A good year out here would see an average yield of 10 bushels to the acre on dryland, according to be in the crop when irrigation County Agricultural Agent Hugh Clearman, or about 3,000,000 bushels of wheat harvested.

Potatoes have three times as much acreage in the county as they did last year, but two freezes which set them back, followed by heavy attacks of psyllids, which had to be fought with sprays and dust, gave the crop-a set back from which it seems unlikely to recover.

Last year, potato harvest began about June 23, while this year it is likely to be held up until around the Fourth of July. Processors estimate that a crop equal in volume to that produced last year will be good, as the potatoes are smaller Still Lots of Spuds

Mildew sometimes forms on shoes that have not been worn for O. C. Cummings. a long time. Remove it by rubbing the spots with petroleum ointment. After a little rubbing, the marks will disappear.

#### Rancid Butter

Rancid butter ean often be fresh ened if broken up and put into fresh milk. Allow it to absorb the milk, drain thoroughly, then wash in cold salted water and work it again into the desired form.

#### Renovating Leather

To renovate leather upholstery, and remove the greasy looking marks from its surface, try the following: Boil half-pint of linseed oil and let it stand until nearly cold. Q. What treatment can I follow help remedy overly-dry hair?

A. 





The operating area of this team will be the most of West and North Texas, and will include Hereford. According to team president Captain Alden C. Clark, the team, supplied with the most current and factual flying training information, will visit colleges, universities, Air Bases and cities in a wide area around Bib Spring, Texas.

Pilots or Observers

Aviation cadets are trained to become pilots or aircraft observers. An Aircraft Observer is schooled in an aircrew specialty such as bombardment, navigation, radar, or aircraft performance en-

Upon completion of approximate ly one year of training, an aviation cadet (Pilot or Observer) receives his silver wings and a commission as a second lieutenant in the United States Air Force Re-

To qualify for aviation cadet training, an applicant must have a minimum of two years of college credits; be between 19 and 261/2 years of age, single, in good physical condition, and be able to pass mental and physical tests.

Pilot applicants must have normal 20-20 vision, while aircraft observer candidates need only 20-50 vision correctable with glasses to the normal 20-20 vision.

Fast Assignment Young men applying now for aircraft observer training can expect a class assignment within six weeks after they successfully com-


