

Test kitchen experts, working with poultry, recommend a low (325 degrees) temperature for roasting goose. They also suggest that the stuffed trussed goose be placed breast down on a rack in a shallow uncovered pan. When the goose is about two-thirds done, it is turned breastside up to finish


Visits In Virginia




