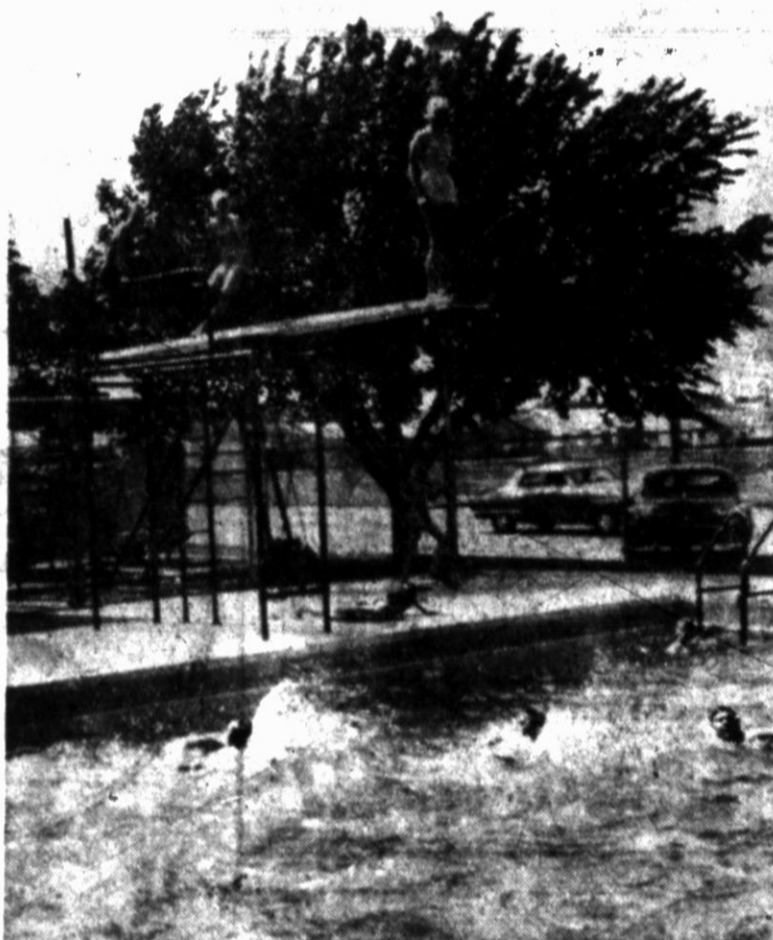
The Hereford Jaycees reported a net of \$851.57 from the two dances sponsored here during Pioneer Days.

## Baby Badly Beaten; Stepfather Charged

Charges of "Aggravated Assault and Battery" were filed Monday against William Henry Gilpin, 30, formerly of 201 105, following complaints of neighbors who alleged that Gilpin brutally beat his 11-month-old stepson. The complaints were signed by Mrs. Gilpin.

Gilpin told officers, however, that the baby boy was "beaten and bruised by children."

The small child was badly bruised about the face, showed severe marks on its neck and under its chin and had apparently been subjected to heavy blows, according to Sheriff Lowell Sharp, who arrested Gilpin following complaints from neighbors.

Sharp arrested Gilpin Monday

morning and carried the baby to doctors for examination. He said that no internal injuries were apparent. However, in addition to the neck and facial marks, the child's lips were bruised and he said that its tongue appeared to be possibly injured. Teeth marks were also found on the baby's arm, the sheriff said.

Gilpin appeared before County Judge Horace L. Schloss Monday and asked that his bond be set. The court set bond at \$750 on

two counts, based upon complaints signed by Mrs. Gilpin. He made bond Monday night and was released Tuesday morning. The entire family was reported to have left town. Trial on the case was set for July 6.

Gilpin had previously been employed as a mechanic by McCullough Motor Company before the incident occurred. Mrs. Gilpin said that they were married in Houston on March 10, 1953, and the baby was by a previous marriage.

There were 175 donors called during the day, according to Corinne Jennings, executive Red Cross secretary. Young mothers and people with rare blood types were not accepted.

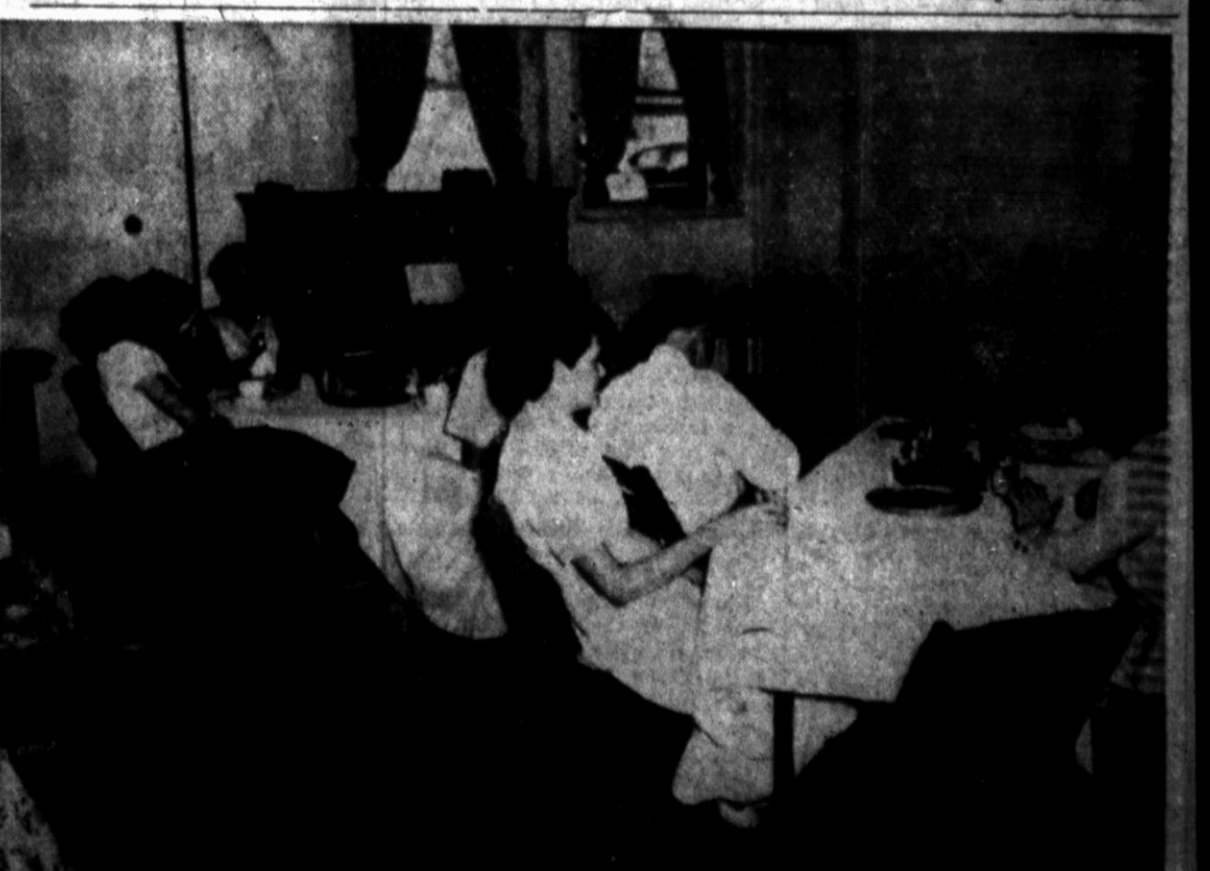
The supervisor of the unit was well pleased with the amount contributed during the six hours that they were in Hereford, Mrs. Jennings said.

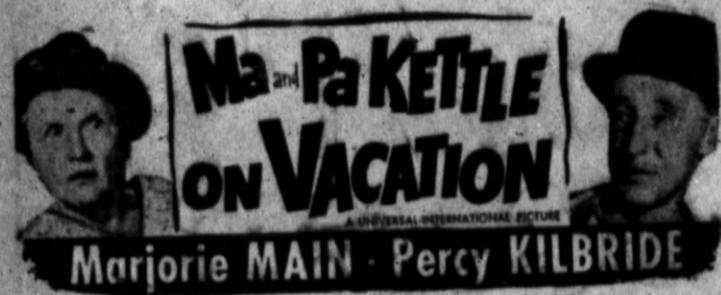

### Beauty At Home

Q. How should the hair be dressed when one has a very narrow forehead?  
A. Sometimes the narrow forehead requires reshaping the hairline. If the hair grows too far forward over the temples, it can be removed by using a depilatory especially designed for facial hair. Q. How can I exercise to help slim down my ankles?  
A. Lie on back, one leg raised straight up. Holding leg stiff, circle the foot outward 20 times, then inward 20 times, being sure to keep the leg stiff. Repeat with other leg.

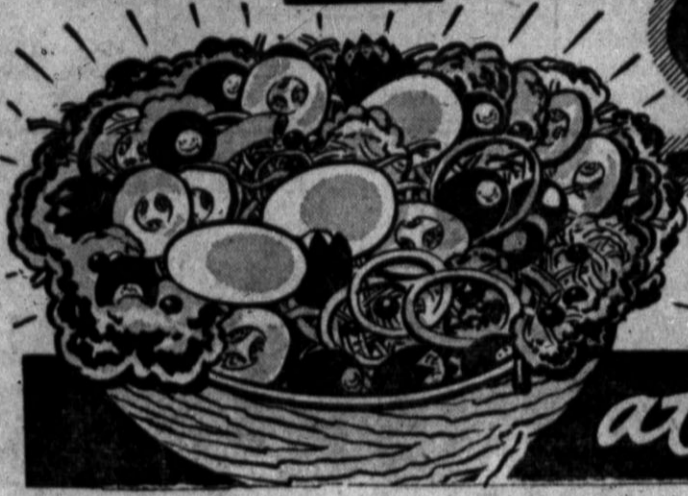

These two girls are the daughter and step-daughter of Earl Head, who lives on the Probst farm northwest of town. Jessie Ann said,

"They put rugs on the floor and painted the house. They bought a refrigerator to put in the house."

Mr. and Mrs. Probst came to Texas from Kansas, and to Deaf Smith County from Lubbock. They have two sons, one in high school and one who has just completed three years of service in Germany. Both are members of St. Anthony's Church in Hereford, but have not yet had time for clubs or other activities. Mr. Probst likes golf but has been too busy farming and supervising the construction of two new houses on Star Avenue to try out the local course. Mrs. Probst's sister, Mrs. Loderhose, recently moved into the second house.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Probst like riding, fishing, square dancing, bridge and meeting new people. If the girls have their wish, these two will have a week of such activities at Drowsy Water Ranch in cool Colorado.

ter. One son, Bill, was president of the senior class and "most versatile boy" in Hereford High School this year. The other son is president of Future Farmers of America.

The family attends the First Christian Church in Hereford most of the time. Mrs. Carmichael is a member of the Progressive Home Demonstration Club and helps occasionally in such activities as the Cancer Drive. Mr. Carmichael is vice-president of the Farm Bureau and is one of the county's five committeemen on the High Plains Water District Board. Both belong to a community square dance club. Mr. Carmichael says they fish sometimes, but deer hunting is his

Mr. and Mrs. Tiefel have become too busy in home and church to keep up former club memberships, though Mr. Tiefel is still a fireman. They say, "About all the vacation we take is a trip to the Firemen's Convention. It would be wonderful to go to Drowsy Water Ranch, but we really don't expect it. We haven't done enough."

It would be exciting to end this story by saying, "And then Arthur Tiefel rushed out in the rain to another fire." But we can't. That happened the night before we were there.



Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Jacobs

Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Jacobs have lived in the Panhandle all their lives, but have been in Hereford only four years. Mr. Jacobs came to work at the cotton gin Construction Company, doing earth moving and making concrete irrigation ditches. They have five children, two of them are married. The children go to the First Baptist Sunday School, but the adults rarely have time for church or clubs. Mr. Jacobs has worked seven days a week for over three years. Mrs. Jacobs works outside the home occasionally.

Though Mr. and Mrs. Jacobs are busy, they seem to have time for their neighbors.

Mrs. H. G. White, 608 Union Ave., says, "They came and helped my daughter and family when they were in need. They would come any hour of the night with helping hands. She is a very understanding woman and mother. I have been here four years and I know her well. She is a good neighbor to everyone."

Mrs. M. H. Wiseman says, "I know of four families they have helped in time of need since they have lived by me."

Mrs. Carl Schroeder says, "They

are always ready to do what other people leave undone. Recently a family was badly burned. They took the husband and little ones in their home, fed, clothed, and gave them love. An old man was taken in and given the best of care until his death. A mother and children whose only support was sent to jail were provided with food, medicine, and moral support. They have taken care of me when I was sick—washed, ironed, and cared for my children."

James Whitson says, "When my brother's house burned here in Hereford, Mrs. Jacobs took care of the children in her home until their mother and the two other children got out of the hospital. This is only one instance where they have helped others. I could name many more."

Mr. and Mrs. Jacobs like to fish but rarely get time to do it. Mr. Jacobs has had very little experience on horses but she "was raised on a horse." The trip to Drowsy Water Ranch would give them a week in which to rest, ride, fish, go sightseeing and make friends with new people.

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Mr. and Mrs. Robert Boyd

Up to the present date, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Boyd, 122 Higgins, have had the most nominations in the Good Neighbor Contest. Mr. Boyd came to Hereford from Tennessee in 1916, moved to Missouri in 1929 and returned to Deaf Smith County in 1936. Mrs. Boyd came from Hollis, Oklahoma, in 1922. They were married in 1927 and have four children—two girls married and two boys at home. One of the boys was graduated from Hereford High School this year.

Though Mr. Boyd is not working, temporarily because of an injured foot, he still "runs a bunch of cattle." Mrs. Boyd has been working about six weeks at the Hereford Floral Company, which is near their home. Both are still active in the Methodist Church and Union Sunday School at Westway.

Cleo M. Wade, Route 5, says, "Mr. Boyd lived twelve miles west of Hereford on Mr. Oscar Hinger's farm until January of this year. He never got so busy with his own interests that he couldn't go help a neighbor or anyone in trouble. It was a great loss to this and the Westway community when Mr. Boyd moved to Hereford."

Mr. and Mrs. Johnnie Townsend, Westway, say, "When there is sickness in the home, the Boyds are among the first to offer assistance, sitting up at night, doing the work, or anything that's to be done. When our community house needs any kind of repair, Mr. Boyd is right there with hammer and saw. Both sing with Westway singers and never refuse when called on suddenly to fill in for someone. The

Boyd's have moved from our community to Hereford, but are still good neighbors to the Westway people as well as to those who live near them."

Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Merritt say, "Anytime there is any sickness, Mr. and Mrs. Boyd will leave their own work to help out. Mr. Boyd is Westway's handyman. You can depend on him to help with anything whether it's fixing a stove or a windmill. There are not any better neighbors."

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Lander, Route 5, say, "Mr. and Mrs. Robert Boyd are always the first to render their service when anyone needs help of any kind."

Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Combs say, "Mr. and Mrs. Boyd are the finest neighbors. They are always the first to arrive in sickness or distress. Mr. Boyd has spent several weeks working alone on the community house here in Westway. We wish to see them have this vacation because, as long as we have known them, they have worked."

R. M. Gunn says, "They are always ready to drop their work and to help the needy, either in work or sickness, and I don't think they have ever had a real vacation."

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Dyer, who live near the northern boundary of Deaf Smith County, came here as children. Mr. Dyer came from Missouri in 1905 and Mrs. Dyer came from Sherman County, Texas, in 1909. They were married in 1927, and have had four children. One is Ann Dyer, who sings in the High School Girls' Octette.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Dyer are members of the Vega Methodist Church, and Mrs. Dyer is a charter member of the Ford Home Demonstration Club.

Mrs. LeRoy K. Williamson says, "Mrs. Dyer is very active in home demonstration club work—always has time to help someone else in craft work, in which she excels. A good deal of her time is spent with the 4-H Club, of which she is leader."

We saw an example of her work in porcelain. She has modeled the head of one of her sons and it is beautifully done.

Mrs. Williamson says, also, "Mrs. Dyer took my two small boys into her home and cared for them while I was in the hospital when my little girl was born. She would accept no pay for this, her

philosophy being that she could repay help given her in the past by helping someone else. Mary Cayton has been in the Dyer home during her mother's hospitalization following a hip injury. That does not mean the Mary merely had a place to stay. The Dyers saw to it that she was taken to Vega for school activities and treated as her own daughter.

"I have lived in this community only two years so do not have full report on the Dyers. However, I have learned to expect to see the Dyers at any community gathering doing more than their share of work. For example, they build the fires for cold weather meetings at Ford School.

Mrs. Dyer helped in the recent Red Cross membership drive and taught a first-aid course last summer."

Mr. and Mrs. Dyer "never had much time for vacations" although they did take one in 1940. It is hard for both to leave the farm at the same time. Usually they take turns on any trips that have to be made. Mrs. Williamson would like to see them take a vacation at Drowsy Water Ranch this year.

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Plank have been unable to get a picture of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Plank. At the time we went out for an interview, Mrs. Plank had entertained her Horizon Club girls at a luncheon, had run some last-minute errands in town and, in the short time before a school meeting, was trying to finish packing for a trip to Nebraska to return some children to their mother. Mr. Plank was away on last-minute errands of his own, so we came away without a picture.

Mr. and Mrs. Plank came to Deaf Smith County from Pampa about nine years ago. Both grew up on farms, he in Oklahoma and she in Illinois, and would probably feel at ease on the riding horses at Drowsy Water Ranch. Their children, one daughter and two sons, all ride well, too.

Mrs. W. H. Goetsch feels they should be awarded the trip to Drowsy Water Ranch because, "They are good neighbors in so many ways. They are a Christian family giving of their time, gifts and services to the Methodist Church in Hereford."

"Mrs. Plank has been leader for a group of Camp Fire girls for a number of years. One of the many things she did for the girls was taking the group on a tour of the western states, furnishing the

transportation, herself. She gave untiringly of her time to see that each girl fulfilled her requirements. "Last year a Mexican family working for them had a baby. Mrs. Plank cared for the mother and baby at birth. When the mother went to the field, leaving the baby with other children, it became unceremonious and was losing weight. Mrs. Plank took the baby into her home and gave it the best of care, both medical and physical. Soon the baby began to grow. The whole Plank family was so proud of that baby. No baby ever had more loving care."

"Last fall, Mrs. Plank learned of a family of three children whose mother was in the hospital with no one to care for them. Mrs. Plank took the children home with her, provided for their Christmas, made them feel like members of the family.

"Lots of people criticize our school system and do nothing about it. Mrs. Plank saw a need, ran for school trustee, and is now giving of her time and ability to improve conditions.

"She started the wheels of rolling to start the day nursery which will open soon at the Labor Club. "Anytime there is a community need, you will find the Planks there doing their part. It is people like them who make our country a better place in which to live."

During my six-week illness the first part of the year, she kept my washing and ironing done for me and wouldn't accept any pay. They are always visiting with new people who have moved to our town, and with older citizens, too."

Mr. Hershey says their greatest pleasure comes from visiting and helping people. If they win the trip to Drowsy Water Ranch, there will be plenty of time to visit with new people. Mrs. Hershey says, "That would be a honeymoon trip. We never had one."

Mr. Gay R. Smith, Box 541, says, "When my wife had to go to a tuberculosis hospital in Denver, Colorado, they took my daughter and kept her until a week after school was out and would not take pay for it. While my wife was at home, they brought food and did lots of other nice things that no one could ever repay with money. These are the reasons I think they are good neighbors."

Mrs. Saulcy, a native Texan, came to Deaf Smith County in 1935. Mr. Saulcy came from Idaho in 1947 and settled on a farm in Westway community where they are hoping for good potato and wheat crops this year.

Both the Saulcys attend the First Methodist Church in Hereford. Mr. Saulcy is active in the American Legion, after army service in World War II, and Mrs. Saulcy was Poppy Chairman in the Legion Auxiliary this year. She is also recreation leader in the home demonstration club and a member of the union missionary society at Westway. She was leader of the Sadie Lee Oliver 4-H Club for four years.

Mrs. George E. Turrentine, of Westway, says, "Clarence and Bessie Saulcy are always willing

and ready to help any of their friends. No one lives too far away to be their neighbors. Bessie has gone as far as twenty-five miles to help one of her friends paper a house. When anyone is sick, or on a vacation, or an emergency trip, they are willing to help by doing chores, feeding the hired hand, sitting up with them or taking care of the children. They have Billy Ohlig in their home now while Gary is still in the hospital. All children, as well as adults, are welcomed into their home with open arms. 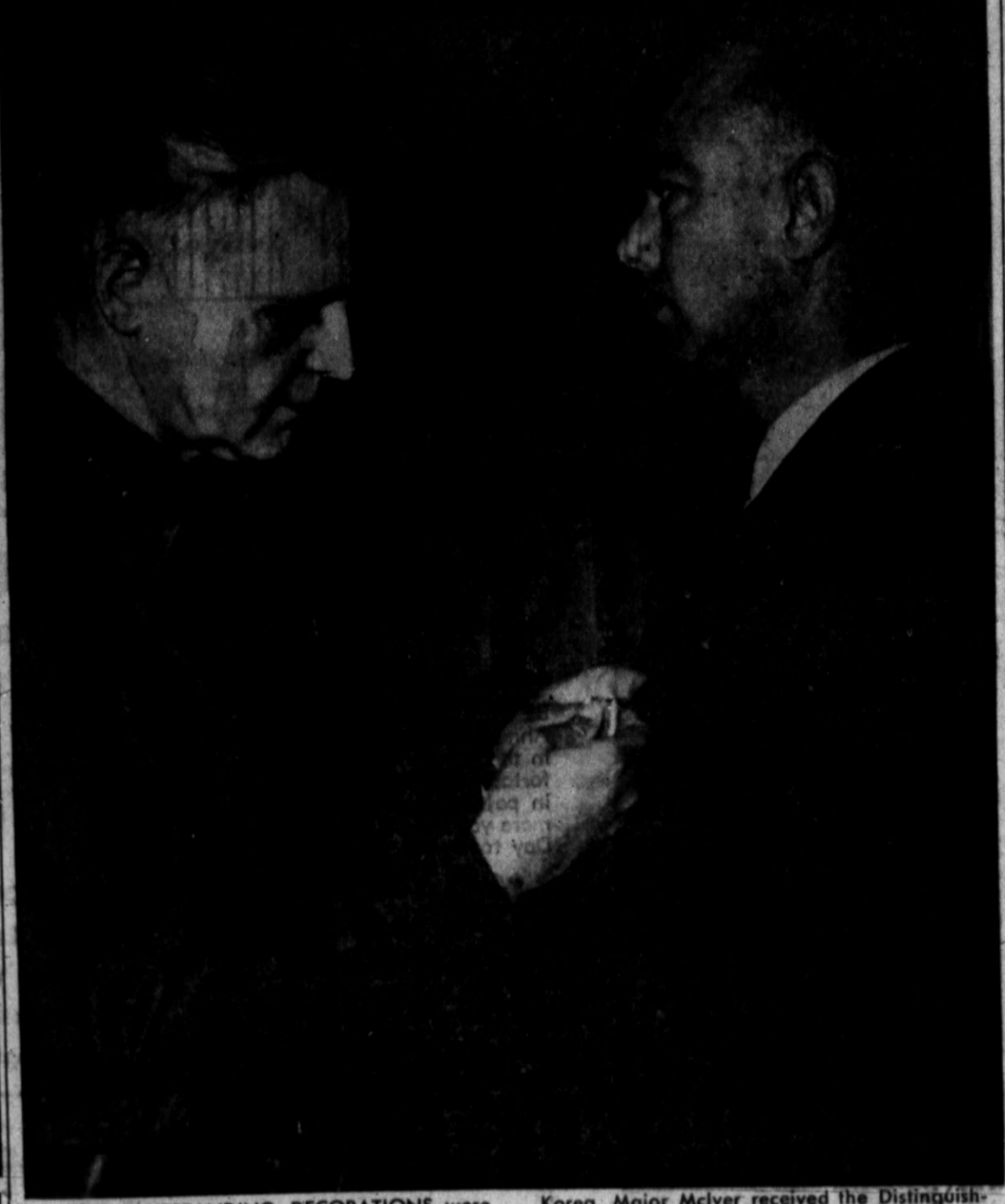

## Hereford Man Decorated For Valor Shown In Korean Area

**FIFTH AIR FORCE, KOREA**  
Major James Calvin McIver, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. McIver of Hereford, recently received two military decorations of distinction: the Bronze Star medal and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

As chief of the Reconnaissance Operations Branch, Fifth Air Force in Korea, Major McIver was responsible for the planning and coordinating of photo reconnaissance missions that enabled the Far East Air Force bombers to hit the Communists so effectively. This particular feat achieved the Bronze Star Medal for the Major.

Major McIver, as pilot on a night flying photo reconnaissance airplane, also made a bombing attack on a heavily defended city in North Korea but was forced to turn away from the target by intense anti-aircraft fire, despite the enemy flack he made a second attack that proved highly successful. He and his crew then went on to complete their photo reconnaissance mission although constantly harassed by enemy ground fire. This feat secured the DFC for extraordinary achievement in aerial combat. Both decorations were presented Major McIver by Lt. Gen. Glenn O. Barcus, commanding general of the Fifth Air Force in Korea.

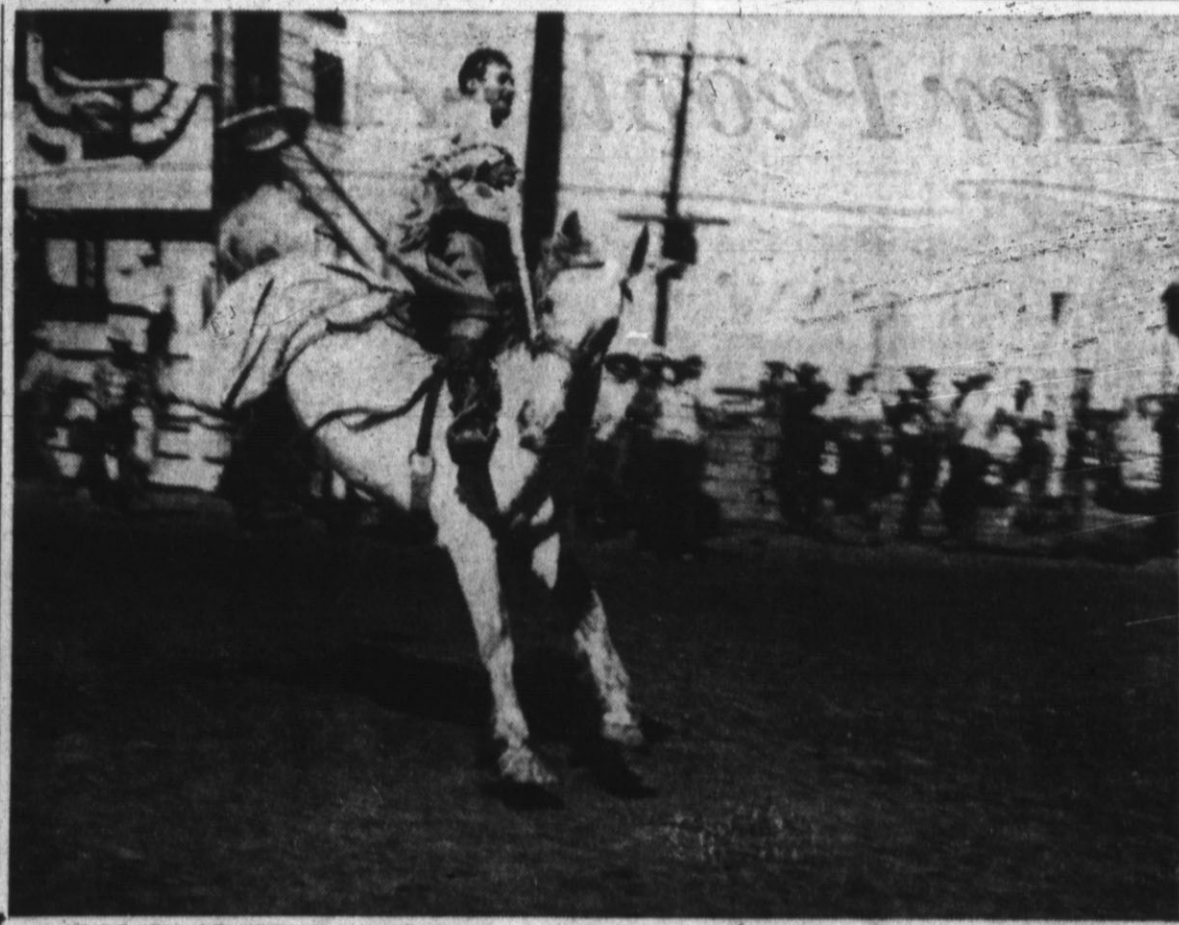

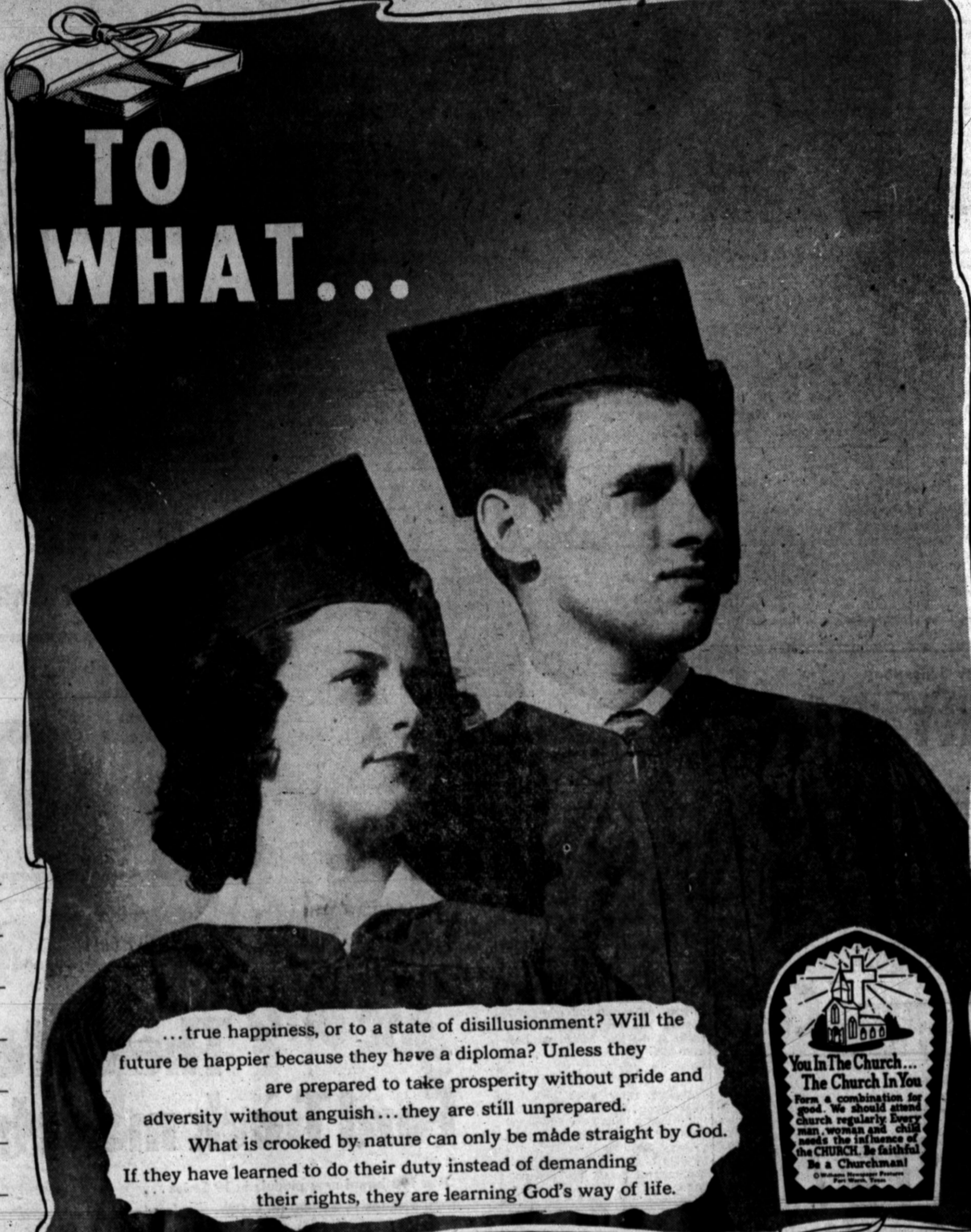

## Household Scrapbook

By Roberta Lee

### Faded Rug

Try renewing a faded rug by first cleaning and dampening it. Then prepare a dye bath of the desired shade. Place the rug flat on several layers of newspapers. Apply the hot dye with a scrub brush. It is better to deepen the original shade of the rug rather than attempting to change its color.

### Fat

It's not always necessary to use fat for frying foods. Simply rub the skillet with common table salt, then shake it out and put in the meat to be fried.

### Sateen

Use borax water when washing sateen garments. This method will restore the gloss.

### Sweet Potatoes

Grease the sweet potatoes with lard before putting them into the oven, and they will peel easily without waste. The flavor will be improved if a tablespoon of sugar is added to the water in which sweet potatoes are boiled.

### Linen

To keep linen from turning yellow when storing it, wrap it in blue paper. Or, use a piece of cloth that has been dipped in very strong bluing water.

### Shoes

Shoes can be made waterproof by applying castor oil about twice a week.

### Damp Rooms

Place pieces of camphor in all corners, and on the shelves of closets in the rooms that are damp. Replace them when they evaporate and they will soon take away all dampness.

### Lemons

To freshen lemons which have become hardened, after long standing, cover them for a few minutes with boiling water.

### Packing Clothes

A point well worth remembering when packing clothes for a trip is to place tissue paper in the folds of the garments and in the sleeves. This goes a long way toward preventing them from creasing, and the garments will look much fresher when they are finally unpacked and hung on hangers.
