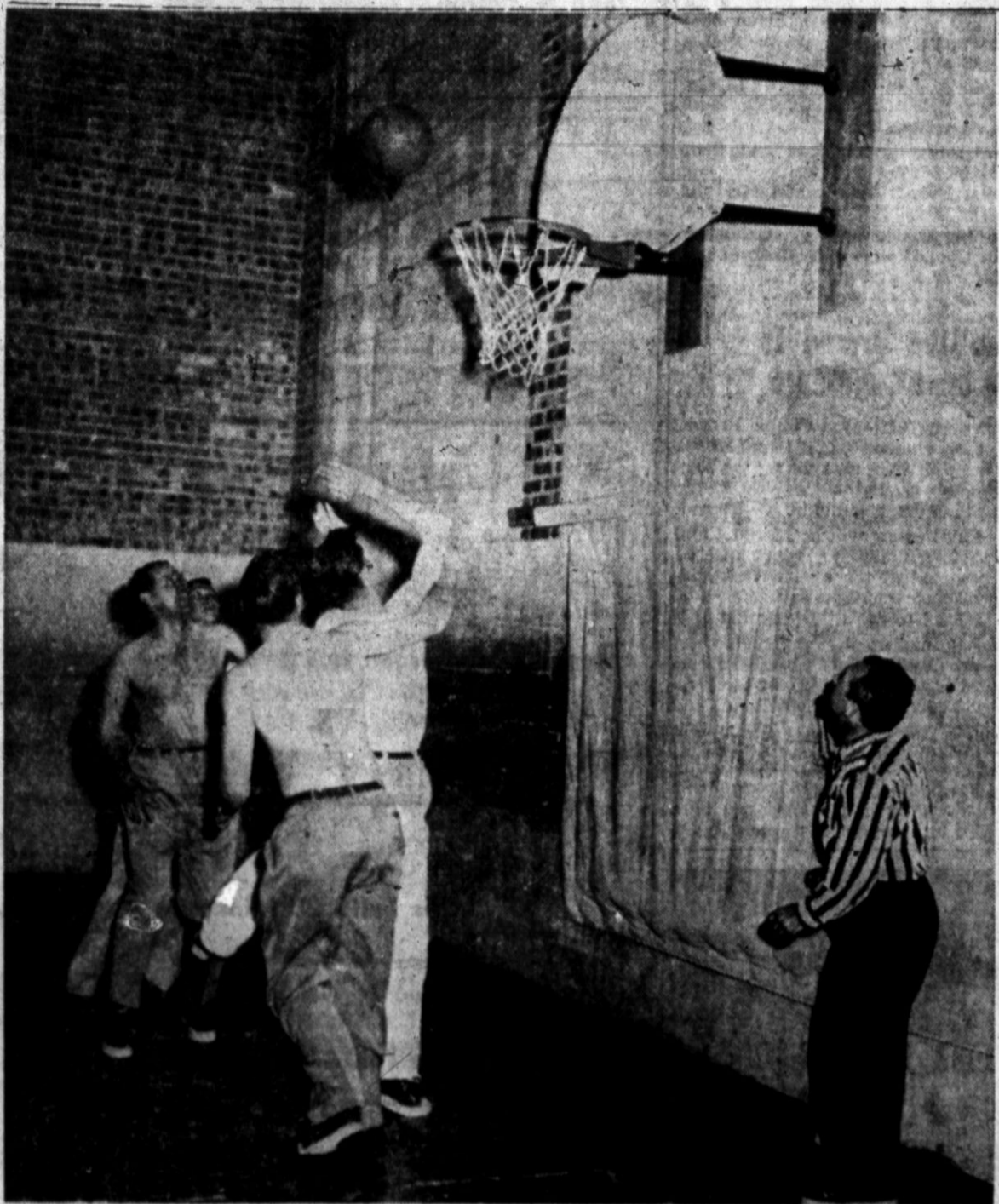
The first flight finds J. M. Posey matched with John Estes. Winners of these two flights will then play for the Grand Champion-

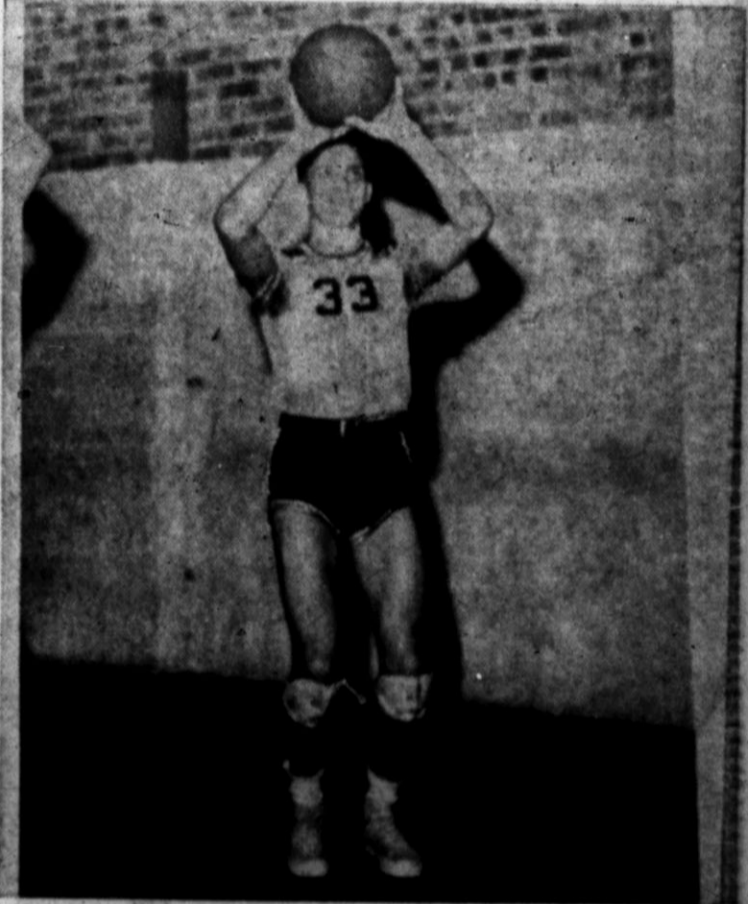
In the fourth, Gregory matched Allen's first quarter feat, pouring

The main events get warmed up for the fracas with a couple of duels which provide a three-match program for the Hereford Arena.

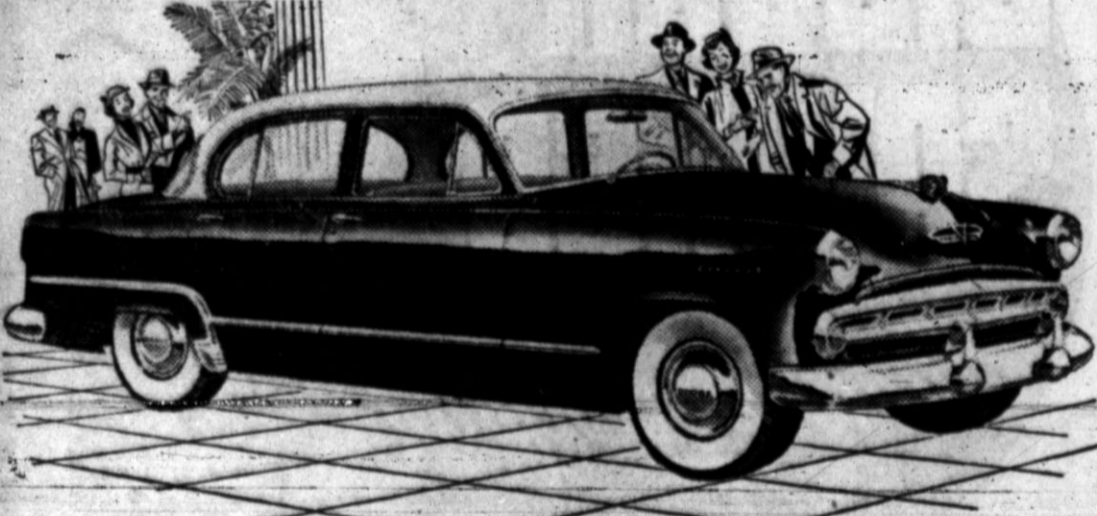
In the first, Herb Parks tangles with Whitey Walberg, and there is little left to say about the ability of each.

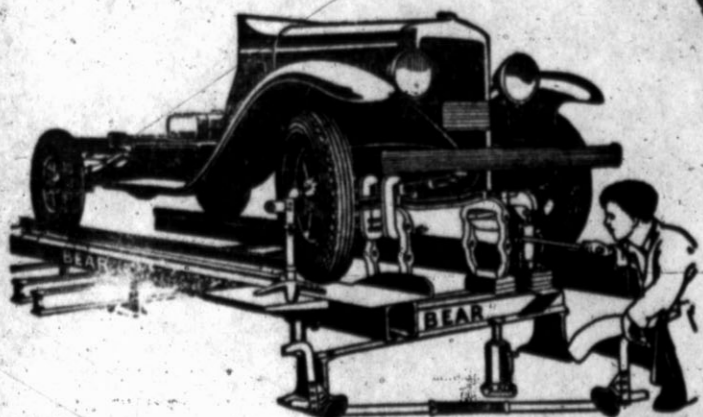

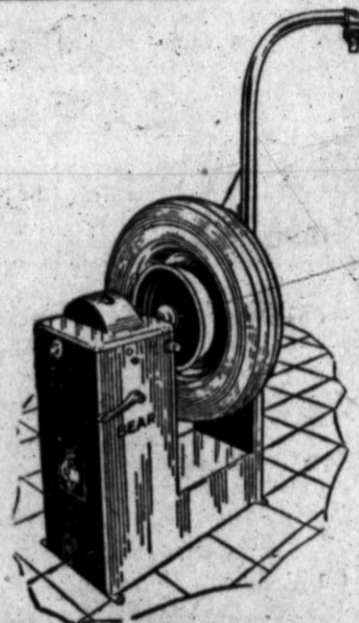

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

STIN, Tex.—Abolishing gasoline tax refunds would provide for a perpetual farm-to-market highway fund and give \$4 million a year more for schools.

Chairman E. H. Thornton Jr. of the Texas Highway Commission made that assertion as he prepared an analysis of the state's road situation for presentation to the Legislature.

Gasoline tax refunds go to those using the fuel for non-highway purposes. Last year refunds amounted to \$15,367,000 of \$120,244,000 collected. Most of the refunds go to farmers who use gasoline for farm vehicles and machines.

Thornton is asking for an additional \$100 million per year to bring Texas highways up to the highest standard and maintain them for the next 10 years.

struggled with the highly controversial auto inspection law—the one that requires you to have that little yellow sticker on the windshield of your car.

Senator Carlos Ashley of Llano typified opponents of the law who want it repealed. Ashley thinks the law is discriminatory in that it works a hardship on lower income bracket people who cannot afford extensive repairs on their cars.

Accidents, Ashley contends, are caused, not by defective automobiles primarily, but by drunk drivers and speeders.

The senator argued that poor people in his native hill country make a living hauling cedar posts in slow-moving trucks that would not pass inspection in a junk yard.

"Why should they have to pass a windshield wiper inspection when they don't have windshields?" Ashley wanted to know.

Senator John Bell of Cuero, on the other hand, worked to retain the bill and modify it so that the safety sticker would not be a requisite to purchase of an automobile license.

Bell also would specify what particular parts of the car would have to be examined to get the inspection tag. Bell and others believe that the law, if retained, will cut down on highway deaths.

The chances that horse racing will return to Texas seem slight.

Representative Ed Sheridan of San Antonio introduced a bill to legalize parimutuel betting, but when the time came for a committee hearing on the measure, Sheridan said he was willing to postpone the whole thing.

Stout opposition to the bill had been gathering, and Sheridan said he wanted to "let it cool." Observers here doubted it would cool enough to let the bill pass.

Quick action was needed, Governor Shivers said, to provide for 900 tuberculosis patients who are now being treated at Weaver H. Baker Hospital at Mission.

The Air Force will take over the hospital on July 1.

Bills to provide for the patients passed the Senate, but moved slowly in the House.

What regulation should there be about home rule cities annexing

adjacent areas?

In the legislative process is a bill by Senator Johnnie B. Rogers of Austin to restrict annexation.

Such a law is needed, say its supporters, to prevent cities from taking in farms, pastures, and dairy lands.

Opponents of the bill from Houston and other cities say it would practically stop annexation and force cities to retain their present boundaries.

The Senate made up its mind about the five-day banking bill—and killed it. The bill, which had the support of some big city banks, would have permitted the financial institutions to operate on a five-day week basis.

Opponents were banks in smaller cities, where the rural people come to do their banking and shopping mostly on Saturdays.

Senators considered the question of whether we should have a preferential presidential primary in Texas—whether we should select delegates to national nominating conventions by vote of the people rather than at state party conventions.

We should, said Senator Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, because "I have never seen anything go wrong with a secret election and a free ballot."

We should not, argued former Senator Joe Hill, because if delegates are elected only the very rich or the stooges of some pressure group could ever go to a conven-

tion.

And his wife lost her purse while he was addressing the Senate.

Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe proposed a constitutional amendment to get money to build needed state office buildings from a two-cent property tax now going into a Confederate pension fund.

The fund now has a surplus of \$5 million over what is needed to pay the pensions of two veterans and 500 widows of Confederates.

In the Senate is a bill, already passed by the House, that is intended to give stronger control over Communists. The bill would make it easier for officers to enter and search the homes of persons suspected of being subversive.

Opponents of the bill contended that it was a threat to civil rights.

The Senate and House met jointly to hear Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, ace of World War I, condemn the Roosevelt-Truman administration for a "weak and vacillating foreign and domestic policy."

This is how Rickenbacker would stop the Korean war: blockade the Chinese coast, cut the railroad between Manchuria and Indo-China, and use atom bombs behind the Korean front lines.

Q. What can I do to minimize the appearance of a slightly receding chin?
A. You can try blending a spot of rouge on your chin in a crescent shape, and using a lighter shade of powder on your chin than on the rest of your face.
Q. How can I make my hair sweeter-smelling than it is?
A. One good and effective way is to add a few drops of cologne to your last rinse water, after shampooing.
Q. What is the best kind of rouge for excessively oily skin?
A. Dry rouge is better than cream rouge. Combat that oiliness by watching your diet, getting plenty of exercise, fresh air and sun.
Q. What is the best way to curl long-bobbed hair quickly and easily?
A. The old-fashioned rag curlers are best for this. Use strips of cloth, ribbon or socks, and section the hair smoothly and hold the strand for winding in the direction you want the finished curl to lie. Roll strand under, around the

middle of the strip, and tie the strip ends together to hold the curl in place when it reaches the scalp. Hair should be only slightly damp for this type of waving and need be left rolled only about a half-hour.
Q. How can I treat cold sores on my lips?
A. Apply hot compresses to relieve their soreness, then dab them gently with spirits of camphor.
Q. What exercise is good for reducing large hips?
A. Lie on floor and clasp your knees close to your diaphragm. Cross arms over knees, and keeping stomach pulled in, roll far to the right with knees in the cradled position. Without using your elbows to push you back, roll to left. Roll back and forth pushing with your hips. Do this exercise on a hard surface, at least 100 times daily.
Q. What is a good way to prevent smearing of my lipstick?
A. A little perfume added to the lipstick will help prevent this.
Q. I have a very dry skin and wish to avoid soap and water as much as possible. What is a good substitute cleanser?
A. A very good cleanser for removing old makeup from the skin is mineral oil of any brand.
Q. Is there any way, through my makeup, that I can make a short, broad nose look longer and narrower?
A. You can try drawing a line of light foundation base from the bridge to the tip of the nose, and blending this into a darker shade of foundation at the sides.

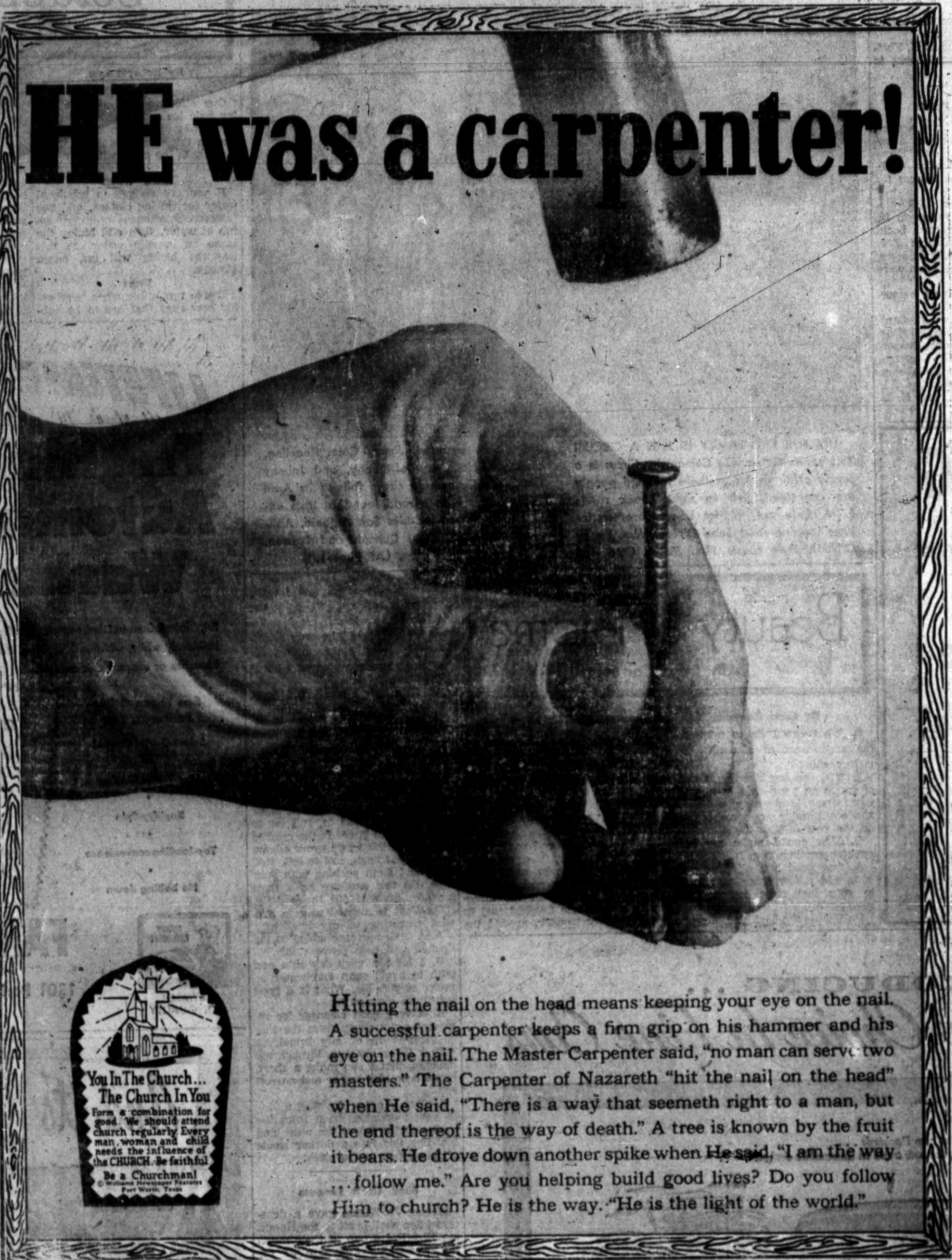

CONG. WALTER ROGERS REPORTS:

Restoration Of Value Of Dollar Presents Problems In Economics

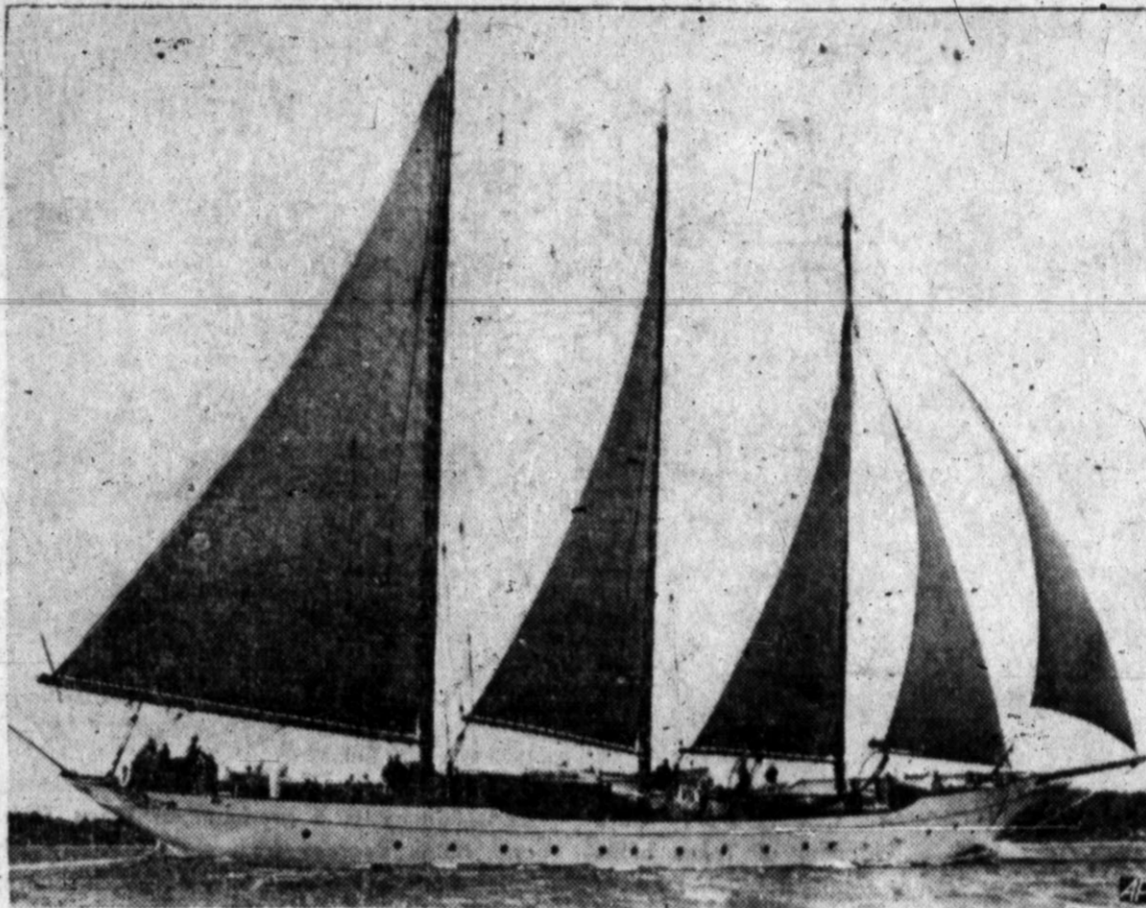
NO MAJOR BREAK BETWEEN EISENHOWER AND THE CONGRESS: Despite many predictions to the contrary, I do not look for any major break between the executive and the legislative branches of the government. It is true that there will be many differences in the future, as there have been several already. Those heretofore occurring have been settled without disturbing repercussions. Those occurring in the future can and should be settled in the same manner. There is little doubt that President Eisenhower does not want a running fight with either the House or the Senate. The same is true with a majority of both of the Houses of Congress. The President knows that the Congress will back him all the way in maintaining the defense of this country and in sound economy measures. This is especially true of the Southern bloc. This bloc has not changed its principles in the slightest degree. It makes little difference to the members from the South who or what party might be in control, as this bloc intends to continue in the future, as it has in the past, to vote on the issues as they are

presented and to base those votes on sound and basic principles dedicated to the best interests of this nation. President Eisenhower knows this as well as any man who ever served as President. RESTORATION OF THE VALUE OF THE DOLLAR: Much has been said and written about restoring the value of the dollar. All of this talk sounds good until you begin to analyze the problems involved. Co not expect a speedy increase in the value of the dollar. Such action by any administration under the present circumstances could well prove economically disastrous. The major task at the present time is to stabilize the present value of the dollar and prevent it from sinking lower. When this is done, action can then be begun for a gradual upward trend in its value. This upward trend must consume several years. An immediate increase of 30 to 40 per cent in the value of money would mean bankruptcy to many small business concerns, municipalities, and individuals, to say nothing of the increase in the already back-breaking burden of the national debt. The debts that are presently owed

by business concerns municipalities, individuals and the Federal Government are fixed amounts that were incurred in dollars of approximately the same value as at present. A drastic and immediate increase in the value of the dollar would simply mean a corresponding decline in the value of goods and of course wages. The President has placed in his Cabinet a number of outstanding business men who have full knowledge and understanding of the problems involved, and I do not think that they are going to take any steps that could result in a major recession and a possible depression.

STATEHOOD FOR HAWAII: The Interior and Insular Affairs Subcommittee on Territories and Insular Possessions, of which I am a member, is presently studying the Hawaii statehood bill. This will be a hot issue in this Congress. Alaska and Puerto Rico were both disturbed because Hawaii was singled out for statehood in the President's State of the Union message. The hearings on this bill are most interesting and will produce many interesting facts, which I will try to give you from time to time. Statistics as of July 1, 1948, reflect Hawaii's population at 540,500, of which 100,000 are Hawaiian, 70,000 part Hawaiian, 177,000 Caucasian, 144,000 Japanese, 28,000 Chinese, 18,000 Filipino, 9,000 Puerto Rican, 5,000 Korean, and 1,500 others. Alaska's population at that date was 100,000, approximately evenly divided between Caucasians, on the one hand, and Eskimos, Aleuts and Indians, on the other hand. Puerto Rico had 2,113,053, 76.5 per cent being Caucasian and 23.5 per cent being Negro. Space will not permit me to include other interesting facts conditions, land uses, labor matters, taxation, and other subjects in this letter.

RECEPTIONS IN WASHINGTON: Washington was a city of receptions during the past several days for the President and his opponent whom he defeated in the November election, Governor Adlai Stevenson. There were several receptions for Governor Stevenson during his short stay in Washington, the highlight of his visit being of course his meeting and conference with the President. The Congressional Club gave a reception on Monday night, Feb. 26th, honoring the President and Mrs. Eisenhower. This club is made up of wives of present and former Members of Congress who desire to join. The reception was a formal invitation affair. The invitations were in great demand and many government officials did not get to attend because of the space limitations in the Club. The President and Mrs. Eisenhower were

Q. How can I make a transparent cement for glass?
A. By digesting together for about a week one ounce of indiarubber, 67 ounces of chloroform, and 40 ounces of mastic.

How Can I?

Q. How can I remove light scratches on furniture?
A. By rubbing over them with boiled linseed oil, turpentine, and white vinegar, mixed in equal proportions. For the deeper scratches, use a paste made of thick muckage mixed with coloring matter to blend with the furniture. For oak, use burnt umber and raw sienna; for mahogany, Venetian red; for walnut, burnt umber and Vandyke brown.

Q. How can I make use of old candles?
A. Melt the ends of old candles and add this to common turpentine. The mixture will make an excellent wax for polishing the floors.

Q. How can I renew the surface of blackboards?
A. Dissolve 4 ounces glue in 1½ pints hot water. Add 3 ounces flour of emery and enough lamp black to color. Stir until smooth and apply with the end of a roll of

woolen goods. For best results, apply three coats of the above.

Q. How can I prevent streaks when washing painted woodwork?
A. It is advisable to wash painted woodwork a small amount at a time, rinse, and then wipe dry. This will prevent those streaks which are seen so often after cleaning a painted surface.

Q. How can I mend table linen so that it will hardly be noticeable?
A. Try darning the linen on the sewing machine. First put the worn places in embroidery hoops, loosen the tension of the machine, and then stitch back and forth until the place is neatly mended.

Q. How can I avoid making a tough pie crust?
A. Too much water makes the crust tough and also makes it hard to roll out. Add about a teaspoonful of water at a time, and use as little flour as possible on the rolling pin and board.

Q. How can I make new shoes comfortable?
A. By moistening the lining of the shoes, or the stocking worn, with alcohol and wearing the shoes while this is drying. This makes the lining of the shoe stretch to fit the foot and prevents the pinching often caused by the lining alone. Using alcohol also eliminates danger of taking cold.

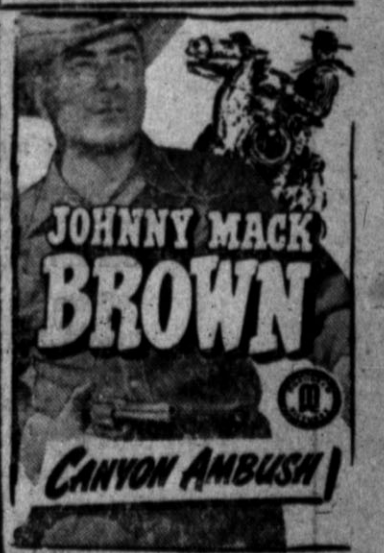


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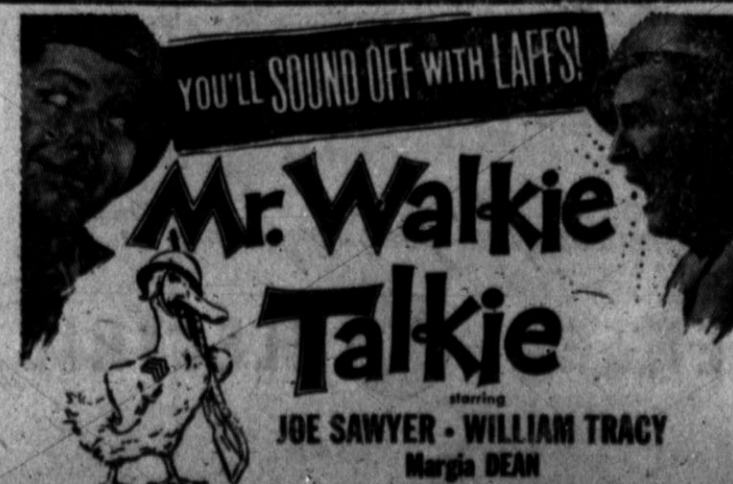
